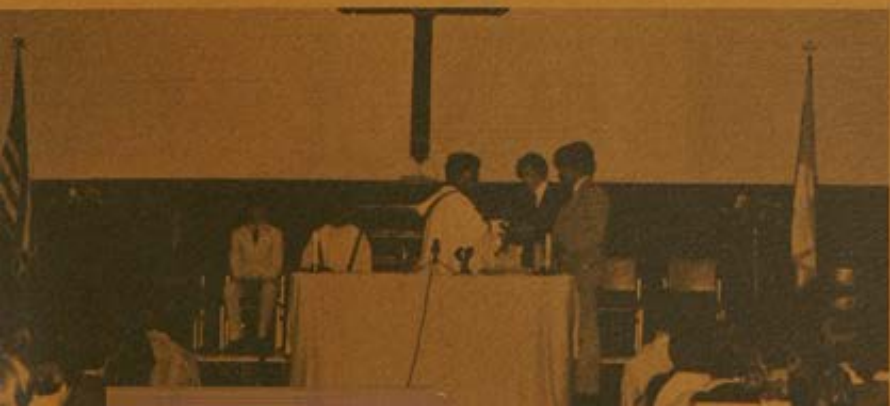

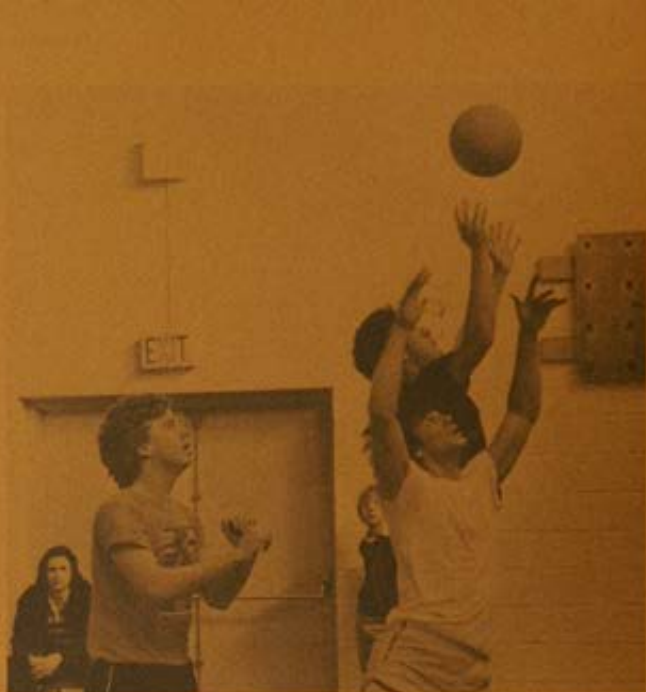

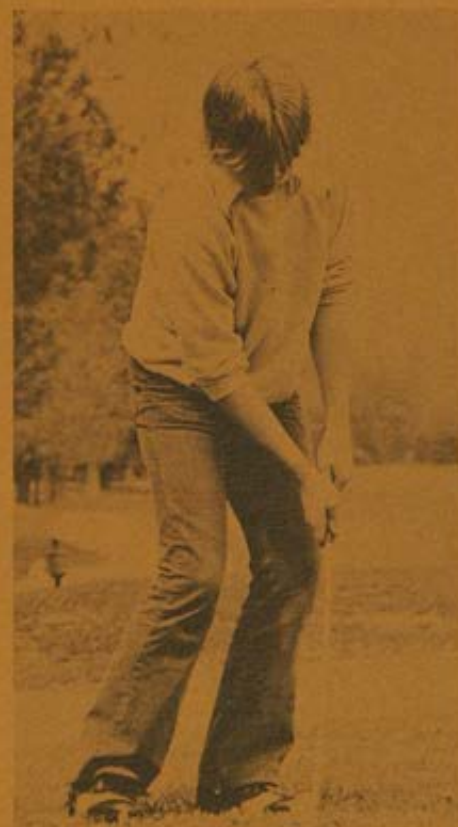

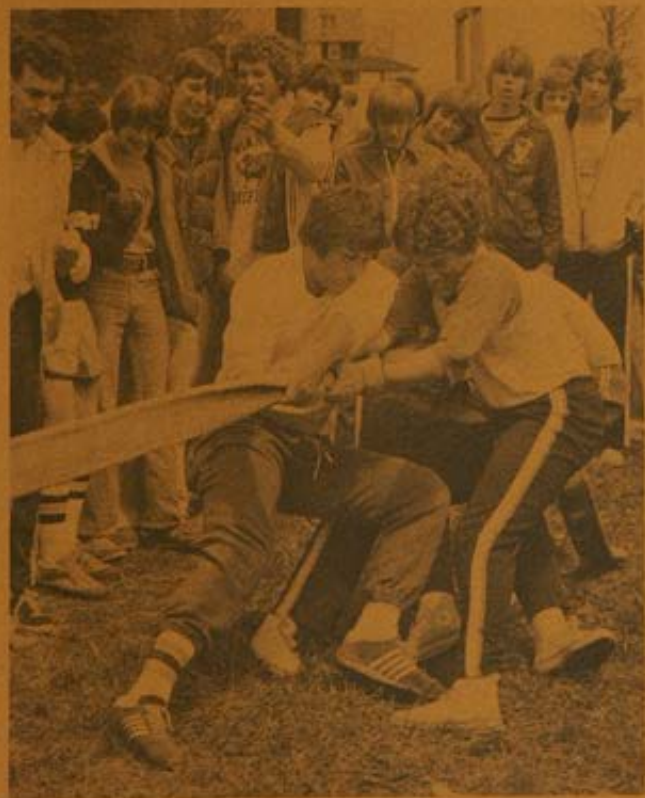

After 8 Years, Brother Hatesohl Leaves Vianney

Brother Robert Hatesohl has become something of an institution around Vianney over the past fifteen years. He was first stationed here during the 1964-1965 school year in order to help with the clerical work of running the business office. He again returned to Vianney in the fall of 1968, officially assigned to the Maryhurst Scholasticate which was located on the campus at that time. Finally, Brother Bob was reassigned to Vianney in August, 1970 as the school's business manager and has served in that capacity over the last eight years.

During his tenure as business manager, Brother Bob was referred to by a number of names which supposedly reflected a rather tight-fisted attitude toward money. As most members of the Vianney family know only too well, these names were given to him in jest only. As a member of the school's administration, he went out of his way to make sure that Vianney's educational and extra-curricular programs were adequately financed and strove to make improvements possible whenever feasible.

Brother Bob is probably best-known for his easy-going manner: always approachable, understanding, and helpful in anyway possible. A good listener, he is considered by many to be a "facilitator," one who tries to make the hard road less difficult.

Now, after a long career of service to Vianney, Brother Bob leaves us to spend a year in a religious renewal program. The Vianney family wishes him its best, and in recognition of his service, the editorial staff dedicates the 1978 Talon to Brother Robert Hatesohl.

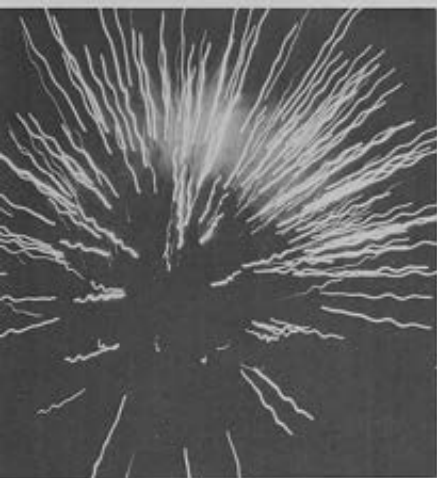

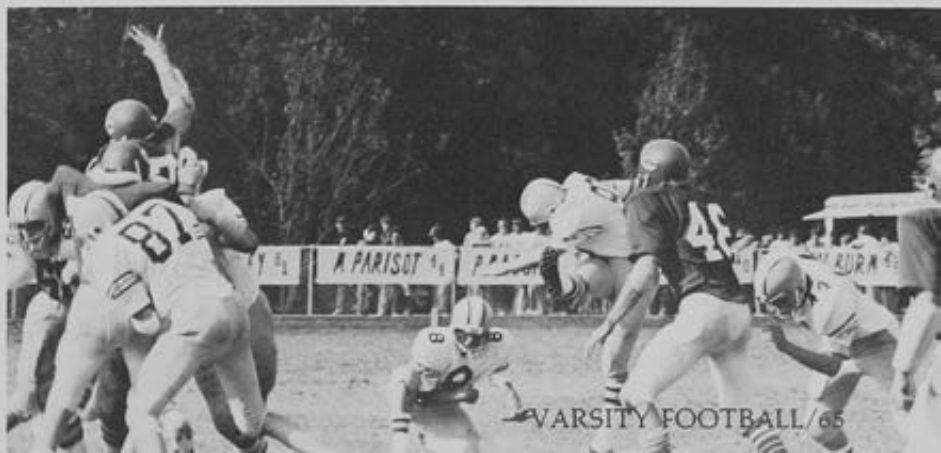
New Lights Are Good Luck When Griffs Are Home

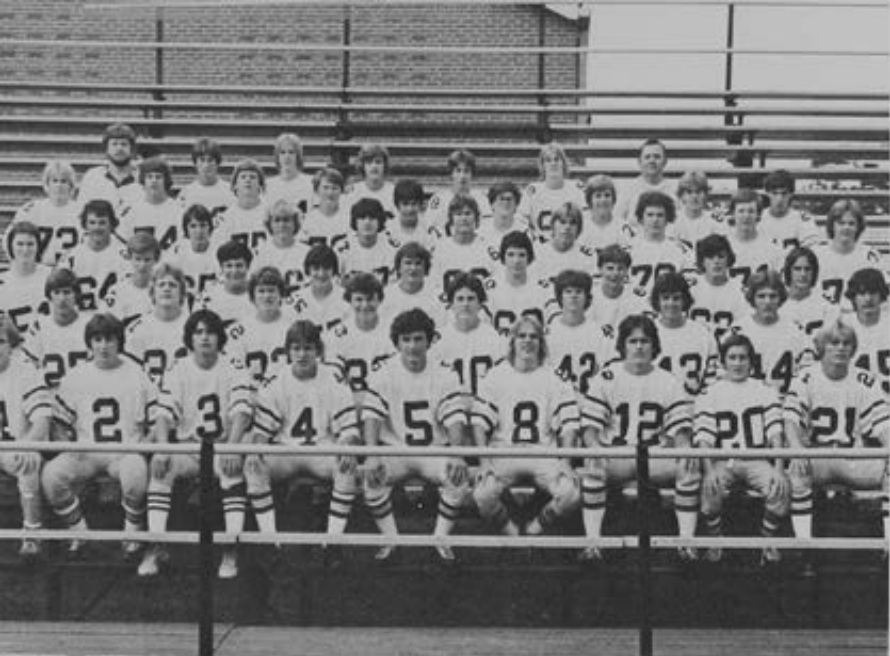
Lions Make Noises; Eagles Soar

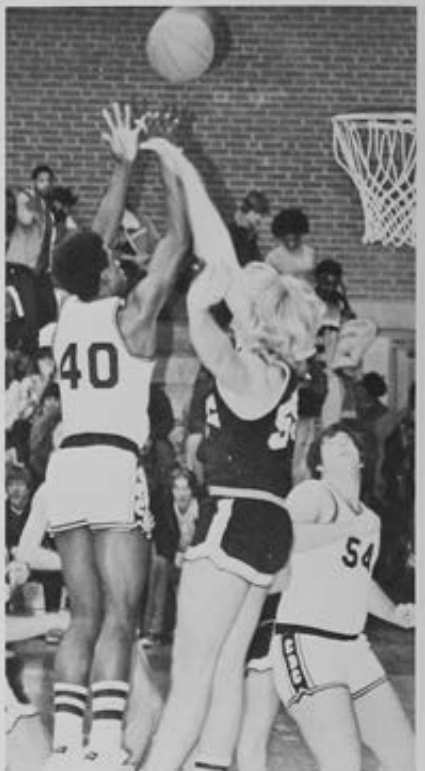
Varsity Basketball One Of The Finest

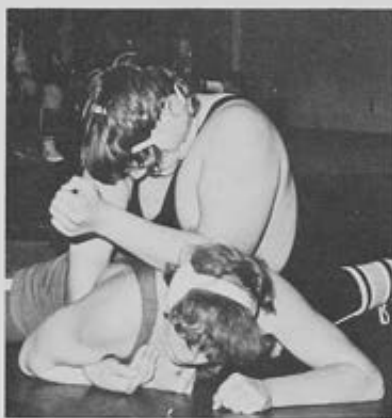

With many juniors returning in the running events and with the field events being wide open, Vianney appears ready to repeat in 1979.

Class Of '78 Graduates With Distinction

The eighteenth annual commencement exercises, held on May 21, 1978, ended four years of study and hard work for the graduating seniors. One hundred and eighty two members of the graduating class of 1977 received, from Brother Jerome Bommer, S.M., Principal of Vianney High School, their diplomas.
