

Applying to the International Baccalaureate Program at Charlotte Country Day School

Which students are best suited for IB?

- Motivated students with a passion for learning
- Students with solid academics (A's and B's, already enrolled in some honors courses)
- Students who demonstrate many of the qualities of the IB learner profile: inquirer, knowledgeable, thinker, communicator, principled, open-minded, caring, risk-taker, balanced, reflective

All application materials are confidential and evaluated anonymously by a committee of IB faculty. The committee will decide together if the applicant is accepted, provisionally accepted (allowed to pursue IB dependent on fourth quarter performance), or denied.

Three-part application (all details are on the IB page on BucsNet):

- 1. Country Day transcript
 - a. Mr. Peery pulls this for all applicants
- 2. Teacher recommendations
 - a. Applicants must request that all current teachers <u>and</u> their advisor complete an online recommendation form (teachers have the link; students need only to ask for completion)
 - b. Recommendations are due March 3, so please ask well in advance
- 3. Student essay
 - a. Details on essay prompts and requirements are on the next page
 - b. Student work will be submitted via online form by 11:59pm on March 3 (submitting early is okay)

Timeline 2020-2021 (subject to change):

- Late January: Mr. Peery visits all English 10 classes to discuss IB
- Feb. 10, 7pm: IB Open House via Zoom (link will be provided). Attendance is strongly encouraged.
- March 3: Student essays and teacher recommendations due
- March 24 (approximately): Admissions decisions are released via email
- March 25-26: Individual conferences with Mr. Peery for all accepted and provisionally accepted applicants
- April 6: Deadline for accepted and provisionally accepted applicants to commit to IB

- 2. Choose <u>one</u> of the following to respond to. Make sure to indicate which question you are answering by numbering it, e.g., 2.b). 500 WORD LIMIT
 - a) Write about a time when your knowledge changed significantly. How did you change as a result?
 - b) What is the best piece of advice to which you still do not listen? Why?
