On March 26, 1961, Saint John Vianney High School was dedicated. Along with it came the foundation for an educational center which would pay fruitful dividends: boys walked in through its doors and four years later proudly exited as men. This institution of learning was new, modern, and ready for development. The small, but personal Chapel provided an atmosphere which allowed for relaxed prayer. The comfortable library rendered to student needs, whether as an aid to studying, reading, or researching. The spacious gymnasium furnished an area for physical activities, school assemblies, and social events which would dot the calendar. The polished cafeteria served as a student gathering place for studying, talking, and eating. The threadbare athletic fields were still being constructed. The bright classrooms supplied an environment conducive to lecturing and learning. Yes, Vianney was a reality, and the dreams about the future enhanced its establishment as a school of higher education.

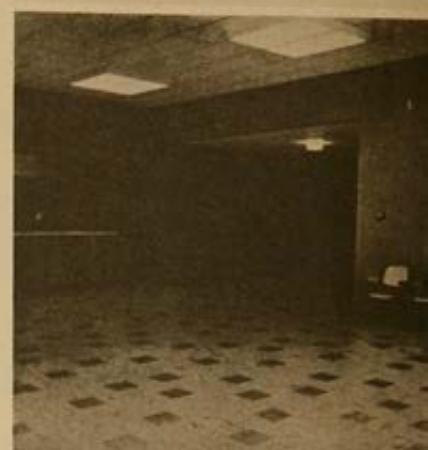
The 1960-1961 academic year saw Brother Kenneth Nesbit, S.M. as the acting principal. The highly qualified staff was mainly composed of members of the Society of Mary. William Scharf was the first Student Council President in a long line of capable leaders. The Mother's Club and Father's Club existed as separate organizations. The Glee Club claimed over fifty members while the Writing Club and Oratory Club were just getting started. The major sports were football, opponents at Kirkwood's field and the basketball team turned heads as its cheerleading squad spirited the crowds.

At the end of the first school year, Saint John Vianney High school proudly graduated its first class — the Class of 1961. With 34 graduates moving out into the world and on into life, Vianney concluded the successful school year for the first of many times.

1962. Vianney is still a baby, and yet, changes are already taking place. New faces have come into the scene. Bro. Earl Leistikow, Mr. Robert Hoffmann, and Bro. Eugene Kwasinski are all beginning their stay at Vianney. The Library is sparse with only 4200 volumes. With the new always comes the seasoned. Fr. Warner A. Rohrback, Bro. Victor Naegole and Bro. Harold Marcoll all celebrated their silver jubilees this year. The coaching staff is growing also. Mr. Frank Longo and Bro. Fred Fuchs will be made coaches this year. There is a new spirit in a new school. On the first day of the football pass drive the seniors came in with returns of 100%. On October 4, 1961 the first school newspaper, the Cure, came out. With a brand new basketball team Vianney captured first place in the 20th annual Bayless tournament. Vianney is an attention getter. In March, 950 people watched as St. Louis area coaches defeated the football Cardinals in a basketball game played at Vianney. The score was a close 58-54. With the year at a close it is time to choose a new leader for the year to come. Dick Fontana will be that leader.

1963 brought Vianney's first foreign exchange student, from Vienna, Austria. With the number of students growing, the first Vianney Identification Cards were printed. A new tradition started. The first chocolate drive nets \$3100. The area of public speaking was stressed to all students. In the first three weeks of every student's second semester, he had to study public speaking. Then for a practical example of the study the students would participate in an intramural speech meet. Ironically, the first student to win a full four year scholarship to Vianney was named Mark Griffin. That Scholarship was provided by the Mother's Club. The month of May brought many honors. For the 35 seniors graduating it was an honor to finish. To the Newspaper staff it was the highest honor possible in the High School Journalism Competition.

1964 saw the the changing of principals at Vianney. Bro. Fred Weisbruch assumed that position. Mike Spelley was the new Student Council President. That Homecoming brought new ideas that would be tradition. That Homecoming was the first to include a bonfire, pep rally, float and car contest, parade, football game and victory dance all in one. The football team was also a close second in the Catholic League. The Mother's and Father's clubs merged to form the first Vianney P.T.A. Basketball teams had their glories also with the B-team running its record to 13-4 and both the Varsity and B-teams placed second in the league. In the spring, the election of the next year's officers showed Gene McHugh to be the winner. The Junior and Seniors were off to Washington, D.C. and New York for their class trip.

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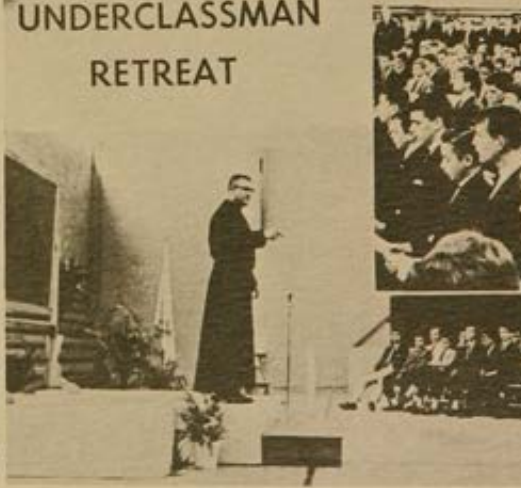

1965 saw the introduction of Bro. Jerry Bommer to the staff of Vianney. As promised, the proctor system was revised splitting the assembly and cafeteria proctors into different bodies. The evil S.L.U.H. destroyed the Big V's chances for an undefeated season in football. With the formation of the new Art Club, the making of signs and posters took on a much more textured aspect. The Student Council took it upon itself to write a constitution which would state its purpose, beliefs and rights. The National Honor Society formed a new chapter at Vianney with some tough standards for the Griffins to meet. Always in the news, the Varsity Football team tied for the Catholic League Title. With the formation of a new Chess Club the intellectuals could finally be challenged head to head. The Vianney P.T.A. quenched its thirst for adventure as it showed the James Bond 007 flick, "Gold Finger". Cheap thrills were plenty as the Sophomore and Freshman classes participated in Vianney's first Puberty Ball. At a cost of a whole 50 cents, the turnout was good. One of the reasons it was initiated, according to the principal, was education. "Through example, the Sophomores are expected to teach Frshmen how to behave at social functions such as dances," the boss said. East met West when Vianney got its first Judo Club. The Seniors had their own Prom for the first time, as the Juniors got their first Junior Ring Dance. The two were previously a joint event. The close of the year brought elections and it also brought Mike Mullen as the new STUCO president.

1966 brought a new school year, and as is the custom brought many changes in the school and its people. Bro. John Hamman and Bro. Norbert Grass joined Vianney as instructors. Two new courses were available to students also. Analysis and Music/Art Appreciation became new parts of the Vianney educational experience. The Varsity Football Team clinched a 2nd place finish in the C.A.C. battle. After an absence, activity awards were re-established. The recipient of these awards would have to gain a certain number of activity points to win. The Student body experienced its first folk mass. A crisis of unity occurred as students boycotted the Christmas dance in protest of the band choosing policies. STUCO elections were held again at mid-year because of a dissatisfaction with the leadership. Coach Jerry Boeckman brought his coaching and teaching talents to Vianney. Vianney had its first Talent Show. The Griffin put its first fine arts edition to press. The baseball team had a stroke of bad luck as its season was delayed a total of 16 games in a row due to rain. The first full 3 act play saw its way to the Vianney stage. Bob Bosslet got the student's vote as president of the Student Council.

1967 was the year the football season got off to an embarrassing start as the Cadets of C.B.C. wiped the Griffins out by a score of 34-0. The year was not all bad. A new service organization was formed. Opportunities For Action (O.F.A.) replaced the long standing and highly formalized Sodality. Bro. 1968 brought many questions to the minds of the Vianney students. Constitution? What Constitution? Asked Mike Browne in a letter to the editor of the Griffin. Let the Student Council answer that one Mike. Senior Steve Nobel asked of the faculty, "The New Religion?" Steve saw the changes in the Catholic Church but saw none in Vianney's religion program. 1974 heralded the arrival of a new administration for Vianney as Brother Richard Dix, S.M., assumed the duties of principal from Brother Chewning. As a result of recommendations from the previous year's NCA visitation, the administrative position of Curriculum Coordinator was created to help upgrade academic programs and make Vianney more truly a "college preparatory" high school. Brother Vincent Wayer filled the position ably. Homecoming was marked by a hot-air balloon ascension at half-time. Mr. Heeb was named CAC Coach of the Year as the varsity football squad finished its season with a 9-0-1 record and captured the CAC championship. Vianney jumped into the world of electronic media with the purchase of its first video recorded and camera, due to the success of the school's final chocolate drive. The Pan-Action committee, under the direction of Mr. Eisele, undertook the arduous task of reviewing and revising the school's hair and dress code. Mrs. Rosemary Orr became the new business secretary. Miss Judy O'Connell became Vianney's first distaff faculty member. Christian Commitment Week was shortened to only three days. "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" became the second big musical to hit the Vianney stage. Bob Dolan was named Griffin of the Year. But in spite of the many of the year, the most remembered event was the most tragic: the death of Mr. James John, a man who had been with Vianney from its beginnings and who had earned the respect of all who knew him, whether as a teacher, a coach, or a colleague.

1975 introduced Mrs. Rottjakob, Mrs. Heeb, and Mr. Thomas Downing, a Vianney grad and Griffin of the Year 1967, to the teaching staff. Jim Saller headed the Student Council. The athletic department claimed the CAC All-Sports Trophy for its previous year's performance. Movies returned to Vianney as the Film Series was revived. For the first time, three full-length were presented on the Vianney Stage. The varsity football team retained its CAC crown with its 9-1 season. The Speech Team won its first league trophy, placing third among 42 schools in public speaking. The basketball team tied for the title with DuBourg and St. Mary's, finishing 8-2 in the CAC. Tom Casso was voted Student Council president for the 1976 school year. The May festival, featuring a new car as top raffle prize, grossed about \$25,000. Mark Lux was named Griffin of the Year. Once again, however, the year was marred by a tragic death. Fr. Alphonse Piekarski, who had been at Vianney since 1970, passed away.

1976 brought with it the usual additions to the faculty. This year, the newcomers were Mr. Michael Hrdlicka, Brother Joseph Maly and, replacing Mr. Pilch as assistant principal, Brother Richard Thompson. With the proceeds from the last year's May festival, the school purchased an \$11,000 Classic computer, with a view towards introducing a computer programming course during the 1977 academic year. Brother Vic Winkler was back in the classroom, having recovered from a serious illness suffered at the end of the previous year. For the second consecutive year, the athletic department received the CAC All-Sports Trophy. A Pro-Life group was formed under the direction of Father Jim Tobin, and the "vampire van" (the Red Cross Bloodmobile) made its first annual visit to Vianney. The spring of the year saw five students from Lima, Peru, attending classes at Vianney. Jim Cahalin was voted Stuco President for 1977. The Drama Club produced the first amateur production in the St. Louis area of the musical "Godspell." The twice-weekly Activity Period was introduced on a trial basis, to be continued in the future. With the celebration of Brother Karpfinger's twenty-fifth jubilee, the first annual school-wide field day was successfully sponsored by the athletic department. Tom Casso was selected Griffin of the Year.

District and CAC Titles Finishes 15-6

In the first year in the history of Vianney, the basketball team won 15 titles. In addition, it won the District title. This ending with a record, the best of any Vianney team.
The team was led by the pitching of Pat Wallace (13-1), and the play of all three catchers: Tom Fick (1974), Don Murphy (1975), and Alphonse (1976).
In being their first four games, the basketball team was victorious. Then the Celtics started to come around and in their next game had lost to St. Charles, 100-110. This was the spark that lit the fire. From then on the Celtics were dominating except for a surprising second place in the District Tournament. Following this, the team won their next four games before losing to St. Charles. After a losing streak, the basketball team was a threat to the team. However, the rest of it all together in their last game against St. Charles. CAC in national games. The team posted a 15-6 record over Parkway South, St. Louis, the team placed probably the best game of the season when defeated St. Charles, 100-110. The next three CAC opponents, were the Celtics defeat following St. Charles and Kentucky. This brought the win streak to six, but never that it got the team a CAC title. Kentucky's loss gave them a leading. The last five days the opportunity of winning the CAC title with four games left. The basketball team won and finished (1976) in what proved to be the game of the year. However, the team lost to St. Charles in a wild game in the playoffs and basketball went on to the State Games. The last two games were victories over St. Charles and St. Louis and the Celtics had won East CAC Basketball playoffs. This coupled with the CAC title earned the Celtics the 15-6 record.

1977 marked still another "changing of the guard," as Brother Jerome Bommer, S.M., took over as principal. Mr. Steve Travis and Mr. John Panhorst also joined the faculty at that time. In December of that school year, the CAC realigned its football league and, in effect, expelled Vianney and the other local Marianist schools in an effort to "terminate the ten-year football domination by the conference's three boys' schools." Classical theatre came to the gym courtesy of the Student Council and the American Theatre Company of New York, as a selection of scenes from some of Shakespeare's most popular plays were presented to the student body at a cultural assembly. The Readak studies skill course was offered for the first time while Jim Voorhees was elected Stuco President for the next school year. It was the year when the administration approved a proposal for lighting Griffin Stadium, paving the way for Friday night football. Brothers Jerry Bommer and Joseph Conradt celebrated their twenty-fifth anniversaries as members of the Society of intramural program was revived and tennis made its Vianney debut as a varsity sport. The Talon was dramatically revamped, and Joe Ojile was selected Griffin of the Year.

1978 marked the departure of Father Jim Tobin from the staff. New faculty included Fr. Joe Uvietta, Mr. Gene Kwasinski, and Mr. Larry Skull. The first night football game in Griffin Stadium was played and the gym received a much needed new look by means of new paint, new colors, and some striking graphics provided by Brothers Suda and Thompson. Vianney increased its participation in St. Louis University's 1-8-1-8 college credit course by introducing new programs in physics, English, Spanish, and French. The Vianney Band began its long comeback from obscurity and the Winter Carnival was successfully revived. The video department came of age with the acquisition of a Beta (Burcke) Max recorded and more television sets for classroom use. Bill Hennessey was chosen by the student body to lead the Student Council during the coming year, while Mr. Tom DeLuca provided one of the most entertaining assemblies ever witnessed at Vianney as a hypnotized a number of students and placed them in some far-fetched situations. Brothers Hyland, Behlmann, Schneider, Fuytinck and Duventester all celebrated milestone jubilees; the Drama department produced three highly successful plays; and 1968 grad Mike Leach presented to the school a sculptured Griffin for the Brother Joseph Lanfer Award, Jim Voorhees was honored as Griffin of the Year.

1979 introduced Brother Ken Kehm, replacing Brother Bob Hatesohl as business manager. Other new faces included Mr. Bill Fiock, Fr. Jose Ramirez, Mr. Jack Glaser, while after several years' absence, Brother Jim Droste and Mr. Jerry Steverson returned to the Vianney fold. Under the leadership of new head librarian Larry Skull, major renovations were made in the library, including new independent study rooms with typewriters for student use. A Speech/Humanities course was added to the curriculum and the varsity soccer team won the state championship. The fall variety night moved out of the cafeteria (fitted with new, immovable booths) and into the gym. The success of the Winter Carnival permitted acquisition of a new le Computer System. After two years of discussion, the Social Service Project was initiated with overwhelming success. Gary Purk became Stuco President-elect, "Fiddler on the Roof" became the largest theatrical event ever undertaken at Vianney, the tennis team began to come into its prime, and the seniors, faculty, and administration voted Bill Hennessey as Griffin of the Year 1979.

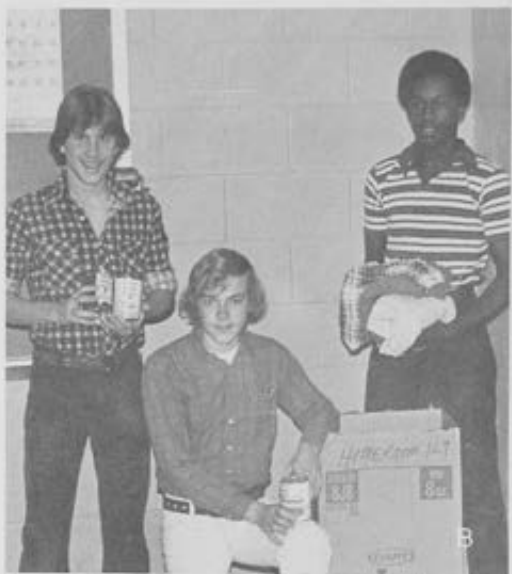

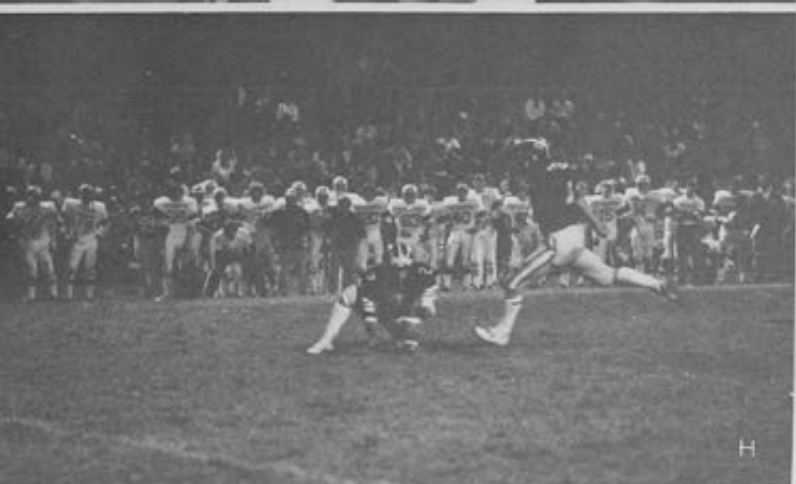

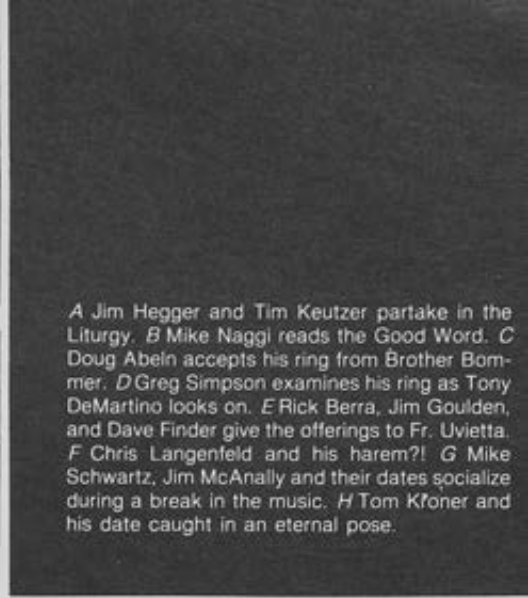
By working with the young, the old or the emotionally, physically, or mentally handicapped, the juniors learned (hopefully) what life is like from the other side.

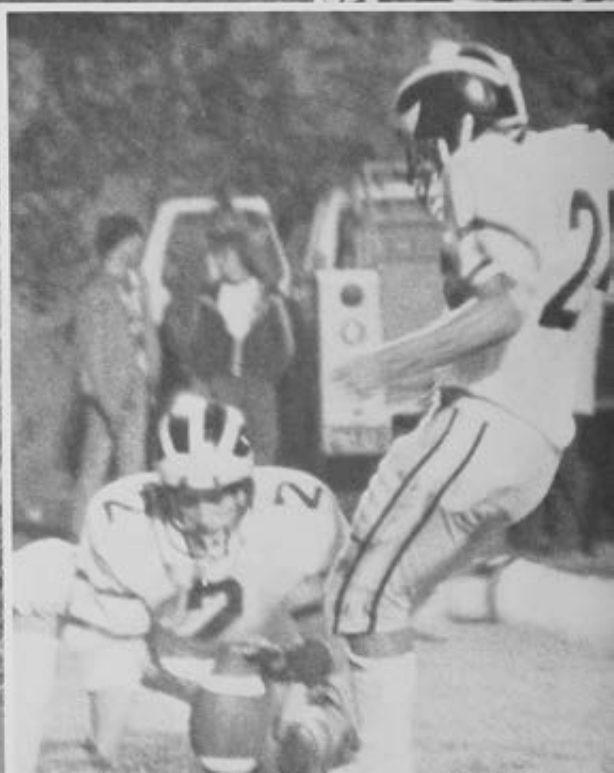

The Varsity Football Team finished the 1979 season with a very respectable record of 6-4. Early in the season Coach Don Heeb gained his 100th victory at Vianney. Later in the schedule, Quarterback Danny Christian became one of the leading passers in the area while Paul Taylor developed into a top kick returner. The ten games had many other

highlights which included hard fought victories over Chaminade and Rolla. The city title remained in our possession as we defeated Kirkwood 17-14. In the reputed battle between the great Griffins and the Lindbergh Flyers, we once again proved our superiority despite a visible lack of size.

At the banquet following the season, individual awards were

given out. Paul Taylor received the 100 percent award and John Boly was the Most Improved Player. Each of the tri-captains received an award: Gary Purk was the Scholar-Athlete, Pat Hooper was the Best Defensive Player, and Dan Christian was the Best Offensive Player, along with being the team's Most Valuable Player.

Despite losing ten starters, Coach Mike Villa's Varsity Soccer Team enjoyed a very successful season. Victories over State Champion Rosary, powerful CBC and Illinois State Champions Granite City South highlighted the 16-7-1 season. The Griffins, who won seven and lost four in Catholic Athletic Conference play, finished fifth in the league, while capturing third place in the CAC Tournament. A tough loss

to Oakville in the District Final ended the season earlier than everyone had hoped.

Many players contributed to the success of the season. Steve Valenta lead all scorers with 12 goals apiece while Mark Visconti chipped in seven. 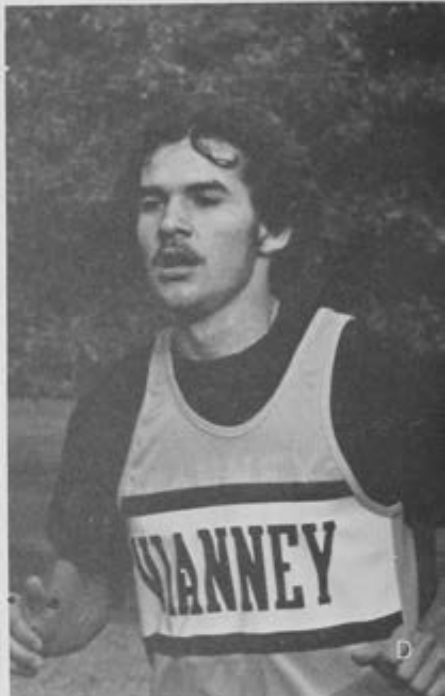
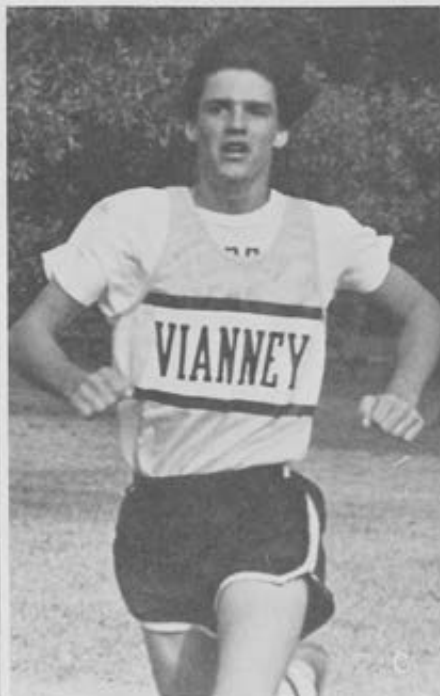

After nineteen years of trying, the 1979-1980 Varsity Basketball team capped off a most successful season by winning their first-ever Missouri State Regional Championship.

Lead by the all-time leading scorer, Gerry Braun, the Golden Griffins compiled a 20-10 record. Braun, who averaged twenty points and eight rebounds a game, was named to the first team in the CAC and second team in the South District, Dan Christian, who was the assist

leader for the season and in Vianney history, made second team CAC, as did George Giulvezan, who averaged fourteen points a game. Other players who helped the Griffins cause were Dave Ehrhardt, Phil Link and Tom Harris, all good rebounders and cornermen.

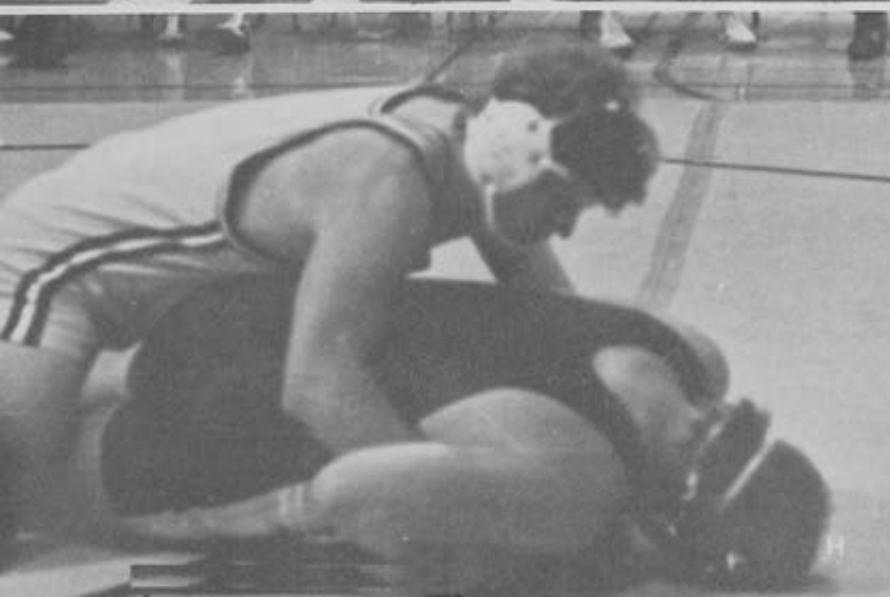

The 1980 Vianney Varsity Baseball Team had a banner year. They finished with an 18-4 record, the best in Vianney's history, and they also were co-champions of the Catholic Athletic Conference.

Led by first team All-CAC players Gary Purk and Terry Repp, Vianney finished with the sixth best record in the St. Louis Area. Purk, a shortstop-pitcher, batted .345 with 2 homeruns and 14 RBIs. As a pitcher he was 2-0. Thirdbaseman Terry Repp batted .386 and drove in 19 runs, finishing second in both categories.

Leading the Griffins in hitting was Junior Dave Ehrhardt. Mak-

ing the second team All-CAC, Dave batted .419 and drove in 14 runs. Dave also proved a very proficient pitcher by holding a 3-1 record and chalking up 16 strikeouts. Another player who had a tremendous season was Junior Firstbaseman Steve King. King, also a second team All-CAC player, led the team in RBIs with 21, tied for the team lead in extra-base hits with 8, and finished third on the team in batting with a .385 average.

Other players with outstanding seasons were second team All-CAC pitchers Tom Hampel and Tom McCoy, Mike Agne: second team All-CAC Designated Hitter,

and Outfielder Paul Taylor, who was named an Honorable Mention Player. Hampel had a record of 3-0 while striking out 16 batters. McCoy was 3-1 and led the team in strikeouts with 24. Agne batted .324 and tied for the team lead in stolen bases with Taylor, who batted .319 with 15 RBIs and 7 stolen bases.

Vianney beat Missouri State Semi-finalist DeSmet 9-4, recorded 3 Strikeouts, and set a team batting average record of .317. These were just some of the things that led Vianney to their best season in history.

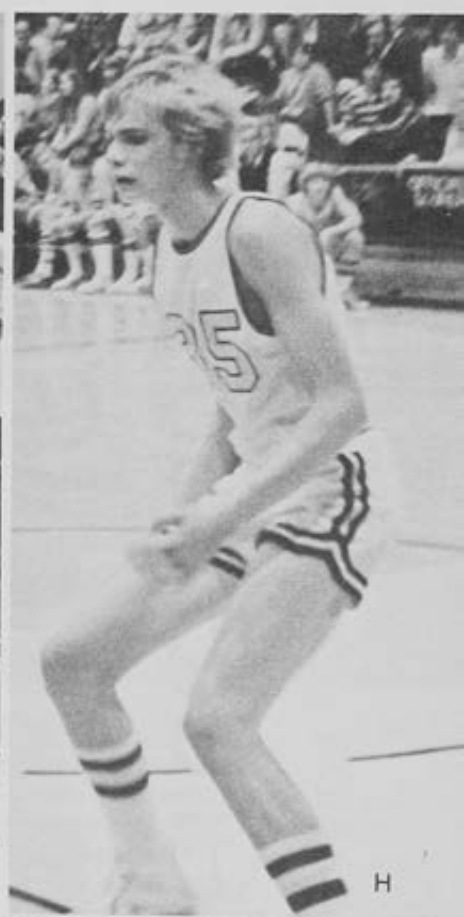

their best second half against city rival Kirkwood.

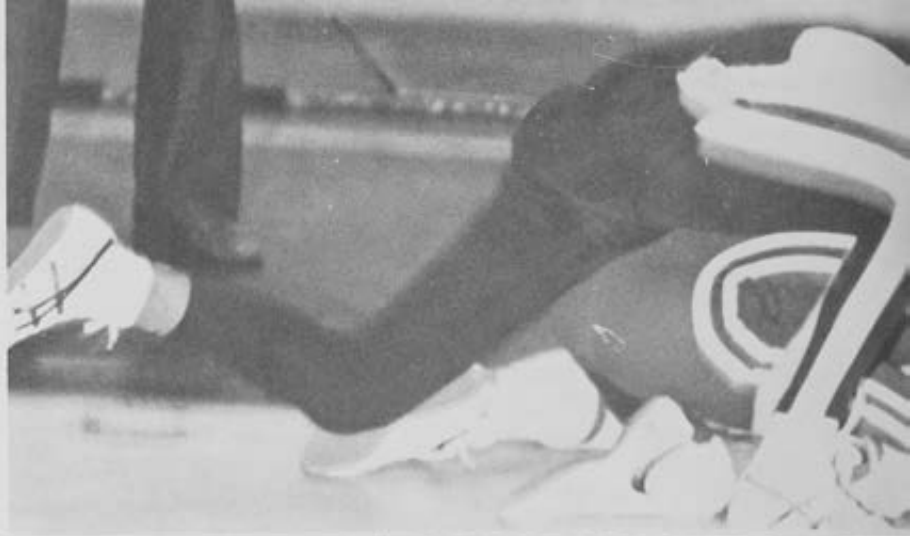

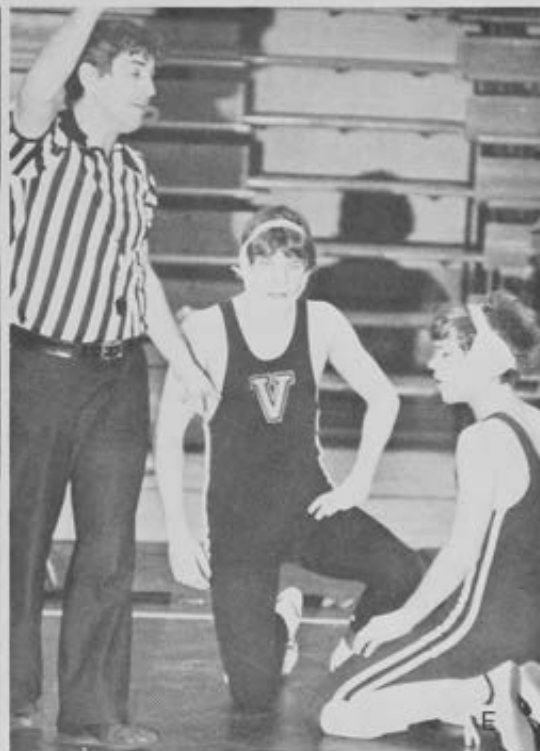

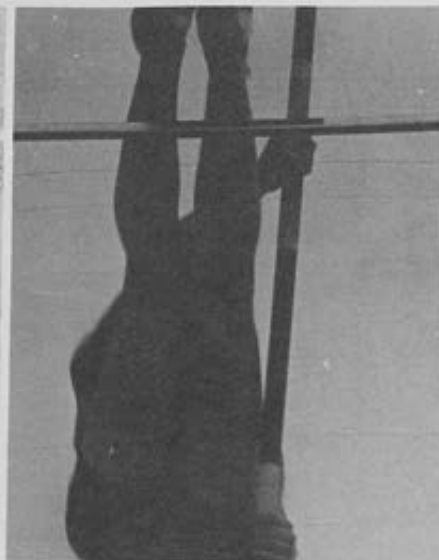
promise. Their record of 5-7 was not impressive, but the experience gained by these underclassmen does allow the future years to be optimistically bright.
