We are grateful to you for all the feedback on the remote learning experience thus far and if you have any further comments, then please do forward them to <u>Mr Close</u> (Deputy Head Academic).

We are continuing to keep abreast of the Government's views on returning to school and we are grateful that we will have two weeks' notice of any future changes. The asymptomatic testing centre at school is well and truly up and running, and we are now testing those staff who are on site and still working with the Pre-School children twice per week. The test centre is based in the Sports Pavilion, which allows easy access from the car park and this will certainly be helpful at the point when the Year 7 and 8 pupils are permitted back on site.

This lockdown seems more challenging than the last, however knowing that we are all in it together and aiming for the same goal seems to give me comfort and we are already hearing great news about the vaccine roll-out in the UK and around the world. Chaplain's Thought of the Week

The President's inauguration day itself happened in an unprecedented manner, with many changes to the expected norm. However, perhaps the greatest change of last week was secured through Kamala Harris. Kamala Harris is 'The first female, the first black, the first south Asian American vice president.' MIDDLE AGES AND MEDIEVAL HISTORY

In History this week, pupils in 7BD have been studying the power of the Medieval Church and have been working diligently to try to uncover exactly what life was like for ordinary people living through the fascinating Middle Ages.

At the beginning of the lesson, the class was introduced to Mentimeter, a great way to collect live feedback and to encourage lots of engagement in lessons. We intend to develop live polls, quick question responses and even multiple choice quizzes using this in class and students clearly enjoyed taking part in active learning via Teams.
