The theme of the 1977 **Talon** was that Vianney is bigger than all of us. It was an appropriate theme because that year a Brother, not new to Vianney or to the office he assumed, became the fifth principal of Vianney. Although he is small in stature, he has been in other ways bigger than all of us. The new principal was Brother Jerome Bommer, S.M.

Of the five men who have served Vianney as principal, Brother Jerry has been one of the most respected and well-liked by the parents, the faculty, and the students. His friendly, warm, and personable demeanor aided him in his ability to communicate with members of the Vianney family. His Christian attitude, reflected in his genuine concern for the welfare of the individual in particular

and the good of Vianney in general, allowed him to be open to suggestions and criticisms, an openness which was always characteristic of his administration.

Brother Jerry's family spirit and his commitment to provide a solid education was evident in his leadership. Among other achievements during his six years as principal, Brother Jerry nurtured the computer-program curriculum. He built a successful band program. He expanded college credit courses in the physical and social sciences, foreign languages, and art. To help raise funds so as to implement Vianney's educational goals and to help provide a Catholic education for all who wish it, Brother initiated the successful dinner auction and created the Office of Devel-

opment. In his final years as principal, Brother Jerry instituted the Father-Son Banquet to help mold the spirit of Vianney — the Family Spirit.

Upon completion of his term as principal, Brother Jerry will take a sabbatical for a year of religious study to deepen his commitment to Christ through His Mother Mary and to reaffirm his commitment to Catholic education.

We know of no better way to recognize a true Christian in every sense of the word or to show our appreciation for his unselfish efforts on behalf of Vianney than to dedicate the 1982 **Talon** to Brother Jerome Bommer, S.M. We wish him God's speed.

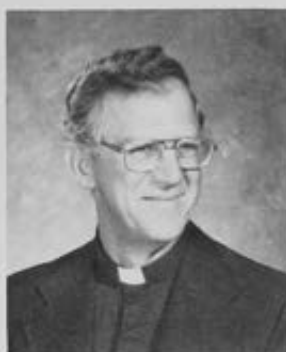
Students Make Faith Decisions In Religion

Foreign language study develops in the student a positive attitude toward speakers of other languages, helps him understand better the nature, multiplicity and importance of other cultures, and in the process brings about a more enlightened perspective and appreciation of his own American culture, as well as an awareness of each man's responsibility to the world community.

Art Enhances Creativity

The Art Department, recognizing that each student has a certain unique ability, encourages his creative expression in the graphic and plastic arts and aims to help the student express himself, his ideas and emotions, more clearly in visual terms.

The art room itself plays an important role in the student's education because in this environment, each student is a

member of an art community in which he must work with others, showing respect for their work, proper use of tools and materials, willingness to share and help in room care responsibilities. The music department aims to have all students achieve an awareness of music and its heritage commensurate with the needs, interests, and talents of the individual student.

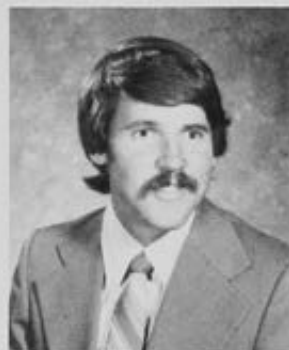
This goal is accomplished by providing listening experiences featuring music of many different styles, providing a means for musical performance of dif-

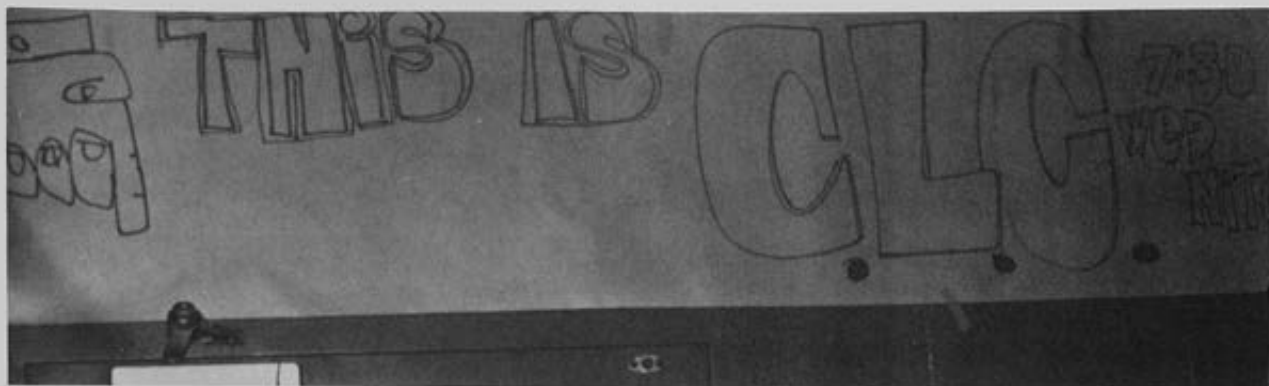
helping with College Night, and preparing Orientation Day, the freshmen's first day at Vianney. OSA members are also available for counseling members of their assigned homeroom.

Proctors And Student Court Keep Order

The proctors, the enforcement arm of Student Government, under the capable leadership of Mr. John Burke, exceeded the record of excellence maintained by proctors in recent years.

The Vice-President of Government, Dan Schilly, organized the proctors into two groups: cafeteria proctors, whose responsibility it was to maintain order and preserve cleanliness in the cafeteria and assembly proctors, whose duty it was to maintain appropriate decorum at assemblies ranging from study body Masses to pep rallies. Both group of proctors provided a valuable service to the school.

The Student Court, a branch of the Student Council and the judicial branch of Student Government, has as its responsibility to try cases presented to it by the proctors.

The Court, composed of appointee senior Chief Justice Jerry Hirlinger and two jurors elected from each division, hears the testimony of defendants and proctors who brought the case to court. After hearing the evidence, the court decides on the guilt or innocence of each defendant. If found guilty, the defendant is assigned a specific number of hours for which he must provide a service to Vianney.

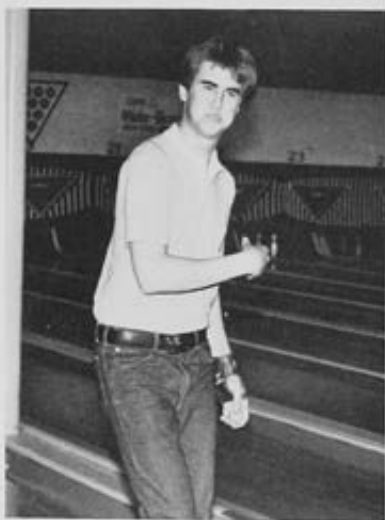

Mr. Peter Hesed, Vianney's second new director, molded this year's musical, "Camelot" into a stylish production that devastated the audi-

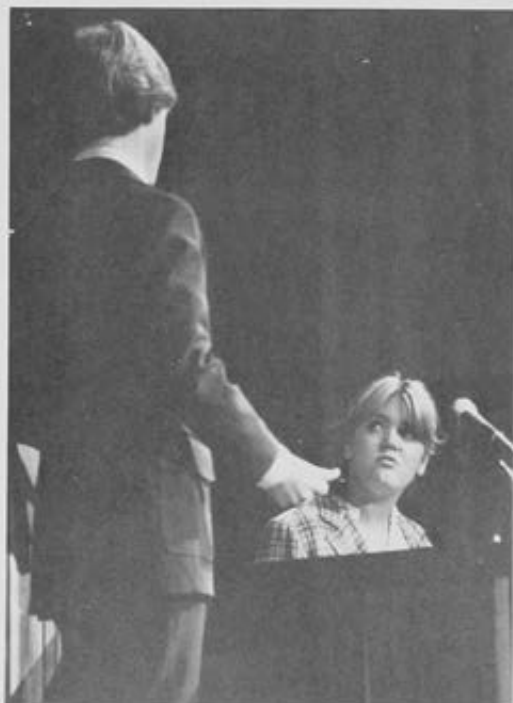

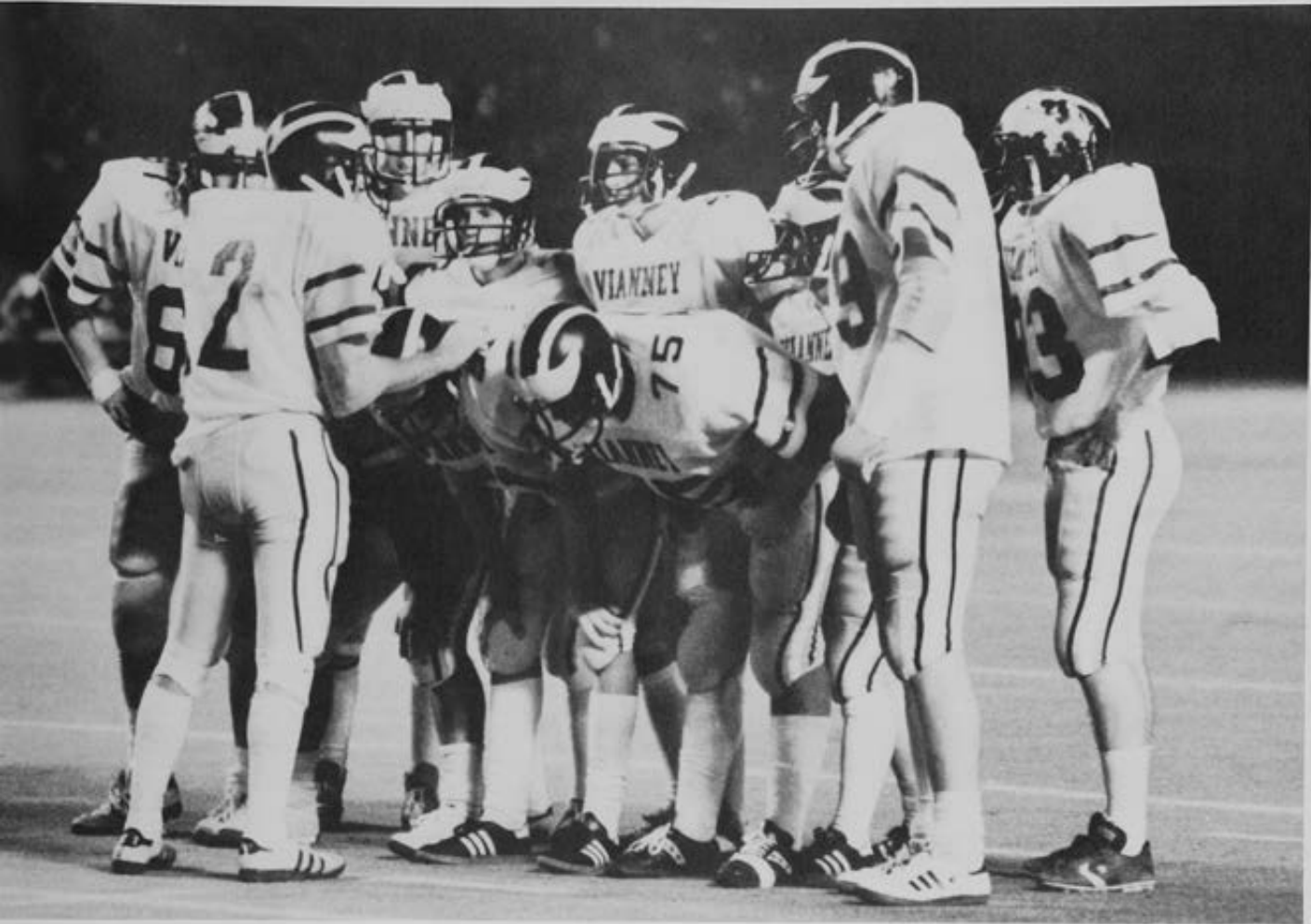

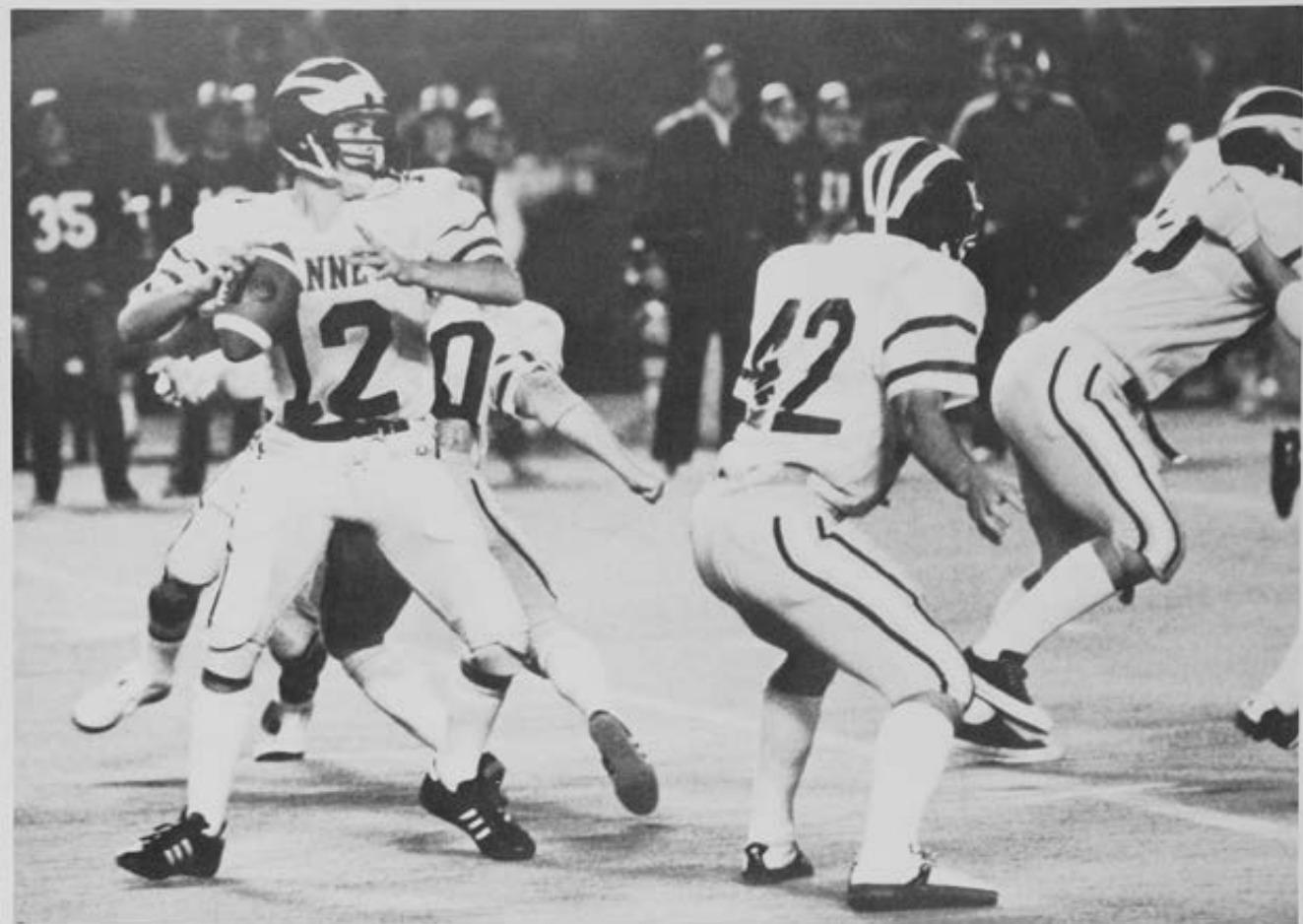

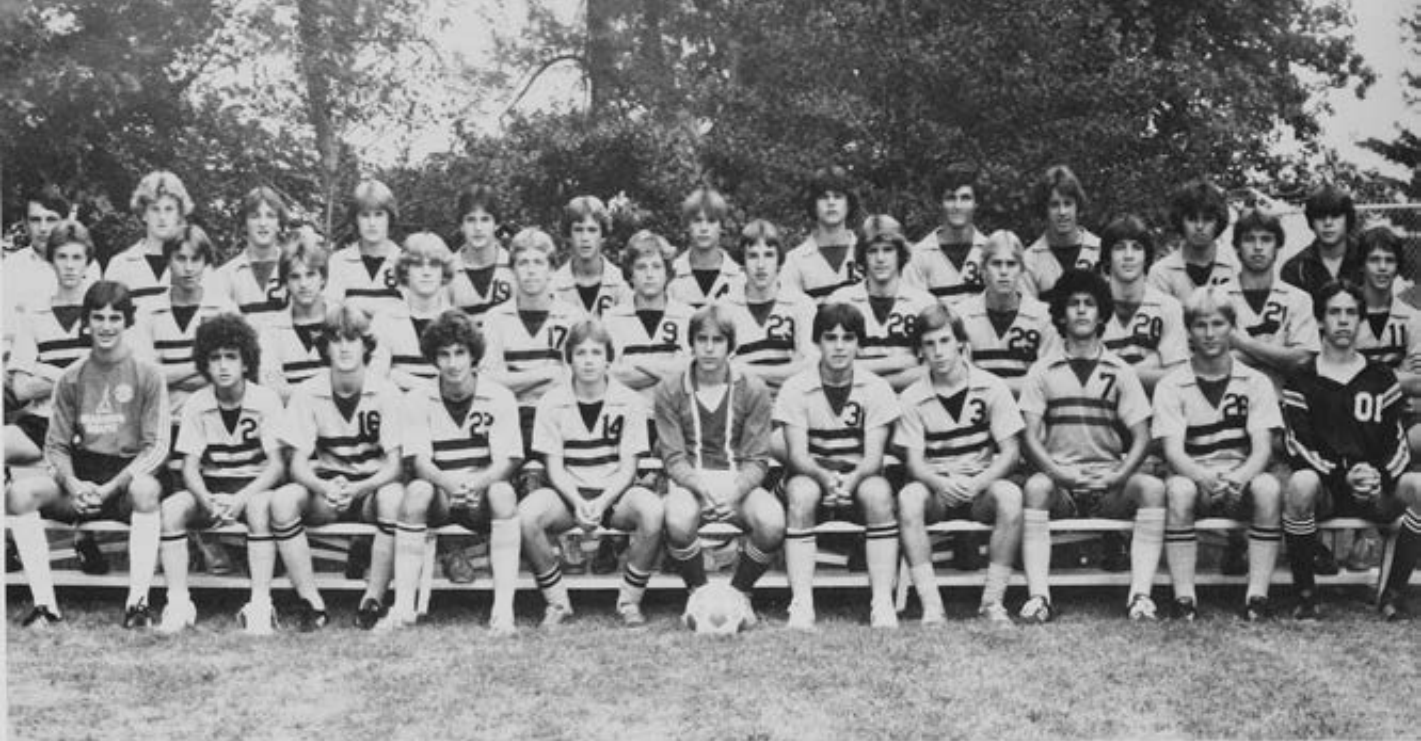

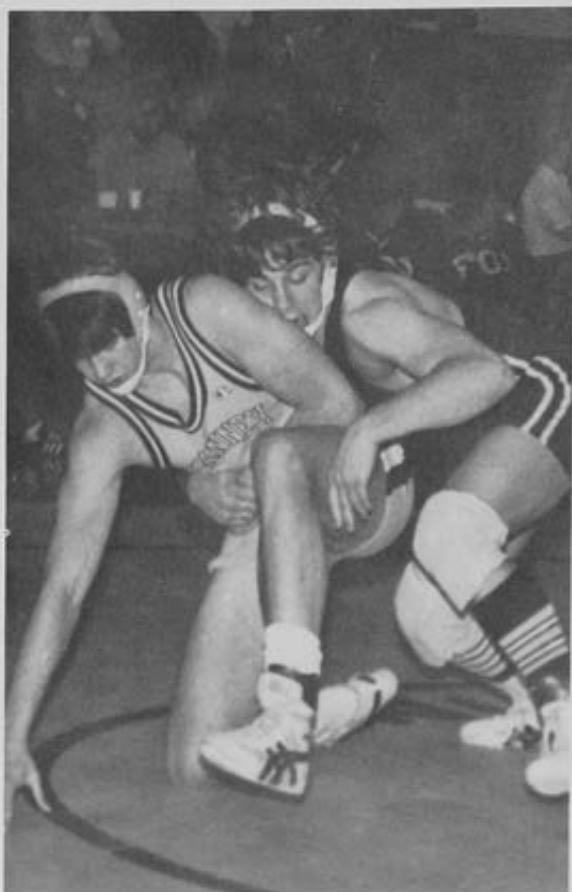

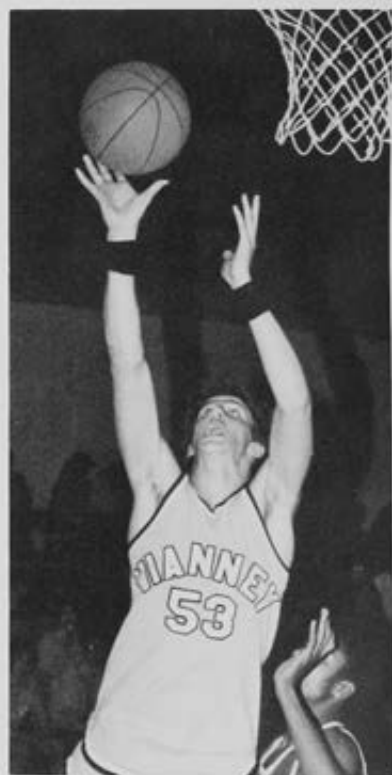

In the playoffs, the Griffins

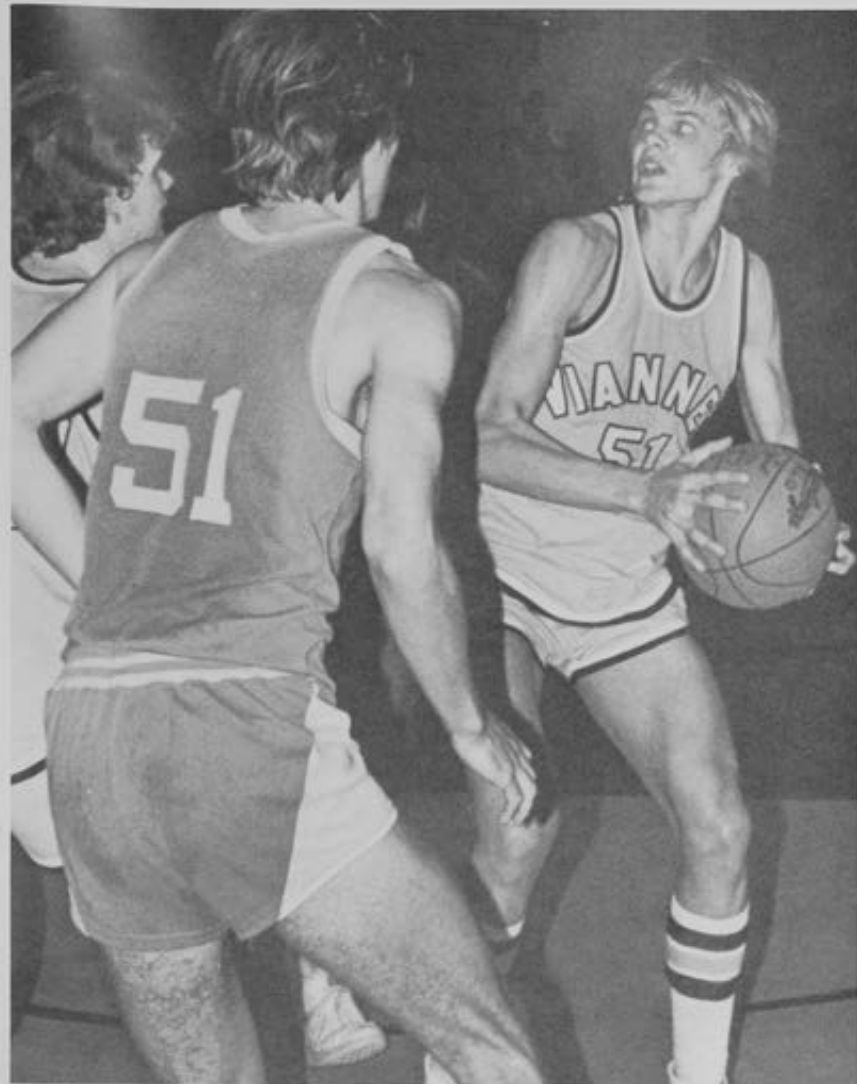

potent scoring attack.

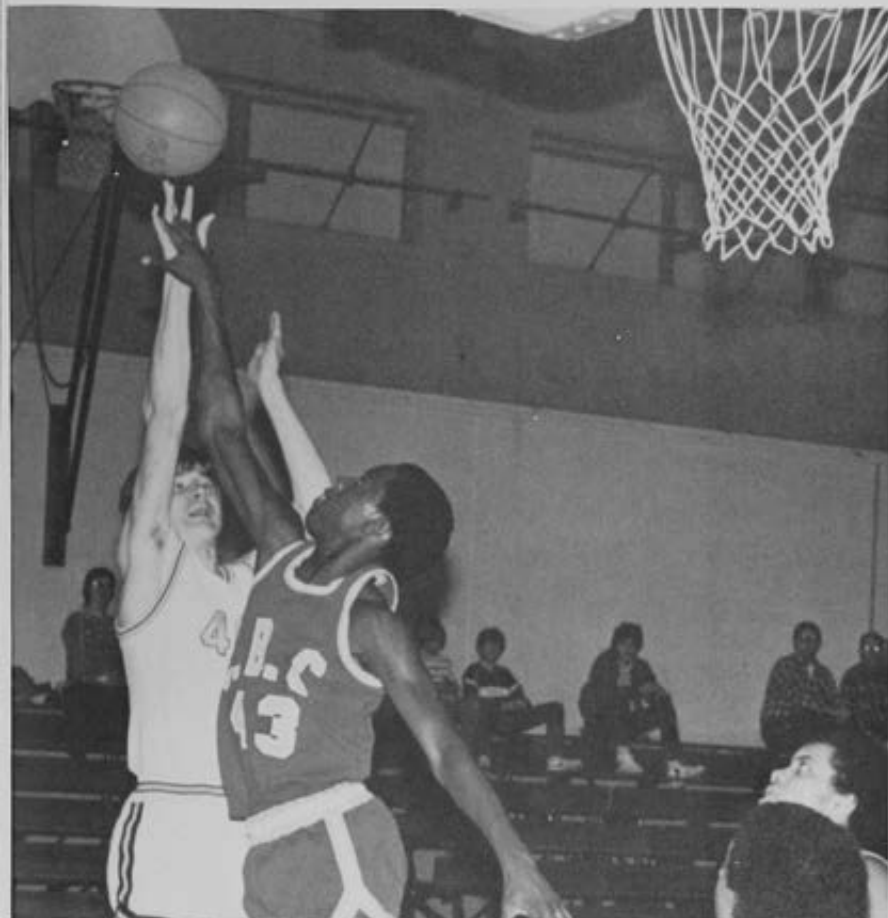

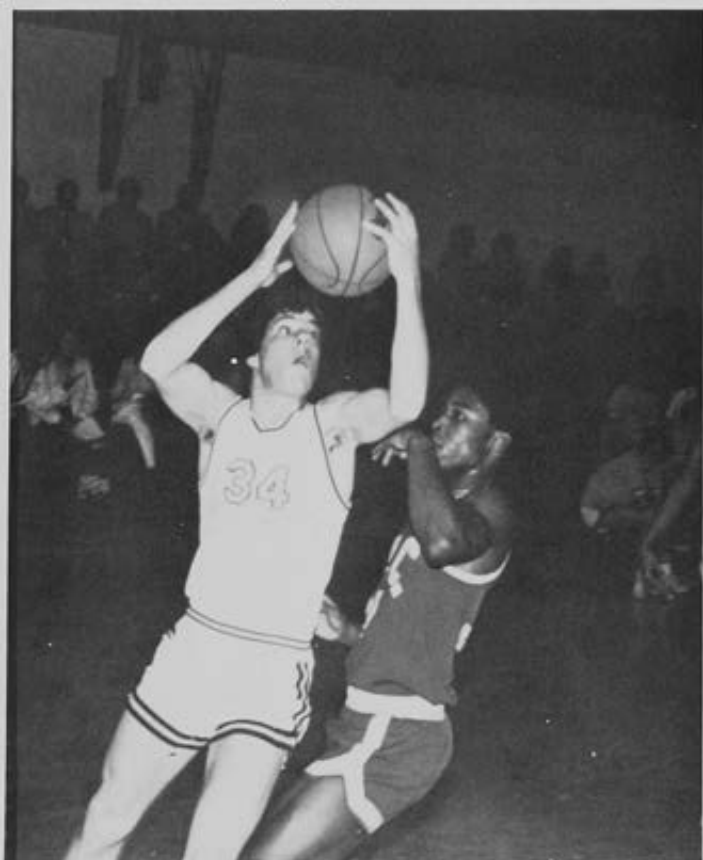

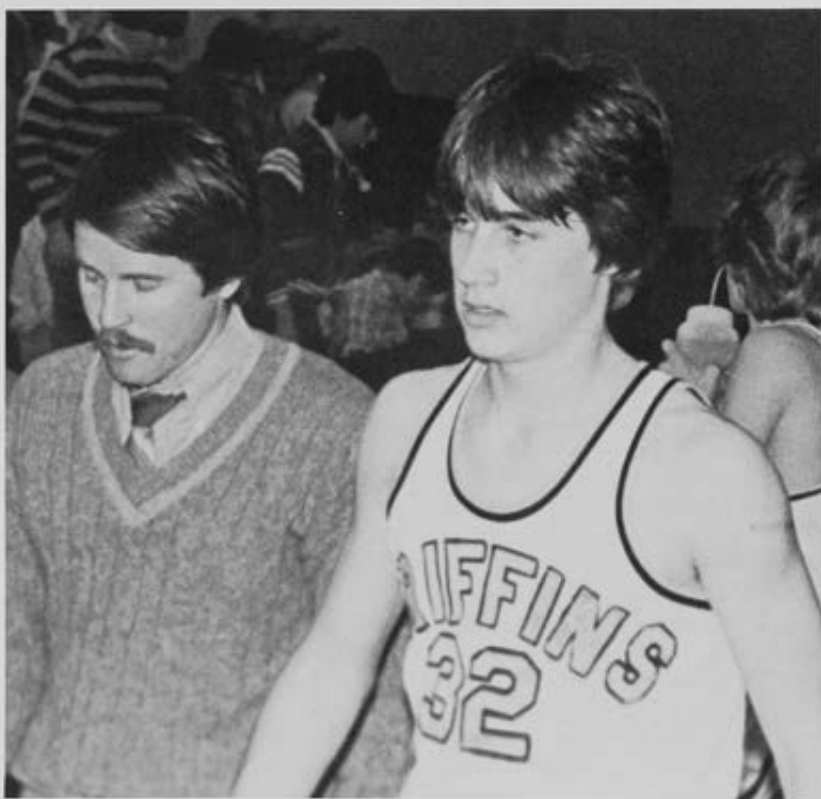

The team also sent Mike McCartney to State in the 400 meter run.

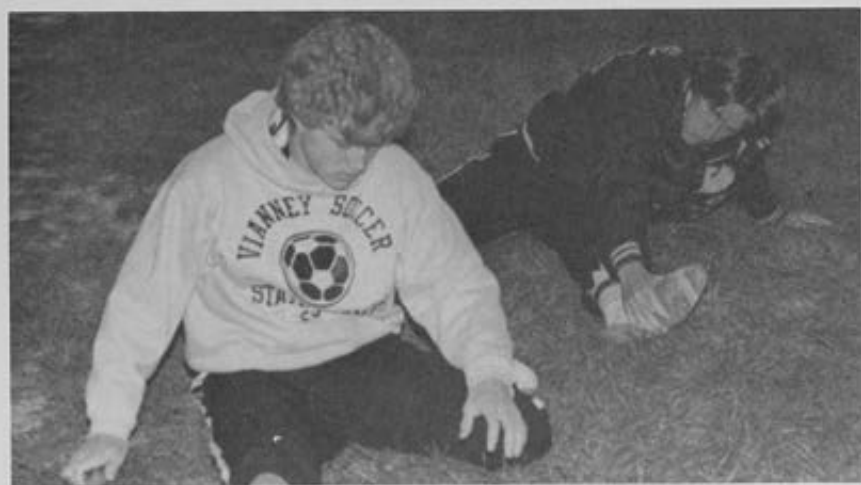

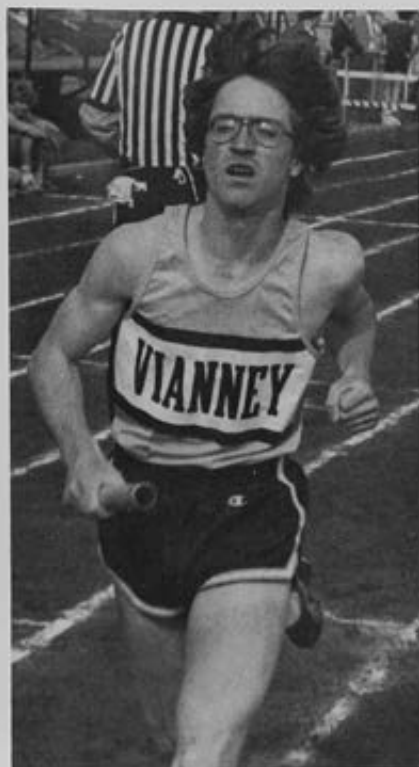
Bright Future: C-Track

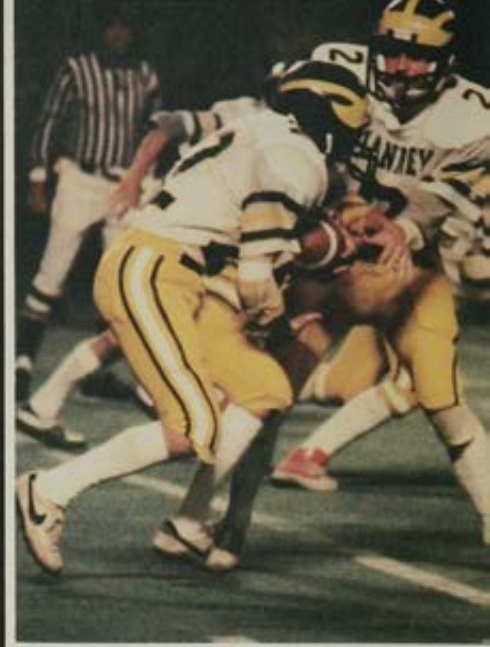
