Good evening, everyone,

I would like to first thank all of the board members and health professionals who are able to join this meeting tonight with such short notice. We appreciate it. I know several you requested that we meet in person for those willing to do so. I apologize that we are unable to accommodate this request given the short notice but we will certainly be meeting in person again for our next regularly scheduled meetings in accordance with guidance from our local health departments.

This special meeting was called for by 3 of our board members. Their concern is all of our concerns – how we continue to provide an Amity quality education during these difficult times. These last 9 months have been difficult for all of us. For the parents working from home, who do not have formal training in teaching attempting to help our kids with new technology while still doing their normal jobs. For the parents who are essential employees as well as our teachers and staff, who interact with the public on a daily basis, trying our best to be safe and not bring the virus home to our families. And lastly, for our students, many of whom hol d a sense of loss – loss of their sports and clubs, loss of seeing their friends and loss of learning in an environment the way it used to be.

As recently as Wednesday, the director of the CDC reiterated his advocacy for inperson learning, citing evidence that schools aren't a major source of coronavirus transmission. The director stated, "we now have substantial data that shows that schools' face-to-face learning can be conducted in K-12, and particularly in the elementary and middle schools in a safe and responsible way". Governor Lamont and the CT Dept. of Education fully support in-person learning in our schools as long as the local health departments concur. The American Academy of Pediatrics statement on Covid advocates strongly that students be physically present in schools by stating: The importance of in-person learning is well-documented, and there is already evidence of the negative impacts on children because of school closures in the spring of 2020. Lengthy time away from school and associated interruption of supportive services often results in social isolation, making it difficult for schools to identify and address important learning deficits as well as child and adolescent physical or sexual abuse, substance use, depression, and suicidal ideation.

There are a lot of questions many of us have and this is why we will be hearing from our District Health Advisor and our two health districts in a few minutes. If there has been one constant over the last nine months, it been that Amity has worked in partnership with our two health districts. School district's consultation

with their local health departments is exactly what the state is recommending districts do and Amity is no exception. The health districts have advised us from what PPE our staff should be using, to setups of spaces in the schools, to training for our nursing staff and when Amity should be in person, hybrid or remote. Regarding remote learning, Amity has always offered a remote option for our students and of course, will continue to do so. For the first couple of months, when the numbers supported full in person instruction as per the leading and secondary indicators outlined by the State, the health departments recommended hybrid instruction. Some saw this as too conservative an approach. This past Friday, the health departments recommended we go hybrid in the high school and in person at the middle school. Some see this as non-conservative enough. One thing is for certain, the health departments are the trained professionals in community health care and we will continue to follow their recommendations as we have all school year.

With that being said, I'd like to move onto public comment.

We have 25 letters in support of continuing the hybrid model. Some of these specifically supported the hybrid model at the high school, some for continuing the hybrid model at both the middle and high school.

We have 51 letters supporting remote learning. Many of these advocated remote learning through the winter holiday break.

We have 43 letters supporting full in-person learning. Some of these supported inperson learning in general, some support in-person learning at the middle school, and advocate for in-person learning at both the middle and high school.

We have 12 letters specifically supporting a hybrid model at the high school and full inperson at the middle school.

We have 16 letters speaking against a particular model of learning. 11 spoke against returning to

in-person learning, and 6 spoke against remote learning. There were an additional 8 letters that addressed either multiple issues or different issues, such as a support of teacher or concerns for student mental health.

All together, we received 155 public comments. These have all been shared with the Board of Education members and will be included in the meeting minutes packet and posted on the website.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

I am writing to you today as a parent of a 7th grade Amity Middle School Orange student. I am also the daughter of a 41-year veteran teacher and the daughter in-law of a retired Superintendent of schools. I fully understand the importance of education for all students and the necessity of in school learning. I also understand we are in the midst of a pandemic. I am a healthcare worker who has had Covid-19 and had not been exposed to anyone that I know of. My husband brought it into the home and we have no idea where he got it. Likely the grocery store. We take all precautions by wearing masks, socially distancing and washing our hands and still got it. It does not matter where you are or what you do, you can still get it. The mask wearing helps as well as all other precautions but it is not 100% effective. Nothing is. We all take risks everyday by going out to get groceries, pumping gas, going to the post office or anything else where people are.

The news that I received regarding the teacher's union now pushing back against fulltime in school learning and wants to remain remote until mid-January, is very upsetting. The teachers need to understand that the towns health departments would not put the health and safety of the children or teachers in jeopardy if they felt it was unsafe. The schools have done an excellent job since August and have had minimal cases in all schools. This speaks volumes to how the administration has been protecting its students and staff. The likelihood that any teacher is getting COVID from a student is small. The likelihood they are getting it from outside sources and their life outside of school, very likely.

I am a healthcare worker who has been in this mess since March of 2020. I did not choose to deal with COVID-19 in my career, but I had no choice. Supermarket workers, police, firefighters, postal workers and the list goes on and on, also did not choose to deal with COVID-19 in their line of work. Guess what? Teachers are not exempt. My children deserve to be in school and not in front of a computer screen for hours a day. My son has been getting migraines because he is in front of this computer all day until 12:47. It is getting old for everyone and the teachers need to be in school, and in front of students. It is the safest place for them other than home and they are ready to be back five days a week. They are cleaning, they are in cohorts and it is the safest form of education at this time. The elementary school my middle son goes to has had only one case since August, and it was a teacher. The cohort quarantined and they were right back at school and no one else in the school was affected. They are in school full-time and it is working. There is absolutely no reason these middle schoolers should not be in school full time and it isn't even full time, they are done at 12:47. There is ample time for the school to be cleaned and sanitized.

Please know that I fully appreciate all of the teachers and everything they have had to do to accommodate this current learning environment, but we have all had to change the way we do things in our line of work. It is now time that the children are back in five days and are getting instruction in the presence of their teachers. I fully support the fulltime, in school model and look forward to my son being in school fulltime starting on Wednesday, December 9, 2020.

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Dear Members of the Amity Board of Education,

I would like to express my gratitude for your outstanding efforts to keep our high school students in a hybrid learning model and for the return to school on December 7th. I fully support this decision and furthermore support the middle schools full enrollment early dismissal schedule.

As an engineer, I have worked through this pandemic from the beginning being considered an essential worker for our National Defense Programs. We have never stopped or gone remote with over 350 employees. However, I have seen firsthand how effective the safety protocols of wearing masks, taking temperatures, washing hands and social distancing works. In a facility where manufacturing personnel interact regularly we have not had one known case of transmission in the workplace. All cases have been traced to outside of the facility. Due to our diligent workflow and safety protocols, we have been fortunate that when cases do arise due to being in contact with a host outside of the workplace, the workers that had contact have remained negative. We even had a case where someone with a medical condition who can't tolerate a mask was in contact with someone who tested positive operating the same machine, with similar touchpoints and remained negative due to the safety measures practiced previously mentioned. Speaking with my two high school daughters, grades 12 and 10 respectfully, I am sure and reassured by their reports that the same diligence and safety measures are being taken daily by students and faculty while in school with no exceptions. Similarily, all cases they have heard of have occurred outside of school. Data proves that in school interactions are safer than remote ones. Our administrative teams led by Dr. Jennifer Byars have done an outstanding job following the data, keeping updated on the latest information on a daily and even hourly basis. Our Principal Anna Mahon has worked tirelessly to regularly give information based on facts to the parents so we are informed and can make decisions best for our personal family needs. She puts safety of her students and faculty first, as demonstrated after the late October spike when she researched and dug deep in contact tracing to get the data to Dr. Byars and the Department of Health regarding outside gatherings which triggered going fully remote in a proactive countermeasure.

As a town tax payer and mother I chose to move to Orange 20 years ago to receive the superior education the Amity Regional 5 District provides. I have been and continue to be in full support of the decisions made by Dr. Byars and her amazing administrative teams. Why you ask? It is quite simple, data. Data speaks and the data proves that all of the proper safety protocols are in place in all of our school environments. It is so critical to keep these kids in school. They need, at a minimum, the limited social interactions that a hybrid model provides to give them the best social, emotional, and academic education possible. We all know it is not equivalent to pre-covid times, but I am thankful for what our Board of Education, Administration and teachers have launched and provided in these turbulent times.

I understand that many teachers are feeling uncomfortable. I simply ask that our Board of Ed and amazing administration work with them to feel comfortable in school teaching. I believe that teachers are "essential" workers so I ask them to please work with our Board of Education to stay in school. These students need you, as patient's need Doctors and Nurses, as families need grocers, manufacturers, truckers, police officers and all essential workers who have never stopped in person duties to get through these times. Our youth and teens need to be in school for both their physical and mental health. Many are not thriving, anxious and are depressed. The two or three days they are in school is all they have to continue to push through these tough times and maintain hope. Teachers you

are supported, appreciated and your concerns are heard so please do what you do best, continue to lead and teach <u>in person</u>, our children, our country, our future needs you now more than ever before.

Our COVID positivity rate is hovering between 6 and 7 percent. The full effect from the Thanksgiving holiday is just beginning, and we won't know the full effect for a week or two. Why choose this particular day to change to full in-school learning?

I am especially worried about the teachers. Amity has amazing teachers who love to teach and are very effective. But teaching while they are very concerned about getting sick can't be optimal. My two children went through Amity and were well prepared for good colleges and life beyond school. However, if they were still in middle school, even though their risk is less, I definitely would not want them back into full classrooms. Even pre-COVID, classrooms were crowded and hallways packed.

From what I've heard from teachers and friends with school-aged children, the hybrid model, while not ideal, seems to be working. Students have the technology they need and teachers have adapted their teaching to include effective online lessons.

Why change now when our positivity rates are rising? I am hopeful you will reconsider what I think is a serious misjudgment.

Hello,

I am writing this email in support of the decision of the school board and superintendent to return the Amity Middle School to in person learning five days a week. I am glad that you made the decision to return the students to a more normal, effective and proper way of educating them. I suspect however that this attempt like the last one will be short lived. I figured this when I dropped my son off this morning and saw several teachers congregating outside. My guess was that they were speaking about the return to full time learning, and I suspect they were not happy with the decision. My guess was later confirmed when I picked Michael up from school, and he said the teachers had a protest about going back to school. And now as I type this, I learn about a teacher walk out and news crews all over Amity. Seems to me as if someone is trying to pressure you into reversing course a second time. I hope that doesn't happen. Unfortunately, I am not surprised. My son Michael has shared many things with us regarding comments from teachers regarding how they don't want to be there and don't want to be teaching him.

You are making the right decision by having the kids return to in person learning. Frankly it is 3 months too late and should have been done on day 1. There is literally no reason they should not be in person. All the data and all the evidence and experience from other schools both in our community and throughout the country and world have shown that schools do not act as a major source of spread of the virus, and that children in particular have not been shown to spread the virus to adults and have been shown to have better outcomes with this virus than seasonal flu. I hope you remain steadfast in your decision and not cow to pressure from the union or individual teachers.

I know from experience that my son has not been given the education he deserves, Amity is known for or frankly, that I pay for through my exorbitant taxes. His test scores and grades are down, and he doesn't have any meaningful opportunity to engage with his teachers or other students. It is absurd to think that having a class for 30 minutes especially when it is virtual is enough. He is not capable of teaching himself Algebra, Science or any other of his subjects. We are doing tremendous damage to an entire generation of kids, and we will be reaching a point of no return if more isn't done to correct these errors. It is high time to stand up for what is right, act with courage and resolve to ensure we give our kids what they deserve.

In support of your decision, I figured I would share some publications which can help you with your decision making process. We supposedly live in an era of science, so I hope you take some time to review and familiarize yourself with these articles and their implications.

This article published in the New England Journal of Medicine attempts to evaluate the impact that mitigation strategies (lockdowns) have on the spread of the virus. The study evaluated 3,402 Marine Corps recruits of which 1,848 were enrolled in the study arm where they were required to implement strict mitigation strategies much more aggressive than what we expect even today including limiting contacts, frequent sanitizing of surfaces, and frequent testing. Of note, the strict quarantine group had a higher rate of infection than the control group that didn't implement the aggressive mitigation strategies. Showing once again that these non pharmaceutical strategies are not effective in reducing the spread of the virus and only serve to put undue burdens on otherwise healthy people.

In this study conducted at Yale, researchers surveyed 57,000 child care providers across all 50 US states including Washington DC and Puerto Rico. They showed no differences in COVID-19 outcomes between workers who continued to provide in-person care for young children and those who did not. Essentially they concluded that child care providers assumed no heightened risk compared to individuals who did not provide child care services. This has important implications for school administrators, superintendents and teachers as it shows there is not an increased risk of infection and poor outcomes from teaching or caring for students.

In this study, the CDC looked for antibodies in blood samples collected between December 13th, 2019 and Jan 17th, 2020. The results identified that blood samples collected as early as December 13th in some states and December 30th in CT have antibodies for SARS-COV 2 the virus that causes COVID-19. The implications of this are significant and in my opinion, not to be overstated. It significantly alters the timeline of the COVD-19 pandemic and means that it was circulating as early as November in some parts of the country and as early as December in CT. Yet, there were no mitigation strategies, no social distancing requirements, no universal masking, and more importantly no concerns about rising hospitalizations, deaths or other things we have heard since late March and April 2020. Seems to me like this would be something worth asking Dr Mohammed and the Public Health Director from Quinnipiac Valley. Frankly, I have no idea why this isn't getting more attention as this challenges so much of the conventional narrative.

I can't help but share this study. It really isn't relevant to the discussion, but I just enjoy sharing it. This study evaluated the use of masks among healthy volunteers and attempts to determine if masks reduce the risk of infection for wearers. This is the largest study to date and is a randomized controlled trial which is the gold standard. I know the "fact checkers" will say that masks don't protect the wearer, they protect other people. Unfortunately that is fundamentally absurd at face value and doesn't deserve much consideration. It's like saying if I take Tylenol you won't get a headache. I know everyone thinks these masks we all wear are doing a great job of reducing viral transmission. I hate to burst anyone's bubble, but they are the equivalent to shaking a stick at the sky to stop the lightning.

This is the final study I will share at this time and frankly the most important. Everyone needs to recognize there are negative side effects of all the mitigation strategies being implemented including school closures. A CDC report published August 14th surveyed people to assess anxiety, depression and suicide. Of note, 1 in 4 people aged 18-24 seriously contemplated suicide in the preceding month. This is a shocking statistic. While our kids and the children in the Amity Middle School are not represented in the report, it is not hard to imagine the impact on younger children. The past 9 months has placed a tremendous amount of stress on people and in

particular young people. If people do not have hope then they become lost. We cannot allow a dystopian future to destroy our children and force them into a life of anxiety, depression and despair.

Students deserve a quality in person education. They should be able to interact with their friends, and they should be able to participate in all the events that make school special. I implore you to stay the course and to pursue your plan to bring the kids back. Everyone needs to wake up and recognize that the draconian effects implemented in March and April did more harm than good, and we cannot make the same mistake twice.

I am respectfully writing this letter to show my FULL support of the Amity School District going to a hybrid model. These children need to be in school, learning at home is less than ideal. The social, emotional and mental health of our children should be first and foremost, not the teacher union. And additionally, those parents that are concerned about sending their children ultimately have the right to keep their children home. Why do us, parents that want for our children to be in school not have that right. And how about our children that so desperately want to be in school....when does that matter, when is that enough of a reason? If the powers to be met, including the local health officials, and they made this hybrid model decision I strongly hope it is upheld.

I have watched my daughter's bedroom transform during this pandemic from a sanctuary to an asylum, which is quite honestly heartbreaking. And lets not forget those children that were very successful academically pre-pandemic yet have lost their way and are now failing. These are the reasons I support in person learning.

I have always been a cheerleader for our community, and more specifically our school district so this is disheartening. These past 9 months have really shown us another side of our school district. My son's 5th grade teacher in the spring last year was literally missing in action and deserted his teaching responsibilities completely until he was finally forced to for the last 3 weeks of school-too little, too late. My daughter last school year, in middle school had very few teachers teaching live; they would just post work to be done. She was saddened by the lack of care they showed the minute they were no longer in person. She truly cared about them but felt they no longer cared about her. All the open house night talks that my children are their children....this was put to the test and they failed. However, this school year both the Orange and Woodbridge School Districts have answered the call for our kids with full in person instruction. It is insulting and frankly embarrassing that Amity teachers are bemoaning teaching in a hybrid environment nonetheless while their district colleagues show up in person to teach all their kids every day.

My husband, Ed is a retired Detective with the CT State Police and I am also a retired police officer. Ed is currently a Westport police officer, assigned as the Staples High School, School

Resource Officer. Staples has been in a hybrid learning model since the beginning of the school year consisting of 2 Full days for the split alphabet. Staples shut down for 2 weeks over the Thanksgiving breaks as most districts did. When the pandemic first hit and the state was shut down, Ed was re-assigned to patrol in what was the Covid hot spot at the time. In response to the request of the Amity teacher's union request/demand for exclusive virtual learning I would like to share some brief thoughts. First, we appreciate what you do, have done, and will continue to do as educators for the Amity school system. Your dedication to being exceptional is the reason we moved into the district. Second, we understand the stress and the uncertainty about all of this... and your willingness to go the extra mile thus far.

However, as we all navigate this wave of the pandemic, it is clear the measures taken by the state, towns and administration in preparation of containing the spread of COVID have mitigated the risk. While imperfect, and evolving almost daily, they are keeping the environment safe. This is a testament to your willingness to heed the advice of the experts.

While my opinion as a parent is valid, I too lean on experts for how I came to my conclusion to send my child back to school. The American Academy of Pediatrics concludes that the benefits outweigh the risks as outlined in late summer and reiterated since. In JAMA, the Journal of the American Medical Association, they write about the "COVID slide" and a return to school as a "urgent national priority." Their suggestions for a safe and sound environment [distancing, identify at risk students, public health interaction, etc.] are being followed and an arbitrary shift to a full virtual environment seems excessive. Lastly, the CDC has continued to update their guiding principles to ensure the least amount of risk. Again, I believe the school system has done an excellent job controlling what they can control.

As the son of an educator and administrator I want to again reiterate my appreciation for what you have done. My folks have shared they have no idea how you are able to manage it all. Also, I understand that tomorrow, or next week or next month all of this may change, for better or worse, and we should be flexible to support the safest environment for you and my child. 

First, I need you to know that I thank you for your time and energy and commitment to Amity. You certainly did not sign up for these COVID complications. That you are meeting, yet again, to review our path forward is greatly appreciated. I have been with Amity's junior high and middle schools for 37 years now. We have established ourselves as a premier district. This will continue. But now, we have to deal with how to make the best of a very bad situation. This is a time for risk management, not risk taking.

Logic, safety, consistency, and the sanity of your staff say that we should be instructing our students fully remotely until mid-January.

There is great confusion undermining our present situation. We went fully remote for the week following the Thanksgiving gatherings. That was a grounded, sound, and safe path. We are now being directed to a full return 3 days later. This amid an epic outbreak that has only just started! We are faced with the tip of the iceberg. Dear Amity Board of Education,

I am writing to express my support of the in-person learning model for the middle school. As a parent of an 8th grade student, I have witnessed that his learning style is best served when he is able to be in the classroom environment. Since his mother and I are both considered essential workers, our son is home alone on remote learning days. This lack of supervision and support during the school hours, coupled with his own tendency to be easily distracted, naturally has shown this school year to be his weakest at meeting expectations.

While there is certainly an element of personal accountability to blame for this measurable academic slide, I know that his ability to learn is impacted greatly by the controlled environment within the walls of Amity. Having the structure, better access to teachers and support staff, and the personal connections that can't be replicated by electronic means are the conditions that provide the best climate for learning... and I'm confident that is the case for more than just my son. In fact, a recent study featured in the New York Times showed that students in remote learning environments are not keeping pace with where they would be if they were in a classroom learning environment.

Lastly, the impact of emotional and social well-being may be harder to measure but remains equally important. Our kids need the emotional support both for their mental development and their academic progress. I have no doubt that the truth of this rings out to the choir to which I'm preaching, which is why the school district has gone to such lengths to provide a safe environment while the kids are in the Amity environment. I feel completely comfortable sending my son to school during this pandemic because I have personally witnessed the measures in place to keep him safe.

I urge this Board to consider the needs and the safety of the students above the unfounded scare tactics recently submitted to you. The personal protective equipment and safety protocol measures are necessary, and they are WORKING. Your administrators, your support staff, and other public health officials are doing an exceptional job at handling this public health crisis... please let them continue to work. This school district has already made many unprecedented accommodations to ease the burden on the teaching staff, but this is also their time to shine and meet the challenges we all are facing. We support our teachers in their efforts to make

Dear ER9 families, faculty and staff,

Yesterday, we received the latest health report for Easton and Redding. Currently, the leading indicator (the number of new cases 14 day avg per 100k pop.) and the secondary indicator (positivity rate) remain in the red. Last week Easton and Redding health officials shared that we should anticipate a post-Thanksgiving increase in the number of positive cases. They warned that the increase will likely impact our community next week (10-14 days after Thanksgiving) and cause staff absences due to district-related quarantines, pending test results and childcare issues as a result of school closures in surrounding towns.

In today's meeting, our local health officials urged us to adopt a proactive approach rather than reacting after students and staff are exposed.

Based on their strong recommendations, we will remain in distance learning at least through December 23rd and will plan to return to in-person instruction on January 4th.

Determination of the learning model (hybrid or in-person) will be communicated prior to the return from the winter recess and will be made based upon the health metrics at that time.

There are no universally agreeable solutions to the complicated circumstances of this pandemic. While I am fully aware of the challenges this shift will create for many of our families, I believe this measured approach is the best way to safeguard the health and safety of our students and staff, and will provide more runway for families to have stability in terms of the model we're using. This plan also eliminates the continued disruptive adjustments for both families and employees that result from the week-to-week waiting and unpredictable nature of multiple changes. As we move forward, we will continue to refine our distance learning model to ensure students continue to grow academically, socially and emotionally. Thank you for your continued support, flexibility and understanding during these unprecedented times.

Dear Dr. Byars and the Amity BOE,

I was pleasantly surprised to get the email on Friday stating the students were going back to school, AND the middle schoolers were going to start going everyday! Finally! Today, I was disappointed to see Amity made the news because the teachers don't want in person learning. I was not surprised since my son came home from school saying his teachers protested going back to school.

As an educator, I understand this pandemic has brought about new ways of teaching and the challenges of juggling distance learners, in person learners and possibly personal situations. Frankly, it is hard to have sympathy for these teachers when the Board of Ed gave them the day before Thanksgiving off, and these teachers get out 1.5 hours early everyday. (I also see some of teachers leaving school before all the students have left for the day.). These same middle school teachers have several times throughout the year voiced their displeasures about being in school. My son has been told by teachers that the administration cares more about the students' education than that particular teacher's health and life, and the teachers miss distance learning Wednesdays when they could work in their pajamas. Now, they don't even want to be in school at all! And this is how they thank everyone for their free day off before Thanksgiving? The elementary teachers, who have been full time since the beginning of the year did not get a day off or get an extra 1.5 hours of planning time everyday.

Distance and hybrid learning has detrimental affects on the students, both socially and academically. My kids say school is like jail, little interaction or movement. It is not ideal learning for students (or teaching for teachers). Internet connections go in and out. Tests are taken over the course of multiple days, partially taken at school, partially taken at home without the ability to ask for clarification. Little to no feedback on assignments. My son played email tag with a teacher asking for extra help, and she gave him five minutes notification to log on. (Needless to say he didn't see it in time.). If the teacher is "out" during distance learning, there is no substitute/class for the day, so no learning goes on. My son's grades are slipping. While he was in the gifted and talented program in elementary school, he is not capable of teaching himself algebra, chemistry/physics, Spanish, English or his other classes. It is also very concerning that his SBAC scores from September 2020, were lower than his September 2019 scores, presumably due to lack of instruction. We pay taxes for our teachers, essential workers, to do their jobs and educate our children, not portray their personal fear and opinions on our children, giving the students the impression the teachers don't really care or feel that education isn't important.

Please keep the students in school (in person) five days a week.

Thank you for trying to do what's in the best interest of our student's education.

I am writing in regards to the return of school with all students on Wednesday December 9th.
I teach at the Amity Middle School in Orange and have been a resident in Orange for over 36 years.
I have had two children go through the Amity system. It is a great school but things like this just make me question the plans being put into place.

Since September we have been hybrid. This has worked out very well. There are a maximum of about 10-12 students in classes, 10-12 students at home.

I feel that we have really gotten to know these students being in a close group.

The alternating of groups daily and on Wednesday has worked out well. Last week when we were remote, the students were wonderful and engaged. I feel that because they had no masks, they were more comfortable. I teach everyday so that students at home and in school get the same instruction and are joining in classroom work.

We have been doing so well and now with all of what is happening in the town and state, we are going back to full? We have three more weeks until break. Why not continue at least in hybrid. We have not even experienced

the result of the Thanksgiving break and what effects it will have.

We all would love to enjoy time with our family. Other than hospital workers, pretty much everyone is home working. We want to be safe. I did not see my family for the holidays, as I am around too many people. It is a sacrifice, but one I am willing to make.

We have "cohorts", but we do not. There are special ed students who travel to other groups such as the resource room,

Math help, reading help etc.

We also have students (different teams)mixed for art and tech, reading and health, going to different rooms with different students.

There is terrible internet and when the internet does not work we have to go to the cafe, sometimes with different teams,

Teachers are not able to teach because they have all this talking from the other teacher and students. One day we were in there with a class that was eating with no masks on. Inappropriate.

When there are even two teachers out, the sub has to take both these classes to the cafe three times a day, the two classes

and academic success and students sit in random spots, no names are placed on the tables and how do we contact trace in

the event that there are issues?

In the hall students are moving from place to place and there is not enough supervision in the halls to tell them to separate.

When we go for a mask break, used to be 10 minutes (after 3.5 hours of sitting in one spot), they are now only

allowed a few minutes. they often stand too close together and when it is inclement weather, there is not ample room. Students are barely 2 feet apart, now with twice as many students, there will be no room. How does this make sense?

In one of the classrooms there will be 20 plus students, one row is against the wall and a student has her desk facing a

brick wall. They are about 3 feet from each other, nose to nose.

We want to teach, we just want to be safe. If you can only imagine how much time teachers spend with technology beyond the

actual lessons to prepare for their students. I have been teaching for over 40, 39 years at Amity and spend more time than I ever did.

We volunteer and do so much for these students and the school which ultimately gives Amity a great name . Show us some respect

and protect the teachers and students and their precious families. Our goal for the year is SEL, for teachers and students and staff.

Young people are just as vulnerable as those of other ages.

Thank you, Marissa Nall Dear Members of the Amity Board of Education,

I am writing to you as a middle school teacher at Amity Middle School Bethany regarding the recent proposed changes to the instructional models in Amity Middle Schools and High School, respectively.

As you know, on December 4th, we were informed about the plan to move Amity High School back into the hybrid model of instruction and the two middle schools to full in-person learning. I hold major reservations about this decision. Firstly, based on the indicators outlined in Addendum 4--namely the massive community spread of Covid in Connecticut--this is not the time to be increasing in-person contact amongst students and staff. In both the letter to the community and the press statement to FOX61 News, Dr. Byars stated that a full in-person opening in December would be a perfect amount of time to test the model and that "if we were successful," the model could be maintained into the new year. This statement was deeply troubling to me. We are people; we are not part of an experiment. What does success look like? No cases? 5% of the population? 10%? I am not willing to risk my own health, the health of my students or colleagues in trying to find out.

In my career, I have spent the entirety of it living and breathing Amity. I am a proud member of the school community and so proud of the work produced by me, my colleagues, and the students we hold so dear. Of course, I want all of my students back in the building, full time. I want to be able to share a table with them and hear about their world. I want to allow them to run and play with their friends during free time. I want to let them put their heads together, literally and figuratively, to learn and collaborate. But, it is not safe right now. In the middle schools, a full in-person model would put up to 22 students in a small classroom and it would be exceptionally difficult, or even impossible to keep the students distance 3 or more feet apart. Mask breaks, especially as winter and inclement weather approaches, would be increasingly risky. Hallways will be busier at the start and end of the day, and when students pass to their elective classes. The elementary schools have successfully kept students in-person for most of the school year. However, this is a false equivalence because the middle schools cannot cohort as effectively. Students break their cohorts several times a day: on the bus, for support classes, for specials like PE and music. Every student spends between 1/2 and 3/2 of their day out of cohorts. Further, the full in-person instructional model is that in name only. The Amity re-opening plan allows for families to opt-out their student(s) and teachers to instruct remote students synchronously. Because of this, the full in-person model is not "normal" school. Teachers will still be on Zoom with a handful of students from each classroom, still tied to a computer in the front of the classroom, still teaching in two separate models, and still reliant on technology to provide instruction to students not in the building. But now, we will have more students sitting in the room, deserving of our time and attention, but assuming more risk to them and ourselves.

As a final point, please consider what the Amity teachers have sacrificed this year. We have been in the classroom each day, finding new ways to meet the needs of all learners despite increasingly difficult and stressful circumstances. Some of us have gotten sick from Covid, or seen our family members fall ill. We cannot socialize with our colleagues or find time to decompress together. We are balancing teaching in a pandemic with all the normal responsibilities of teaching. In my own family, our collective risk is massive: I am in the Amity district, my daughter is in kindergarten in another town, my husband works on the front lines in a hospital, as do several other immediate family members. Because of our risk, we have had to make difficult decisions regarding childcare for my daughter and infant son. We are asking my mother-in-law and aunt, both over the age of 65 and not always in good health, to put themselves at risk to care for our children. The more

exposure we have, the more risk to them. At some point, our family members who have been so generous with their time, may make the decision that the risk is too much and they can no longer watch our children. We have spent 9 months taking every possible precaution-- wearing masks, staying home, sanitizing, having essentials delivered. I do not want to be the one that ends up causing illness for any of my family but I also need to work. We also have no other options to help instruct and care for my children at home. I know many of my colleagues and I have not slept for weeks with the stress levels of entering our building every day. We feel scared and left out of the loop. We are trying our best but we are exhausted. We all love our own children and our Amity kids. I also deeply care about my colleagues, their wellbeing and that of their families. We need our teachers strong, comfortable, and mentally available to help Amity students.

At this time, I would ask the Board to consider keeping the whole district in fully remote learning until mid-January. This will allow time for the Amity staff to make appropriate plans to welcome back all students in the New Year. It will also keep students at home through the holidays and any gatherings or travel that may occur. Most college students will return to campus by this point and spread within households will be less likely. Based on Governor Lamont's December 3rd press conference, many teachers and high-risk individuals may be eligible for a vaccine by this time as well. When it is safe, we are willing and ready to return to the school building and begin a return to life as we knew it. We just ask for time and transparency.

It was beautiful and communicated a feeling of appreciation that helped uplift our spirits during a difficult teaching experience. I also appreciated the gift of the day before Thanksgiving, there is nothing more valuable than time with family. Thank you for that gift.

On Friday afternoon, I was completely surprised by the sudden announcement to bring back all of the students to the middle schools this week. This abrupt change in our model with such short notice was not something I would have predicted. I am concerned about the safety of our students as they will spend 5 hours a day in classrooms with full rosters. My son attended the middle school in Bethany and had a wonderful experience supported by a caring staff. However, this rush to bring all of the students back after Thanksgiving and leading up to the winter holidays does not represent the kind and caring culture that my son had the good fortune to experience. If I cannot do that as a parent, I feel obligated to say that as a teacher, I am not comfortable with our current plan to bring back all of the students this week. Dear Members of the Amity Board of Education,

I am writing to express my concerns about the recent instructional model decisions that have been made for the high school and middle schools. Connecticut's new positive COVID cases are the highest they have ever been in the past few weeks and there were 8,129 new positive cases reported on Monday (12/7/20). COVID hospitalizations and deaths are on the rise. New Haven has issued an executive order for businesses. Almost all Connecticut towns and cities are in the COVID "red" zone. Many school districts across the state have moved to remote learning models until early to mid January and I urge you to do the same for our Amity schools. Keeping students, their families, and yes, teachers and our families safe should be the priority at the critical time.

I have been a social studies teacher for over 24 years and 17 of those years have been spent serving the students in Amity schools. Like my colleagues, I care deeply about my students, my work, and my profession. Teaching is our way of life, not simply our job. Our dedication to our students is paramount. Yet, our present working conditions are having a detrimental effect on so many of us. Many of us do not feel safe. I have a medical condition that puts me in the "might be at increased risk" category should I contract COVID-19. My husband has three medical conditions that put him in the "might be at increased risk" category and my oldest son has one condition putting him in that same category. My rheumatologist has warned me that I will likely be one of the coronavirus "long-haulers" should I contract COVID-19. Needless to say, my family takes COVID safety precautions very seriously and we are doing everything in our power to keep ourselves safe. Since I don't fall into the "at increased risk" COVID category, I show up to work each day with the same dedication and commitment I always have. I do so under significant stress and I mask that stress from my students. I am not alone. Many of my colleagues also have medical conditions that may put them at increased risk. Some of my colleagues are pregnant. Some are fathers of newborns. Some have medically fragile children. Yet we continue to show up and do our jobs to the best of our abilities. I ask you to please consider this as you make decisions that affect our lives and the lives of our families. The students of Amity get to opt out of in-person instruction. The teachers and staff do not.

Dear Amity Board Members-

I am writing to express my support for the return to in person learning at Amity High School. I understand teachers have concerns for their safety and so do many other professionals and employees who are deemed essential. These essential workers have been on the job throughout this pandemic ensuring that folks have medical care, groceries etc. I am certain that many were fearful about contracting Covid on the job but they went to work and modified their work flow to incorporate safety measures. They did this for the greater good.

We can agree that education is also essential and that it is not one size fits all. Many students are disengaged with remote learning, and it does not replace the richness of in person school. In the high school setting, teachers are less likely to need to be physically close to students. The likelihood of mask-mask transmission is low and from what I hear from kids they are compliant with mask wearing. That being said, school administrators worked very hard to make changes in the school environment to minimize the risk of Covid transmission. These measures, along with physically distancing and mask wearing, appear to have been working because there is NO

EVIDENCE OF IN SCHOOL transmission. If faculty and staff wear masks properly, wash hands, and maintain social distance, their risk of contracting Covid from a student is slim to none.

The American Academy of Pediatrics statement on Covid advocates strongly that students be physically present in school. Attending in person school and its associated extracurricular activities are important components to the social, emotional, and academic development of children in all stages. The data on Covid cases in our district supports the in person instruction model. Both health departments in our district advise that faculty and students can be in school safely and have NOT advised the closure of school. If school was an unsafe place because students and faculty were getting each other sick, the requests of the teachers union would be validated. Currently there is no evidence that this is the case.

The overarching objective has always been for our children to receive the best possible educational experience. Lets not lose sight of that as we navigate this pandemic. Thank you for your time and dedication to our children.

Dear Mr. Belfonti and Amity Board of Education,

My name is Patrick Cumpstone, and I am a history teacher at Amity Regional High School, as well as a member of the AEA Executive Board.

In line with our demands as a union, I am asking that the Amity Board of Education vote this evening to place our school district in the remote instructional model until what the state defines as the "key leading indicator" proves that it is safe to return to hybrid in-person learning.

We are 8 months into a brand new virus. Though we know more than we did in March, we cannot continue pretending that we are no longer in a pandemic by essentially returning to business as usual except with masks. This is a dangerous path to continue down.

I have a 2 month old son. While there is an ongoing body of research on how COVID-19 impacts adolescents and adults, there is far too little known about health risks in newborns. Because I'm being asked to report to work at a time when community spread is at record highs, I cannot experience the joy of greeting and holding my son when I come home from work every day. Instead, I have to remove my shoes, throw my clothes in the wash, shower, and sanitize all of the physical materials I brought home from school. This includes my phone, pens, and, yes, even the handles of my laptop case.

I have colleagues that live with elderly parents who they've had to relocate out of fear that they could infect them due to their exposure at school. I have colleagues with "at increased risk" health conditions who risk their lives each day they step in the building to teach our students. And I have colleagues who've contracted COVID-19 whose cases were never reported to the community by district administration as they should have been out of courtesy for the safety of our staff and students.

We have put all of this at risk to avoid one thing: remote learning. But why? My 2.5 week experience with remote learning from 11/16-12/4 was the most fulfilling experience I've had since March. I had Wi-Fi that worked. I had all of my students together. I was able to cultivate a true classroom community for the first time this year. My students performed just as well as they had in the physical classroom. All the while, I was able to keep myself safe, my colleagues and students were able to do the same, and I was able to hold my son.

Again, I urge the Board of Education to vote this evening to place our school district in a remote instructional model until the leading indicators defined by the state show that it is safe to return in a hybrid model.

I am a science teacher at Amity High School. I have been teaching for the Amity District for twenty one years. I am writing this morning in support of remote learning through January 2021.

As a 60 year old with underlying conditions I have been coming to work since August with great trepidation. When we returned to school the positivity rate was low and the hybrid model allowed for 6 foot social distancing. Now, the positivity rate has dramatically increased and is projected to go much higher. The addition of more students to the building has reduced the ability in some spaces to maintain the 6 foot social distance.

Adding to the stress of the situation is the unavailability of my regular medication due to the pandemic. I have had to switch to something new this month and I am uncertain about its effectiveness.

In March, I had family members in the hospital with COVID and they have long lasting effects from the infection. I also know someone who was on a ventilator for 8 weeks and his wife was asked three times if she wanted to take him off life support. He ended up surviving but with serious debilitating results. The possible impact of this virus is very real to me.

I am concerned for the health of myself but also for my colleagues, staff and students at Amity High School. I urge you to support remote teaching through January 2021.

Prior to remote learning in 7th grade, he was beginning to struggle with organization, but had passing grades with a mix of A, B and C grades. He is now a student with mostly Fs on his report card. His self-worth is being affected. His doctor is recommending we medicate him. His mental health is suffering. He is being offered the opportunity to go to school in person every day as an accommodation, but feels very self-conscious. He was so happy to hear all middle school students were going back.

There are other, permanent health implications due to remote learning that need to be considered. For my child, there are risks and side effects from medication and mental health issues along with a grave impact on his educational progress and outcome. Let me add to this that he recently took a private school entrance exam and scored in the 75th percentile. He is clearly capable and has the intellect! The obvious reason he is failing is remote learning.

Parents have the option to have their child go full remote if they wish. Teachers have the option to go full remote if they have a medical condition. Why is everyone being forced to abide by their wishes? Everyone should have the option for in school learning. It can be done safely and is working in other districts including the elementary schools Let the students/parents choose how and where they learn best.

The fact that you are meeting this evening gives me hope that our current teaching model will revert back to remote learning for all buildings. I have dedicated my life to teaching for the Amity School District and it would be ironic that after 39 years, I would lose my life because of my career. I chose to return to my building this fall, trusting that I would be in a safe work environment when I could have requested to teach from home. I no longer feel that my workplace is safe. I am now being unnecessarily placed at greater risk. I get upset thinking that I am considered "disposable".

Since the start of the school year, I spend most of my time in the company of only my students. I do not visit my friends. I have not travelled out of state to see my grandson who was born last June. I do not dine out. I do not go shopping. I have been doing all that I can to remain safe yet circumstances beyond my control are now jeopardizing my safety.

I worry now that I will bring covid home to my husband. He has his own health concerns. I would like to invite my mother in law to visit and stay over with us for Christmas. She is alone in her home at age 89. However, I could never forgive myself if she contracted covid from me. Last spring, there were terrible stories in the news of many family members dying from covid. I

do not want to be one of those families.

I also worry about the increased health risk to my friends/staff, my students, our families and our communities. I'd rather be safe than sorry at this most critical time of the pandemic.

I hope you reconsider our current teaching model and allow us the safety of teaching remotely.

Members of the Amity BOE,

I write to you as a teacher who has served this district for 20 years. I am sure you have given much consideration to the data which has been shared with you. However, given the current circumstances, I implore you to consider all that you may not see.

Your decision, in Dr. Byars' words, to put the middle schools into full in-person, "the two week window will provide an opportunity to adjust models if full in-person is not successful with little impact on the instruction that students receive," is in effect an uncontrolled experiment. It is an experiment aimed at determining safety. Testing safety at the height of this pandemic seems irresponsible. I ask you, what is the cost to students and staff if full in-person is not successful. Sickness? Unknowable long-term health complications? Deaths? Why are teachers and students being treated as if we are expendable?

I know firsthand the power of virus, the destructive power of the invisible. My daughter developed Type 1 Diabetes after exposure to a common, childhood virus. At two years old, because of a virus, her entire life was forever altered. And so were the lives of everyone close to her. One cannot even begin to grasp the depths of the cruel, compounding, life-long, impacts a virus imparts, until you are personally affected.

Amity teachers are dedicated and exceptional professionals who are working tirelessly for our students. However, we are more than just employees tasked with educating students. We are real people, with lives outside of the buildings, and with families of our own to safeguard.

We have lost family members and friends whom we could not be with in their last days and whom we could not bury. We were not able to comfort them or say good-by and are left with the pain of knowing they died alone.

Our families are grieving unthinkable losses, without the possibility of closure.

Some of us live alone, isolated.

Some of us have spouses or partners who have lost their jobs and are hanging on the best we can, trying not to lose our homes, trying not to lose our families, under the burden of all of this.

Some of us have children learning fully remote, their schools shuttered, because of Covid or to preemptively stop the spread.

Some of us are comforting children devastated by all kinds of loss.

Some of us are in isolation because of our own chronic health conditions.

Some of us are parents of children with life-threatening conditions that Covid insidiously hunts.

Some of us are parents trying to keep our own children' heads above water, trying to keep the anxiety and depression that results from a pandemic at bay.

Some of us are taking care of our own immediate families in addition to risking ourselves to care for older parents who can't go anywhere for food or medication.

We have parents and grandparents in inaccessible nursing homes, and we are tormented waiting for the likely inevitable phone call that will come.

Some of us live every day knowing our partner or someone we love is serving as an essential worker, at risk each and every day.

Some of us have absolutely no respite from our responsibilities as mother, father, daughter, son, husband, wife, partner, caregiver – none.

And this is all on top of the exponential stress and anxiety of fearing each and every day that we could bring the virus home.

And the list goes on.

And yet, our exceptional teaching goes on.

We are teachers, but we are also human beings with families of our own. All of us face real and unfathomable consequences because of the change in working conditions to which you are willing to expose us at the very height of the pandemic. We have devoted our lives to your children, to your families. We often, as our professional dedication runs so deep, do so at the expense of our own. My family knows firsthand the devastation a virus can cause; my hope is that as many of us as possible can be spared from contracting the Covid-19 virus. Help us best protect both Amity families and our own families during the worst part, so far, of this unprecedented pandemic. Please send Amity schools fully remote until mid-January. Choose the most measured way to safeguard the health and safety of Amity teachers and students.

Please forward this to the Amity BOE.

Not only am I an Amity High School teacher, I am a Woodbridge resident, an Amity graduate myself, and the parent of an Amity graduate. I oppose Dr. Byars' decision to return students at this time.

I understand the need for students to be in the buildings. They clearly learn best in-person and it is best for their emotional wellbeing. However, the metrics are such so that the medical risks outweigh these factors. This is especially true in the middle schools, where the classrooms tend to be smaller. For those who argue that my interpretation of the metrics is faulty, why are other districts going full remote based on the recommendations of their local health boards with very similar metrics?

Finally, most discussion focuses on the health and wellbeing of the student population. That is of great importance, yes, but that does not mean at the expense of teacher safety. I personally felt safe at the high school when we were in hybrid before. I set up my room so that I am at least six feet from anyone at all times. I know this is not possible for some of my colleagues, especially at the middle schools. With the metrics as they are now, and the holiday season upon us (where frankly I anticipate too many families will ignore the guidelines for the size of family gatherings, like we saw over Thanksgiving), I think the prudent decision would be to stay remote at least until school resumes after the holiday break.

Dear Board of Education Members,

I would like to express my gratitude for your service to our community, especially during this global health crisis. I know that the safety of our children, teachers, school staff, families and communities is of utmost importance for all of you during these very difficult times and that you will take this request very seriously.

I write as a Woodbridge parent of two children at two schools in the district, Amity Middle School Bethany and Amity Regional High School. Probably, like most people, I want my children to return to school. However, I was very surprised with the district's decision to return our middle schools to a 5-day in person instruction and our high school to hybrid instruction, and I vehemently oppose a reopening of our schools for all children at this time.

Coronavirus cases are at an all-time high in Connecticut with our 3 towns being on red alert. Schools can't be seen isolated from the communities they are in, and our communities are in bad shape at the moment. Returning the school population, either partially or completely, is a dangerous decision that will only end in an increase of cases, endangering not only the children, teachers and school staff but also their families and other community members, and the schools being shut down again in the short-term.

Additionally, the holiday season is upon us and a safe reopening is unlikely given current patterns of local behavior. We are already starting to see holiday parties and gatherings taking place! Although these events occur outside of school, they have an impact in the school community, as we saw recently, either we like it or not. Until people in our towns understand the consequences of this type of behavior, community spread will continue unabated.

I understand that you have many voices pleading for your attention. I understand that it's tempting to say that this decision is "hard" and "complex." But, in the end, it is not: schools cannot safely reopen, and thus they cannot be reopened. Nothing is safe these days! Many surrounding schools are operating remotely until January. I believe that this is the right, responsible thing to do. It is my opinion that the district should continue the remote instruction until mid-January, at least, while it monitors the situation and consults with the health experts to

determine how the numbers are affected during and after the holidays and can unmistakably determine its impact on the community.

I very much appreciate your time and consideration of this letter and I hope that you will make the best decision for us and on our behalf.

Greetings

I have been an Amity teacher since 2008, and my husband has been an Amity teacher since 2014. We are completely committed to this district, our students, and our colleagues. We strive to be the best teachers we can each day. Over the past few months, our lives have been at an unprecedented stress level due to our school situation and the pandemic. The district's decision to return to in-person learning after Thanksgiving break has brought us a new level of stress and anxiety, and it's not just us. I have witnessed the educators I admire and respect the most completely fall to pieces from stress and worry about school and health safety. These are highly dedicated, beloved, award-winning teachers, and they are feeling absolutely broken. The heavy challenge of teaching in hybrid mode has been time-consuming and stressful, and the fact that we have returned to in-person teaching at the height of this pandemic has added a significant amount of fear to the mix of emotions. This decision has greatly impacted my family. We are very worried about potential exposure to Covid-19 at school, and how that could impact our health and our family's health. We have a child with pulmonary issues, and older parents with a series of health issues that put them at high risk. Because our children's school district is fully remote, we have been relying on our parents to watch and educate them, and we are terrified of exposing them to Covid-19. The anxiety in my household is extreme, and we find it hard to sleep or concentrate on quality time with each other. At this time of year when families often do fun bonding activities like decorating, cooking, watching holiday movies, etc., my husband and I find that we cannot fully enjoy these things because we are multitasking (doing school work) and worrying about our safety. My husband and I are very dedicated teachers, but I would like to remind the Amity district that WE are parents, children, and spouses FIRST. The safety of my family and the PEACE OF MIND that we are not exposed to others is more valuable to me than in-person learning. We are excellent at remote teaching, and I have every confidence that our students will enjoy and learn from their experience in our courses remotely.

I would like the Amity district to consider switching to a full-remote model until we return to school in January, and to carefully re-evaluate the situation in early 2021 before a decision is made about that return.

Hello-

My name is Meghan Beardsley and I would like to share some information about how teaching during covid has affected my personal life.

I am a veteran teacher. 22 years total. 20 at Amity. I am also a single mom.

It used to be that in the mornings my ex mother in law would come over and have breakfast with my youngest and make sure that he got on the bus. She now feels unsafe coming over in the mornings. I purchased home security cams to be able to talk to my son through and make sure he gets on the bus on time all by himself. I sometimes have to do this during my first period class because to be honest my first priority is to my children and not my students. I also wake him up about an hour earlier to make sure that he is awake, showered and fed before I leave for work.

My elderly parents live down the street from me. My dad recently underwent surgery for pancreatic cancer and my mom is a lung cancer survivor. Since covid started I have been their lifeline. I do their grocery shopping, drive them to appointments and in general I am their connection to the outside world. In the spring and this summer I was able to spend time with them since I was able to safely distance myself from others. Now I leave food at the doorstep and only drive them to appointments as needed while we all wear masks. I can no longer safely spend time with my parents since we are teaching in the hybrid model.

I also have 2 autoimmune diseases. I have psoriatic arthritis and multiple sclerosis. I am terrified of contracting covid since viruses tend to trigger MS relapses for me. 2 years ago I had a relapse simply because of a flu vaccine and it set me up needing to have massive doses of IV steroids for a week and then I was on oral steroids for a month after. Sometimes my relapses make it difficult to walk. Other times they give me double vision. It all depends. I certainly do not want to relapse because of covid as it is completely avoidable with proper precautions if I am able to stay away from other people.

Students have the option to learn remotely. Teachers do not have the option. My autoimmune diseases do not make the list of high risk for effects of covid so I don't qualify in that way. My parents do not physically reside in my home so I do not qualify in that way either even though for all intents and purposes I reside in a multigenerational household even though it is physically apart.

I keep my fingers crossed and hope for the best. It's all I can do. The stress is taking a toll on my mental health. I felt compelled to cover classes for colleagues who were out sick because of the guilt coming from the main office here at the high school. I never knew if the teacher might be out for possible covid symptoms.

I am told that teachers cannot be considered a close contact of a student because we don't spend enough time near them. However, I think that is terribly convenient to keep us in the dark and it makes me fearful to do anything other than teach from my desk in the corner of the room.

I could get into a whole litany of why teaching hybrid is more difficult and less effective for me than teaching remote.... but I am sure that other teachers will make that clear.

I just wanted to remind you that I am a human with a life outside of Amity and a family that I care for deeply that isn't getting the best of me because we are in person. I would like to be fully remote until at least after winter break. This may be the last holiday season either of my parents have and spending it on zoom isn't how I would like to remember them.

To the Board of Education-Amity Regional School District #5:

I'm writing to express my support for the current hybrid model of learning being employed at Amity Regional High School, and the resumption of full-time onsite instruction at Amity Regional Middle School.

I understand the concerns and empathize with our dedicated teachers. They want to be kept safe, and I strongly believe that they are safe. They have been provided high quality PPE, proper building ventilation, contact tracing and access to prompt testing.

I believe our students are also safe. New York state recently started publishing comprehensive data for all of its schools. This data was analyzed by Emily Oster, a professor of economics at Brown University and co-founder of the website "Covid-Explained." Her conclusion is that schools are not sources of superspreading. For high-school students and staff, rates of COVID-19 infection are similar to case rates in their surrounding communities. For elementary and middle school students they're lower, reflecting the lower disease rate in younger children. During the four-week period reflected in the data, roughly 80% of schools in the state reported no cases at all. Of the schools that did report cases, rates of infection could <u>not</u> support a claim that students and teachers are catching the disease from each other.

Many of us have witnessed firsthand the negative impact lockdown measures have had on the mental health of our children. A CDC report published Nov. 13 confirms this problem is significant and widespread. It found that mental health-related ER visits among children 18 and younger have increased significantly this year. It began in April and remained elevated through October. Dr. John Whyte, chief medical officer of the healthcare website WebMD recently stated "we need to recognize and address the impact of lockdowns and school closures on children's mental health. Many parents are reporting behavioral issues that previously their children had not exhibited. This is most likely a result of the loneliness, anxiety and anger that many children are experiencing. Kids often have more difficulty than adults in expressing their emotions, and that's why we are seeing these physical manifestations related to a decrease in kids' mental wellness."

To summarize, I believe the data increasingly shows that the best way to protect teachers and students both isn't to shut down schools, but to continue focusing on measures to stay safe outside of it. It is my belief that the benefits of onsite learning outweigh the potential burdens

associated. I do not believe teachers or students are being put at unreasonable risk. I urge the Amity BOE to move forward with the current plan.

I am writing to you as both a Woodbridge resident and an Amity Middle School -Bethany Campus teacher. Like many other Amity teachers, I was shocked by Dr. Byars' announcement on Friday that we will return to full student capacity on Wednesday. Current Covid 19 metrics do not support returning to school in full. Rather, a move to remote learning would be the safe choice at this time. We are unable to maintain safety protocols in most classrooms should we return in full. In the hybrid model, desks are 3 feet apart at best. If all students return, we will no longer be able to meet this minimum spacing requirement in many classrooms. Despite what has been shared by the superintendent, cohorts can not be compared to the elementary model, as students "break cohort" for music, physical education, and special services. Increasing students in the building further compromises the cohorts. I do not feel safe with this sudden decision, which will have dire consequences for our community. Returning all students to school as the virus is peaking is reckless and puts us all at risk.

I sincerely hope you will consider recommending a change to the remote learning model at this time, as it is in the best interest for students and teachers. We are asking you to please keep us safe.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

I am in my 15th year here at Amity High School and 21-year Veteran overall to teaching in CT. I am writing to you in emergency crisis mode pleading that you listen to the teachers of this community who are in the trenches day to day especially during this Pandemic. We NEED to remain in Remote Teaching bare minimum through Winter Break and possibly a week after Winter Break. This is to help mitigate the strain on our three towns, the area hospitals and undue stress, sickness, lingering effects and possible deaths to teacher, student and community members.

Leading Indicators from the State of CT show we should be in Remote Learning as Orange is at 36.4, Bethany at 27.4 and Woodbridge at 24.3 per 100,000. I know not all Thanksgiving time period testing has not come back yet, but those increased positive numbers will only make our town numbers climb. I am also concerned because all surrounding towns are higher. As you know Governor Lamont stated on Thurs. that we are at the highest ever for COVID-19 rate in the state at 7.13% and that is alarming. Many other towns with the same or less rates are remote through at least Winter Break. Others are through MLK Jr Day or indefinitely. Doctors around the state are pleading with Lamont to shut down the state.

I am also concerned with how our School District goes about everything related to COVID. Contact Tracing with many school districts means quarantining everyone including the teacher and the class itself when someone tests positive not just those directly around. My husband is also a teacher and his school district along with many other friends' schools are doing this. They even go remote after 1-2 cases. Amity does not. We do quarantine a whole sports team though. Just at the High School we have had over 15 cases I believe before we shut down and went remote. Many more teachers and students got sick while remote and the School District did not report those to us in a letter email like they traditionally have. 6ft at Amity High School in classrooms is not 6ft. Desks are literally 3-4 feet apart. Where I stand in the front of the room or even my desk is not 6ft from the closest student desk next to me. Teachers have heard again and again that both heads of the two Health Departments we are working with are in disagreement whether to be remote or hybrid.

The lack of consistency and lack of safety is alarming. We all have families. We are stressed out beyond max. We of course want to see our students, but remote learning DOES work and Amity students DO show up. They understand that we are in a pandemic and the full magnitude of that. Personally, I don't have to worry about the WIFI Not working in the building (which we have had tons of glitches with this year), I don't have to worry about students not being able to hear each other because 1/2 are in class and 1/2 at home on my computer. We are seriously lacking in the right technology. Many districts invested to make it more seamless in the classroom. Myself and many teachers have spent a good deal of money on tech to make it more bearable and work best for kids. This should not be this way.

Many families are also opting out students these past two days. I literally just had a class of 2 (L-Z) last period when it should have been a class of 11. Many of my classes are much higher whether A-K or L-Z but that's going to change I believe over the next few days if action is not taken. That might be the strongest message being sent to the BOE and Dr. Byars. Parents do not feel this is safe either. Again, the facts and numbers don't lie here as I've expressed in this letter.

I thank you for your time and support. We need to put not only kids first, but also teachers and everyone's families. You will be remembered for whether you made rational decisions or not in moments of crisis. Teachers, Parents and the Community are counting on you to do the right thing.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

I am writing to you to urge a reversal of the decision bringing our community back to hybrid learning, and to keep our schools remote until at least January. First, I'd like to share that I came to Amity from a previous district as the reputation for high academic achievement and supportive administration was very attractive to me. I have not been disappointed, and I am proud to be an Amity teacher and I hope to have a long career in this district. I also would like to make clear my support for the Amity High School admin team: Monica Kreuzer, Miguel Pickering, Frank Barretta, and Jill LaPlante. I want to also explicitly share my gratitude for Principal, Anna Mahon: She has handled an impossible situation with transparency and grace, and I have felt completely supported by her during this very difficult time- I do not know how she does what she does everyday and I am very grateful for her efforts. With that being said, I have several concerns with the return to hybrid teaching that can be rectified by a reversal from the board:

- 1. There are several districts in the state (Naugatuck, Shelton, Oxford, Hamden, Region 9, etc. to name a few) that have chosen to stay remote until after the holidays, some even choosing to stay remote until at least the end of January. This is concerning to me as they are using the same indicators as we are, and have similar situations of community transmission than we do. Why not us? It is no surprise that the COVID numbers are the highest they have ever been, hospitals are past capacity, and over 5,000 people have died in our state alone- this includes relatives of my colleagues and my students. Therefore, why wouldn't we follow the leading indicators as these other districts have chosen to do?
- 2. In a letter that was sent to the middle school community, it was noted that the decision was "deliberately selected to begin [on] December 9th, as this will give us a two-week window to assess the impact on our school community prior to an already scheduled winter break,"- the impact being the post Thanksgiving uptick. I do not feel that it is appropriate, nor responsible, for impact to be assessed simply because we have a break on the horizon- a break where, if people are (God forbid) sick, they can convalesce during the holiday. If we are aware that there could possibly be an impact, why are we risking being in school then?
- 3. I worry about learning gaps for my students. We, as teachers, are better equipped to teach remotely than we were in the Spring. This is not the Spring- I am better than I was then, and the last three weeks for me was "business as usual" with a location change. I felt confident and comfortable providing a consistent education to my students as there were no wifi issues, I could see everyone in one platform, and our class was more of a human experience as we were all able to be unmasked and we could see facial expressions. I fear that the "covid whiplash' of the back and forth, in school and out, is what really will be detrimental to the learning experience. When we know the numbers are not safe, and other districts have already put the safety of their students and staff first, why are we not following suit?
- 4. Finally, I and my husband are both "high risk" individuals with a small child to care for. We, thankfully, have not yet been sick. But we have seen family members and friends become sick- some asymptomatic, some desperately ill. Every day, I mask up and come in for my students. I mask up, and teach my classes. What my students don't see is how

every day I live in fear that today will be the day I get sick and bring it home. They don't see that this level of anxiety has affected my personal life in ways that I can not begin to describe as it is deeply personal.

Please, I implore you to listen to the voices of the teachers, parents, students, community members, and health professionals on the severity of this illness, the effect it is having in our community, and the danger it poses to us all. Remote teaching is a safe and effective way to operate school until it is safe to return. Why must we gamble with the safety and well-being of our community when, in fact, it is not necessary?

Thank you for taking them time read this and I hope you will consider my plea.

Re: Comment prior to emergency meeting, Dec. 8, 2020.

Given that we are all pressed for time, we will not burden you with an additional lengthy opinion piece. The comments that we submitted on Oct. 30 remain true today (attached).

What has changed is that the rate of community spread has gone up dramatically, as most public health experts predicted. The most recent data available from the state has our local Covid-19 rates/100,000 at 27.4 (Bethany), 36.6 (Orange), and 24.3 (Woodbridge). https://data.ct.gov/stories/s/q5as-kyim. This puts the overall Amity community rate at 30. Bringing students back into greater contact at this time is thus directly at odds with the Amity Reopening Plan October 2020 (attached, pp 2-3).

Dr. Birx has privately notified Connecticut authorities to take greater precautions against Covid-19 (Emilie Munson, Connecticut Post (online) 12/7/2020). The majority of public health officials are urging people to limit their exposure as to others as much as possible. The country will easily exceed 300,000 deaths by Christmas.

Dr. Byars has been quoted as saying that decisions to (change model) are "based on data, not opinion" (Pam McLoughlin, New Haven Register (on-line) Nov. 2, 2020). Based on the now ubiquitous data, it is absurd to return to even hybrid instruction for teens at this time. The District should be making plans to support remote learning for several more months. We may be well into spring before it is appropriate to bring students back.

Dear Amity Board of Education-

I am a teacher at Amity Regional High School. I am a member of the community; I live in Bethany. I am writing to you to respectfully request that we remain in the remote learning model until January 4th. I am asking this for the safety of my family. I am asking this for the safety of my colleagues. I am asking this for the safety of all students.

We are in a global pandemic.

More and more information and data regarding the number of Covid cases in Connecticut, and particularly within the BOW community indicate that cases are on the upswing. Fewer and fewer of our students are in class. Fewer and fewer teachers are in school.

I understand that the desire to "get things back to normal" is the goal. I am not even sure what that is anymore. We need to adjust as new norms evolve.

The Connecticut Department of Public Health Town-Level Covid Response Framework supports the case for remote learning. According to that framework if there are 15 + cases per 100K per day, then the community should "consider more distance learning above 25." Cases in Bethany are at 27.4. Cases in Orange are at 36.4. Cases in Woodbridge are at 24.3. Surrounding towns have even higher numbers: Derby has a rate of 58.2, Ansonia 57.2 and Prospect 62.7.

I do not mean to bore you with data that you already know. I would like to preface this by saying that it is disruptive to our students, to our families and to everyone's well-being when we are constantly jockeying back and forth between models.

As a staff, we talked this year about making sure that the social and emotional learning for our students is paramount. We understand that students cannot learn in an environment where they do not feel safe. What has not been taken into account is the social and emotional well-being of staff members. With all due respect and no offense, there has been a lack of transparency between the Board and the school community. We do not feel safe. We do not feel like we are given the knowledge to make informed decisions about our own health. We are real people, with families, lives, children, grandchildren. We love our work, we love the students, but do not feel that our health, and the health of our loved ones should be collateral damage.

Dear Board of Education Members and Dr. Byars,

It is my fervent belief that the Amity Regional School District must remain in a remote learning format until after the holidays when the situation can be re-evaluated. As the numbers in the three towns have greatly increased over the past month, it is no longer safe to be in school. Teachers, their families, students and their families' lives are at stake.

I am not sure if the board is aware to what extent students are exhibiting unsafe behavior. It's quite disconcerting to return to school after a period of remote learning and overhear conversations amongst students discussing all of the family events and parties that they've recently attended and plan to attend next weekend. While this might not be the majority of the student population, it is clear that many are disregarding CDC and local health department guidelines. It's unfortunate that community spread due to such events is occurring, but these outside choices are affecting our ability to safely remain in school.

Additionally, as the school year has progressed, it is clear that "Covid fatigue" is impacting our students. When we returned to school in August our students were diligent about following our Covid protocols. This has changed, as on a daily basis, I personally am reminding students to properly wear their masks, to follow the arrows in the hallways, and practice social distancing. Unfortunately, more and more students are simply disregarding these rules, which is creating an unsafe working environment for the staff, but also creating a very unsafe environment for our students as well.

The decision to continue in-person learning is greatly affecting my personal health and home life. I am suffering from terrible anxiety and have been experiencing insomnia, both of which I have never experienced before. I have experienced an increase in migraine headaches. All of these issues affect my home life, which is truly unfair to my own children.

To be clear, I want to be in school as I truly love teaching and working with our fantastic students and staff. However, at this time, my family's safety and health are paramount, and this risk is unnecessary and reckless.

The decision to move to full in-person learning at AMSB comes as quite a shock when town and district metrics fall within the state guidelines for remote learning. In addition, county data, which the guidelines also recommend be taken into account, shows a major surge in New Haven County, as well as a shortage of hospital beds. It would be helpful to know why the state guidelines are not being followed.

Existing data related to school transmission does not reflect the current level of virus in the community. The data also does not reflect asymptomatic transmission. Although we have not seen a lot of evidence of transmission in schools, there are still many unknowns. This is especially concerning when the state guidelines are not being followed.

My name is Aldon Hynes. I reside at 10 Barberry Lane in Woodbridge, CT. I work at Community Health Center helping with our statewide COVID activities and have been working seven days a week helping the public get tested for COVID and raising awareness of what is currently going on. I am speaking on my own behalf as a resident of Woodbridge, and not on behalf of the health center.

The special meeting concern Amity's COVID planning has been brought to my attention, and I would like to provide some comment on it. First and foremost, it is my opinion that the Amity School district has grievously failed in its responsibilities to the communities it is part of in keeping people informed. As part of my job at the health center, I help produce a weekly Zoom meeting which also gets streamed to Facebook and other platforms. It includes the Mayor of Middletown, the health director, the Superintendent of the public schools, and representatives of the health care community, the business community, and the non-profit community. There are frank discussions about the combined response to the pandemic. Such communications needs to take place within BOWA as well.

I have looked at the Amity Regional School District Reopening updates and they appear to be misleading the public. Of particular note, is the graph of Percent positivity rate. The graph shows a major peak during the month of April and the positivity rates do not approach anywhere near that level in the rest of the graph. This is grossly misleading. In April testing was just getting underway and only those who were most likely positive were tested. During the month of April, 24,712 people were tested in New Haven County. During the month of October, that number was 224,600.

Another piece of misleading information is in the Percent Test Positivity presented for Bethany, Orange, and Woodbridge. It observes a decrease in positivity over the past two periods. Anyone who is paying attention to the news will know that around Thanksgiving, there were extremely long lines for testing. In fact, if you look at the data from the state, during 11/23-11/25, 32,198 people from New Haven were tested. That is more than was tested during the whole month of April. As a result of this, the results are delayed in being released. Positive results are delayed the longest because of processing and reporting requirements.

If you take all of this into consideration, and produce a graph for positivity rate in New Haven County fro the period 7/1/2020 through 11/30/2020, you get a very different result, included below. You will see that from July through September, the positivity rate for the most part, remained very low, below 2%, By the end of November, it had climbed very significantly, with New Haven now having the second highest positivity rate in the state at over 7%.

If you look at the State's data tracker you will see that the current cases per 100,000 for Orange, as of 12/3 is 36.4, for Woodbridge it is 24.3, and for Bethany it is 27.4. The state defines the red zone as having a current case rate of over 15. Orange is over twice that rate and Bethany is approaching that twice that rate.

The State's guidelines say that Pre K-12 schools in collaboration with Local Health Department and Superintendent should consider more distance learning above 25. It appears from the data that Amity should be considering more distance learning at this point. Until these rates are substantially lower, ideally below 15 for at least two consecutive weeks, Amity be looking at ways to decrease the number of


people in the schools and should not consider any action that would result in more people, students, teachers of staff being in the schools.

Related to this is the issue of contact tracing. I have not seen any reports on the ability of the school district in conjunction with the local health districts about their capacity to do rapid and thorough contact tracing. Reports about the contact tracing capabilities of the school district and local health districts should be made available and should demonstrate the ability to rapidly contact anyone who has had a potential exposure. Until that is clearly demonstrated, there should be no expansion of people in any of the schools.

The data I have used is all publically available from the State on its COVID-19 Data portal. I would be happy to go over any of this data in further detail, time permitting, to the extent there are questions.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

I am a Woodbridge resident and parent of a student at Amity Regional High School. I am writing regarding the decision announced on Friday, December 4, 2020 to move the high school from the full remote instructional model back to the hybrid model, beginning on December 7th. I understand that "more in person learning" has been the goal all along and that when the decision was announced to move to a full remote model for the week after Thanksgiving, the plan was to return to the hybrid model on December 7th unless the indicators for school instructional models suggested otherwise.

Based on prior communications from Dr. Byars, I understand that the Amity district is following guidelines established by the CSDE in determining the appropriate learning model. Among those guidelines is reference to an "Addendum 4" (attached) which sets forth certain metrics, including the "leading" and "secondary" indicators, that are monitored in order to determine whether there should be more or less in person learning. The most recent statistics available to the public (updated on 12/3) reflect infection rates of 24.3 per 100k for Woodbridge, 27.4 per 100k for Bethany, and 36.4 per 100k for Orange for the two week period of 11/15 – 11/28. These infection rates, unfortunately, were higher than the rates reported for the prior two week period and seem to be consistent with elevated infection rates throughout the state and elsewhere. Accordingly, these rates appear to indicate that "less in-person learning" is appropriate according to Addendum 4, as do the secondary indicators. While recognizing that more in person learning is preferable in general, it is difficult to understand the decision to move from full remote to hybrid in the high school at this time.

Although there have been relatively few Covid cases reported in the high school, the fact that there is no testing of students or faculty, coupled with the fact that there is no compulsory reporting of positive tests to the school, suggests that it is not entirely clear how many students and faculty have contracted or been exposed to the virus. Based on media reports, many people disregarded guidance about traveling and gathering for Thanksgiving and that trend is likely to continue throughout the holiday season.

All things considered, the primary goal should be to protect the faculty, staff and students at the high school, and remaining in the hybrid model – while not perfect educationally – represents the best approach to meeting that goal.

Dear Mr. Chairman,

We value open communication within the Amity community, the more so in a pandemic when people are tired, stressed, and uncertain.

Families in our community are confused about how we prioritize in-person learning and the changes in the instructional model of our schools in this pandemic, from shutdown in the spring to increasing in-person time in a surge of cases this fall. We would like to hear from the Superintendent, our medical advisor, and both health departments how thinking on schools' roles in pandemics has evolved and why they have made the choices they have. We hope to increase community understanding and trust by having all parties in the (virtual) room.

Responding to the pandemic has required sacrifices and accepting non-ideal circumstances from us all. As Amity approaches the mid-point of this school year, we would like to hear from each building administrator and teachers what is working and what is not, so that we can find ways to better support our school community where possible. We further request a survey of both students and families to assess coping and where different supports may be needed.

To begin this process, we write to officially request that you call a Special Meeting for the Amity BOE, in accordance with Board Bylaw 9321(a) (attached).

The purpose of the requested meeting is threefold:

- 1) To receive information regarding changes to the district instructional model in response to the COVID-19 pandemic,
- To receive correspondence on this topic,
- 3) To discuss and act as necessary.

We request this meeting be held as soon as possible, in light of the pressing nature of the topic. It is our understanding of public notice requirements that provided notice of the meeting time, place, and purpose is posted by close of business Monday, December 7 that the meeting can be held Tuesday, December 8.

Bylaws of the Board 9321(a)

Time, Place and Notification of Meetings

1. Regular Meetings

A. The Board of Education shall set a calendar of regular meetings for the ensuing year at the first regular meeting in December.

- B. In compliance with the General Statutes of the State of Connecticut, the Chairperson shall file this calendar with the Town Clerk by December 31st, and not later than January 31st.
- C. Normally the Board shall schedule regular meetings on the 2nd Monday of each month of the year.
- D. If at any point in the meeting the Board of Education should not maintain a quorum, then the Chairperson of the Board will adjourn the meeting and declare the time and place of the resumption of the meeting, which shall be reflected in a written order of adjournment. A copy of the written order of adjournment will be posted on or near the door of the place where the meeting was held within twenty- four hours after the time of adjournment.

2. Special Meetings

- A. Special meetings may be held when determined by the Board, when so called by the Chairperson, or upon written request of three members of the Board.
- B. No special meeting shall be held unless a notice stating the time, place, and purpose of the meeting has been given to each member and to the Town Clerks, twenty-four (24) hours before the time stated for the meeting to convene.
- C. When a majority of the members agree that an emergency exists which has made a regular notice impossible such a meeting may be called at a time or place which may be most convenient. In case of such emergency meeting, a copy of the minutes setting forth the nature of the emergency and the proceedings occurring at such meeting shall be filed with the Town Clerk no later than seventy-two (72) hours following the holding of such meeting.

Notice of meetings will be mailed to persons filing a written request renewable in January of each year. The Board of Education will charge a fee for these notices based upon cost of the service, as provided by law.

I have taught in the Amity district for over twenty years, always putting my students first and showing up to work faithfully, happy to be a part of such a supportive community that values education and values teachers.

While I don't doubt that recent decisions to move back to in-person learning reflect that valuing of education, I don't feel they reflect the same value of teachers. With numbers in the State at an all-time high, a vaccine on the way, and the holidays upon us, I was surprised that we couldn't wait it out the next few weeks, at least through the holidays, until this health crisis turned around a bit and it felt safer and smarter to return to school in person.

I can speak from extremely recent, raw experience in that I just lost my dad to COVID-19. While it is true he was 91, he was relatively healthy until COVID swept through his nursing facility, infecting the majority of the residents, many of the health care workers, and killing six of the residents. While, for months, the facility has successfully kept the virus out, meticulously following protocols and limiting exposure, once the virus breached the facility, it spread like wildfire.

While none of us seems to know the actual numbers at Amity, I know that many students, their family members, and an alarmingly high number of faculty members have become infected. There are just too many variables, too many things we can't control and too many members of the community non-COVID compliant to feel confident that transmission isn't happening here in the building.

I truly can't wait to be back in my classroom with ALL of my students safely in person. There is truly no substitute. But waiting a few more weeks seems to me the safest and smartest course of action. A few more weeks will not damage our students irreparably – COVID could.

They CLOSED until January 4th based on "strong recommendations" from their Health Department.

We also need to understand why Amity is taking the risk as teachers are vehemently opposed and many more families opt out of in person. When the staff feels the school is unsafe, we as parents lose confidence in sending our children to school.

This immediate pivot from full remote to full in person learning during a time of increased transmission is ill advised and needs to be reconsidered.

Yesterday, we received the latest health report for Easton and Redding. Currently, the leading indicator (the number of new cases 14 day avg per 100k pop.) and the secondary indicator (positivity rate) remain in the red. Last week Easton and Redding health officials shared that we should anticipate a post-Thanksgiving increase in the number of positive cases. They warned that the increase will likely impact our community next week (10-14).

days after Thanksgiving) and cause staff absences due to district-related quarantines, pending test results and childcare issues as a result of school closures in surrounding towns.

In today's meeting, our local health officials urged us to adopt a proactive approach rather than reacting after students and staff are exposed.

Based on their strong recommendations, we will remain in distance learning at least through December 23rd and will plan to return to in-person instruction on January 4th.

Determination of the learning model (hybrid or in-person) will be communicated prior to the return from the winter recess and will be made based upon the health metrics at that time.

There are no universally agreeable solutions to the complicated circumstances of this pandemic. While I am fully aware of the challenges this shift will create for many of our families, I believe this measured approach is the best way to safeguard the health and safety of our students and staff, and will provide more runway for families to have stability in terms of the model we're using. This plan also eliminates the continued disruptive adjustments for both families and employees that result from the week-to-week waiting and unpredictable nature of multiple changes. As we move forward, we will continue to refine our distance learning model to ensure students continue to grow academically, socially and emotionally. Thank you for your continued support, flexibility and understanding during these unprecedented times.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

I find myself in the unique and dual positions of parent and educator in the Amity School District. Out of respect for our great district and the amazing students I have the privilege of teaching year after year, I have made it my practice to support the decisions made by the district as I believed these decisions represented the best interests of our students, including my own child. I was even given the chance to help develop some of those decisions because Amity is great at giving teachers a voice in so many of the essential initiatives that help shape our students' educational experience.

I am what my mother would have called a "company girl." However, I can no longer remain silent as I witness what I consider a misstep by administration. I can only speak to the teaching conditions at Amity Middle School Bethany, but I believe that the conditions are not safe to bring back all students. The decision to do so was published on Friday afternoon and planned for Wednesday of this week. Teachers, students, and community members were shocked by this change in status because of the spiking rates of COVID positive cases in our state as well as the two towns that attend our middle school. Additionally, this abrupt and unexpected change in model gave teachers only 48 hours to prepare.

An "all in" approach is often touted as the ultimate goal of the re-opening committee. I participated on the re-opening committee this summer because of my overwhelming concern for the health and well-being of my students and my fellow teachers. And I agree whole-heartedly that the goal for reentry should strive for an in-person experience for all students, only if and when the conditions are safe and responsible to do so. We are not there yet.

The hybrid model has certainly posed its share of challenges for teachers and students alike. However, Amity teachers have risen to that challenge, learned new teaching platforms, and engaged students in creative and previously undiscovered ways these past few months, and they will continue to do so until this crisis subsides. I have watched our students rise to this challenge as well, making new friends in a cohort of students that were previously unfamiliar to them. I have watched with pride as students choose again and again to support each other's learning on a daily basis. I witness firsthand the beauty inherent in hardship, and trust me when I say, that our students have empathy in abundance.

No offense to the precious elementary school students in our communities, but the young adults who attend AMSB should not be compared to the children of the elementary schools. It is true that they are both cohorted, but please be aware that our middle school students break their cohorts for at least two classes per day, including physical education, band, choir, Mandarin, and special services. Doubling this hallway traffic will be detrimental to their safety and increase their potential exposure. Please understand too, when comparing our students to those in the elementary schools, that our classrooms are significantly smaller than those found in either elementary school, and our students are significantly larger than their elementary counterparts. Our rooms do not allow for 3-4 feet of distance between students.

Please understand that the change to an "all in" model at the middle schools will not translate to an increase in educational opportunity for our students. Since parents have the option to opt their children out of in-person learning under the Amity re-opening plan, teachers will still have the responsibility of educating those students at home synchronously. This means that teacher attention will still be fractured between the two groups of students while the challenges and delays of constant technology failures take time away from learning for all parties involved. Essentially, students will be at an increased risk while receiving no increased benefit.

Therefore, as a parent and an educator, I respectfully request that the Amity Board of Education consider the health of its students and teachers as the highest priority and consider moving all learning to the remote model at least until after the holiday break.

I appreciate your time this evening and I would like to understand the Board and Superintendent's decision to move to full in-person learning at AMSB as well as hybrid at Amity High School. To say that I am disappointed by this decision is an understatement as town and district metrics fall well within the state guidelines for remote learning let alone full in-person learning. Further, there is currently a major surge in New Haven County (and most of Connecticut), which I would have expected would further justify the decision to safely remain remote, as most neighboring towns are currently doing.

With such a major surge in New New Haven County, as well as increasing demand on our front line workers and shortage of hospital beds, my expectation would have been that we continue to try and keep our communities as safe as possible. This does not appear to be the right time to rush back to school when we should be focusing on containing the spread in our community. I fully appreciate that we may not have seen a lot of evidence of transmission in schools directly (albeit we did have an outbreak after Halloween). However, do we know how many students unknowingly brought the virus home to their parents/family members?

I further understand that each family has the right to keep their child fully remote, as our family has chosen to do, and for that I am grateful. However, do we not have a responsibility to our community to try and keep everyone safe? Have we taken into account the safety of our teachers and faculty members? It is my understanding that our teachers, in a unified manner, have expressed their concern for returning to school at this time and their voices really should be heard. They should be commended for everything they have had to endure this year and I do not believe they are given the recognition they deserve.

I am fortunate to work alongside such a talented, passionate family of educators, and Amity students have always been a source of joy for me. I desperately long to be back in school with all my students for a full, "normal" day. However, in light of the alarming rise in the COVID positivity rate, I realize just how dangerous this would currently be. I respectfully request that you allow Amity District 5 to remain fully remote until January 11.

Let us not confuse quality education with daycare. I am positive that our dedicated administrators will attest to the fact that Amity teachers continue to provide rigorous, quality instruction regardless of being in-person or remote. We strive to collaborate with colleagues and students to create engaging lessons and offer specific feedback -- whether we are in-person or remote.

I understand many parents' frustration that remote learning makes it difficult for them to work. Trust me, I have two children of my own who have been remote for about a month now. One of my daughters definitely could use more support with remote learning, but she must manage on her own. I would love for my daughters to be in school, but I respect the decision of their district to protect everyone -- staff and students alike. Furthermore, I have had to address my children's increased anxiety as they question my safety because I am returning to the building when so many other districts are now fully remote. I do not think it's good for us kids in junior high to just sit all day in the same chair at the same screen even with breaks, it gets very upsetting.

I don't feel that I can do my best work like this academically or emotionally. It is very difficult to learn without being present with a teacher especially for math IM in the top math group and many times I can't see what she's doing with this technology and the glare from the screen in the whiteboard.

If given the opportunity to go to school, I will make sure I wear my mask, wash my hands properly, and social distance because attending in school is very important to me. I will be able to see my teachers and perform much better than I am now. I need to be with people and I can't see how much longer this can be like this for kids. I will do a lot better personally and academically.

Please consider keeping the Amity Middle School open with live teaching from the teachers because if not I'm just going to be alone all day, being taught by the computer and not my actual in person teacher, not being able to ask questions and get answers immediately, and therefore make everything harder and more stressful.

I am an Amity teacher and parent writing to express my concern for Amity's return to the hybrid model for the high school and full-in person instruction for the middle schools. Amity is my family, my community; it truly means everything to me. I believe wholeheartedly in the model of community Amity has projected during my tenure at the school. I carry those ideals into my home life and model them with my own children, one of whom is a freshman at Amity this year. The other will be a student at the middle school next year. My children understand Covid statistics; they understand that the majority of children do not get sick from Covid or experience symptoms to even know that they have it. They wear masks to protect others, people around them who may be more vulnerable to such a virus. This is part of being a good citizen, a productive member of a community. We don't leave our home unless we need food, medicine, or other necessities. Unfortunately, this is not true of many, many people in our community. As a teacher, I had several student emails over the long holiday weekend from students asking for extensions on assignments because they were traveling home after Thanksgiving. I don't think you need me to tell you about Covid, but I've had at least one friend test positive after more than 14 days after exposure. This is why my own son will be remote learning until things are safer and clearer in terms of infection. Perhaps I am overly sensitive to this illness, but I am one of those people with "underlying conditions." As a long-time type 1 diabetic, Covid could mean a death sentence for me. In 2003, when I was just 25 years old, I contracted influenza from a colleague who came to work sick. Consequently, I spent 5 days in the ICU in ketoacidosis (a deadly condition that results from uncontrolled high blood glucose levels—usually from infection) with a blood glucose level hovering in the 600-900 range (a non-diabetic might have a blood sugar of 85-100). My doctors could not get my blood glucose level down, and when they finally did, one doctor told me I was the closest he's ever come to losing a patient. That was the flu. We know Covid is more deadly than the flu. According to the CDC, 5 out of 10 diabetics who contract Covid will end up on ventilators; 3-10 will die. This is why my son kept his mask on at all times while at Amity (even in gym when many of his classmates did not wear masks). He was so anxious and scared he would bring Covid home to me. How many students might be in my son's position? How many students walk the halls of Amity wondering if this might be the day they infect a parent or grandparent who will not be able to fight off what a teenager can? We are all in this together. Right? I believe that Amity students working remotely through winter break is a community service. We work so hard for our kids (students and actual kids!). I give up hours upon hours of free time to work with students who need extra help, college recommendation letters, or need me to moderate a club. Is it that foreign a concept to consider students doing something for adults? It's their turn to protect us. This is what it means to be a compassionate, productive member of a community, to be an effective world citizen. Our incredibly hard working and caring administrators have built a school community upon these very principles. Let's honor their hard work and dedication as well!

I am lucky and ever so grateful that Amity granted me the privilege to teach remotely. But right now, we should all be working remotely. Despite the prevailing rhetoric, teachers are NOT front line workers, or "essential workers." If the last 9 months have proven anything at all, they've proven, though not ideal, we CAN do our job from home. And if I am "essential," or "front line," where's my December 2020 Covid vaccine? Where's my proper PPE provided by my employer?

Dear Pam,

I hope this finds you well. Here is a letter that I wrote for tonight's board of ed meeting. Can you please ask that the person be careful summarizing this? Last time they did, it was interpreted differently then intended and reflected poorly on our school and myself. I hope it does not look insulting? I always try to be cordial.

Dear board of education members,

I would first like to thank our nurses, custodians, secretaries, and building administrators (Mr. Doyle and Dr. Tracy) for their efforts during this extraordinarily difficult time.

I would also like to thank the board for their service and the time they have volunteered in trying to make the best decisions for our schools during this pandemic.

I am writing this letter as a concerned teacher, parent, and community member. I am deeply saddened by the conversations that are occurring amongst faculty, students, and community members.

There appears to be a great deal of distrust and uncertainty among faculty and community members about decisions being made on their behalf by the boards of health and boards of education. Frankly, teachers feel left out and extremely confused and there are more questions than answers. Let me use examples that have led me to that conclusion.

- 1. The CDC guidelines about level of risk and recommendations coming from our own first selectman and towns seem to conflict with the assessments being made by our health boards and school officials. Other towns with similar metrics (i.e. region 9) have health officials telling people they strongly recommend remote learning. How can two towns, so similar, have such vastly varying opinions?
- 2. There is also an increasing distrust from the lack of notification about cases in the schools. Multiple parents have shared examples of instances where they were notified several DAYS after their child was potentially exposed in their class. One such example was from a parent whose son was notified 7 days after being exposed in the class. Can you imagine the number of people he could have infected within that time? His own elderly grandmother included? This seems to demonstrate that our health department cannot keep up with the amount of contract tracing being completed? Along this line, there also seems to be a discrepancy between the positive cases we are told about and the positive tests that have actually occurred. This impacts informed decisions about the safety of the schools and does not allow for families to make difficult risk assessment choices. Many schools in the area are reporting every case, regardless if the student is remote, in person, etc and that would be useful information to have.

- 3. There has been a disconnect between what is happening in schools and within the community. Teachers have found out about private sports leagues, social events, and even private Halloween parties from students and parents without any information about these activities from the board of health or school board. These activities endanger teachers and teachers do not feel safe knowing that these are happening and we could be possibly exposed by these community actions. With many staff living or caring for in-laws, or trying to protect loved ones from exposure, this seems like a dangerous reality for staff members, especially when sitting with large groups of individuals for 5 hours plus a day.
- 4. There has been no anonymous surveys given to parents and teachers to truly assess the level at which people are interacting with others. Students have made it clear that they have traveled during the holidays and have been seeing circles of friends and family. No one is going to rightly admit about violating "the rules." This data would be useful to assess how much POTENTIAL exposure could be coming to our schools, especially during the holiday season.
- 5. Teachers have not been asked for any feedback regarding the status of their classrooms, their safety concerns, and their well being. I have witnessed people breaking down emotionally and physically from this. TEACHERS ARE EXHAUSTED. And by bringing everyone back does NOT make it easier on anyone. As long as we are running these virtual meetings simultaneously at school via Google Meet or Zoom, it is a massive amount of work to manage classroom discipline and protocols while also instructing those at home.
- 6. We are sandwiched between two major religious holidays. I don't know the percentages, but I am certain a great number of our district families celebrate Christmas or Hanukkah. Many students, faculty, and community members were hoping for some sort of semblance of celebration, albeit small. By increasing risk, many are now contemplating nullifying visits with immediate family. This could have happened if the district had decided to remote at least during these religious times. This has a serious emotional impact on people and we as a district are a business which embraces diversity and people.

There is much more to this, but I encourage the board to reach out to teachers. Reach out to the community. Reach out to religious leaders. Reach out and have some conversations. We just went through a major professional development training dealing with difficult conversations. Why are we not having them together? The more teachers and community members are left out, the greater the loss of trust. I do not want to see that happen for trust is a very difficult thing to get back and all of this impacts our students directly.

I wish you all a blessed holiday season. I hope that you stay safe and healthy. I pray that you walk a mile in our shoes for one moment and reflect upon this difficult time.

My friends and colleagues are not only stressed about how teaching in the hybrid model is effective, but also how safe they truly are in the school building itself. Right now, teachers cannot fully engage with students under the hybrid model because of the distancing that needs to happen as well as the fact that teachers are spread thin through trying to navigate technology, students at home and in the classroom. It is difficult to say the least - especially in the arts. I have found that by teaching remotely, I've had the opportunity to engage fully, and more personally. I've been able to meet the demands of both my students and their families by being one on one with them and by holding them accountable through zoom classes. I've been able to give personal feedback through face-to-face interactions in zoom. My students have succeeded through this platform and I can only hope to make you realize that every other teacher has this ability as well. Every teacher I know at Amity is dedicated to the success of students in the building as well as their safety. It is with this that I can only hope that you consider, for the safety of both teachers and students, to move to a remote option until January or when indicators dictate a safe return to school. Thank you for your time.

I would like to share a few comments/questions for today's Board of Ed meeting. I would really appreciate it if my comments were shared anonymously, but it okay to say that they are from a current Amity HS student.

Although I don't know the focus of the emergency Board of Ed meeting, I would like to comment on the workload at Amity HS this past semester during the pandemic. I am a high honor roll senior who is applying to colleges. I would also like to ask several questions.

This semester, many Amity high school students (on remote learning days) are spending about FIVE HOURS on Zoom, to attend synchronous classes. In addition, every single day, students like myself are spending an ADDITIONAL 7-8 HOURS on a computer screen trying to keep up with the demanding homework load. My peers and I are trying our best to to keep up with Amity teachers' high expectations and trying to maintain good grades, but it is a LOT given the pandemic that we are also dealing with.

Some students are unduly stressed out by this situation. It does not feel to many of us that Amity HS teachers, on the whole, have made ANY modifications to the work load or to their grading expectations. The result is that many students are working around the clock trying to manage their work, leaving very little to no time to relax or decompress. Many students are dealing with mental health issues because of this.

Here are my questions for the Amity HS administrators and the Board of Ed:

- (1) What has the administration done thus far to regulate the amount of work we are being given, given the pandemic?
- (2) Are you aware that, from the perspective and experience of students, there has been NO DISCERNIBLE adjustment to the work load/expectations?

- (3) What will the administration or Board of Ed do to try to learn more about how students are feeling? What will you do to further regulate the work load and expectations, if you agree this should happen?
- (4) Although formal midterms were canceled, are high school teachers ALLOWED to still give "informal" midterms? If yes, why is this allowed? (Please note that deciding to allow informal midterms but to cancel formal midterms makes no sense to me.)

As a former Mental Health Care Worker and Genetic Epidemiology Research Scientist, I feel compelled to write to you about my concerns regarding the possibility of our school district returning to a fully remote learning template. The coronavirus pandemic has taken a significant toll on all of us as we cope with stressors at home and the anxiety and uncertainty about the future. But, we are adults. Imagine for a moment what our children are going through. On top of worrying about the pandemic, their families, their friends, the state of the world, our politics, our lives, our wellbeing, our jobs, our economy, our income and everything else these children should never have to stress about for many years, they suddenly have to re-learn how they learn in order to adapt to distance learning. I've spoken to several students and so many of them feel that eventhough they try, they can't "turn if off" while learning from home. Others in a worse scenario, are having difficulty getting motivated to "turn it on". In either case, their sense of structure has been taken away; the very platform from which everything else is cultivated, grows and flourishes.

Unfortunately, this all too often becomes a trigger for adolescent mental health issues such as severe anxiety, loneliness, difficulty concentrating, depression, suicidal ideation, intentions of self-harm, and so much more. Also, keep in mind that often educators, school administrators and counselors are a first line of defense when a student is struggling with their mental health. But when schools close, so too does their window into students' wellbeing because in-person interactions between students and those who would typically help them ceased. So, yes, statistically child abuse complaints will drop during this time, but not because the abuse had stopped. Instead, the drop in reported cases will be due to the fact that children will no longer be interacting with the people who they typically trust and to whom they report their concerns.

I believe pandemic-related mental health will be among the most prevalent concerns in both the immediate and distant future. I was recently reading an article about a study that sited nearly a quarter of people in the United States are experiencing symptoms of depression, nearly three times the number before the COVID-19 pandemic began. As we know, stress and anxiety stemming from the pandemic can bring about new mental health issues for those who have not needed help before and can exacerbate problems for those whose mental health is already compromised. But, children are especially susceptible because their wellbeing and world views are

shaped by routine. When that routine is upended, such as was the case when schools and day cares suddenly closed, sports activities and summer camps were cancelled and students were separated from friends and family, it can be catastrophic for their mental wellbeing. Isolation has been another top concern for students during the pandemic.

With all due respect, I'd like to express that this decision is not at all about us or the teachers or the parents, or the administrators, or any adult. It never was and in the history of education it never will be. We wouldn't be educators or administrators, or healthcare workers or parents if it were. It's about our kids and what's best for them and their well-being. It's about the freedom to learn and be taught appropriately amid the chaos. It's about finding structure or reforming it when it's lost. It's about maintaining a routine for our students, for their mental health. It's about when this is all over sending them off into the world as best as we can with all the possible tools we can give them to succeed. It's about giving them the best possible education we can, face to face with as much human contact as possible. For them, and their mental health.

Thank you for taking the time to read this and I hope you see a way to agree with my words of passion.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

I am writing as a resident of Woodbridge and as an employee of the Amity School District.

First, thank you for all of the time and effort that you spend in creating an incredible school district for our students. It is also a wonderful place to work. I have a great deal of respect for our Superintendent, Dr. Byars, well as for our high school administration, led by principal Anna Mahon. I know that all of you have worked to create a safe learning environment.

This is why I am so surprised by the decision to return the high school to the hybrid model and to move the middle schools to full enrollment in the weeks between Thanksgiving and winter break.

In a year that has already been so stressful, the attempt to shield my students, my own children, and my parents from the situation I am in is taking a toll on my well being.

This year, I purchased disability insurance with the thought that I might get Covid from school, hopefully survive, but deal with long term (and still unknown) effects that would make me unable to continue working in a job that I love so much.

Like so many others, I have limited my errands when I can, opting for contactless deliveries and curbside pick up when possible. I have stopped seeing friends in person and have only occasionally seen my parents and in-laws because my children and I are potential dangers to them. This has been incredibly difficult for my kids,

who are used to seeing their grandparents weekly. It has been very upsetting to my parents and in-laws whose identities are shaped by their relationships with their grandchildren.

During this holiday season, please keep in mind that while some parents have the option to have their students attend school remotely, in order to be able to celebrate Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, and Christmas with their families this year, many school employees will not be able to celebrate with others because we are exposed to hundreds of people per day, and do not want to endanger our at-risk family members who live outside of our households.

Please reconsider in-person learning between now and the end of 2020 to support the social-emotional well-being of the many members of the school community.

Dear Board of Education Members,

I am a proud Amity teacher. I love my students, this school, and this community.

However, while I truly feel a deep dedication to my students and my craft, that passion is currently being overshadowed by the intense fear I feel as I walk into the building each school day.

The COVID numbers statewide are higher than they've ever been. Because of that, I rarely leave my house. My family and I take the threat of this virus and the dangers it poses to our health very seriously. While the percentage of people who survive is reassuring, we are only beginning to learn about the long-term effects of this disease.

Entering the building, where I am indoors with hundreds of other people, makes me incredibly nervous. I hear students talk about their plans for the weekend, the sleepovers, and family get-togethers they are having. Many students and their families are not following the recommended safety guidelines. Even with sports cancelled, students are still practicing. In fact, one of my students told me last period about a practice she attended with friends yesterday.

In my household, I am the person most exposed. My husband, like many other people I know, has been working from home since March. My children have very limited contact with others. Because of the numerous contacts I have throughout my workday, I know I am the greatest health risk to the people I love most. I'm afraid to hug my own children for fear of exposing them.

Remote learning is not ideal, but it is safest. I am safer at home than I am in school. My family is safer when I work from home. My students and their families are safer if they stay home. I believe safety should be our number one priority right now. With a vaccine on the horizon, why risk the lives of so many?

Remote learning also allows for students to interact with each other more than they would inside of the classroom, where I try to maximize the few feet they're able to social distance. When students are all joining class using the same platform, they are able to collaborate more easily because of significantly fewer issues with technology.

When we started back to work in August I was scared, but the plans the state published for a shift to distance learning and the low covid numbers statewide were reassuring. Now the numbers are staggering and the primary indicators for transitioning to remote learning seem like a suggestion. Many districts in the state are making the decision to keep their students and their staff safe by moving to distance learning until at least January. It is my hope that Amity puts safety first and switches to remote learning immediately.

Thank you for taking the time to listen to my concerns and for your continued hard work for our district.

Dear Mr. Belfonti and the Amity Board of Education,

I would like to thank you and the BOE for taking the time to meet and consider the current crisis we are facing. The teachers care for our students greatly. To suggest otherwise is disingenuous. We recognize that in-person instruction is most effective, to do this we first must ensure the health and well-being of our teachers, staff, students, and the greater community.

The leading indicators published by the state show the infection rates in our area are high. These numbers tell us that we should be in our remote learning model, they most definitely do not demonstrate that we should be moving the middle schools to full-in person. I am looking at the guidance in the plan and the data coming from the state of Connecticut that has been presented to the BOE and the teachers to reach this conclusion.

I am asking you to be proactive and not reactive. We have established parameters that inform us. Friday's decision, short timing, and use of new, and not widely known or understood, factors in the decision making, is disturbing. Do not create a situation to see or test if it will spread. Other health departments in the state have advised other districts, based on a very similar situation, to go remote until after the holidays. It is the more prudent measure.

I am asking that allow us to be at the lowest possible risk level. We are education professionals, we are the ones in the classrooms, and we first and foremost want to be back in school with our students. This can only happen when it is safe for all of us.

Dear Amity Board of Education,

My name is Ken Clark, and I am a proud Amity Regional High School teacher. As I have never written to or otherwise formally addressed you before, I'd like to preface my comments by sharing that I love what I do, and I love who I get to do it with. Teaching isn't just my job—it's my calling, and I simply can't imagine doing anything else. I also can't imagine doing it anywhere else; even after over eight years in the district, my colleagues' brilliance, passion, and dedication never ceases to amaze me, and I can honestly say that Anna Mahon is the best principal any teacher could possibly hope to work for. I'm also incredibly fortunate to work with an amazing group of students; day after day and year after year, I learn as much from them as they learn from me. In short, Amity is my home, and it's where I hope to remain for many years to come. Under normal circumstances, there is nowhere I'd rather be than in my classroom at Amity Regional High School; however, the circumstances are anything but normal. With all of that being said, I am writing to you today to express my serious concerns with the district's return to hybrid and, in the case of the middle schools, fully in-person learning. I urge you to reconsider this decision and to return the entire district to the remote learning model until at least the end of the calendar year.

Several other school districts in our area—all of which are relying on the same indicators in their decision making and many of which find themselves in very similar circumstances with regard to COVID-19 positivity rates and community transmission—have decided to remain fully remote until after the upcoming holidays; some have even chosen to remain remote until later than that and will begin the new year in a fully remote model. I am concerned that Amity's decision is so markedly out of step with these districts when our circumstances are so similar.

I appreciate the concerns surrounding student learning. However, I also believe that absolutely nothing matters more than the safety of the faculty, staff, and students in our schools. Health and safety should be our highest priority during this pandemic, and returning to our school buildings now seems an unnecessary risk, especially with the release of vaccines on the horizon, when we can finally see the light at the end of the tunnel. I also believe that teachers have learned a lot about and gotten much better at teaching remotely over the last several months, and at this point, I think we will actually be able to provide a more consistent educational experience to our students if all of us are remote—we will all be "together" online, able to see one another's faces (without masks), and able to engage with one another meaningfully and with minimal interruptions to our Internet connectivity.

I also urge you to consider the impact of this decision not only on students but also on faculty and staff. Personally, I can't begin to describe the stress and anxiety that being in the school building has caused me this year, nor can I begin to describe the way it impacted my personal life. I fear, too, for my colleagues who are considered "high-risk" or who live with or care for high-risk family members. Having to walk into school each day takes away their decision to do what they believe is in the best interest of their own health and the health of their families. If one of them gets sick and the worst should happen, I simply do not believe it will be worth it. Remote learning is effective learning, but more importantly, it is safe. Staying remote means avoiding any risks to our lives and the lives of our students and families.

Dear Amity Board of Education-

I am a counselor at Amity Middle School Orange and a resident in the Town of Orange. I have 2 elementary school children at Peck Place School and one currently in the middle school. I am writing in response and concern to the recent decision to move from hybrid to full-instruction on Wednesday, December 9th. There are many reasons that I feel strongly that we should not be moving to the full-in person learning model at the middle school, but I am writing to share the personal impact it will have for my family.

I enjoy seeing all the faces of my students day to day and having live conversations with them. Having children of my own of the ages of 13, 11 and 7, I know the positives of full-instruction for academic and social reasons. However, I am at the point where I am grateful daily to be able to come to school and that I am alive to be working through this pandemic. This arrangement brings a huge amount of concern knowing that every working day attending school increases my risk of catching Covid. My husband is living with a high risk condition at home. He too needs to attend work, however, his contact with people is minimal. As a counselor, I have daily contact with students, however, my children are in the classrooms daily with many students. I have had to send them to school not by choice, but because of the need for me to attend work myself. My family therefore, has taken a chance in sending them to school knowing that safe protocols have been in place to help reduce risk of obtaining the virus under the hybrid model and the remote models. At the middle school, the setup is highly different from the elementary schools, which I know first hand. My elementary school children have less contact than my middle schooler. This contact for my middle school daughter will further increase when students return in full. My husband and I will therefore be making the choice to keep our middle schooler home to work remotely, to further reduce her risk of obtaining the virus and passing it on to family and especially my high-risk husband. If he gets Covid the situation will not be positive. In addition we have already lost 2 cousins to Covid. This virus has taken the lives of direct family members. I would like my children to be able to spend their holidays with grandparents who will not otherwise be able to be seen due to safety. We value family as the most important factor above everything and personally to me it does not make sense to increase our family risk in the last 2 weeks prior to a break that could actually continue to mitigate spread if they are kept remote. I believe that I am not alone in this view and would request your understanding and reconsideration of factors such as these which would impact not only my family, but the families of other Orange residents as well.

Thank you for your time and energy that you have put into decision making for our district and I thank you in advance for consideration to this matter.
