They are the backbone only . . .*



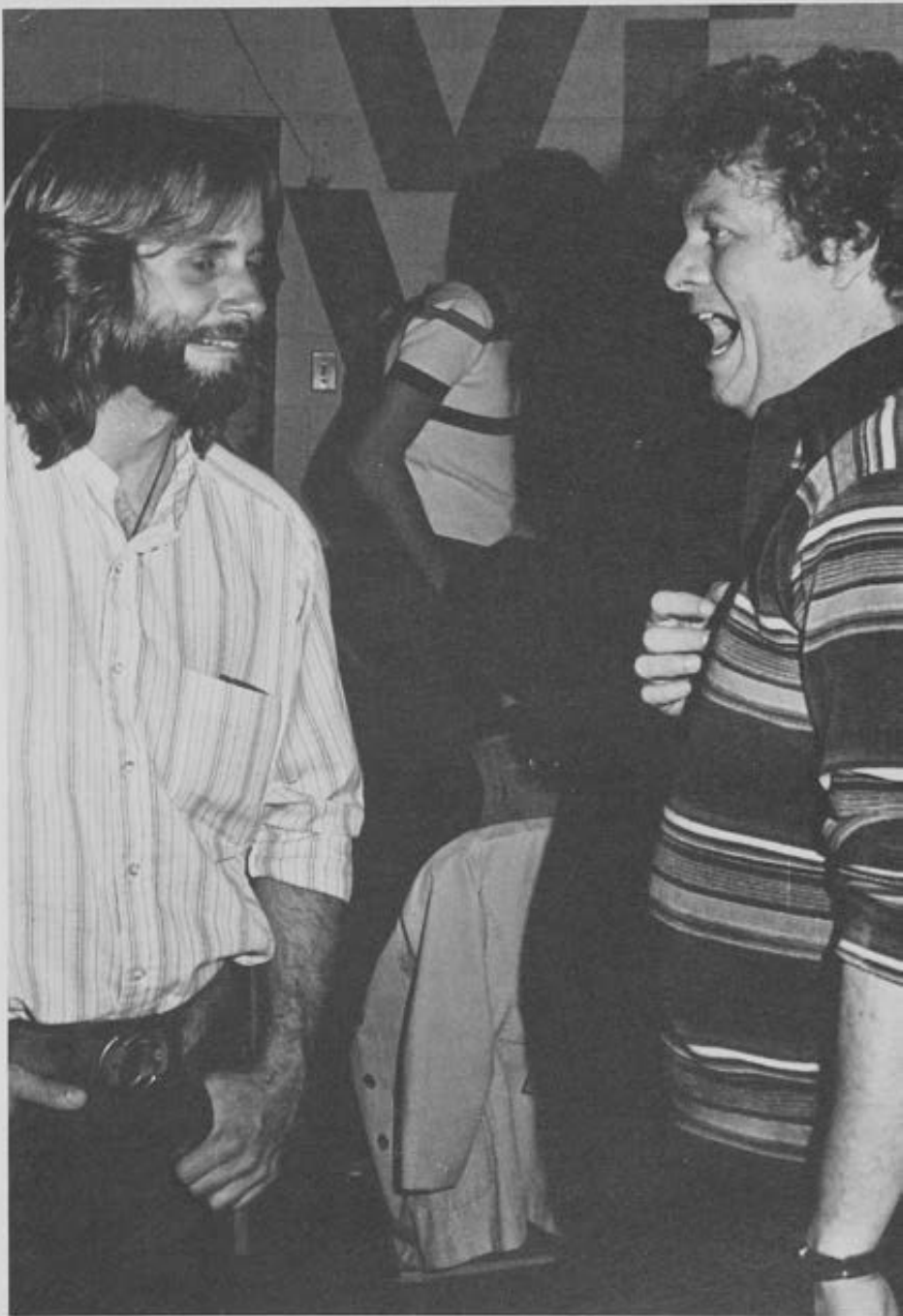




PEOPLE AT PLAY . . .

As Football Season 1979 Approaches Coach Heeb Awaits Victory #100

At just about any high school, probably the best known faculty member (after the principal) is the athletic director. The job of A.D. is immense. It entails the scheduling of games for all sports at all grade levels for each academic year, as well as advising the administration in the hiring of coaches and Physical Education teachers. The athletic director must also make out the budget for all athletic undertakings and, in most instances, he is responsible for making the athletic department financially successful. In addition to the chores of the position, most athletic directors are full-time teachers and additionally coach several different sports.

Vianney is privileged to have Mr. Don Heeb as its Athletic Director. During Coach Heeb's tenure as A.D., many sports have been added to the list of co-curricular activities. Tennis, B-Baseball, B-Soccer are just a few. Next year, Varsity Swimming will be offered for the first time. Also, due in large measure to the leadership of Coach Heeb, Griffin Stadium acquired lights, enabling night football to be played at Vianney.

At the conclusion of the 1978 season, Coach Heeb had coached his 99th victory. With his first win next year, he will join that unique group of coaches who can boast of 100 victories.

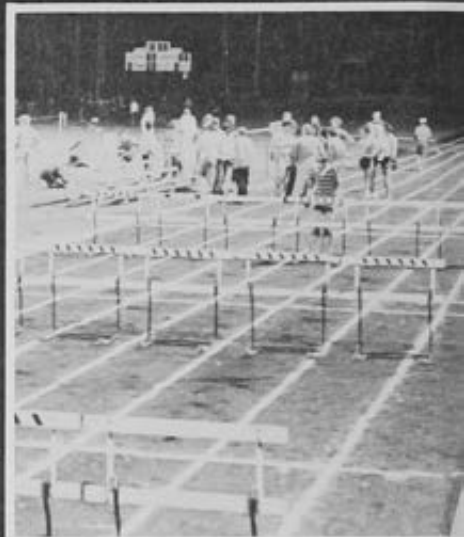

Soccer Brings Home First State Crown

The 1978 Varsity Soccer Griffins have realized a dream come true. On November 19, the culmination of a near-perfect season was realized as the squad was victorious over the Aquinas Falcons in a hotly contested game. When the ball crossed the goal line just 52 seconds into the extra period, the Golden Griffins were the uncontested Champions of the State of Missouri. Senior John Gallo put the icing on the cake in a 2 to 1 victory over the most amiable foe, in front of a frenzied, packed stadium at Lindenwood College. The "never say die" kickers came from a one goal deficit to emerge as the first State Champion team in Vianney history. Senior Ed Wanner put the Griffins back in the game with a brilliant tap-in of a picture-perfect cross from Senior Steve Lux. Coach Mike Villa must be commended for an excellent job at the helm of the champs, along with the mainstays of the Griffins — netminder Chris Oswald, defensemen Chris MacArthur and John Hirlinger, and Jack Horas, Dan Meagher and Steve Lux, who provided the offensive scoring punch.

V-Soccer Goes 25-1; Best In Vianney History

The 1978 Varsity Soccer Squad was the "perfect" team. The team had an awesome scoring attack and a sturdy defense, demonstrated by the fact that Vianney outscored its opponents 93-9, with a record of 25-1-0. To say that the Griffins were awesome would be an understatement. They went into every game as favorites and outplayed every opponent.

The CAC Tournament provided an omen for area rivals. The Griffins swept the tourney in three games, defeating Chaminade, St. Mary's, and Aquinas while not yielding a goal. Vianney breezed through league play, going undefeated and capturing the conference crown for the first time. In the district playoffs, Vianney crushed Parkway South and Oakville and squeaked by DeSmet, advancing to Lindenwood and the state finals where Vianney history was made.

Coach Mike Villa guided the Griffins to their best season ever. The heart of the squad was sixteen seniors whose experience proved invaluable throughout the season. Among these seniors was all-american goalie Chris Oswald, who turned in eighteen shutouts. The defense was lead by Chris McArthur and all state halfback John Hirlinger. John Gallo, Mike Bernier and Tony Valenta were strong in the link positions while Steve Lux chipped in with fifteen assists from the wing. Strikers Jack Horas and Dan Meagher spearheaded the Griffin offense, scoring twenty and twenty-four goals respectively. All in all, this was a remarkable team. They were, undoubtedly, the best!

'78 Football Griffins "Never Say Die"

The 1978 version of the varsity football team was the most exciting in Vianney history. In a season marked by come-from-behind victories, the Griffins emerged with a 7-3 record, barely missing the state playoffs. The season started on a bad note with the Griffins dropping their first two games. Vianney refused to die, however, and reeled off seven consecutive victories before succumbing to DeSmet in the season finale. The first in this string of victories was a 10-6 triumph over Lindbergh. Steve Ward caught a touchdown pass and Gary Purk iced the victory with a fieldgoal. Cape Central and Aquinas were easy prey for the Griffins. Against C.B.C. Vianney fell behind early and was trailing in the fourth quarter. With backs against the wall, the Griffins rallied behind quarterback Dave Leach and upset the highly rated Cadets. With this comeback came increased fan support, especially from the students, who showed no restraint in cheering on the Griffins. This support continued for the remainder of the season, especially at Rolla, where a touchdown pass from Dave Leach to Dan Valleroy in the waning seconds provided victory for the Griffins. Throughout the season, the Griffin offense was lead by a stalwart line anchored by All-District center Bob Karmi and guard Jeff Michalski. Mike Croghan and Pat Hooper enhanced an allaround strong defense. No two players typified the team better than Co-Captains Dave Leach and Danny Valleroy. Leach pulled off one miracle after another during Vianney comebacks while Valleroy was a dominating force on defense. In reality, every member of the 1978 Griffins was responsible for the "Never say die" reputation of the Griffins.

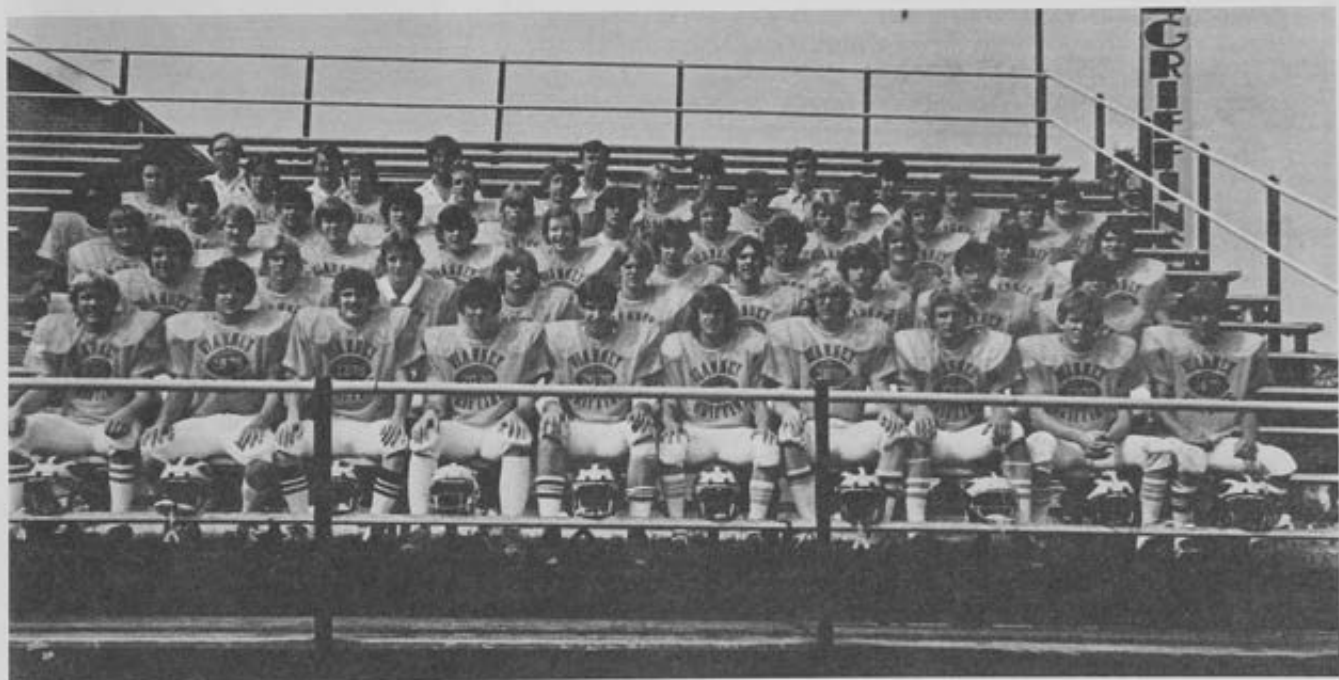

Varsity Basketball Captures CAC Championship

The 1979 Varsity Basketball team suprisingly emerged as one of the area's finest teams, finishing as high as eighth in various polls. The team's progress was steady and the Griffins peaked in CAC competition. Vianney captured the conference crown with a 10-0 record. The Griffins, led by all-league players John Mimlitz and Jerry Braun, simply overpowered conference opponents, including arch-rival St. Mary's, who fell to the Griffins three times. Other key victories came over highly touted SLUH and Kirkwood.

The team played a disciplined style of basketball under CAC coach of the year Mr. Jerry Boeckman, whose squad was near the top in the area for team defense. Leading this defense were guards Wayne Price and Dan Christian. Forward Dan Meagher added muscle under the boards, while Dave Leach and Andy Ruchte came off of the bench to rally the forces. Mimlitz and Braun, however, were the nucleus of the team. Jerry Braun dominated the middle, blocking shot after shot while averaging seventeen points a game. John Mimlitz rewrote the school record book. he became Vianney's single season scoring leader, averaging more than twenty points per game and was among area leaders in free throws. He best demonstrated his abilities on Senior Appreciation Night when he connected on fourteen of fourteen free throws against St. Mary's and was named the game MVP. Two starters return for next year's team which will have to work to repeat this year's success. 1979 was truly a golden year for the Vianney cagers.



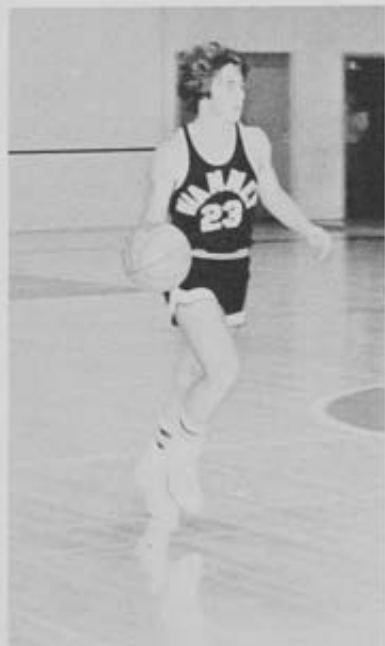

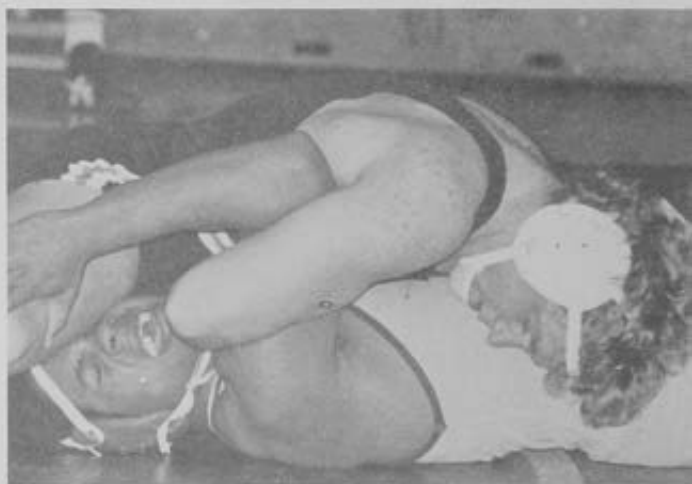

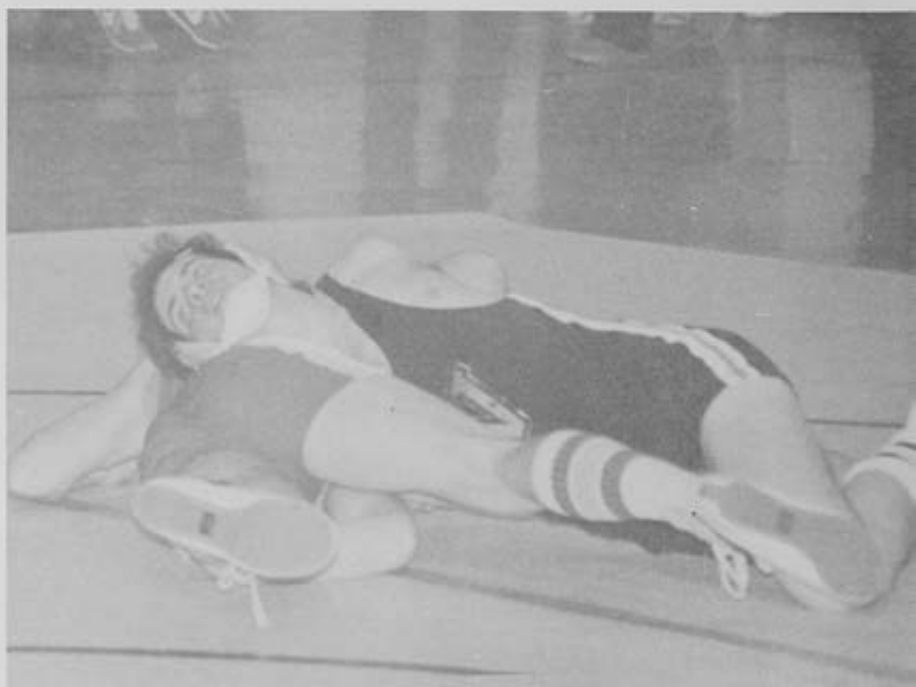
V-Grapplers Hold On For 8-4 Record

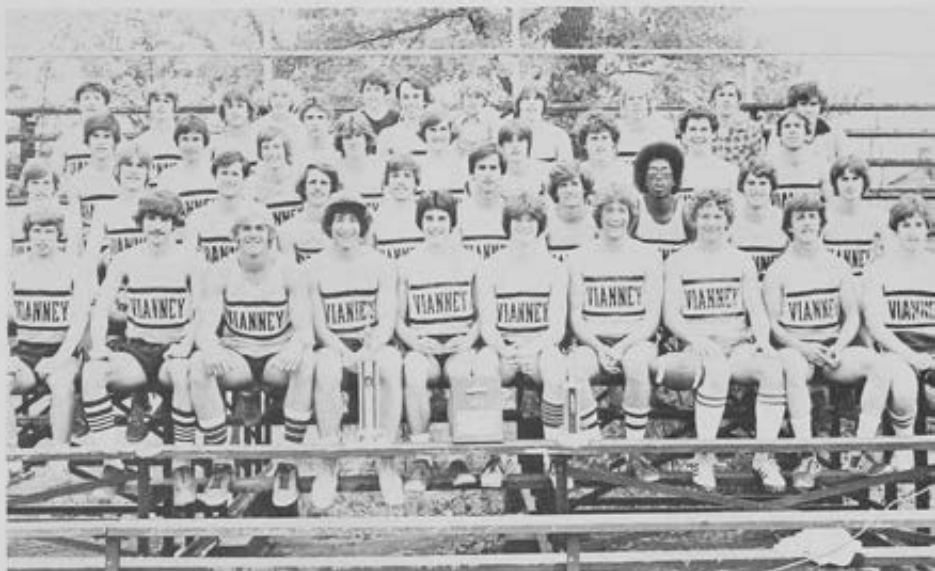

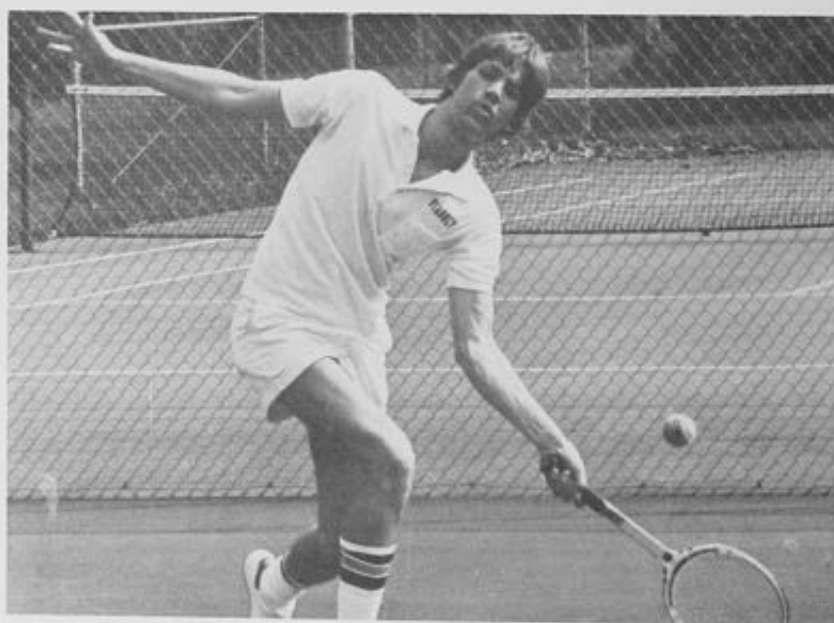
Varsity Tennis Strengthens; Fifth In District

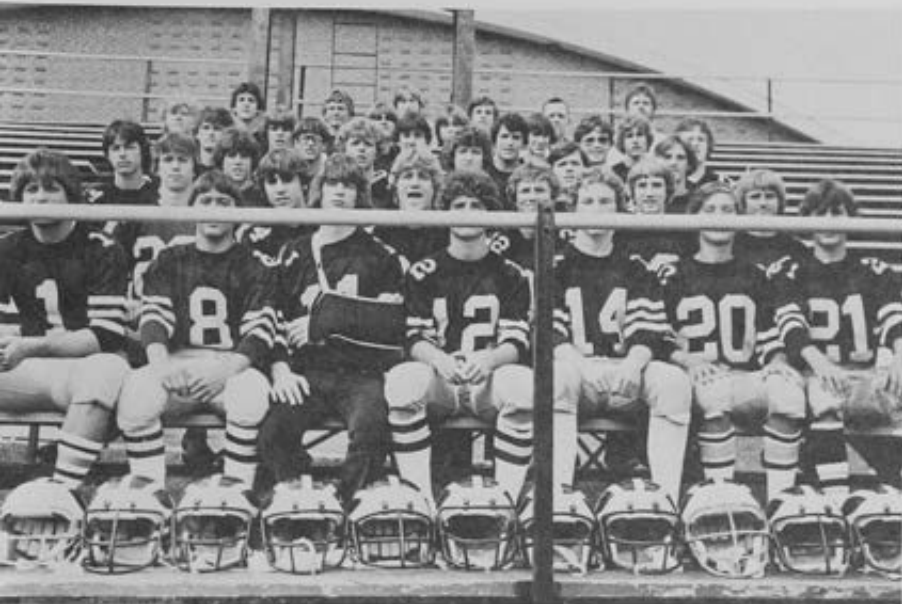

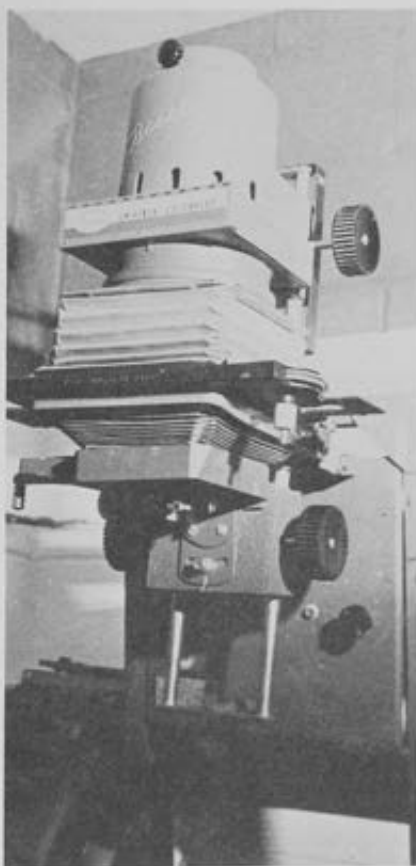
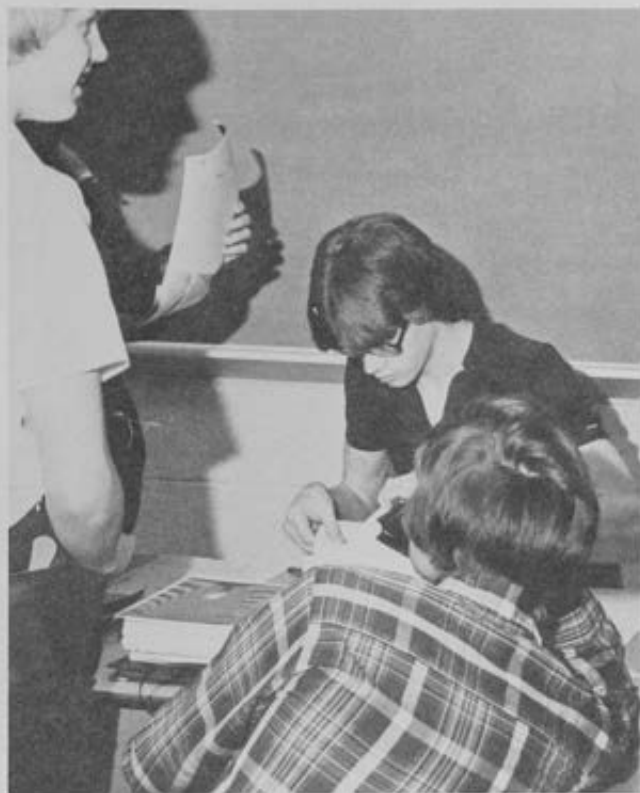

Student Court Justifies; Proctors Enforce

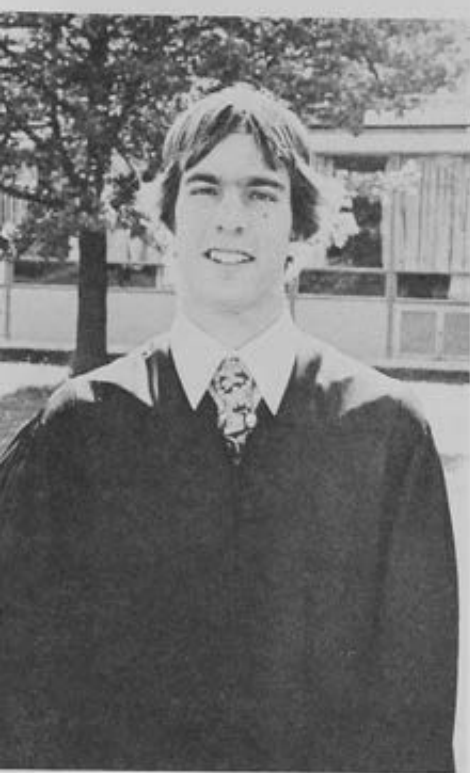

Campus Ministry, VIP, CLC Strengthen Students

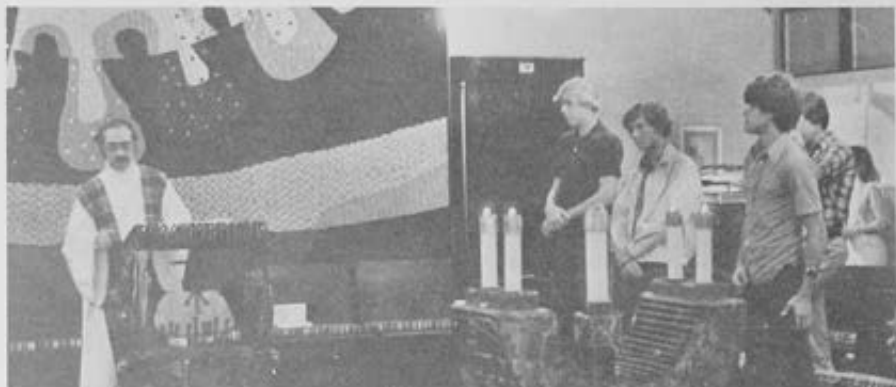

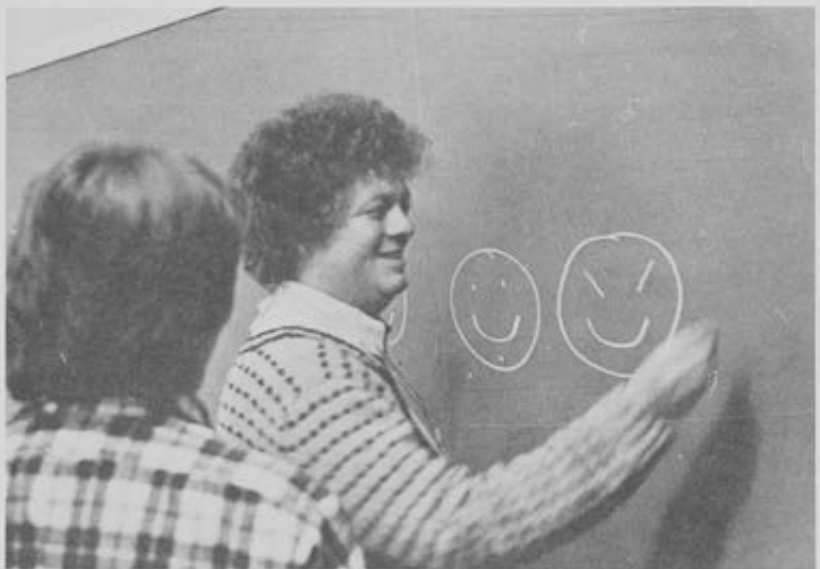

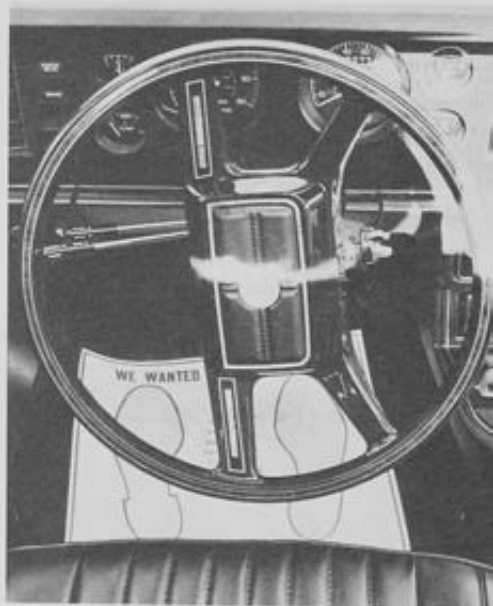

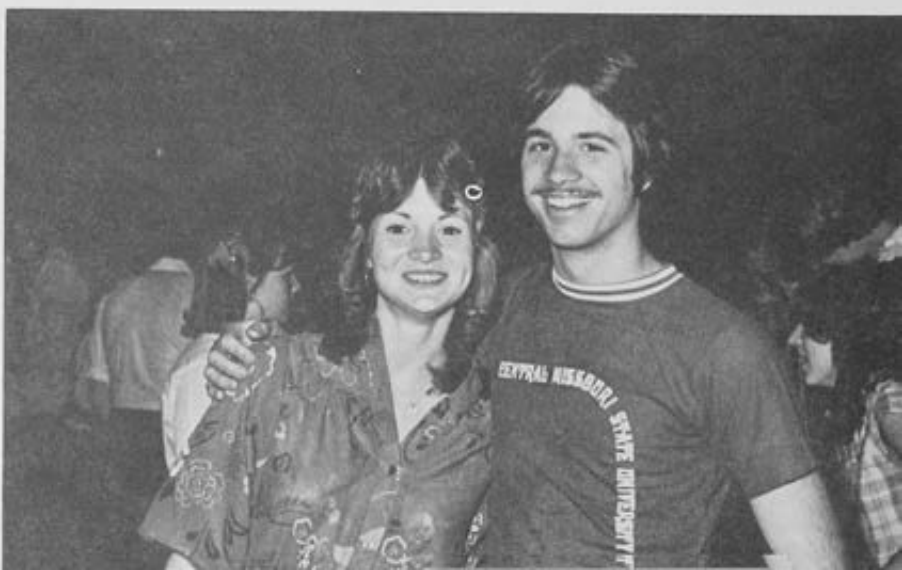

Students Celebrate Bro. Tessmer's Jubilee

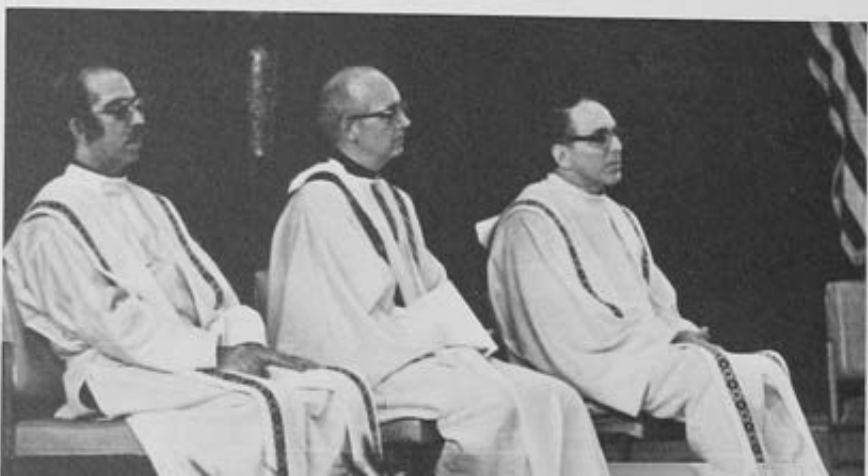

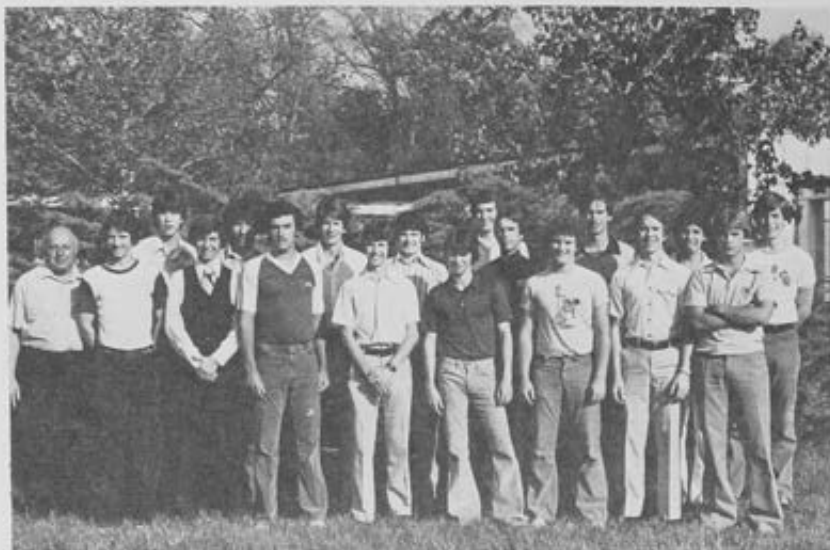

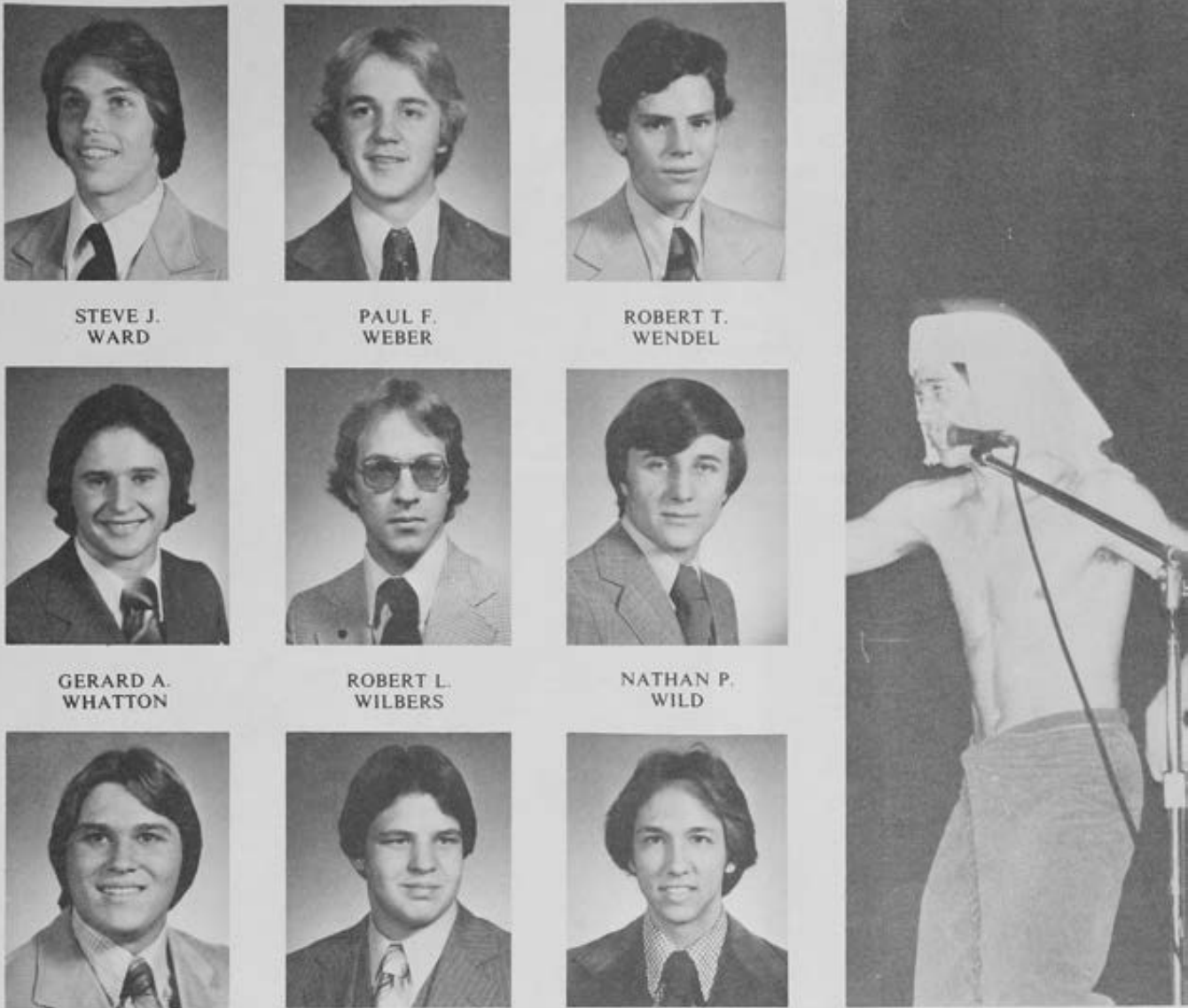

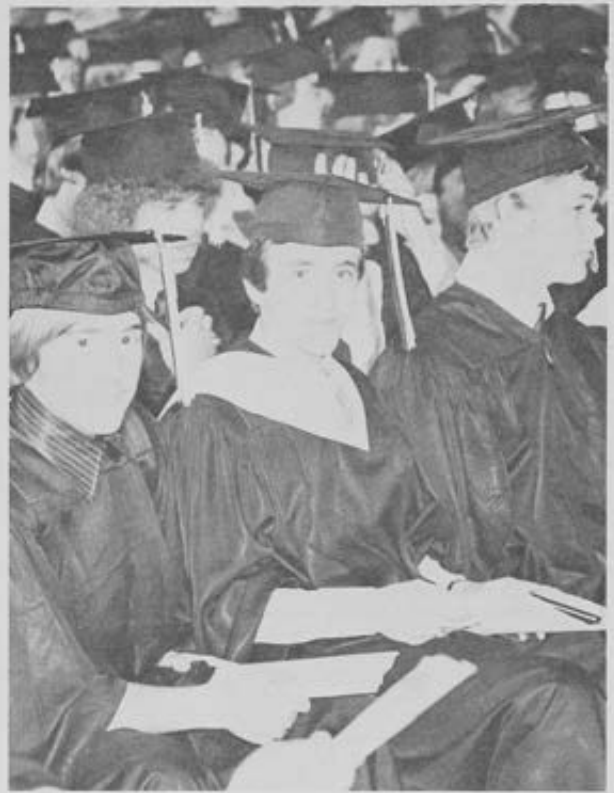
