



Overview

- Students cannot apply to both Oxford and Cambridge.
- Courses vary between the two universities.
- Courses are intensely academic.
- Applications are extremely competitive:
 - Oxford: 23,000 applicants for 3,300 places (2019)
 - Cambridge: 19,359 applicants for 3,500 places (2019)
- Offers range from AAA A*A*A* (A Level); 38-40 points (IB)

- Personal Statement & UCAS form
 - Deadline: 15th October
- Submission of written work
- Admissions tests (November)
- Supplementary Application Questionnaire (Cambridge only)
- Interview (December)

- Organised and industrious







Choosing a course

Things to consider..

- Standard entry requirements
- Future career plans
- Single, joint or combined subjects
- Study abroad or year in industry
- Location and size of university
- Reputation of university
- Contact time with tutors
- Open Days







Personal Statement

- 4000 characters
- Academic focus
- Evidence of enthusiasm, motivation, independence, extra reading, engagement with the subject
- Vocational courses such as medicine require work experience
- Extra-curricular important but...the focus needs to be academic





Personal Statement – where to get help

You are encouraged to seek advice on applications and personal statement writing from the following

- 1. Subject teachers subject specific advice
- For Medicine, Vet Sci and Dentistry Mr Bagley (Will be presenting to Parents next Tuesday 26th Jan at 7pm. Details to be sent out)
- 3. For Oxbridge Miss Galton
- 4. Tutor the tutor should look at the Personal Statement after the subject specialist
- 5. Housemaster to help frame the reference
- 6. HE dept JSH or Mrs Sartori



Predicted Grades (current process)

- These are evidence based with the trial exams in April forming a significant part of that evidence
- Quality of work completed this year is also a factor
- Initially, in May, you will be given an internal forecast grade (IFG) which is a conservative estimate of what you might finally achieve
- UCAS draft grades are then produced in June. These are aspirational and are an estimate of best possible grade we believe you can achieve. UCAS grades are finalised in early September. Whilst there is the chance to move up from the initial IFG, we will often go back to the mock result as the key evidence
- Should help to guide you to appropriate courses and universities



Making choices...

The 1-3-1 rule

You are encouraged to consider:

- 1 Aspirational (slightly above)
- 3 Solid (as predicted
- 1 Safe (below predictions)

With *some* universities showing *some* flexibility at the moment it is fine to put two aspirational choices

The 1-3-1 rule Example:

Pupil is predicted D3 D3 B (AAB) in Economics Maths and Politics. Standard offers:

University 1	AAA
University 2	AAB
University 3	AAB
University 4	AAB
University 5	BBB



USA application



- Used by most US Colleges
- Can apply for as many as you want
- Universities in California are not on Common App
- MIT, Georgetown also not on Common App
- Three references needed for most college Housemaster plus two subject teachers

- Common App
- Early Decision Legally Binding. Not advised for those applying to Oxbridge
- Early Action
- Regular Decision
- Essays
- Recommendations (References)
