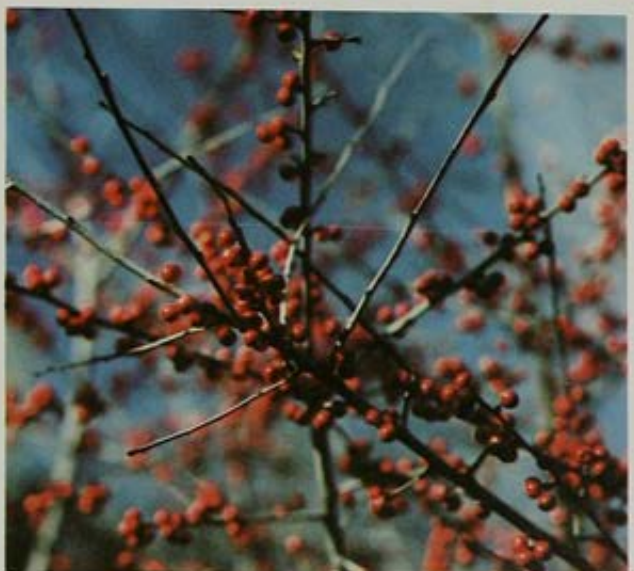

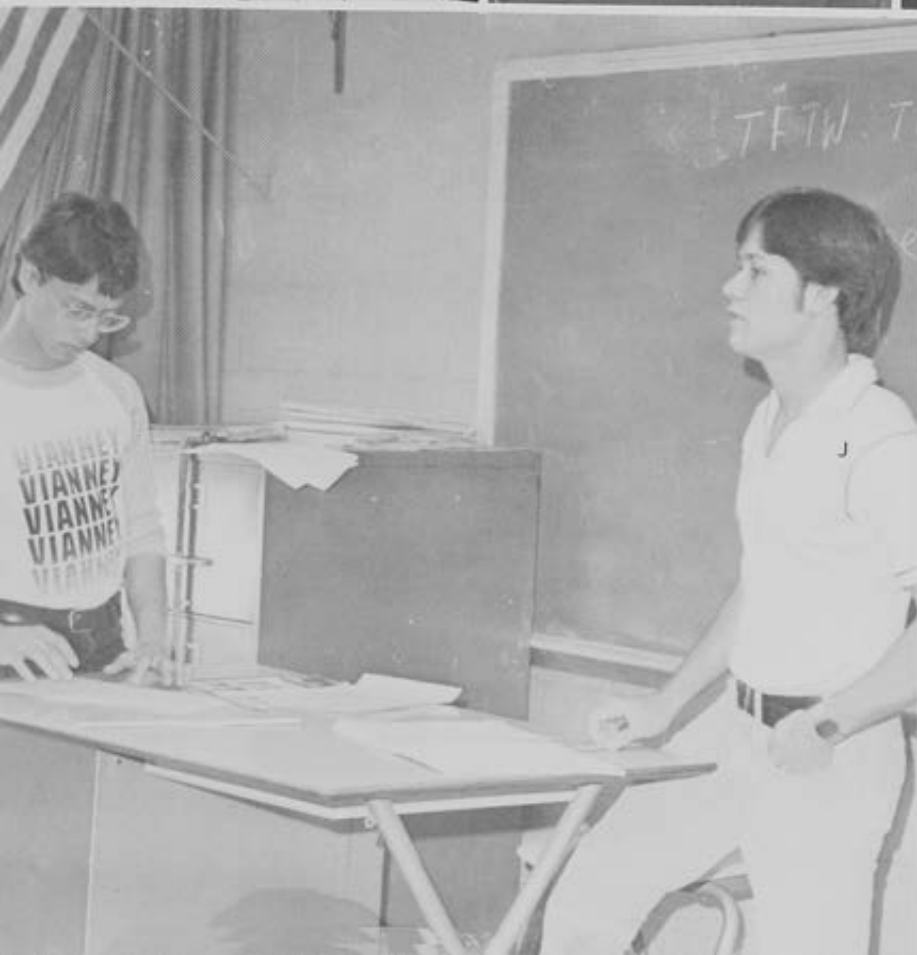

# Proctors And Student Court Overhauled

The 1980-81 school year represented a revolution and possibly a notable accomplishment with Stuco's creation of the 'new' Proctor System that appeared to work very well. Louis Anglo should be given the primary credit for organizing the system.

The system, which still leaves seniors exempt from cleaning tables, allows for the underclassmen to clean tables approximately four to five times a year.

Schedules are posted weekly in each homeroom to keep the students as informed as possible as to when they must do tables. This procedure frees the average proctor from the time consuming burden of searching the entire lunch shift for three outdated cafeteria cards. For those students who prefer to neglect their duty for various reasons, they need not worry about going to court anymore. They are instead automatically

given an hour of work after school. Proctors, cafeteria and assembly alike, still retained their ability to distribute tickets for inappropriate behavior.

Surprisingly at a school like Vianney, many tickets were handed down. In response the Student Court convicted practically every offender. Congratulations to Chris Mowery, Chief Justice of the Court, and other judges Bob Davis and John Brockman.

1. Attendance at periodic meetings at Vianney to discuss coming events at each school.

3. Promotion of interest and support for Vianney and its activities by selling sports passes and posting posters concerning upcoming events.
4. The establishment and maintenance of good rapport

with Vianney and their individual school.

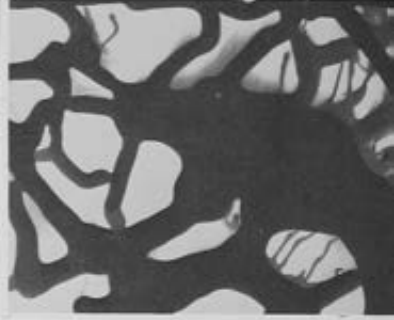
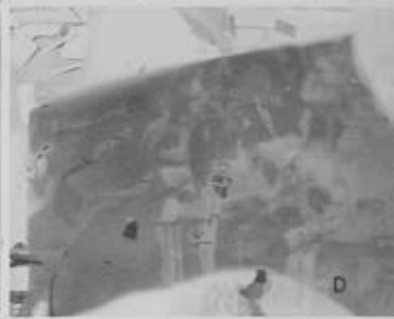

ter Carnival, and the Homecoming. Even when STUCO gave them only 24 hours' notice, the Art Club still whipped up some first class posters by the next day.

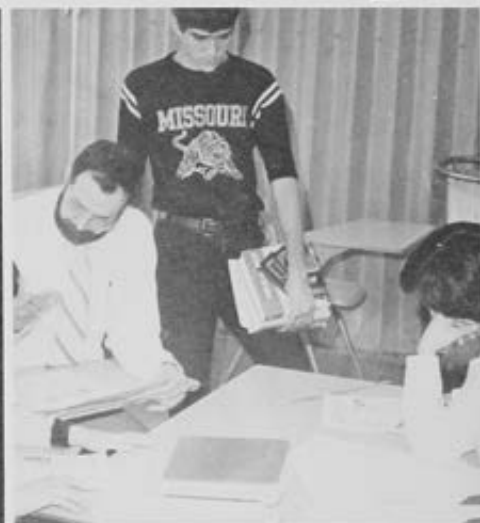

ple.

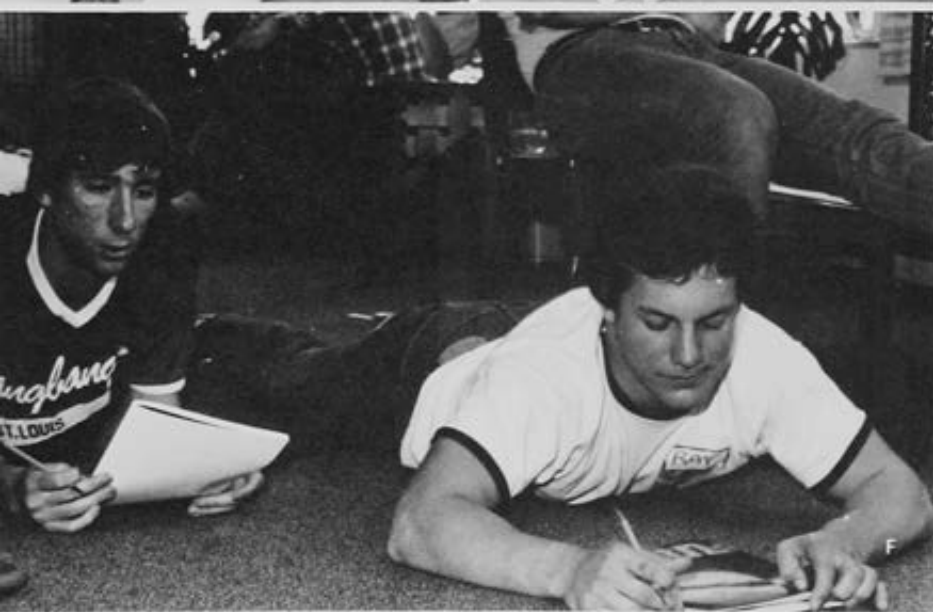

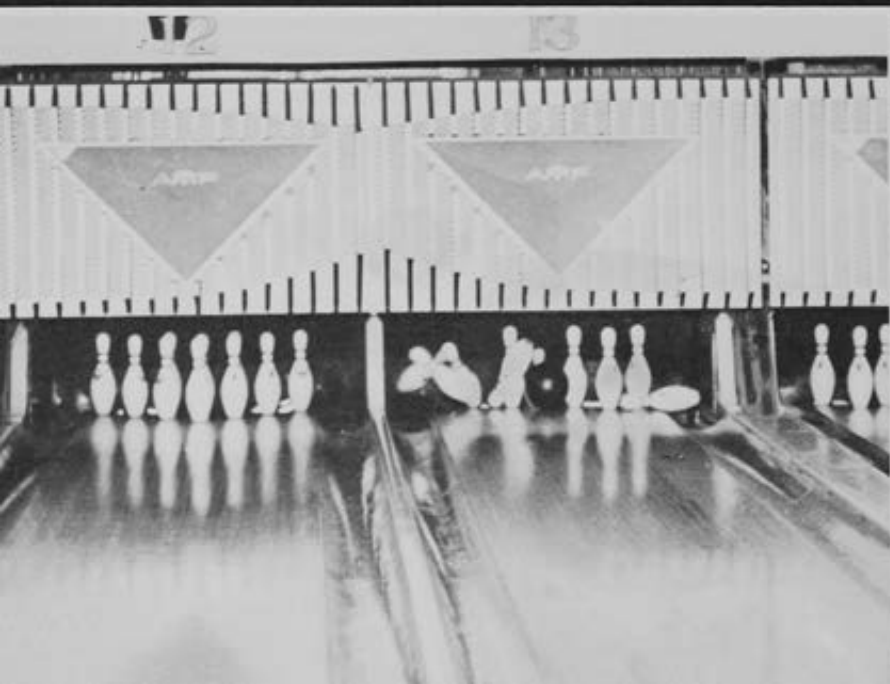
## In Memoriam

# Varsity Finishes 9-3; Wins Stadium Game

In his 15th coaching year at Vianney, Coach Heeb and his 1980 Varsity Football team gave all Vianney fans something to remember. The Golden Griffins qualified for the class 4A playoffs for the first time since 1968.

After beating Fox in the first game of the season, Vianney lost to SLUH and Lindbergh by identical scores of 14-12 with the Lindbergh loss coming only with one second left in the game. To make the playoffs,

In the next game against Kirkwood, Jerry Powell snatched away the victory by blocking a field goal with seconds left in the game. With a field goal from Chris Langenfeld, Vianney won in overtime. After defeating Cape Girardeau 14-0, the Griffins then gave CBC their first loss of the year. Vianney next defeated the St. Mary's Dragons in an ex-

citing triple overtime. After crushing Chaminade in the Homecoming game, the Griffins traveled to Rolla and left with a 35-10 victory. In a game of revenge at Busch Stadium, Vianney pounded Desmet into the astroturf, winning 24-0.

In the state playoffs, the Griffins avenged an earlier loss by beating SLUH in three overtimes, but they bowed to Parkway West in the final game of the season.

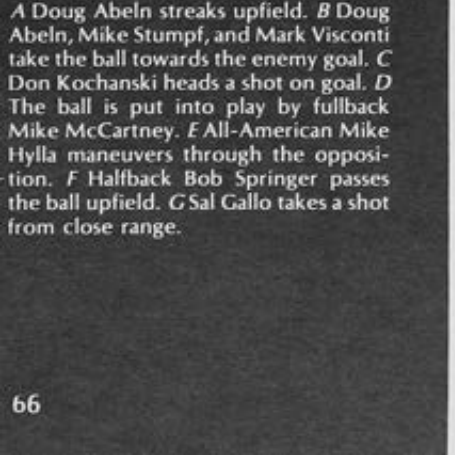

## Cagers Finish 18-11; Second In District

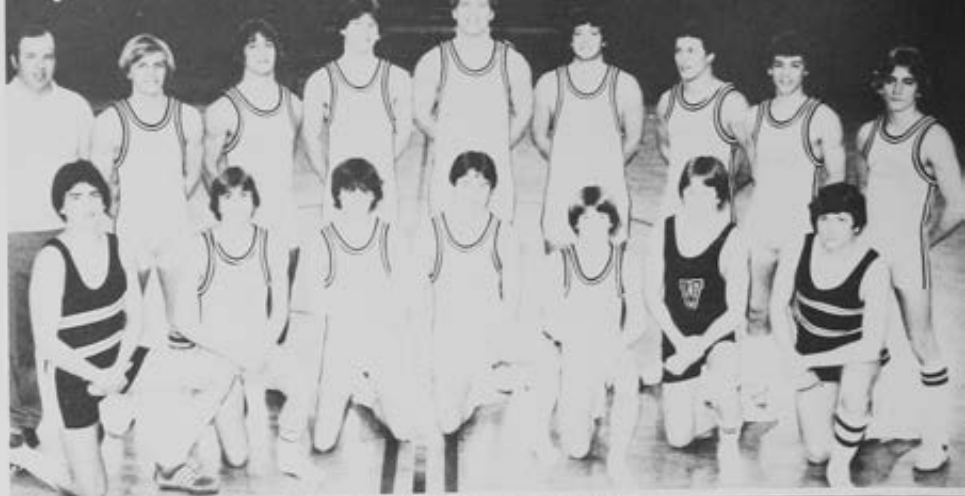

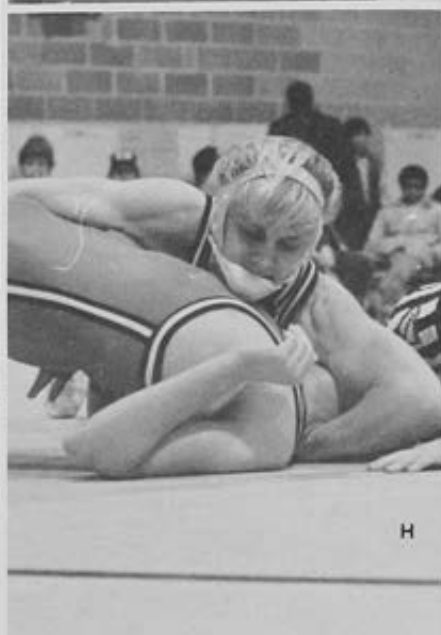
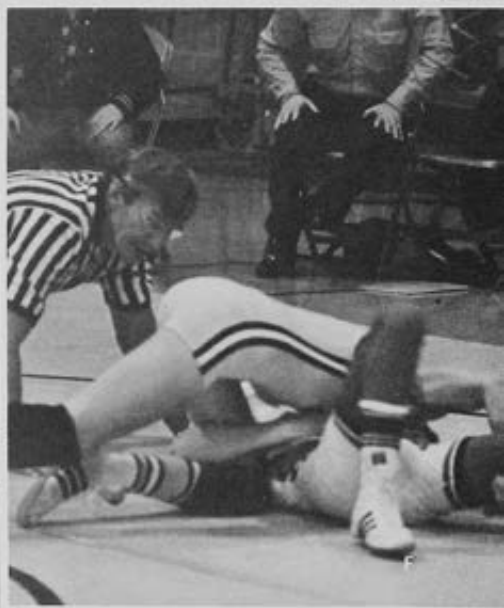
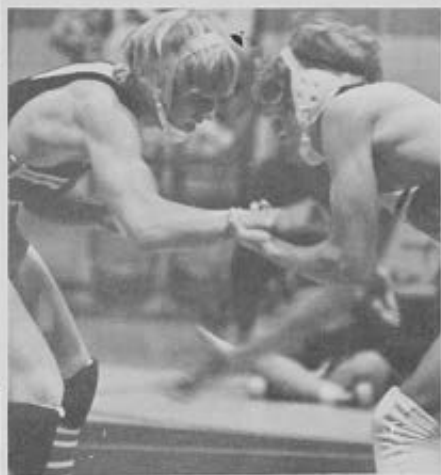
Vianney wrestlers who excelled were Pat John, Steve Robbins, and Keith Rob.

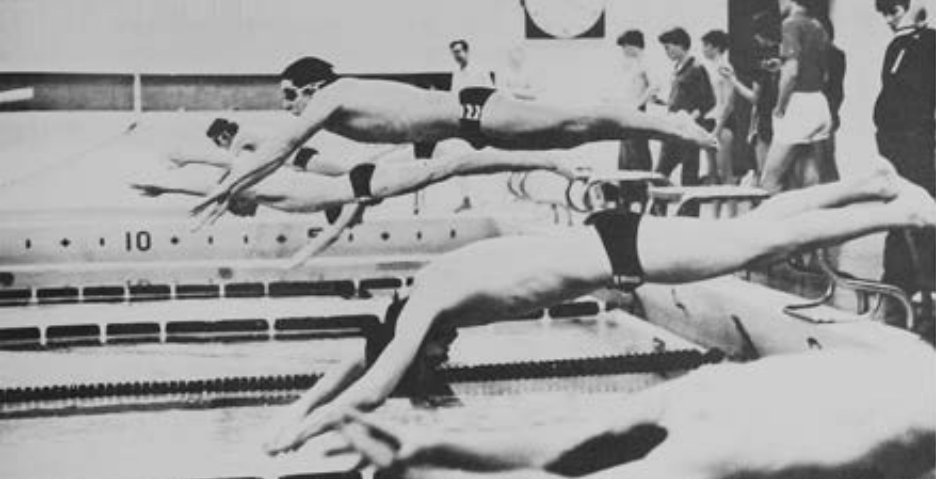
Coach Gary Corbin had high hopes for the Swimming team on making a good showing at

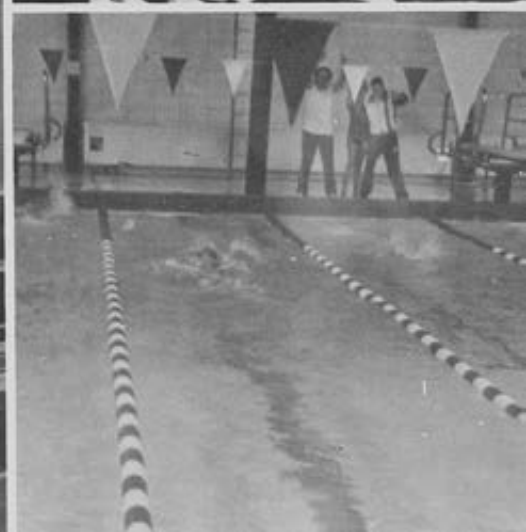
swimmers' performances.

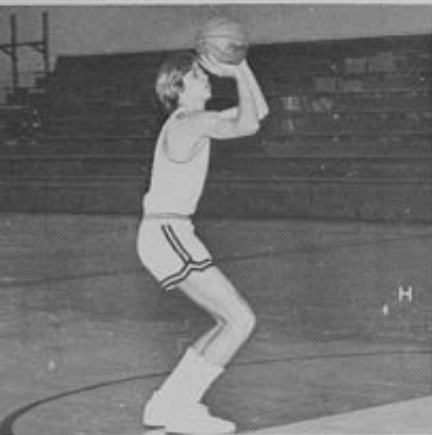
team is a solid, better-than-average team where many players have a strong potential for varsity in the coming years.

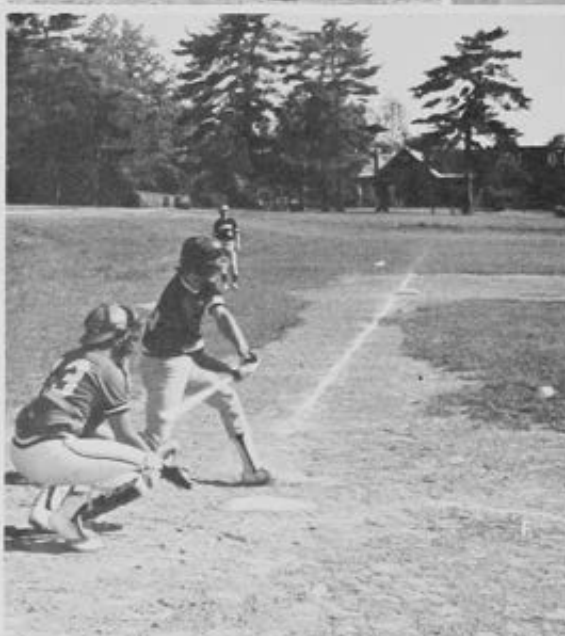

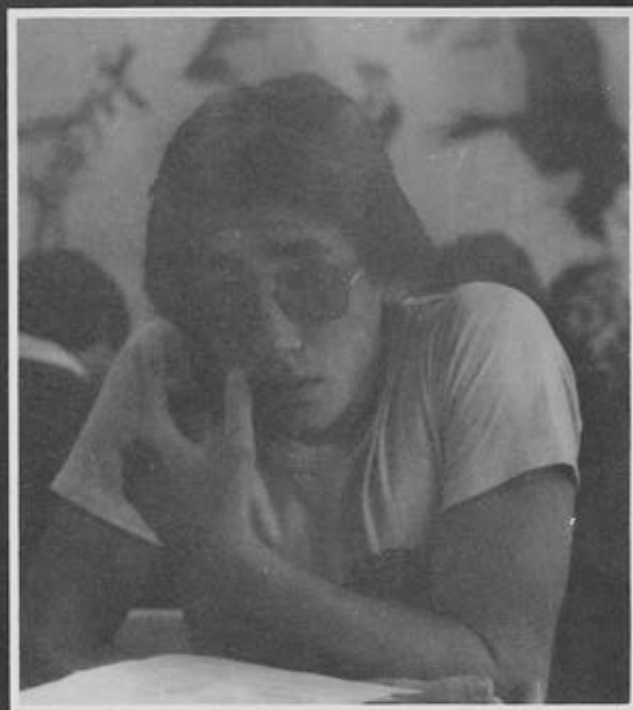

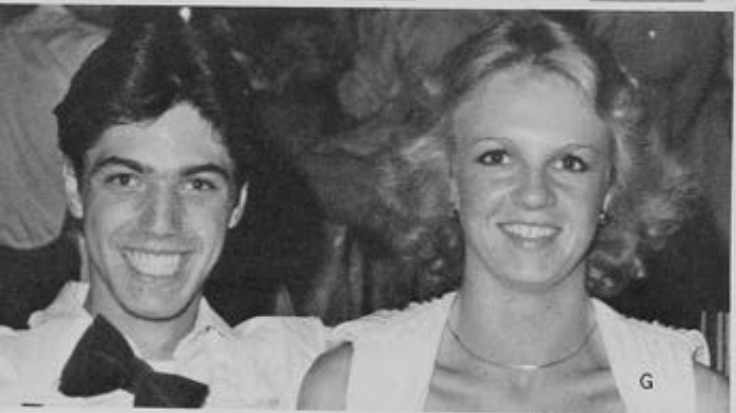
around the dance floor in untraditional steps. They must have liked the band.
