The Homecoming Queen was Kathy Machens of Ursuline and the members of her court were Becky MacRenoylds, Bridgid Maguire, Sue Leach and Mary Hirt.

Saturday night the Griffins ignited the spirit for the all-important game

The 1970 Chocolate Drive was expanded to the entire school and was highly successful. The Drive included all the underclassmen as well as the Seniors. With the underclassmen's help, the effort netted over 23,000 dollars. As usual, some of the money went to defray the cost of prom, and the Senior gift which was a donation of \$5,000 to the school to aid in paying for the ever-increasing cost of education at Vianney. The remaining \$3,500 went toward a Student Activities center which would include a Senior Lounge. The funds allotted for the Activities Center were not sufficient and other contributions were needed. The Juniors pledged \$1,000 for the cause from their class gift for next year and the Student Council donated generously as well.

Even though the Drive in '70 was school-wide, it was entirely organized and run by Seniors. Paul Horn did an unbelievable job as Chairman but he had many people to help him along the way. Some Seniors who aided Paul were Tim Lucchesi, Vince O'Brien, Bob Koogler, and Mike Simorka. Acting as Faculty Moderator was Bro. Dick Schieffer. 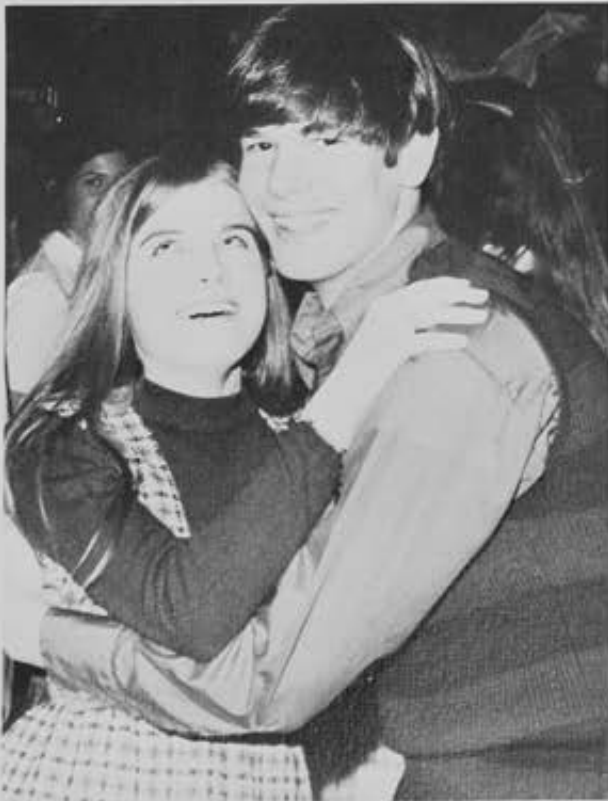

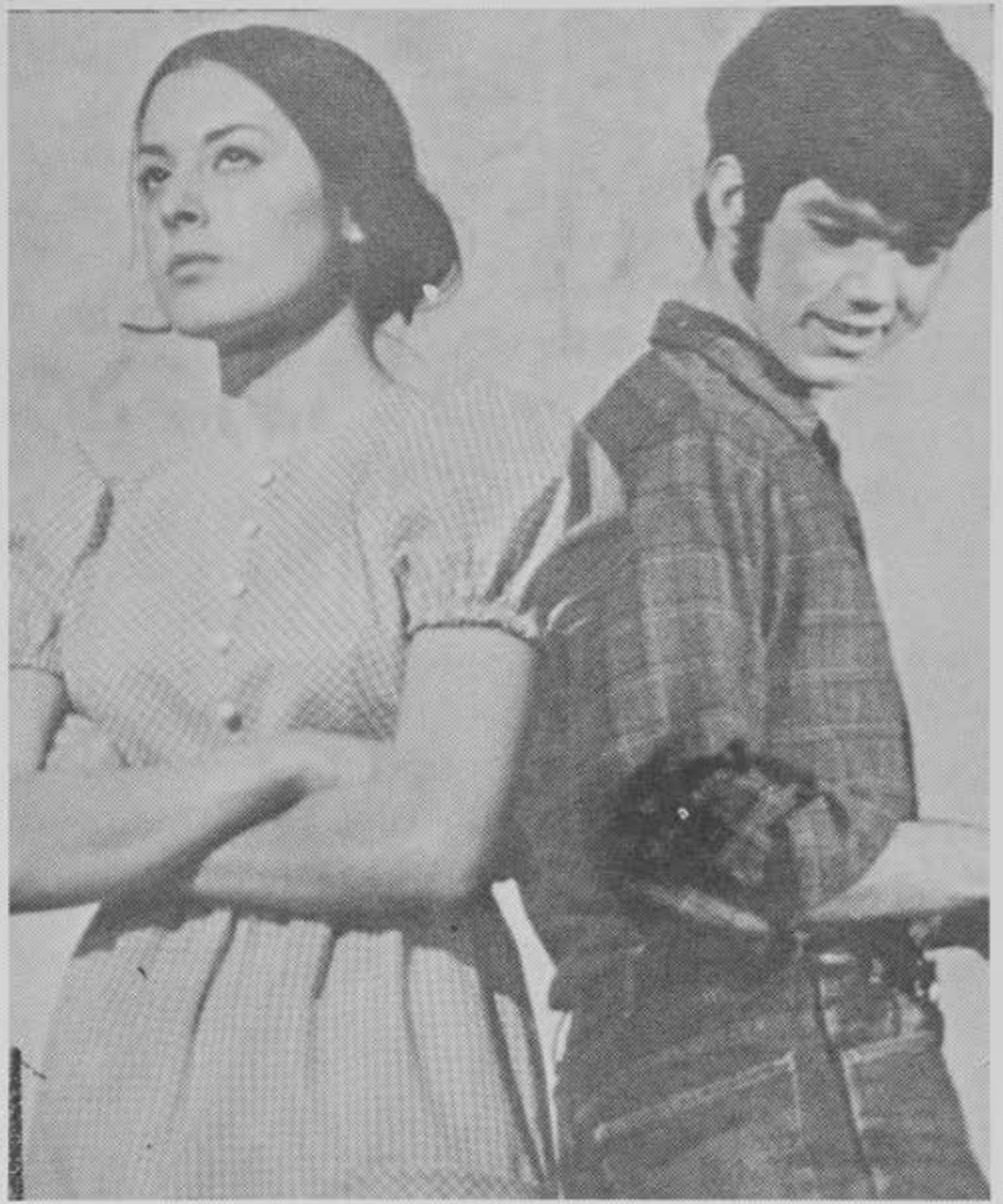

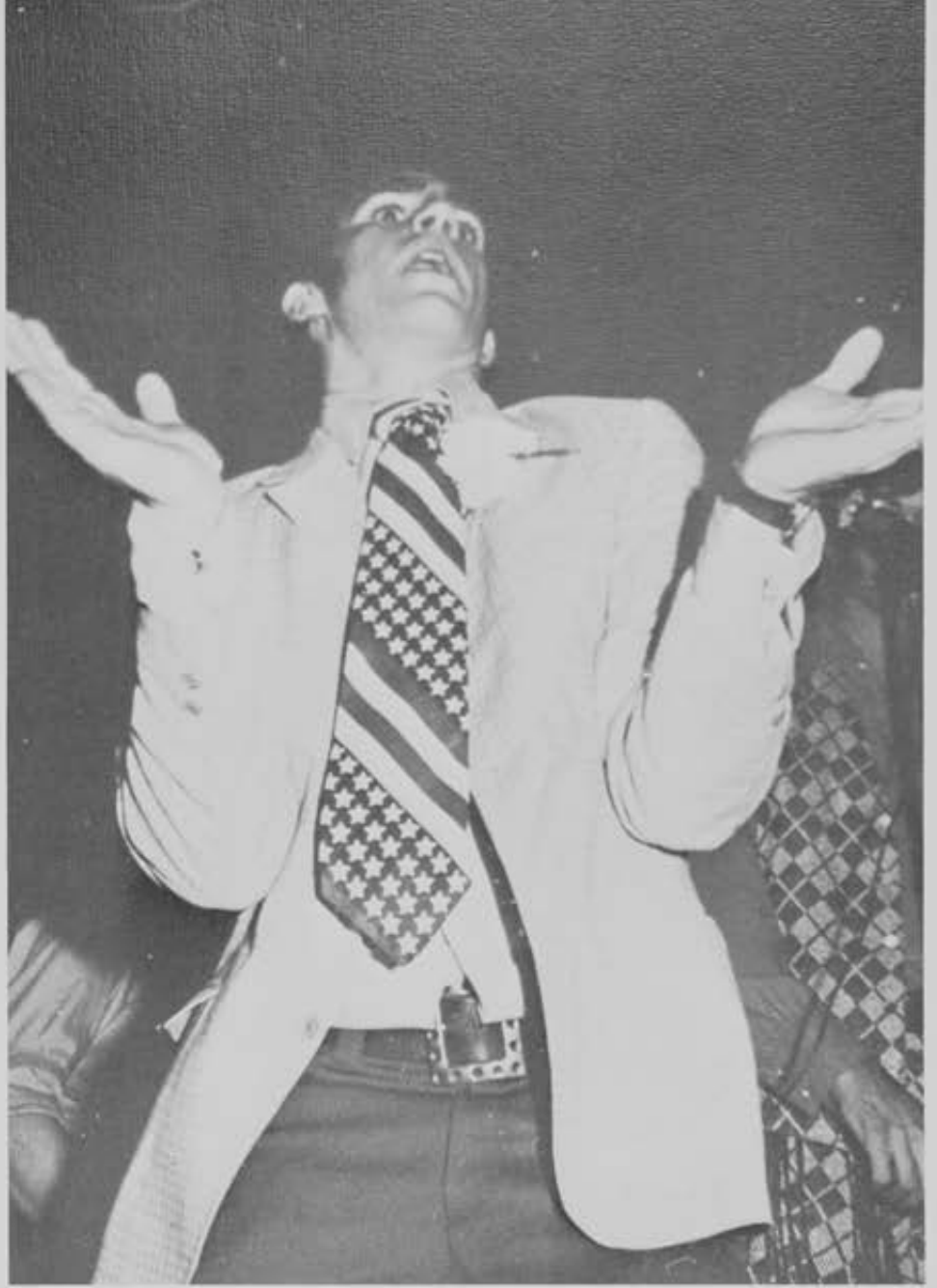

Where do you begin in describing a football team like the one at Vianney this year? Do you start with the records they set, the games they played, the Griffins who made the team what it was, or the coaches who made the players what they were?

Oh well, I guess we will start with rankings the team held during the season. In state, Vianney was #4. In the area, Vianney was #3. In district, Vianney was #2. In Conference, Vianney was #1. Not bad for a team that was supposedly in its rebuilding year.

But what was equally as impressive was how the team's offense and defense fared against the other 93 schools in the area. Our offense was #8; defense was #1. That's out of 93 schools. Think about it—

As regards to the records that were set this year, you name the record, and this team broke it. To recall a few of these records: most points in one season 282, fewest points allowed in one season 24, most shut-outs in one season 6, most points in one game 60, most interceptions in one season, 15, most fumble recoveries in one season 18, most yards gained in one season Gokin 1097, fewest yards allowed in one season 715, most points in one home game 48, best overall record in a season 10-0-0.

The list appears endless. It is. But because of time and . . .



. . . The Griffins opened their 1970 season against the Southwest Longhorns on the opponents field. Laying the winning ways for the rest of the year, Vianney scored 2 touchdowns and 1 field goal against the predicted Public High School Champions and walked off with the first of ten victories. The final was 17-8.

The next 3 games put Vianney back into the spirit it seemed to have lost one year ago. DeAndreis did not know what hit them as they left the field with a 35-8 defeat. Aquinas was spared a 14-7 side-swipe, and Rosary took a 14-0 beating. Although these last two scores were nothing spectacular, something spectacular did arise in the team: confidence and desire. For the rest of the season, Vianney took control.



The defending CAC Champions, McBride, then challenged Vianney at Homecoming, 1970. Bitter memories of last years unsuccessful homecoming along with a few words from the undeniable Coach Heeb inspired the team to such a degree that they went out and beat the ---- out of the Micks. Point after point, touchdown after touchdown, Vianney's score soared. McBride didn't have a prayer. To the fans, this was the most satisfying game of Vianney's history. The final was an unbelievable 48-0 kill.

Remnants of the '67 "spoiler" football team became apparent as Vianney "spoiled" DuBourg Homecoming by a score of 7-6. Although the score was close, the game wasn't. Vianney repeatedly knocked on the goal line of the Cavaliers, but were unable to score until late in the 3rd quarter. DuBourg, after scoring their only touchdown, ran into Vianney's stiffened defense and were unable to penetrate within the 40 yard line of Vianney again.





The Chaminade game served as a warmup for the determining CAC Championship game that was to take place the following week. While our bodies were at Chaminade, our minds were not. Anyway, we won the game 29-0.

So the big game arrived, St. Marys vs. Vianney at Roosevelt Field. The CAC Crown, the pride of Vianney, the hopes and dreams of the 4000 spectators, all rested on this one game; all rested on the players of Vianney. The pressure was immense, but Vianney came through. A passing play from Russel to Philips and an eight yard scamp by All Conference tailback Bill Gokin were enough to do it. 14-0. That was it, the CAC was ours. Vianney was homeward bound.

The last two proved to be something of a challenge to the footballers. In their final performance at Griffin Stadium, the team nipped Mercy 44-0. A real thriller! Then, in the last game for the 1970 year, Vianney squeezed by Kennedy in the cold of November, 60-0.

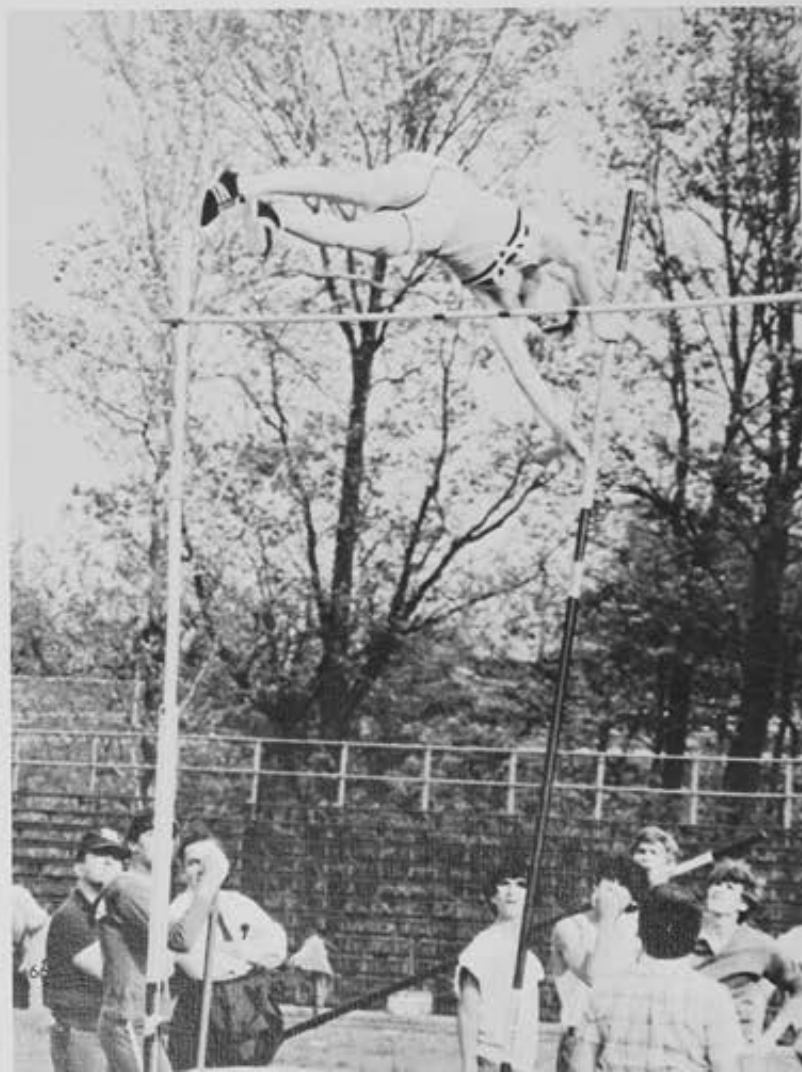


Trackmen Bring Fourth '71 CAC Trophy Home

Early predictions did not place Vianney's team in strong contention for the CAC meet but as has happened so many times in 1970-71, the Griffins proved the oddsmakers wrong. The Chaminade Relays showed many people the balance of the track team in many events. Consistently fine performances in dual and triangular meets provided an omen of what was to come on May 1 at Vianney Stadium at the 17th annual CAC meet. With a fine all around performance, the Griffins took the meet by 17 points, the largest margin in 4 years.

Among the outstanding performers in the '71 season were Steve Frei, Dean Daugherty, Skip Russell and Steve Phillips. Several records fell during the season but the team worked well as a unit as well. The 1971 track season proved beyond doubt that winning is indeed a tradition at Vianney and will remain so.

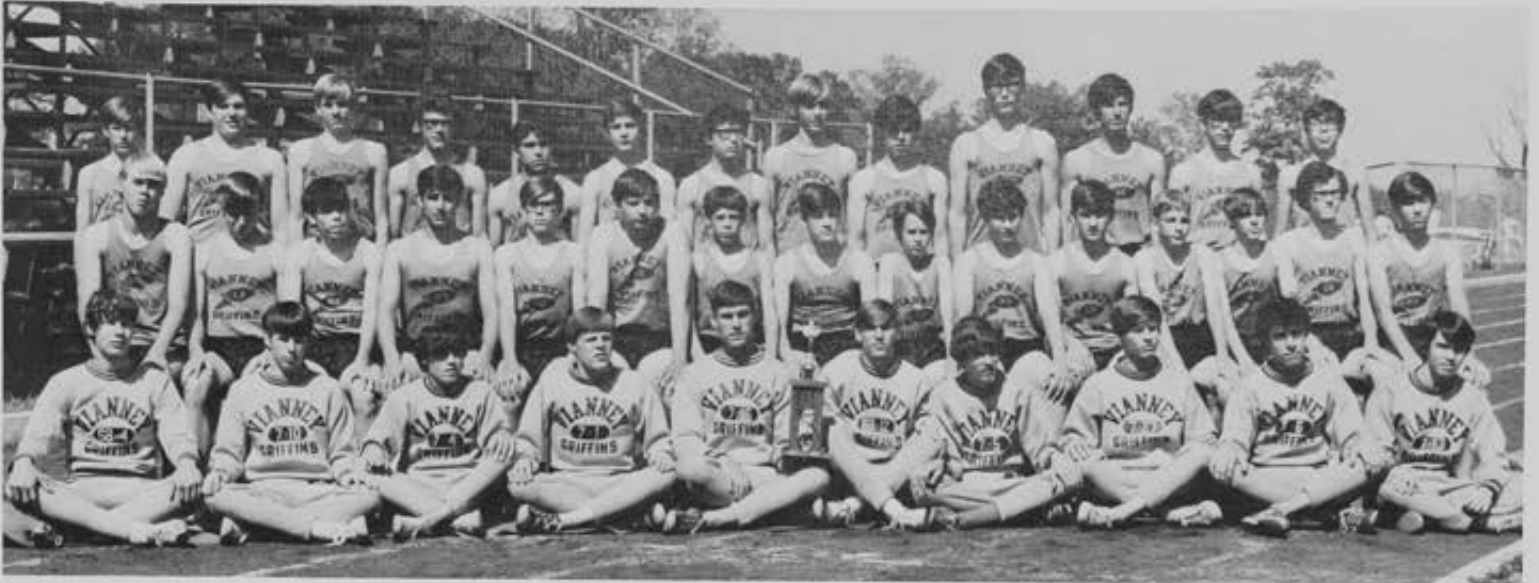

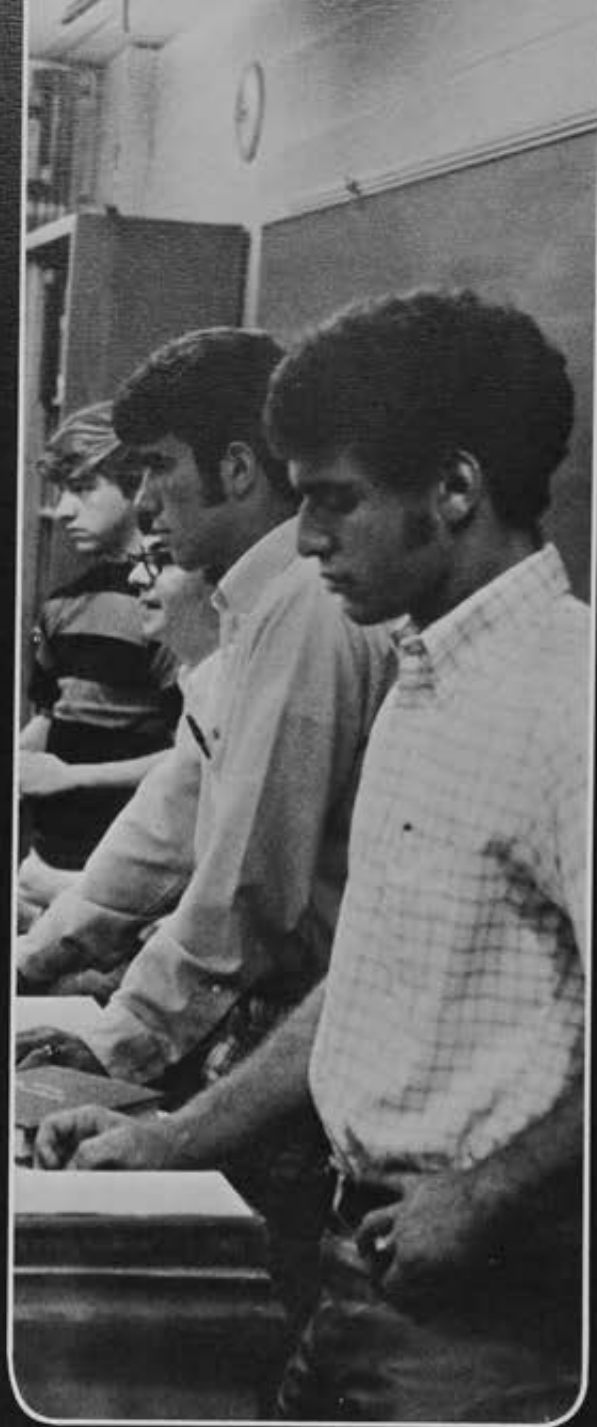

civic nature, which were seemingly headed for failure, and from them produced success after smashing success for the Student Body.

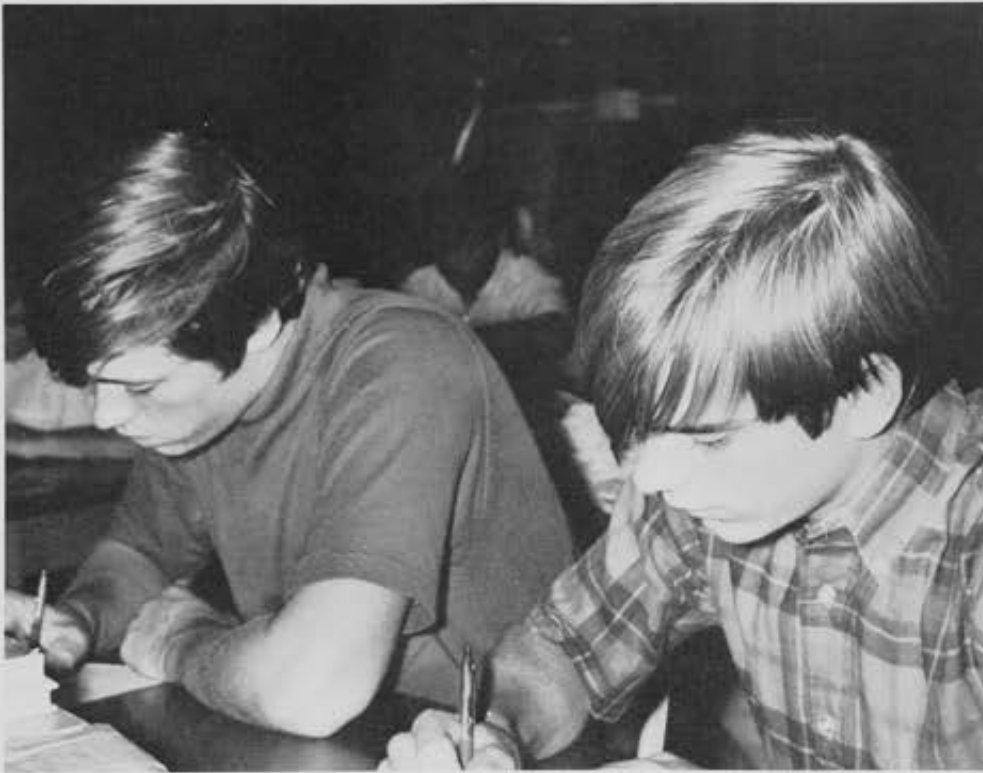

Proctors Maintain Order at Vianney

Working in conjunction with the Student Court to carry out student disciplinary action, the Proctors of 1971 performed their assigned duties in a manner typical of the continual success of the Proctor System over the years. Vianney is one of the very few schools in our area who have initiated and maintained a successful form of student disciplinary government.

Working under the direction of Chris Maret, 4th Vice-President of Government on the Student Council, the Proctor System did its usually fine job of keeping order in all of Vianney's many assemblies and in the cafeteria as well. Bro. David Pozzi acted as moderator of the voluntary organization and helped Chris Maret choose and supervise the some 40 proctors. If an interest is shown by a junior in becoming a proctor he is considered for the position and if chosen, is put on a trial basis for the first term. Several proctors were dropped at that time in 1970 and were replaced by more competent Griffins.

The Proctor System is set up in such a way that the great part of the responsibility of the system lies with both the proctors themselves and with the head proctors especially. One man is designated as Head Assembly Proctor and another is assigned as Head Cafeteria Proctor. Each is responsible of 1970-71 Skip Russell acted as head man of the assemblies and Tom Wilcox did a fine job in his role as Head Cafeteria Proctor. Each is responsible to the Vice-President of Government for the conduct of Griffins in his area. Great improvements were made in the appearance of the cafeteria and most of the assemblies were orderly enough to be enjoyed by the faculty and the students.

The Proctor System and the Student Court are intimately related and one cannot function without the other. It is, therefore, the responsibility of the proctor to appear in court whenever he is involved in a case. The Court and Proctors worked well together in '71 and perhaps this was the key to the success of the whole system.

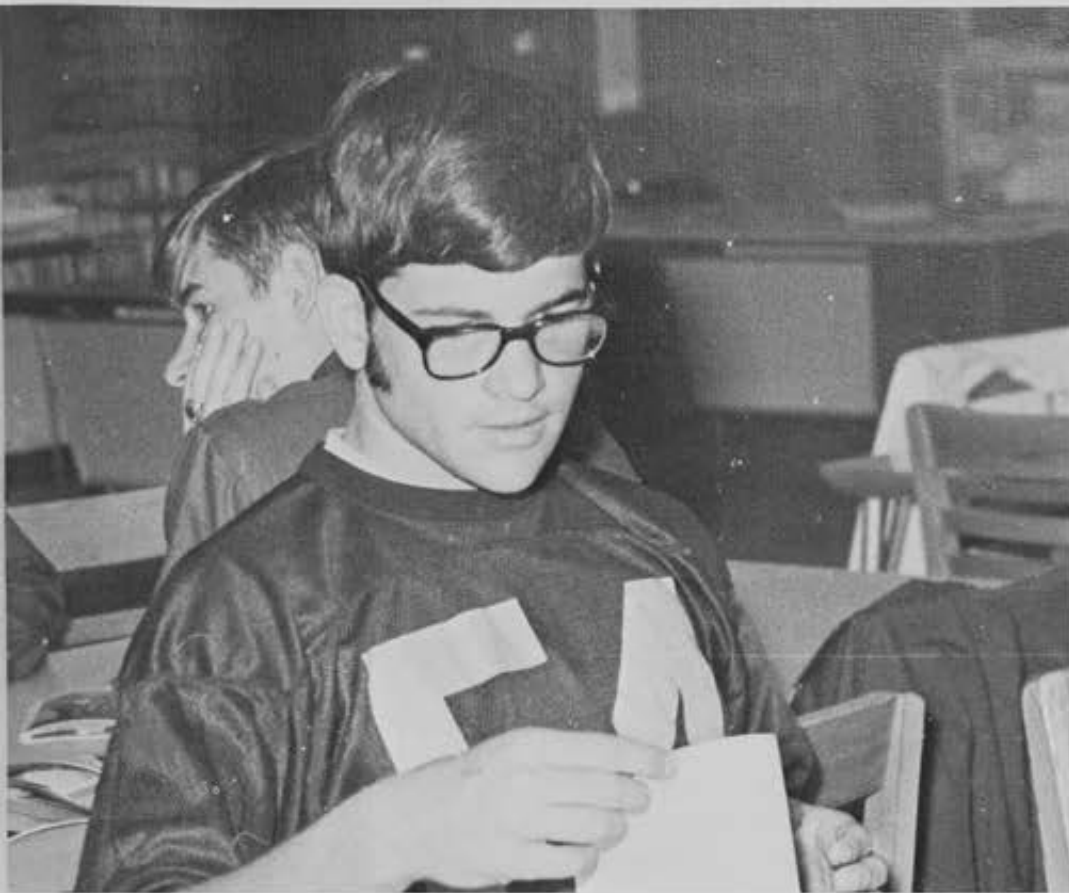

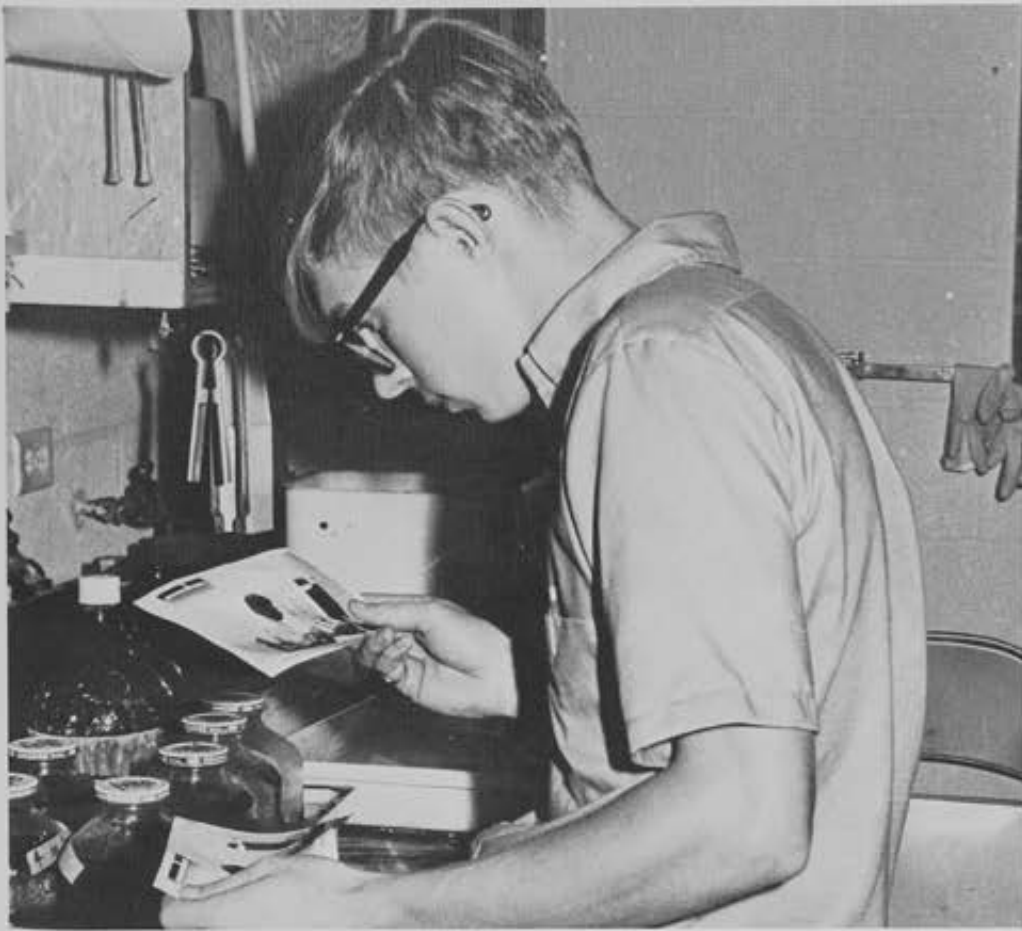

Joe Graff Fund Unites VHS in Second Semester

Early in the year 1971, the case of a young man in need of help came to the attention of the St. Louis public. That was the case of Joe Graff Jr., a Vianney sophomore who is stricken with a severe kidney ailment. In order to continue living, he needs the daily use of a hemodialysis (kidney) machine, an expense his family cannot afford. Therefore, the city of Crestwood began a fund to purchase the machine for Joe and to carry the expense of operating it for as long as possible. Expenses are estimated to be \$10,000 for the machine itself and \$5,000 a year to operate it.

In the traditional spirit of Vianney, an all-out effort to raise money among the students was started. Devised by sophomores Billy Bommarito, Steve Leach and Joe Mondello, the drive included activities such as a film festival put on by the juniors, a re-showing of the Home and School Association's Variety Show, and a benefit dance performed by Chicago Fire. All proceeds of these events went to the fund. In addition, a special "Joe Graff Week" was held at Vianney during which contributions were taken up in the homerooms. All in all, over \$2,500 were collected for Joe. A special thanks goes to Fr. Cahill who helped in administering the activities involved and assisted in the accounting department.

Scholarship: He possesses a mature attitude toward his academic life and has achieved success in his studies.

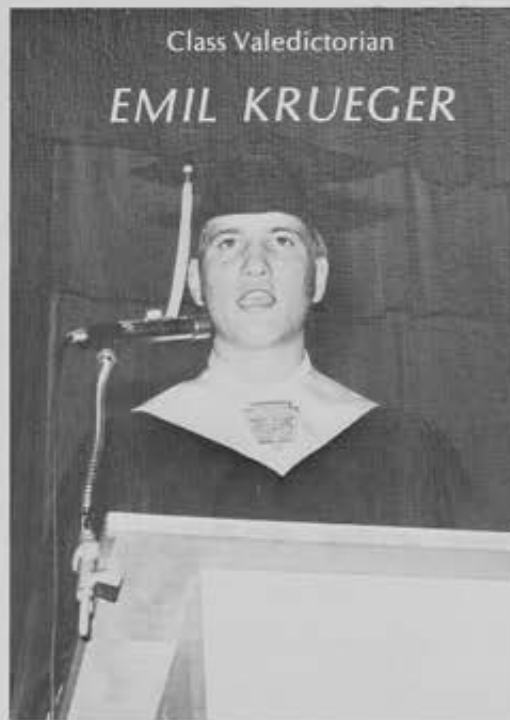
Leadership: The Graduate is able to accept responsibility and to carry out the resulting obligations.

"While my education has promoted the development of my own individual personality, I shall nevertheless always be proud to share the group identity of being a Golden Griffin in '71.

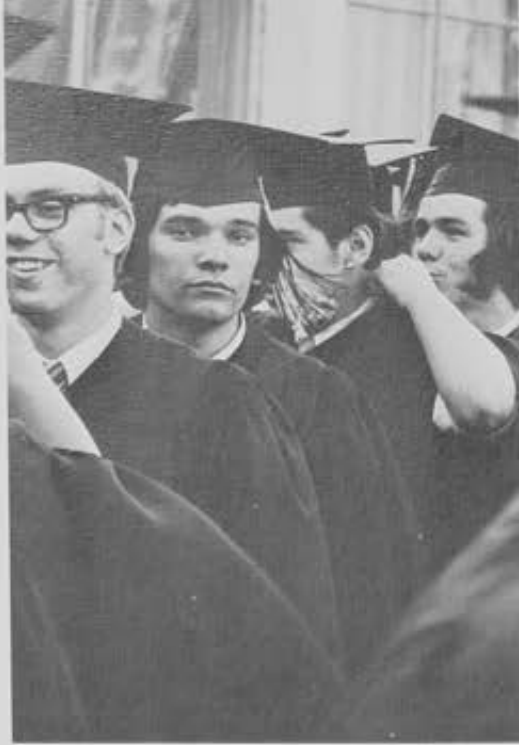
Emil A. Krueger was recognized as the Class of 1971 Valedictorian. Emil enjoyed success as both a student and an athlete at Vianney. He maintained a 95.8 academic average for four years, was Vice-President of the National Honor Society, and received 2 academic awards: English and Social Studies. In addition, Emil was recognized as a National Merit Commended Student, scoring in the upper 2% of the nation and received the Missouri Relations Commissions award. In athletics, he was a first string basketball player for four years and played Varsity baseball as well. Mr. Krueger will continue his education at Dayton University where he will study law.

The salutatorian for the school year of 1970-1971 is Michael Blaha. Mike's average for four years was 95.3 and his achievements as a student were indeed outstanding. Mr. Blaha was recognized as a National Merit Semi-Finalist, scoring in the upper 1% on the test, and also received the Missouri School College Relations Commission Award.
