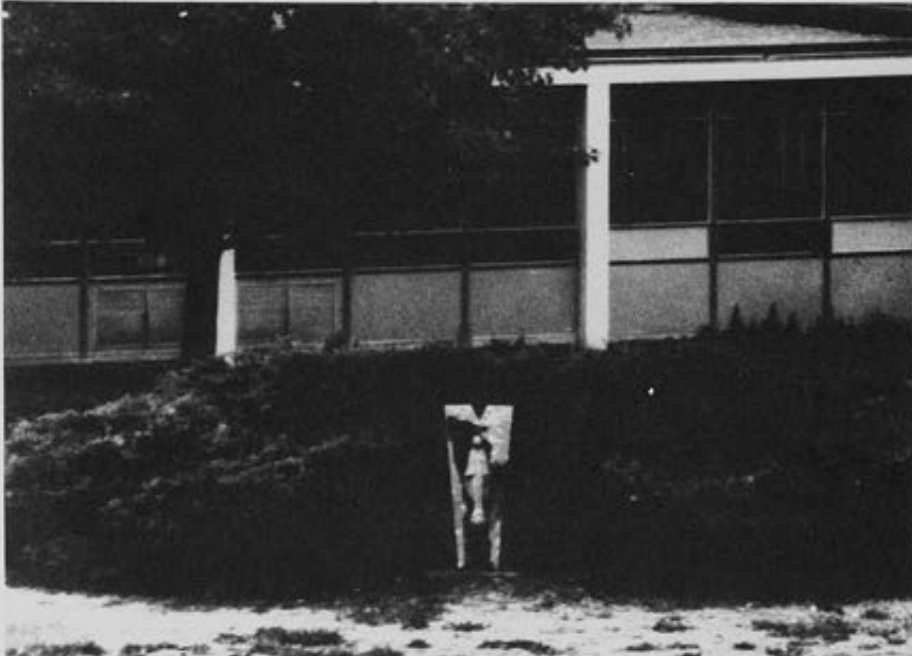

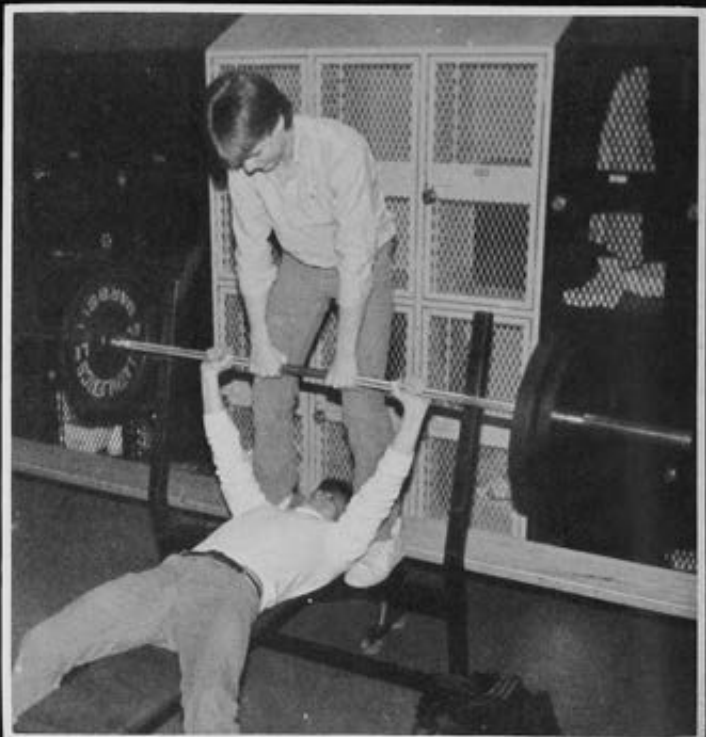

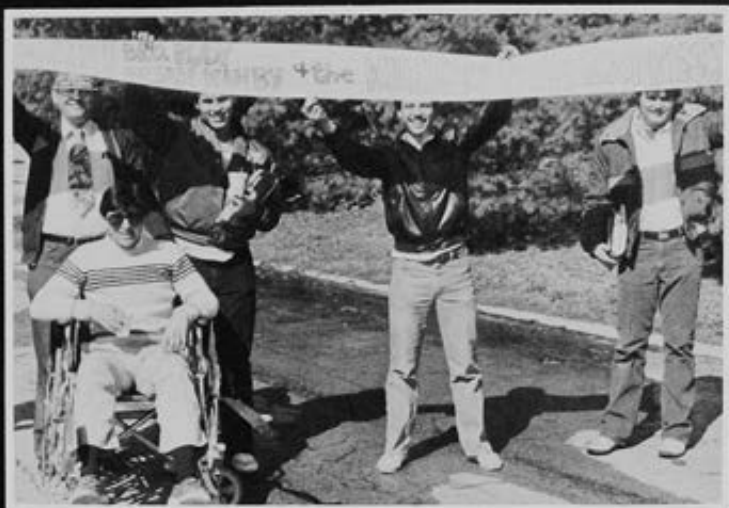

Doorbells and presents are always filled with surprises, perhaps because they both come wrapped in the unexpected. And when the doorbell is the occasion for a gift, the delight in our spirits often multiplies to such intensity that once again we thrill at the child within. This is one such story. However, I caution you that though it is a story about children, it will ask you to transform your innocence into courage.

The doorbell rang and as I opened the door, I found standing there an older lady, looking very much like one of the bag-ladies of State Street in Milwaukee. They carry all that they own in shopping bags and, for the most part, support themselves by asking for quarters and nickels and dime from passers-by. That person who came to my door was very much like such a bag-lady. She said to me, "Could I please talk to you?" In the back of my mind I thought I knew what it was she wanted to talk about — a quarter or a dollar or what she then needed. Nevertheless, I said, "Sure!" and invited her in to be seated.





"I would like to give you something," she began. "In fact there are two things I would like to give you." I thought such a comment to be rather inside-out for usually the bag-ladies come asking, yet this one came offering. "I would like to give to you a story," she continued, "but it is a very different kind of story for it goes back a long way. It happened before you were born, before our mothers and fathers were born. It happened a long, long time ago — I don't even remember the years anymore.

"In a land far, far away, there was a tucked-away village. There in the center of that village was a small table, and on that table there was always a loaf of bread. Yet no one ever ate of the bread; no one ever took the bread. for, you see, there were all kinds of stories which roamed about the village — stories of people who had taken the bread and had become slaves. Thus no one took the bread for fear of becoming a slave. Other stories told of people who had taken the bread and had disappeared. Thus no one took the bread for fear of being seen no more. Still other stories were told of people who had taken the bread and had died. Thus no one ever took the bread for fear that they too would die. No one ever remembered who it was who had taken the bread and had become a slave or had disappeared or had died, but they did remember the stories, and that was all that mattered.

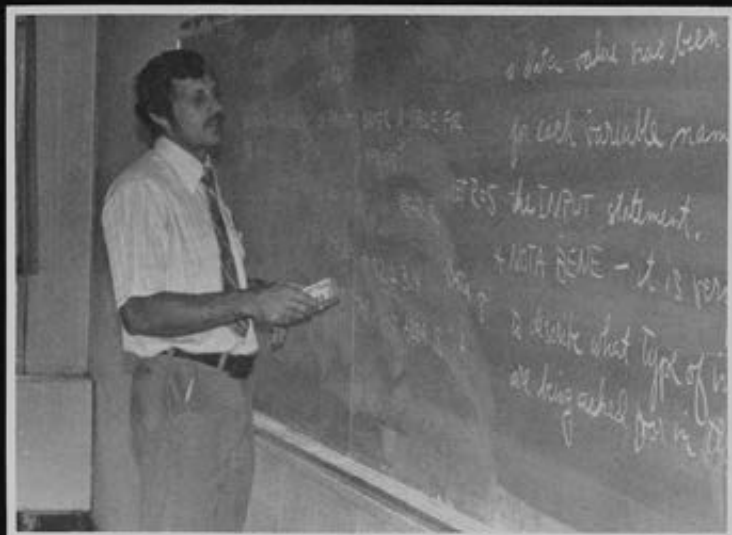


There was a ritual in this village that whenever a young boy or a young girl turned fourteen they would be brought to the table in the center of the village. There the elder of the village would stand opposite the youth with the table between them, and all of the other villagers would gather around. The elder would then ask the young boy or the young girl, 'Do you wish to take the bread?' Always out of fear of becoming a slave, or of disappearing, or of dying, the young boy or the young girls would say, 'No.' Three times the elder would ask of the young person, simply to make sure the question was clearly understood. Always the young person would answer three times, 'No.'

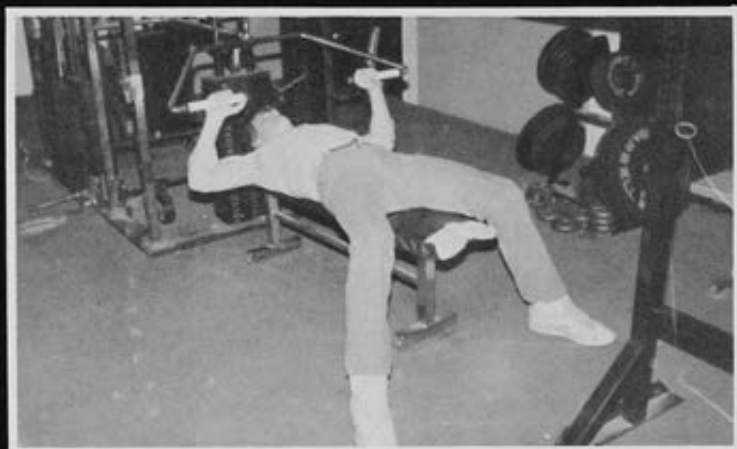
As the bag-lady went on, I thought to myself of how strange this story was. Yet a long time ago I discovered that when stories come from places you do not expect, they often bear truth within them.

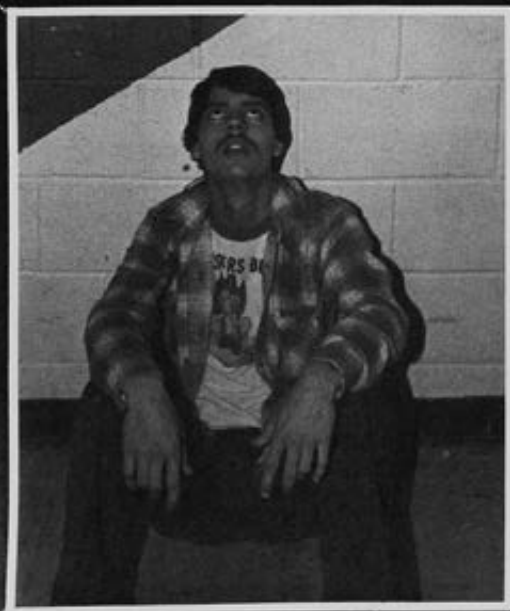
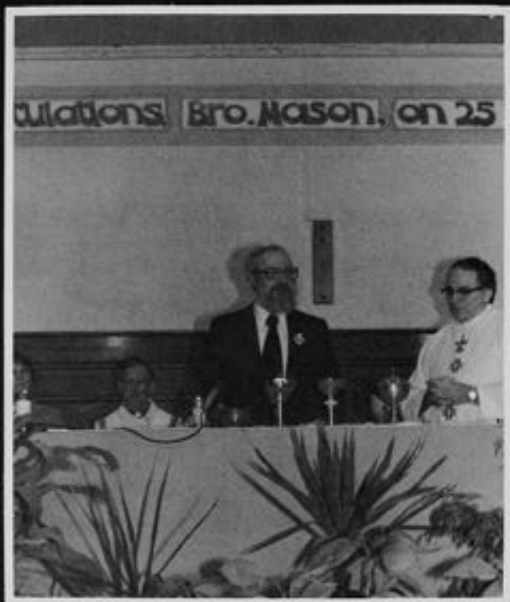
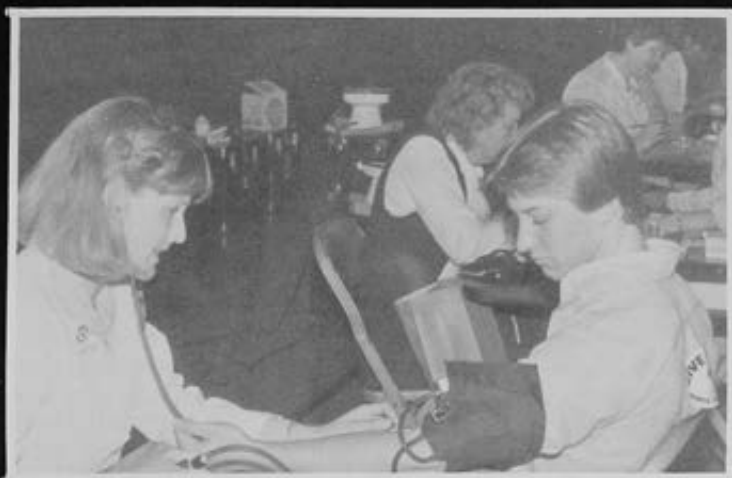


The bag-lady went on. "One day a young boy turned fourteen and was brought forth to the table in the center of the village. As prescribed by the ritual the elder stood opposite the young boy, and all of the people of the village gathered around. The elder looked at the young boy and asked, 'Do you wish to take the bread?' This time the young boy said, 'Yes' Then the elder inquired once more, 'Do you wish to take the bread? Again the boy replied, 'Yes'. One more time, having explained all of the different stories about slavery and disappearance and death, the elder asked, 'Do you wish to take the bread?' For the third time the boy said, 'Yes'. Then everyone in the village stepped back. The boy walked forward, and he took the bread in his hands.



"What happened in the days that followed," said the bag-lady, "is that the boy didn't become a slave. What did happen is that he began to go about doing all kinds of good for people, good that no one else would ever do for anyone. You might say that he became more of a servant, for anything that anyone would ask he would do. And he did disappear for a while. Not forever, but it seems that as the stories came back to the village, he was among the people telling them about a God who loved them so deeply that no matter what they would do, he would still love them. Then one day he did return. And you ask, 'Did he die?' Well, because the boy would do anything for anyone, and because he went about telling them about a God who loved them, and because it disturbed the people so much that they could not be what he invited them to be, one day they did kill him. Yet the word soon spread among the people that he still lived among them."





Then, suddenly, the bag-lady got up from her chair and walked out the door. I began to follow her, but she left quickly. As I came back inside bewildered, I noticed, then, that she had left her bag. Carrying the sack, I ran out the door and to the street, but there was no one out there. I looked up and down the street, unable to understand how someone could disappear so quickly. Then, holding her bag, I walked back inside thinking about her story and about the boy who once took the bread. Not knowing what was in her bag and without even looking, I reached in to see what it was she had left. Suddenly I was frightened, for I found bread in the bag and realized then that I too had now taken the bread. I began to wonder if I would become a slave, if I would disappear to be seen no more, or if I too would soon die. In the end it crossed my mind that perhaps this was the bag-lady's second gift. I could not help but wonder if perhaps she and that young boy of fourteen were the same person.

One day soon, before a week of days had passed, someone will come to you and offer you bread. Then you too will have to decide whether or not you will take the bread. In the moment remember the story of the bag-lady and remember, too, how we are asked to die each day for one another. Above all else, however, when someone comes and offers you bread, consider for a moment what life would be if no one ever took the bread. Then, having considered such a possibility — decide and choose.

BROTHER HAUG: A REAL LIFE JOLLY GENTLEMAN



All of his life, Brother Francis Haug has been active in the areas of athletics and academics, achieving excellence in both. He has touched many of our lives, and the lives of our families and friends. In gratitude for his service, we therefore dedicate the 1984 Talon to Brother Francis Haug.

Born in 1924 in St. Edward's Parish on the North Side of St. Louis, Brother Haug was the 10th of 12 children. He attended grade school at St. Edwards, where he played on many sports teams with older boys and also was a bat boy for some excellent baseball teams composed of some former and future minor and major leaguers.

After graduating from St. Edwards, Brother Francis then went on to McBride High, where along with his brother, John, and future brother-in-law, Ray Obie, they won the State Basketball Championship.

In 1940, Brother Haug started to study for the brotherhood here on the grounds of Vianney. At the same time,

Brother's American Legion baseball team started on the road to the national finals in North Carolina. The team finally ended up third in the country.

After high school, Brother Francis went to Dayton University to receive his undergraduate degree, to the University of Notre Dame for his Masters degree in English, and St. Louis University and Loyola of Chicago for graduate courses in school administration.

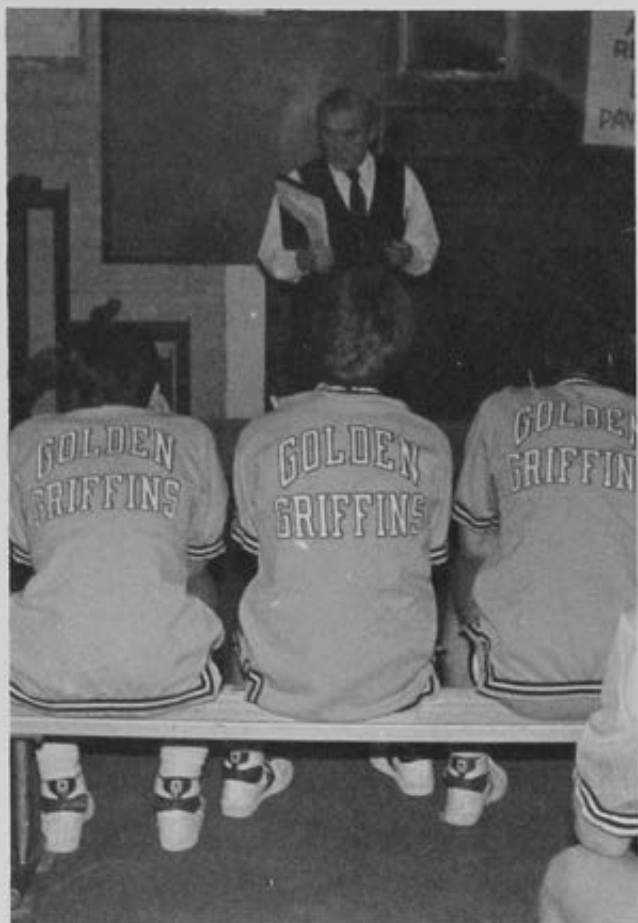
Brother Francis began his first teaching job at Northside Catholic High in 1944. The long list of schools where Brother Haug has taught includes: Coyle High in Kirkwood, where Brother taught several Vianney dads. McBride High from 1964-66, where he was the Superior of Religious Community, and St. Mary's High, where Brother Haug was Principal from 1966-72 before coming to Vianney.

Brother Francis' different duties have varied from principal, English teacher, math teacher, and religion

teacher, to football, basketball, baseball, and tennis coach. Here at Vianney, Brother Haug is presently teaching math to freshmen and sophomores, coaching B-Basketball, and coaching tennis on both the Varsity and JV levels. This in itself is a busy schedule of five courses and seven months of coaching, but Brother Francis says that it is hardly comparable to when one year he taught six courses in Religion, math, and English, was assistant principal, head of the English Department, and coached three sports.

Showing no signs of letting up the pace, Brother Francis still enjoys sports; mainly tennis, golf, and bowling. He enjoys reading, music, theatre, cards, watching old Barney Miller reruns or classic westerns on television, and watching high school athletes in action.

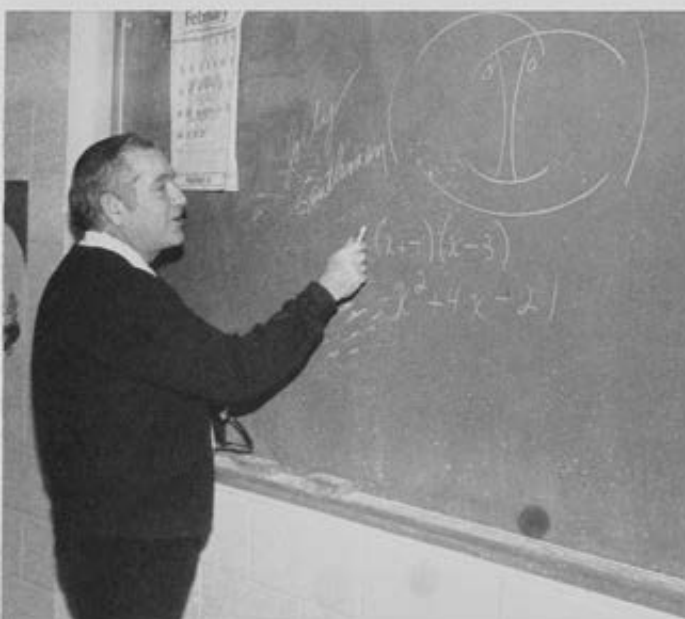

NICK JOHN LEADS COURT

The Student Court and Proctor system is a very unique part of the student government. It is a method by which the students themselves take responsibility for keeping discipline at school. The majority of those making up the Court and Proctors are seniors.

Throughout the year, the proctors have proven to be very effective at keeping the students under control. Whether it be in the cafeteria, the gym, or even in the parking lot, senior proctors could be found giving tickets to rule-breakers.

Most students, however, did not agree with the accusations made against them so they brought their case to Court.

The Student Court consists of eight jurors; two seniors, two juniors, two sophomores, and two freshmen, each elected by their fellow classmates. Anyone receiving a ticket has the opportunity to plead their case before the jury. The jury then votes and the majority determines whether the person will be acquitted or not. The Chief Justice determines the work sentence for those found guilty.

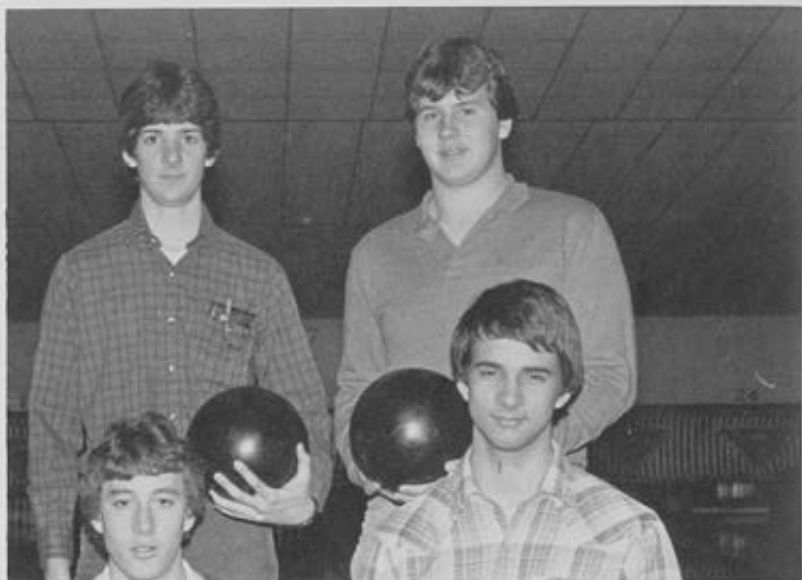

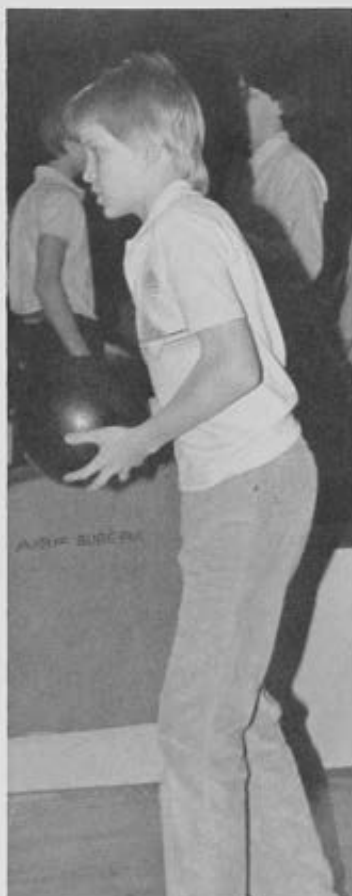

Ron Watermon, a junior, is starting to follow in the footsteps of Ron Lamb, the state champion Radio Speaker from Vianney. Ron took sec-

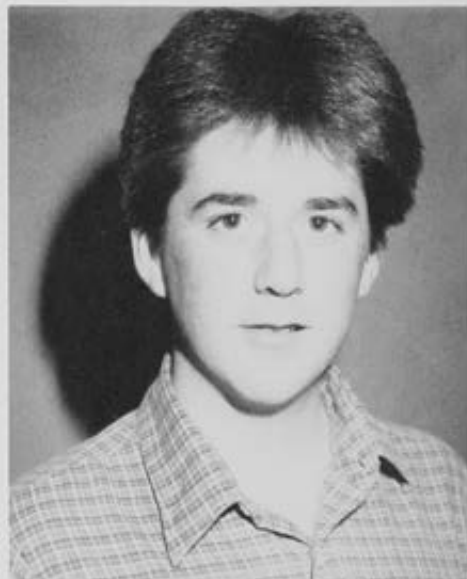
ond at Parkway South in Radio Speaking along with several firsts and seconds in the GSL competition. Ron also placed sixth in Districts Radio.

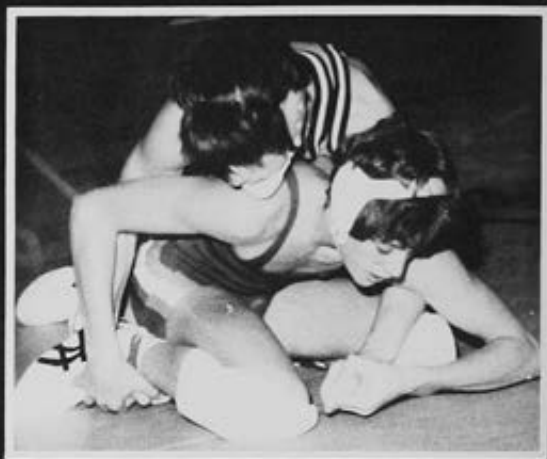

The '83-'84 Vianney Wrestling Team proved to be the team which pivoted the Vianney wrestling program to respectability. It is true that the Vianney Wrestling programs of the past have not been extremely competitive, but this season the Griffins could honestly say that they could compete with anyone in the state. Of course the 4-6 dual meet record is not very astonishing. However, Vianney lost some of its meets by only one match. A good wrestling season is not determined by the regular season accomplishments, but rather by the successes during the Districts, Regional, and State Championships. 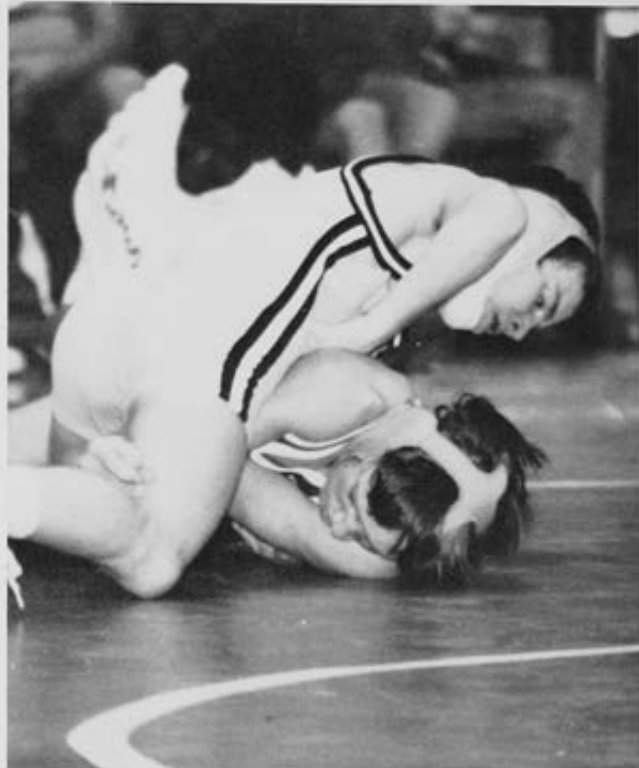
the Regional meet, five wrestlers from Vianney won their matches and qualified for the State tournament. This is the most that Vianney has ever sent to the tournament.

Most of the team's success came from a group of hard working serious seniors. Scott Barnhart and John Schmit each wrestled fairly well during the regular season and came on very strong at the end. Both were champions of the District tournament and qualified for state. Scott Crawford was hampered by an injury for most of the season but still placed in many of the season's tournaments. Seniors Nick John and Tony Kramer were probably the most outstanding wrestlers on the team with Nick winning 25 matches and Tony winning 28 matches, tying the school record. Each of them won medals in every tournament during the season and also qualified for the State tournament. However, Tony went

even beyond qualifying for the tournament and wrestled his way into fourth place. This is an accomplishment that only one other wrestler in the history of Vianney had bettered. The team had another wrestler, Keith Canova, who was perhaps as valuable as Kramer. He was not necessarily the best wrestler on the team but he was a true leader. 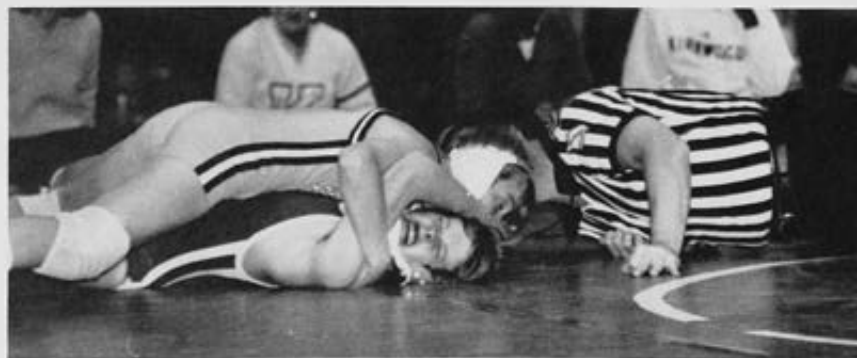
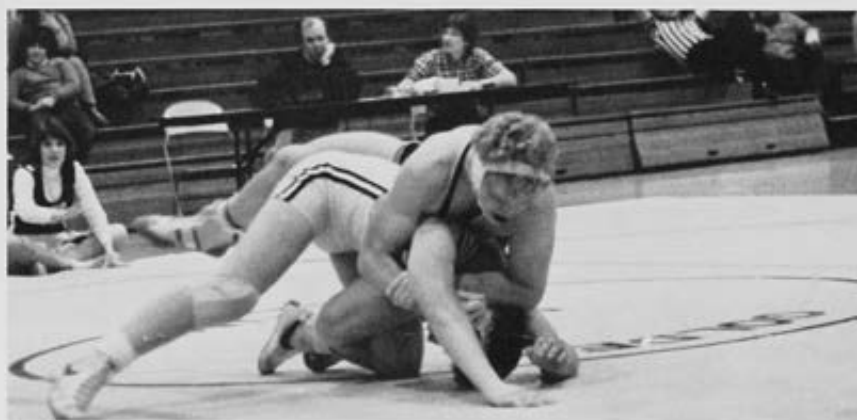

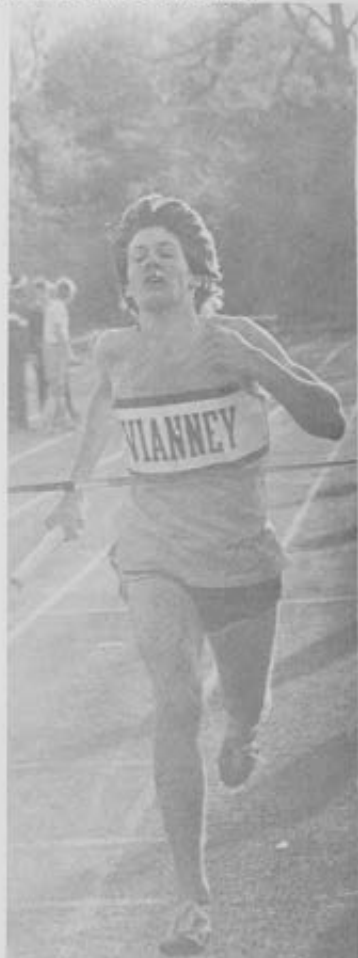

The announcement of awards proceeded the entrance of the Seniors. They were lead by Grand Marshall, Bro. Leonard Rudy.

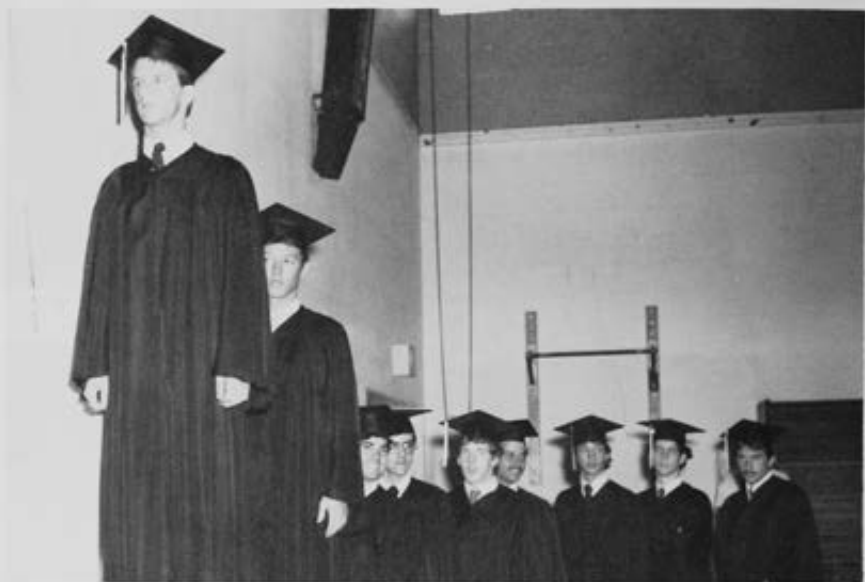
Since this was Bro. Rudy's last year, the senior class felt it was appropriate to have Bro. Rudy as the Grand Marshall.

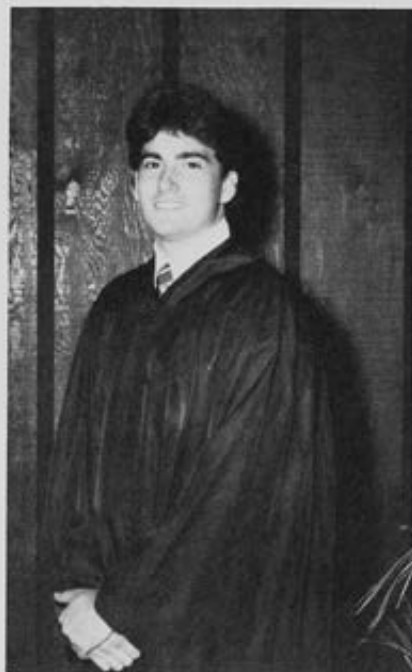
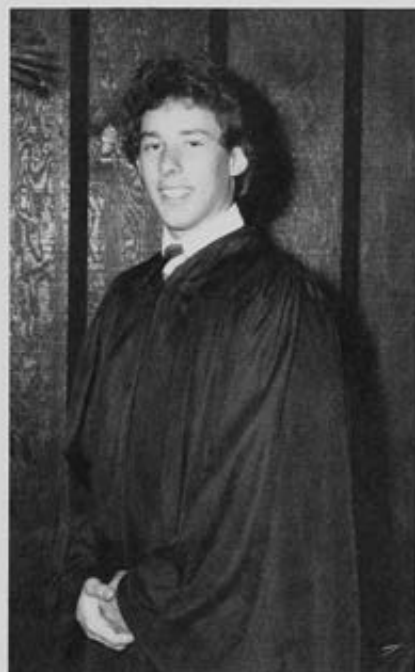
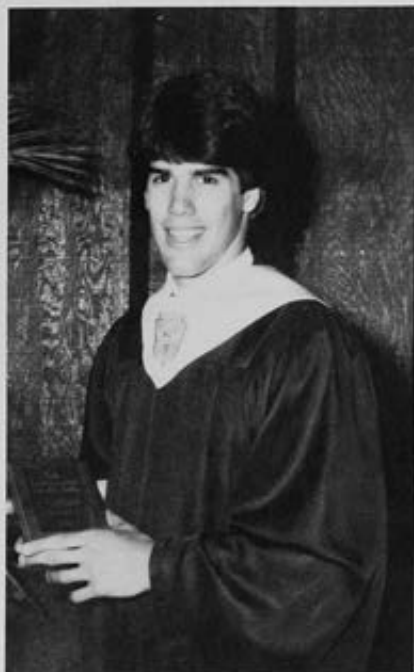
