Is there any good news? As we enter 2021, saying a welcome goodbye and good riddance to 2020, the call for hope and cheer is both necessary and uplifting. So here is my contribution, and

in no place is there more reason for optimism than in the prospects for young women and girls across the globe.

Some facts to start: Girls are now better educated than at any time in history. They are more independent than ever, no longer subject to the authority of father and husbands.

Women now run large companies and significant countries; the Vice President of the United States is a woman. In this respect, no-one can seriously and honestly claim that a woman's place is "in the home".

In all aspects of life women and girls have caught up with men and boys. 50 years ago, according to The Economist, 49% of primary school age girls in lower middle income countries were in school, compared to 71% of boys – today the share is 90%.

Again, The Economist notes, that in 1998 only half the world's secondary school age girls were enrolled, today it is two-thirds.

Sex selection at birth is declining fast, as girl babies are more wanted throughout the world than ever before. A child bride is also becoming a less common phenomenon, falling from 1 in 4 to 1 in 5.

And never have so many girls and women competed in sport to such a large extent or to such heights. Simply put, girls throughout the world are healthier than ever before – fewer die in infancy or are malnourished at birth.

The figures are truly remarkable and inspiring.

Yet problems and scandals abound, and it is still a shocking fact that only one girl in three south of the Sahara finishes her secondary education.

The modern girl is, nonetheless, having a time that her predecessors could not have imagined. They have an extraordinary (and to me baffling) immersion in a vast online world; they are more informed about international events and can access facts and figures at the click of a button. They are empowered; they are assertive and they are impressive.

IN THE KITCHEN WITH SWPS

MISS BLACKMAN'S LOW SUGAR COOKIES

Ingredients

150g plain flour 45g granulated or caster sugar 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 tsp vanilla extract. 2 tablespoons milk of choice 80g butter



Method

- 1. Pre-heat oven to 190°C/gas mark 6 and grease and line a baking tray with grease proof paper.
- 2. Sieve dry ingredients into a large bowl.
- 3. Cut butter into small pieces and add to dry ingredients, use "rubbing in" method.
- 4. Add wet ingredients and mix using a spatula to form dough. Knead until smooth.
- 5. Add some flour to table and roll out to finger thickness, then use a cookie cutter to make shapes.
- 6. Place on the baking sheet. Cook for 10 minutes.
- 7. Remove from the oven using oven gloves, and allow to cool and harden.
- 8. Allow to cool completely before packing away. Use an airtight container.

Equipment

1 large bowl, sieve, baking tray, spatula, sharp knife, cutter, oven gloves







LEEK MACARONI CHEESE Serves 4

Recipe

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Leeks, sliced into rounds around 1cm thick
- 3 tbsp butter or margarine
- 320g any pasta
- 1 garlic clove, finely chopped
- 1 tsp English mustard powder
- 3 tbsp plain flour
- 500ml whole milk
- 300g mature cheddar, grated



METHOD

- Heat the oven to 200°C. Pan fry the leek until just soft, then set aside.
- Boil the pasta for 2 mins less than stated on the pack, then drain. Meanwhile, melt the butter in a saucepan. Add the garlic and English mustard powder, cook for 1 min, then stir in the plain flour.
- Cook for 1 min more, then gradually whisk in the milk until you have a lumpfree sauce. Simmer for 5 mins, whisking all the time until thickened. Take off the heat, then stir in 250g of the mature cheddar.
- Stir the pasta, half of the leeks into the cheesy sauce. Tip into a large ovenproof dish, or four individual dishes.
- Scatter over remaining leeks and cheddar over the and top with the cheese and bake for 20 mins until crisp and golden.

This plant is one of the traditional emblems worn by the Welsh on St David's Day as it is said to relate to the Welsh victory over the Saxons in AD 640, when Welsh soldiers wore them on their uniforms to tell them apart from the enemy.

The lower part of a leek is white and is used in everything from soups and stews to pies and stir-fries as well as being served as a vegetable in their own right.

A number of exciting projects were produced on a range of subjects, with titles such as: 'Should there be a free market to enable the trade of live kidneys in the UK?', 'Should there be a time limit in which to save extremely premature babies?' and 'Progression or Regression? An analysis of the representation of women in 20th century Chinese cinema.' PET HOUSE GRAPH CHALLENGE

Our Year 9 mathematicians have been using linear graphs to make pet houses using Desmos graphing software with Mrs Nightingale. These are all core parts of the IGCSE maths course! Indi and Feirin included some nonlinear elements as extension, very impressive for their stage! HISTORY & POLITICS SOCIETY DR THOMAS ALLCOCK, MANCHESTER UNIVERSITY




In the first meeting of the student-led SWPS History and Politics Society over 50 people, including students from Grey Court School in Richmond, attended an illuminating lecture and an extended Q & A from Dr Thomas Tunstall Allcock, a modern History specialist from the University of Manchester.

Appropriately, 24 hours before the inauguration of the 46th President of the US, we discussed the legacy of US Presidents and how they are reflected upon in popular culture and by historians. The main individuals discussed were John F Kennedy and Lyndon Baines Johnson from the 1960s but there was plenty of opportunity to link and compare to recent events in Washington.

Dr Allcock's lecture was both informative and entertaining and the Q&A drew out a lot of further detail such as speculation as to whether JFK would have become embroiled in a war in Vietnam. We would like to publicly thank him for generously volunteering his time.

The event was both superbly organised and chaired with poise and humour by Izzy M in L6AA. The next event organised by Izzy and the History and Politics Society is on 10 February, when MP Munira Wilson (Lib Dem spokesperson for Health) will join us to give her fascinating insights into both women in politics and also the current pandemic. 



CO-CURRICULAR CLUBS



SCIENCE, TECHNOLOGY, ENGINEERING AND MATHEMATICS AT SWPS



MEDICS. DENTISTS. VETS

Medics, Dentists and Vets (MDV) Society has continued in earnest this term, albeit remotely. Prospective medics watched an informative talk from Cardiac Scientist Dr Tim Husselbury on his studies and career in medicine, and engaged in a thought provoking workshop on the ethics of Advance Directives by our Head, Mr Muller.

Further talks on Parasites in Medicine, and the Life of a Medical Student and Junior Doctor, by Dr Masri and Dr Sophie King are also scheduled for the coming weeks. An overview of MDV Society was presented as part of the Life Beyond SWPS Sixth Form parents information event.

Y8 CHROMATOGRAPHY PRACTICAL

Our Year 8 Chemists performed Chromatography at home as part of their topic on Separation Techniques. Using only household items, they were able to expertly demonstrate how water could separate different solutes in everyday pen inks.

Y8 PHYSICS VIRTUAL CIRCUITS

Over in Physics, Year 8 have been using interactive virtual circuit simulations to investigate current and potential difference as part of their Electricity topic.

SCIENCE ENRICHMENT CLUB

Students in Years 7-9 have been engaging with events shared in the Science Enrichment Club on Teams. Budding astronomer, Grace B in 9Y has been using a remotely operated telescope on the Canary Islands to photograph the Great Conjunction and the moons of Uranus, professionally producing the poster above.

Sofia L in 8W independently participated in a remote event by STEMettes to design a drone to distribute Covid-19 vaccinations, making ingenious use of carbon dioxide capture to cool the sensitive cargo.
