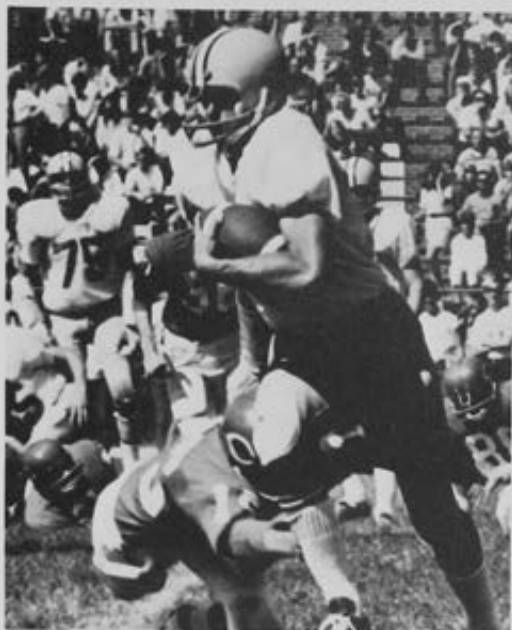

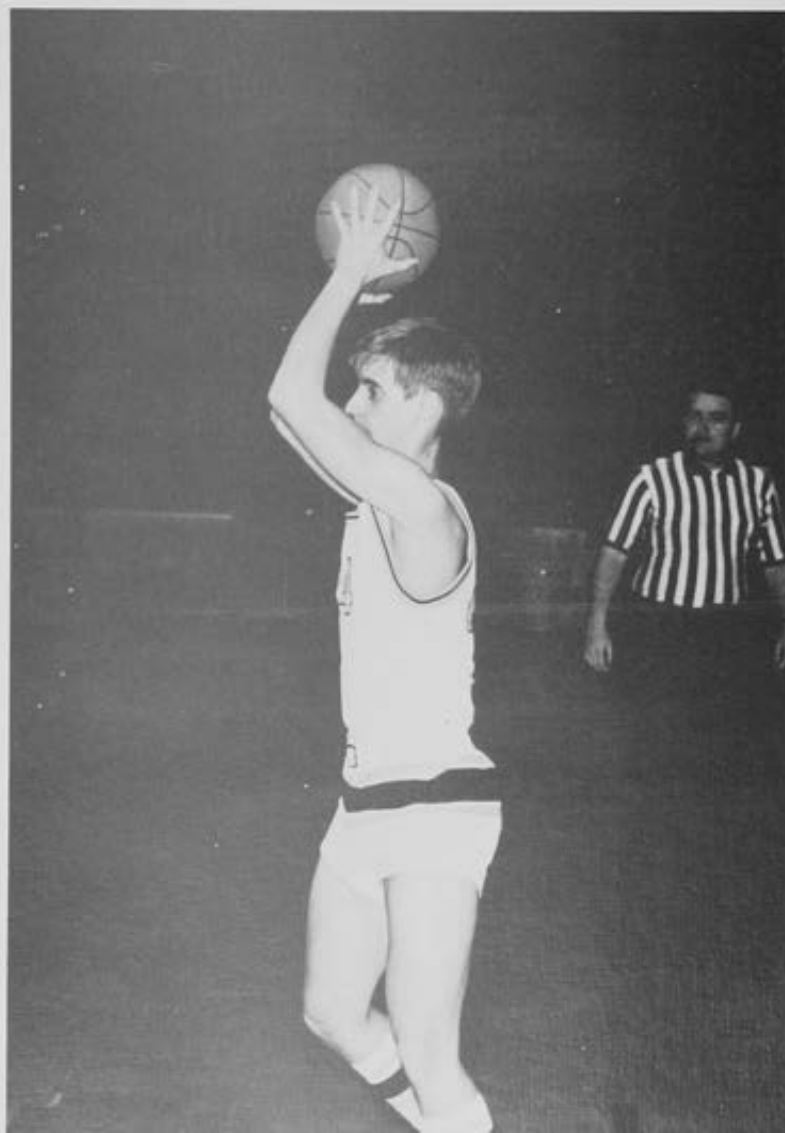


Varsity Basketball Rebuilds in 7—16 Season

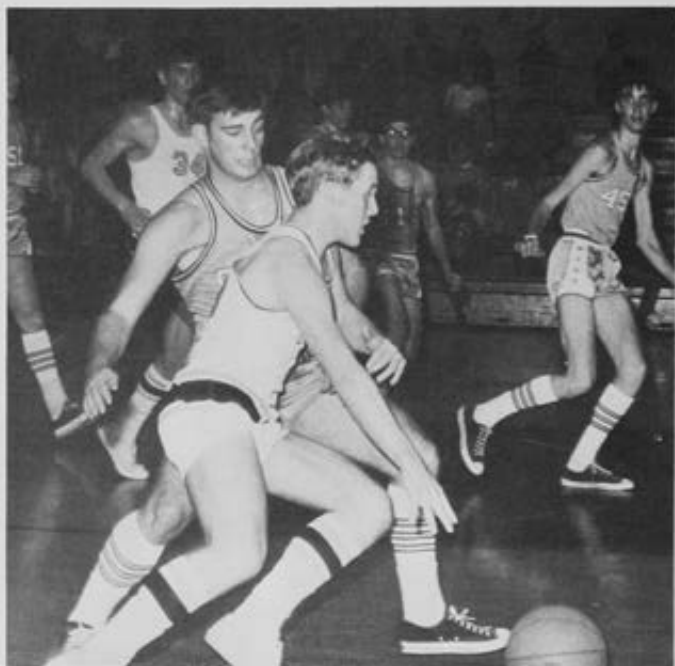

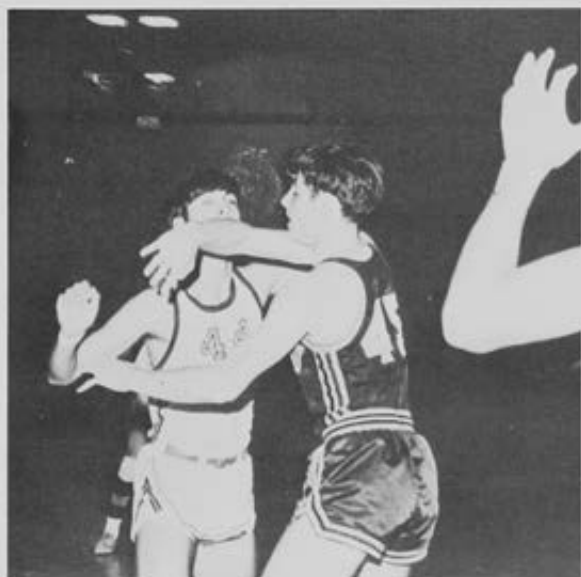

The B-Team, after a shaky start settled to 9-8 record. Tom Birsinger and Bill Gokin, were impressive.



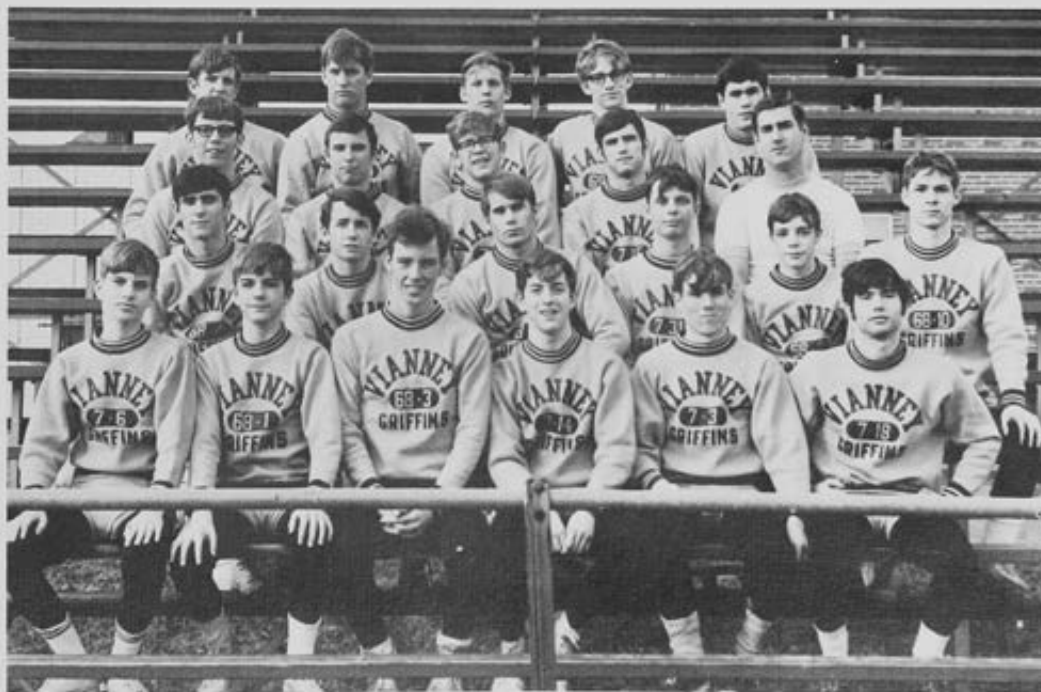

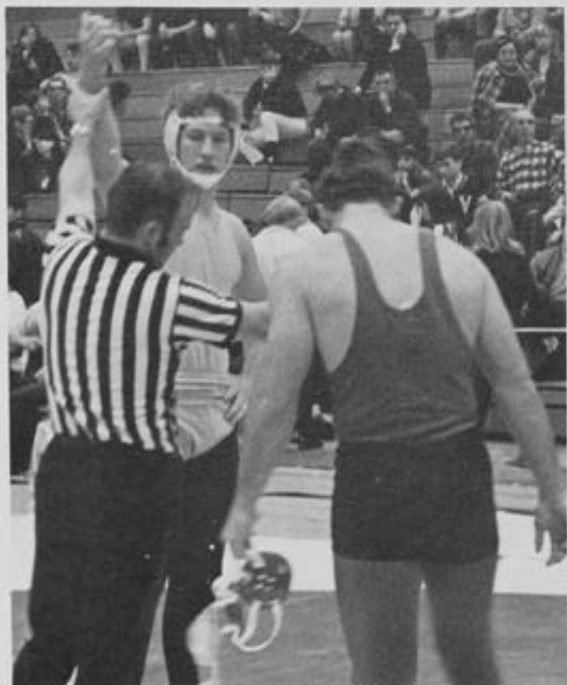

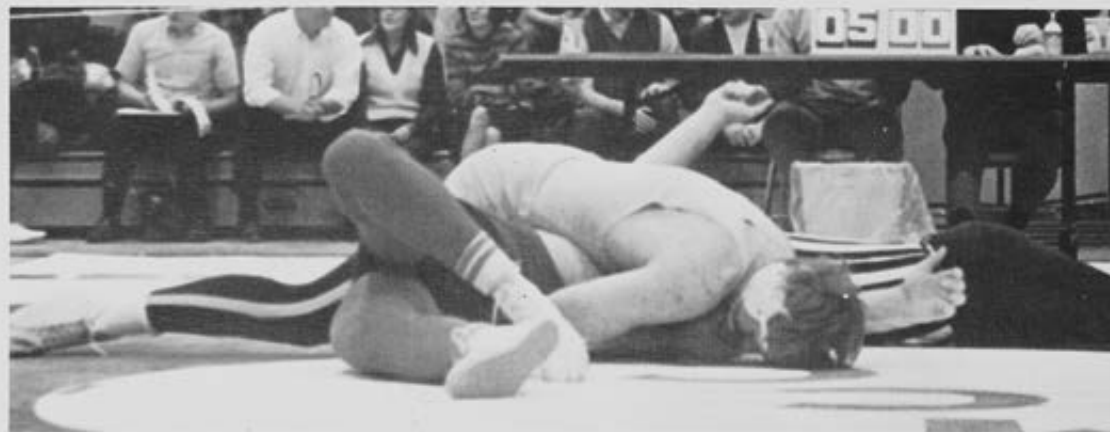

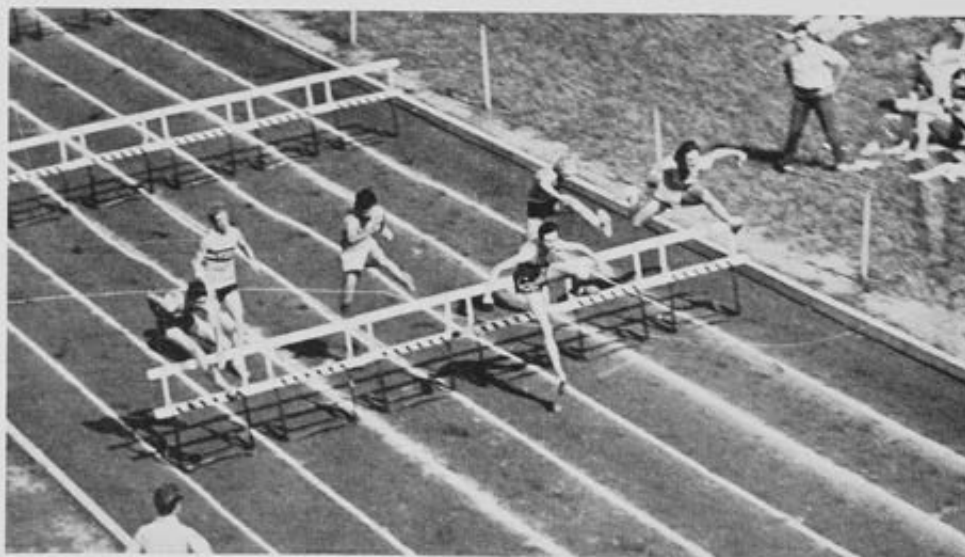

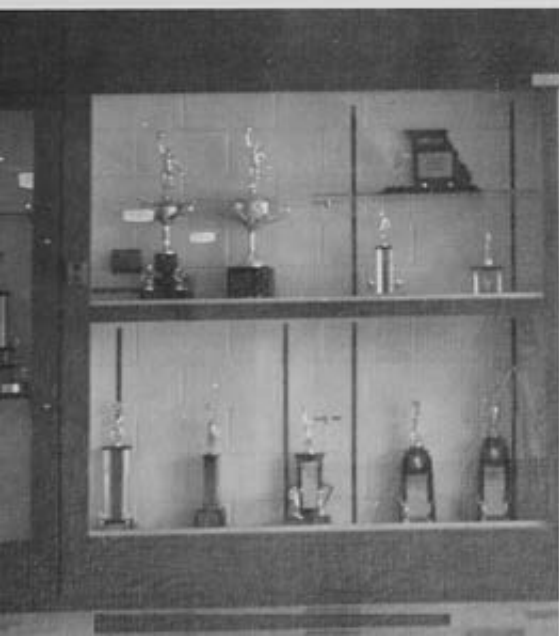

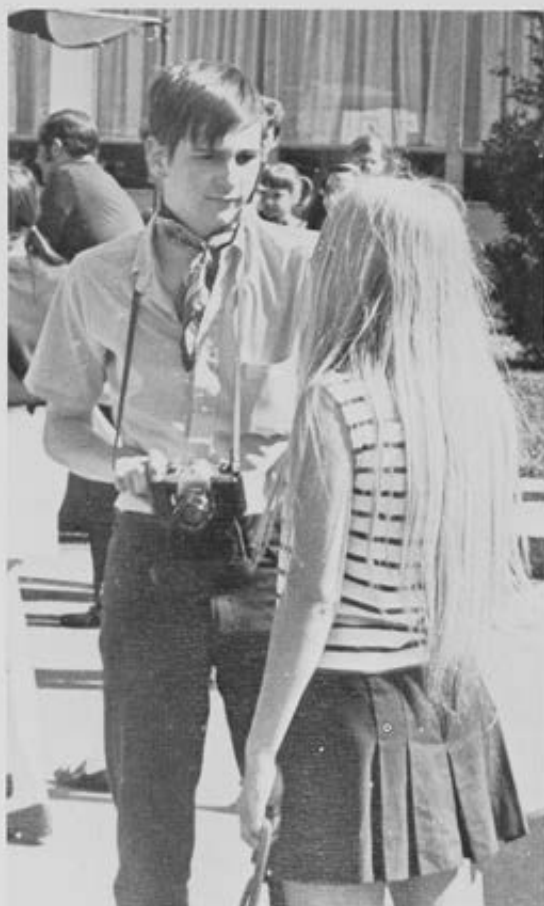
May Festival Caps Year

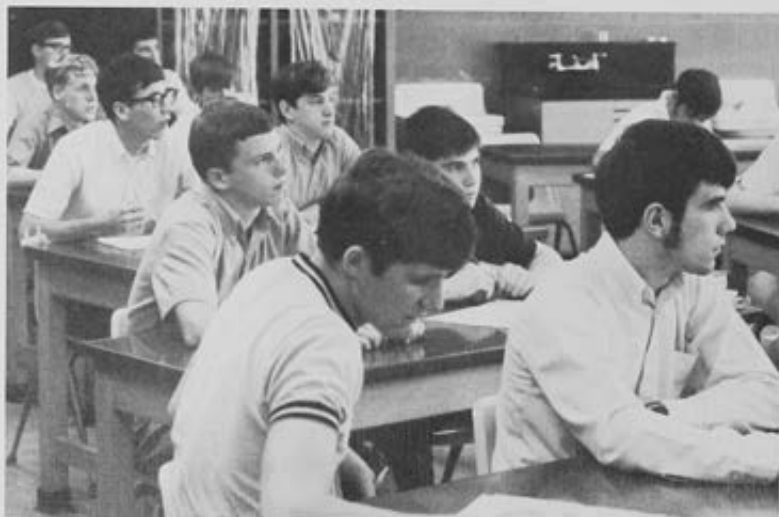

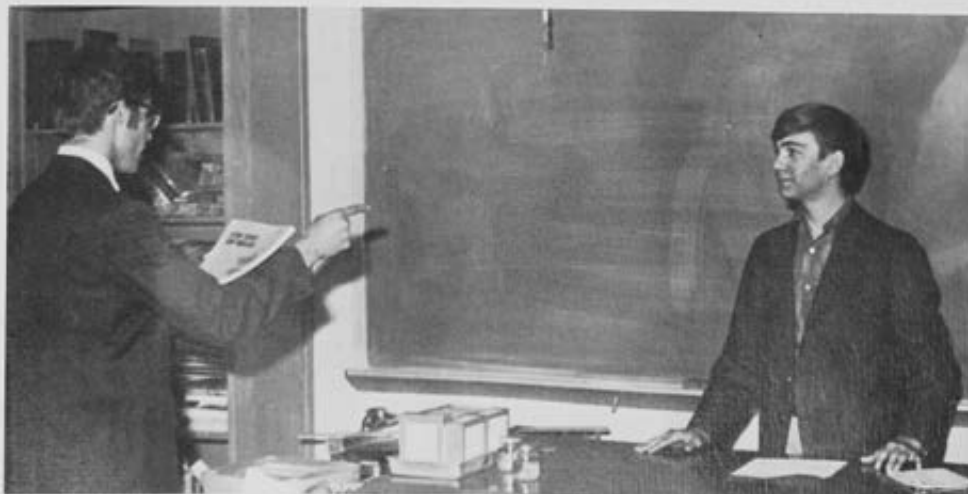

The Gym is itself once again but this project will remain something worthy of Vianney for a long time.

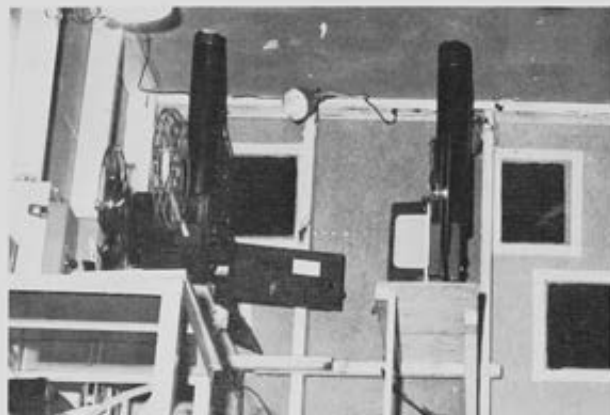

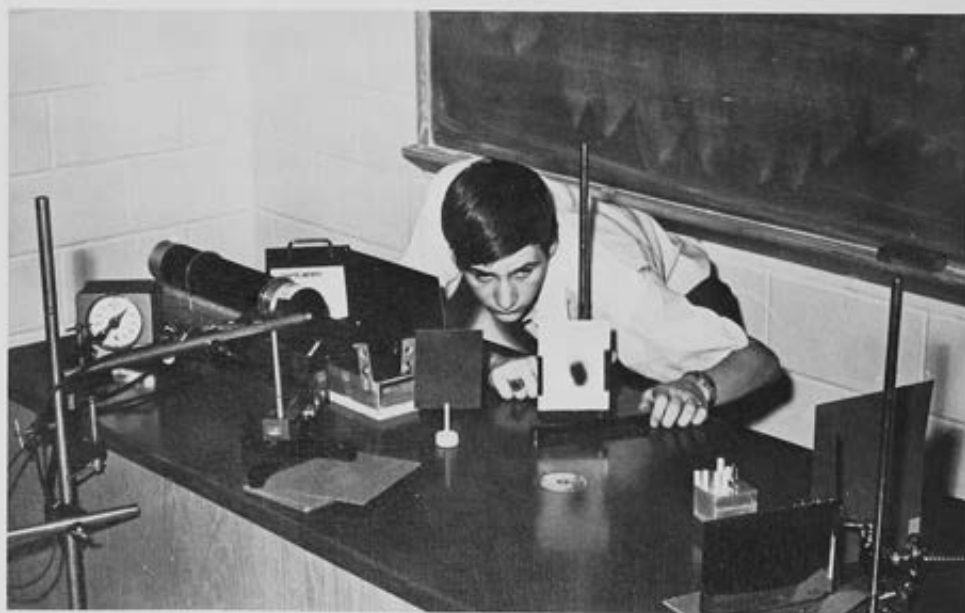

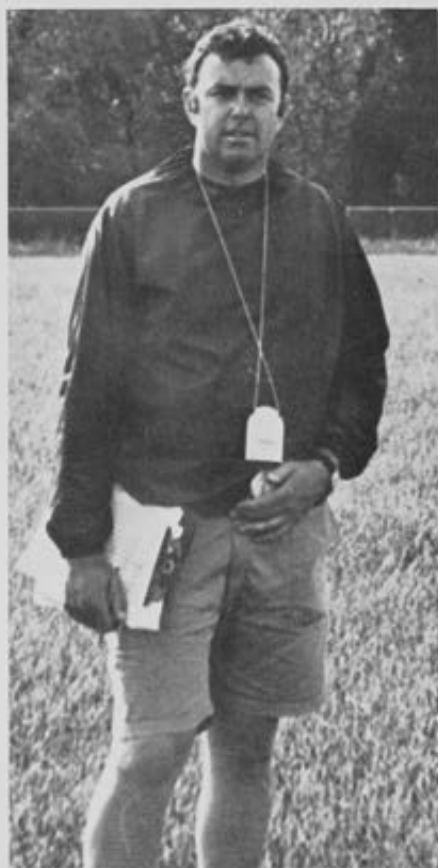


Athletic Department Leads Griffs to Success
