The Board was incredibly proud to hire Dr. Andy Torris as the incoming head of school in July 2020. Andy came to us from The World School in Shenzhen, China, where he was founding director. 






50th Year Celebration for the Classes of 1965–1975






IB Diploma Pass Rates




Full IB Diploma Participation at AES




AES School Statistics






International Day


