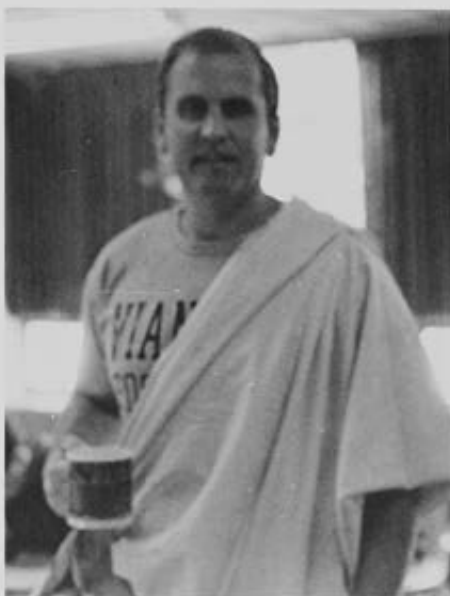

WOODEN BRIDGES ARE FALLING DOWN

On February 20th, Mr. Farrell's annual Craft Stick Bridge Building Contest was held in the gym. Those who attended saw senior Brian Oetjen win the contest when his bridge held 70 pounds before finally breaking. Senior Matt Foster took second with 40 pounds and senior Andy Kranjec was third with 35 pounds. The record is 155 pounds, set by Bill Deckelman in 1989. Mr. Farrell attributed the large difference to the different specifications for each year's contest.

A bridge entered in the contest had to be between 34 and 36 inches long, and could not exceed 150 grams in weight. Craft sticks and glue were the only materials allowed in the construction of the bridges. The weight had to be suspended within 1 1/2 inches from the center of the span.

But why have the students build the bridges? To find the answer to this burning question, the Talon Staff talked to Mr. Farrell. He said, "One thing I'm looking for is whether the bridge has an impressive design or not. Mr. Farrell also gave some advice to all those who will one day compete in this contest. "The most common mistake my students make is that they look at their bridges two dimensionally on paper. When they build the bridge, there is not enough interior support, and the bridge collapses."

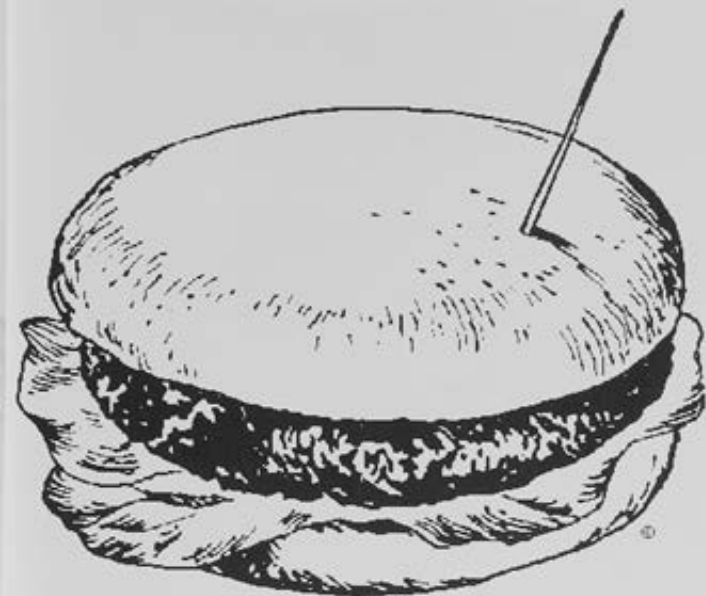

VIANNEY SOCCER HAS RECORD BREAKING YEAR

The varsity soccer team ended the 1991 season with the most wins in Vianney history. Their record was 28-1-1. They dominated every team they played, outscoring their opponents 102 to 24 and had 13 shutouts. They won three major tournaments-the CBC Tournament, the CYC Tournament and the Granite City Tournament. On their way to State, the Griffins beat Webster Groves 6-1 in the district finals, Oakville 6-0 in the sectionals, SLUH 2-0 in the quarterfinals and Springfield Glendale 5-1 in the semifinal match. The championship game ended a 0-0 tie as Vianney and DeSmet battled scoreless through the end of regulation play and four sudden-death overtimes. The teams were declared "State Co-Champions." This brought to Vianney an unprecedented sixth state title-more than any other Class 4A school in Missouri.

The team gained much recognition throughout the season. Vianney was ranked number one in the area by the coaches' polls in both the *Post-Dispatch* and the *Journal* from their second game of the season through the state playoffs. They were honored as KMOX "Team of the Week" and three members of the team were named "Athlete of the Week." They were Cliff Politte, Josh Klimek and Jerry Mercurio. Kirk Vidra also earned the "Most Valuable Player Award" at the Granite City Tournament.

The Griffins high scoring offense was led by Josh Klimek (20 goals, 19 assists), Jerry Mercurio (13 goals, 8 assists), Jeff Yenzer (12 goals, 7 assists), Cliff Politte (10 goals, 8 assists) and Matt Touhy (8 goals, 7 assists). Their great defensive playing was led by Kirk Vidra, Joe Cernich, Bill Weckback, Mike Montana, Phil Schroeder and goalie Jeff Hulsey (13 shutouts).

Coach Villa recognized the team's efforts during the season. He said, "It was a great season. We narrowly missed being undefeated with a tremendous effort against many very good teams."

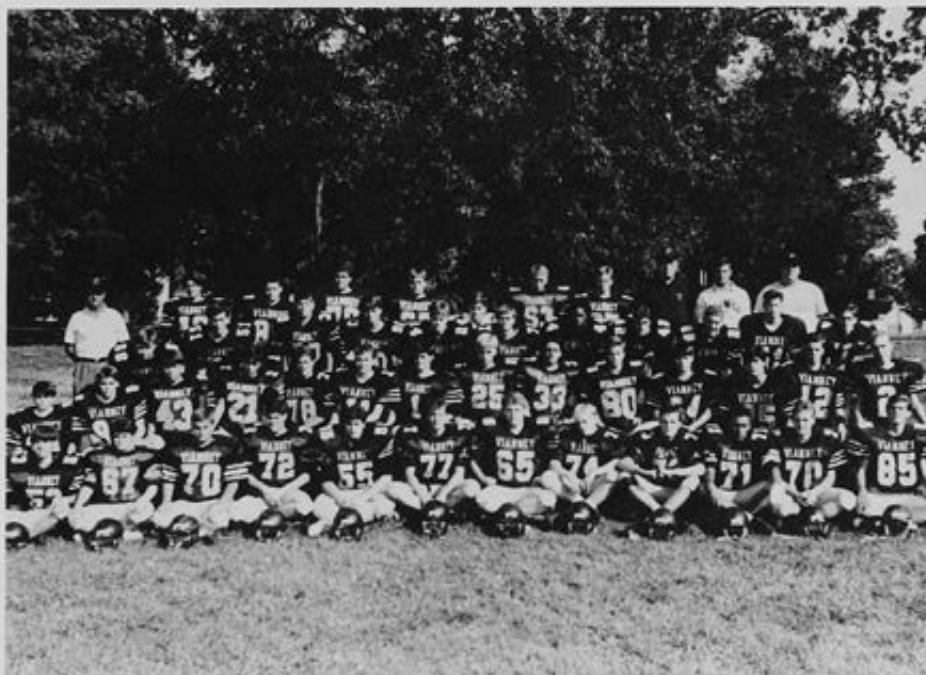

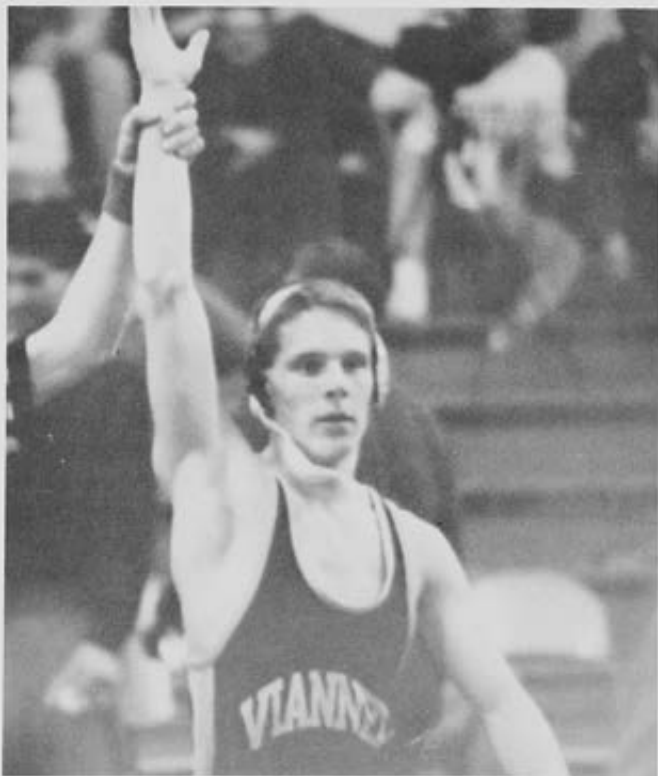
Vianney Hockey also had a strong 1991-92 season. The Junior Varsity team had a wonderful record of 27 wins.

Varsity Basketball 1991-92

Varsity Hoops Post Best School Record Since 1971 With 24-5

The 91-92 Griffin hoopsters ended their season with a 24-5 record, the best in Vianney history, and earned respect for the program by going further into the playoffs than Vianney ever has. Under coaches Jerry Boeckman and Bill Young, the Griffins made it all the way to the quarterfinals of the state tourney.

The road to the quarterfinals was no "cakewalk" for the roundballers. The team was seeded first going into district play and was matched up against Lindbergh. The game was fast paced with lots of breakaways. The Griffins played well on offense and defense and won by a large margin.

Next was the district title game. At the beginning of the season, the team set a goal to win the district championship, and now they had their chance against Mehlville, who had both beaten and lost to Vianney during the season. The game was close all the way to the end.

What about the end? If you missed it, you missed one of the greatest finishes in Vianney athletics. Picture this: the game was tied with seconds to play - star forward Dave Wors drives down court. He crosses midcourt, shifts right, pulls up at three point range and poises to shoot. But at the last second, he spots the second half of the "Dynamic Duo" -- Mark McGuire -- standing wide open under the basket. Wors fires a pass cross court with two seconds left, and McGuire viciously kills Mehlville's hopes of victory with a resounding slam dunk. The Vianney crowd swarmed the players as the hoopsters were headed to sectionals. McGuire said, "It was a great pass from Dave [Wors] and it was exciting when the crowd surrounded me."

The Ladue Rams were standing in the way of Vianney's first sectional win. Ladue was on a roll, winning their last 17 games and looking to avenge an early season loss to the Griffins in the Meramec Tourney. Vianney came out hot, hitting three 3-pointers in a row to jump to a 20 point lead in the first quarter, but Ladue didn't give up. Storming back with a pressure defense, they cut the Griffins lead to 3 at the half. During halftime, a verbal whipping by Coach Rhame fired up the team. Mark McGuire also made a decision -- He wasn't going to lose. McGuire, making steals, running the court, and playing superbly in the paint, took control of the game and proved that the Griffins were too much for Ladue to handle.

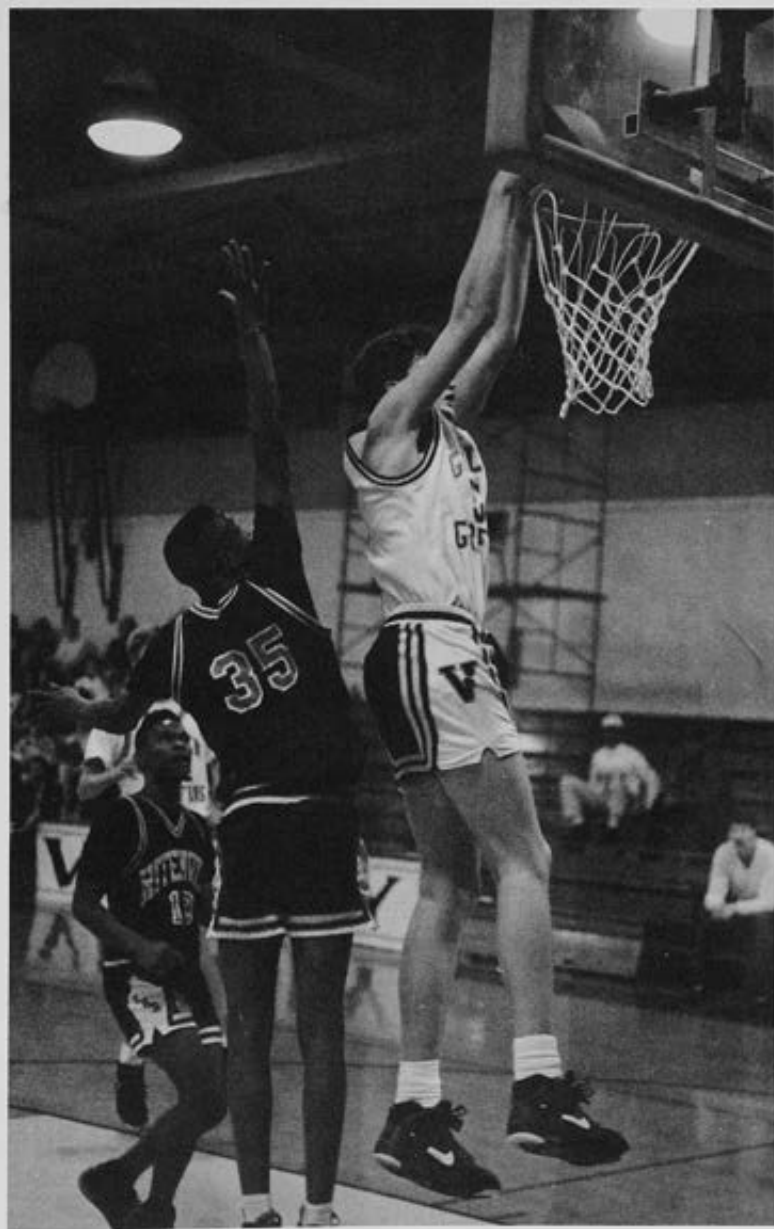

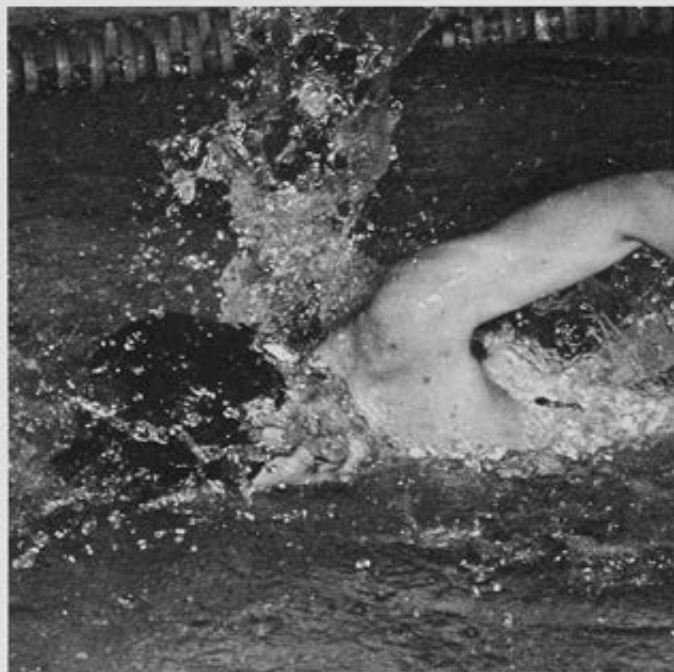

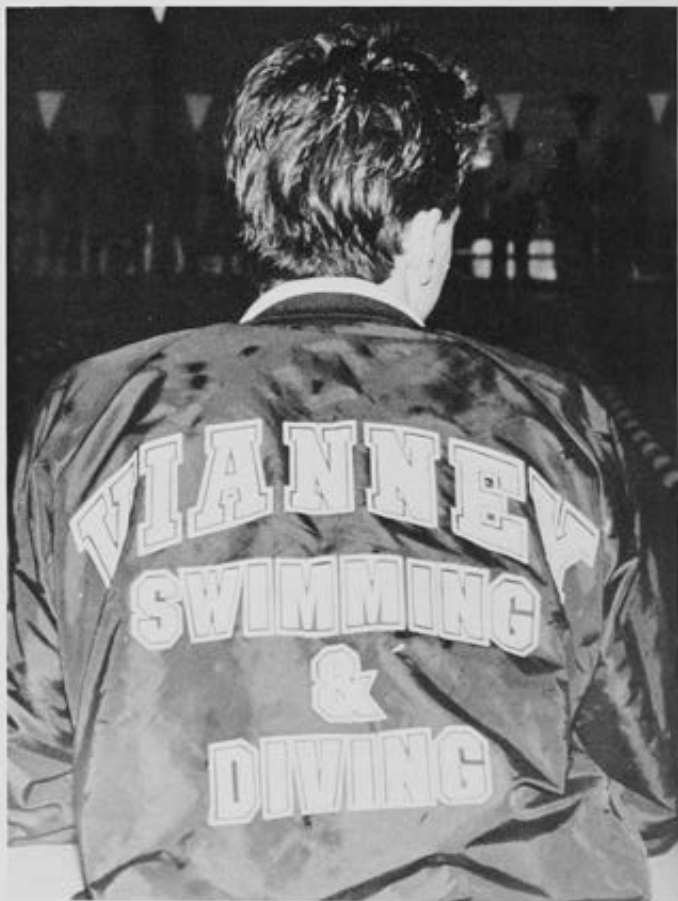

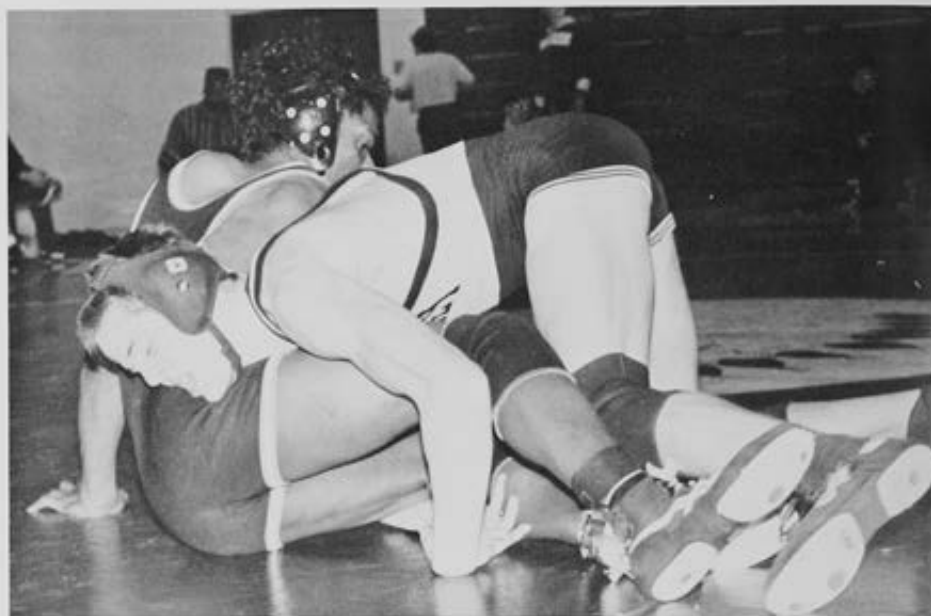


Coach Corbin watches the clock intensely as his swimmers return.

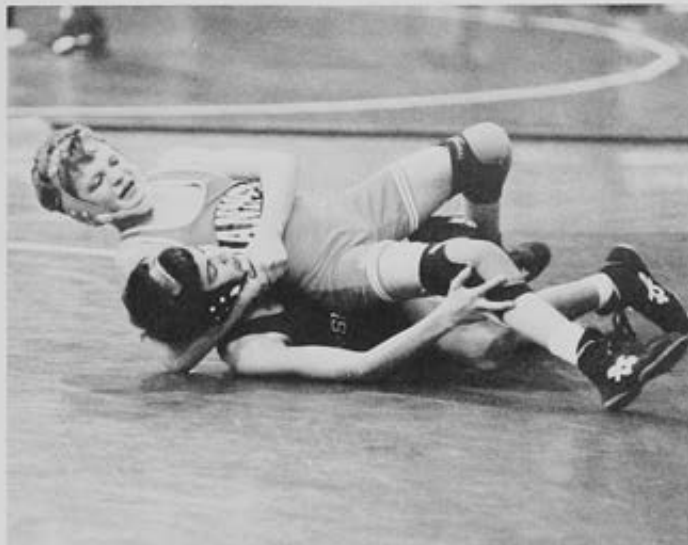

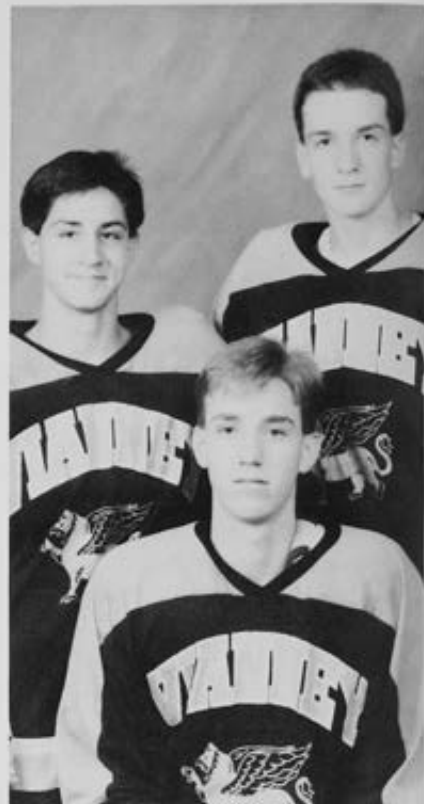

An Awesome Season

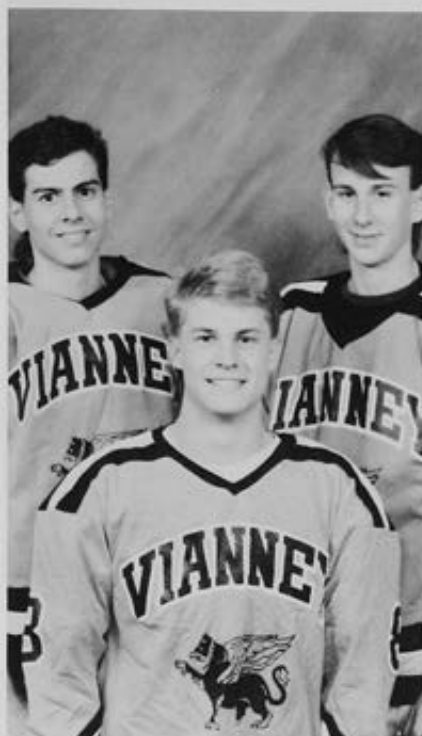
Vianney's Varsity hockey club was strong this year ending their season with a record of 12-8-1. This put the hockey squad over .500 for the season.

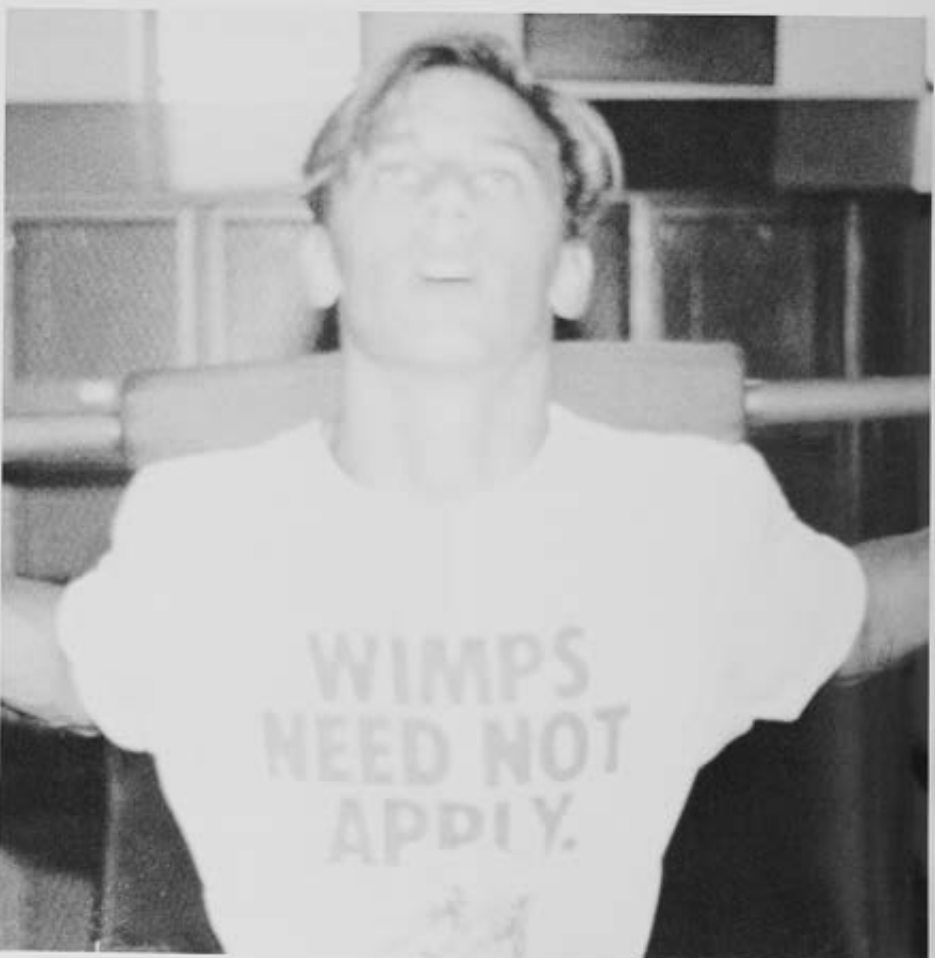

Bigger, Faster, Stronger.

"The success of our teams will depend upon how dedicated we are on the practice field and in the weightroom." Those words were spoken earlier this year by Coach Don Heeb while speaking of the importance of strength training. Last year a new weight program was instituted at Vianney which is designed to make our athletes more competitive on the playing field. This program is known as the Bigger, Faster, Stronger Strength Program.

The workout consists of specific core lifts such as parallel squats, box squats, dead lifts, towel benches, and cleans. These exercises are done Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. These exercises fundamentally develop the overall strength of the athletes. On Tuesdays and Thursdays, an emphasis is placed on developing speed and agility. These aims are met by a rigorous workout of plyometrics.

The athletic department adopted this new program for reasons which might be explained in the near future. According to one Vianney athlete, "Maybe all the sports teams will soon adopt this program and find its athletes more capable of enduring long injury-free seasons." With the brand new weight training facilities such as squat racks, benches, and lat machines, the Bigger, Faster, Stronger Program is off to a tremendous start.

This new program may seem like a system lacking in amusement but this is very false. During strength training time, the coaching staff performs its own comedy hour in the weight room. Top billing goes to Coach Rhame and Coach Baur, who offer new dimensions in stand-up comedy and the art of needling freshmen. Without Coach Rhame, Vianney would lose important housekeeping tips on the proper organization of a weightroom facility.

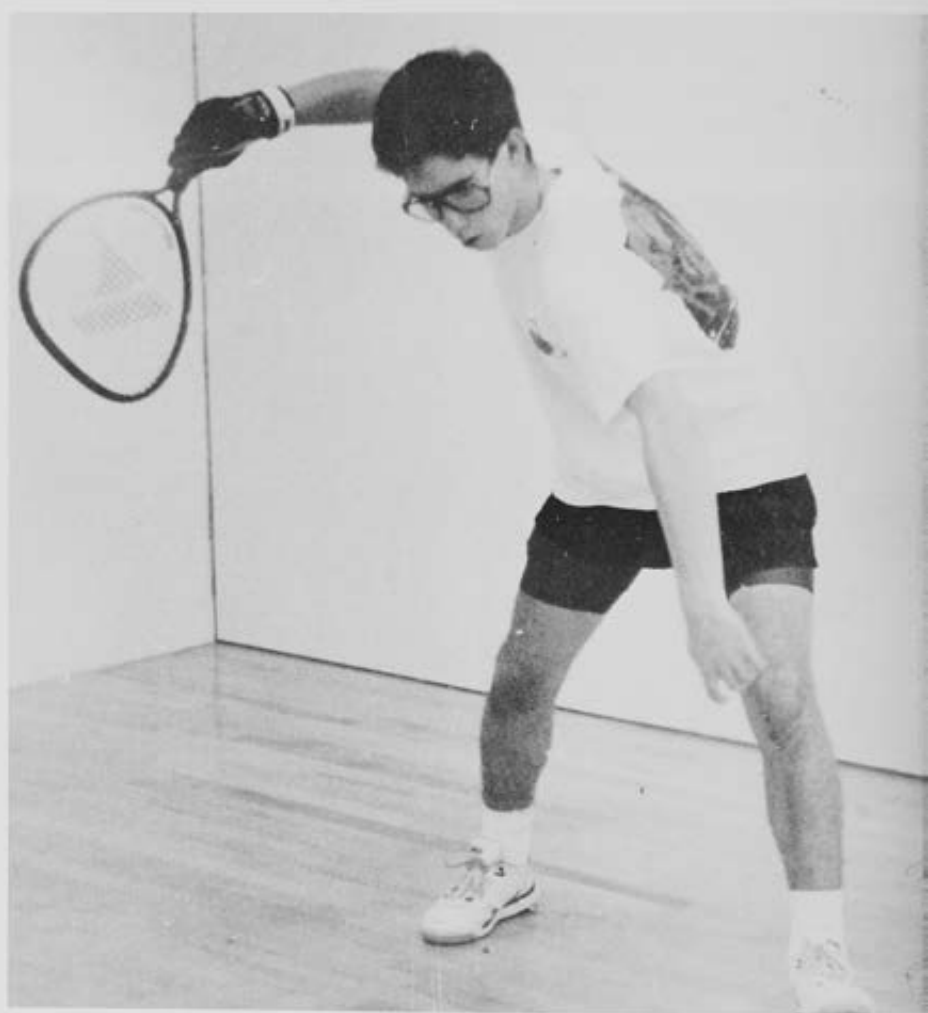

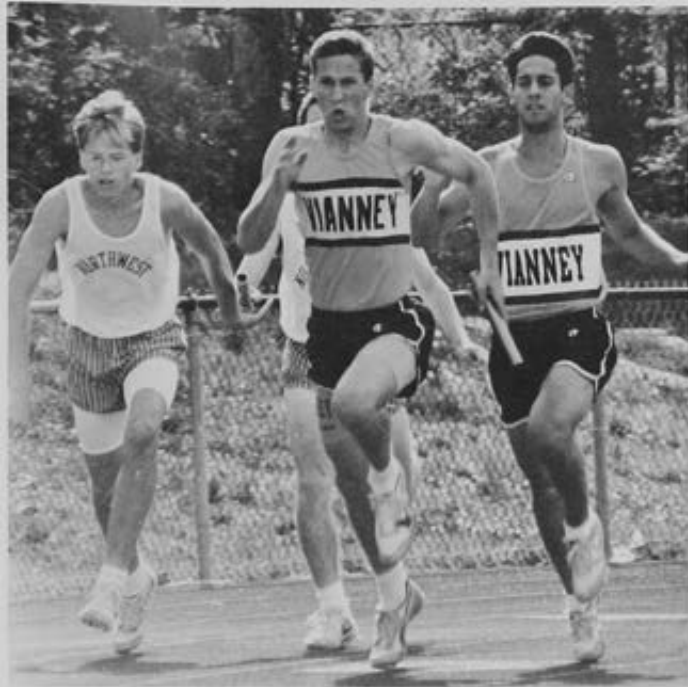

Coach Stevison commented, "This was the first year we had as many athletes (six) get out of Districts and reach Sectionals." Qualifying for Sectionals this season were Andy Metherd and Brian Kloepper in the pole vault, Scott Meis and Jeff Yenzer in the long jump, and Derek Don de' Ville and Pete Kohlberg in the shot put and discus, respectively.

In 1992 the Vianney Volleyball team started with only four returning players from the undefeated 1991 State Champion team. Of the four returning players, Scott Mebruer, Tom Cella, Jeff Gilsinn, and Chris Hensley, Scott was the only starter. The team also missed the pre-season Kirkwood tournament due to the late start caused by the extended basketball season. Regardless, the team once again had an incredible season bringing home yet another state championship. 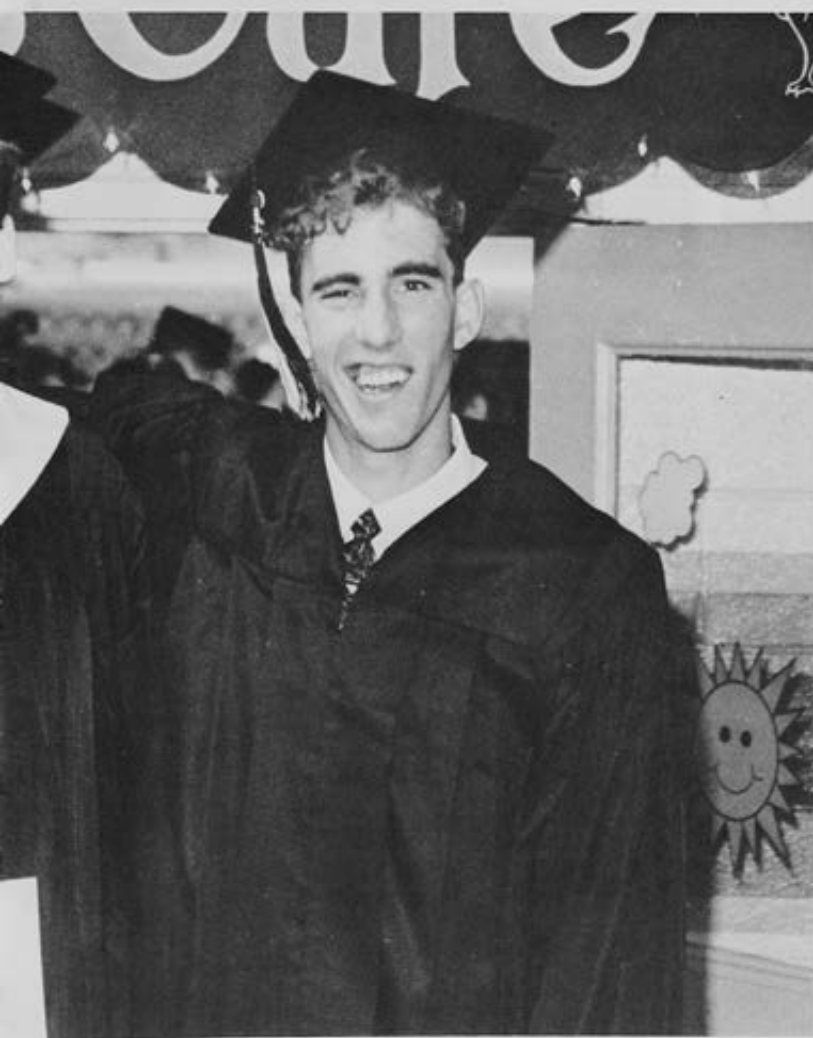

NEW SOPHOMORE DRIVERS GET JOBS TO PAY COSTS

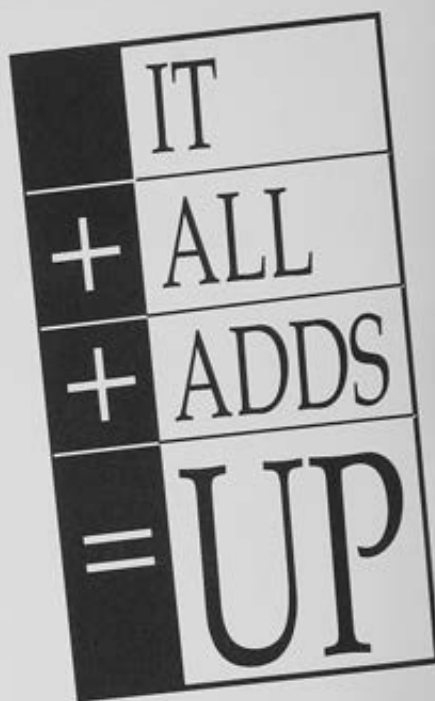

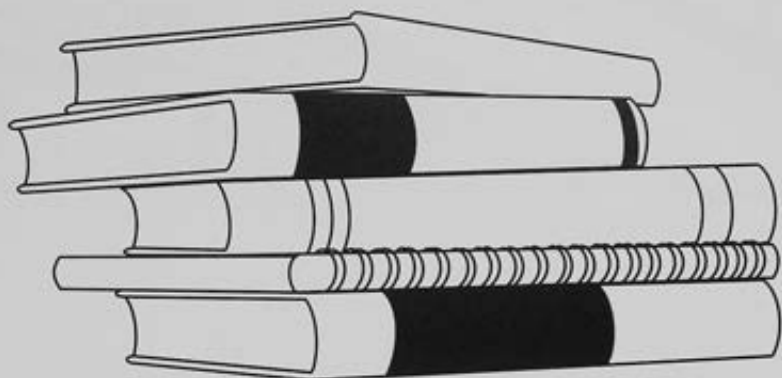

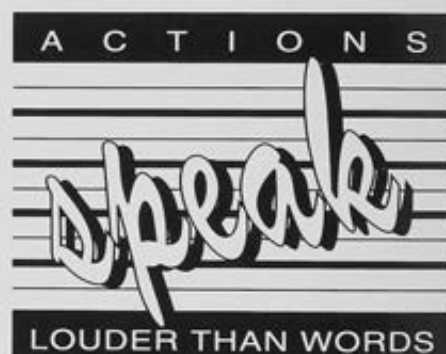
One student from this year's junior class was chosen to share

his SSP project with the Talon staff. This student is Brad Snyder. Brad spent his three weeks at St. John's Mercy Hospital transporting patients. According to Snyder, "The most difficult aspect of the whole process was dealing with AIDS and heart patients."

Brad spoke of the lessons which he learned from this affair. He singled out two lessons in particular: one, he quickly learned to respect others, despite

their condition; two, he learned to accept death as a part of life.

Asked to describe the operating room at St. John's, Snyder said, "The atmosphere was intense for the serious operations but remarkably relaxed during the not-so-serious surgeries. The doctors acted professionally during surgery but were not afraid to loosen up and play when things were sewn up."

I found the project to be the most important and practical learning experience of my high school career. This was first-hand knowledge acquired through the day's ups and downs. I learned a great deal from my co-workers and the patients that I encountered. I was around people-people who were scared. When people are scared, they change. They don't trust others. They want someone to blame for their feelings. I had to choose my words very carefully in conversations. Each word was capable of setting the patient off into a sensitive area.

During my project I was around older people. Some of these people felt uneasy. I learned that to soothe this uneasiness I had to be confident in my actions yet respectful

in my speech. Respect is the key. These people in the hospital seemed to feel that I owed them something. I did, that was my job. Comforting someone's fears was an incredible experience.

On days when I was out-of-sorts, I couldn't let the patients know. They weren't the cause of my problems but sometimes the answer. By serving them with respect, I could win their trust and be supportive.

In stating some of my personal thoughts, I hoped to show how valuable the Service Project can be if the student is willing to learn. These lessons carry over into everyday life--lessons that can't be taught in school but can only be applied. Each student learned something special during his project--something he will have forever.

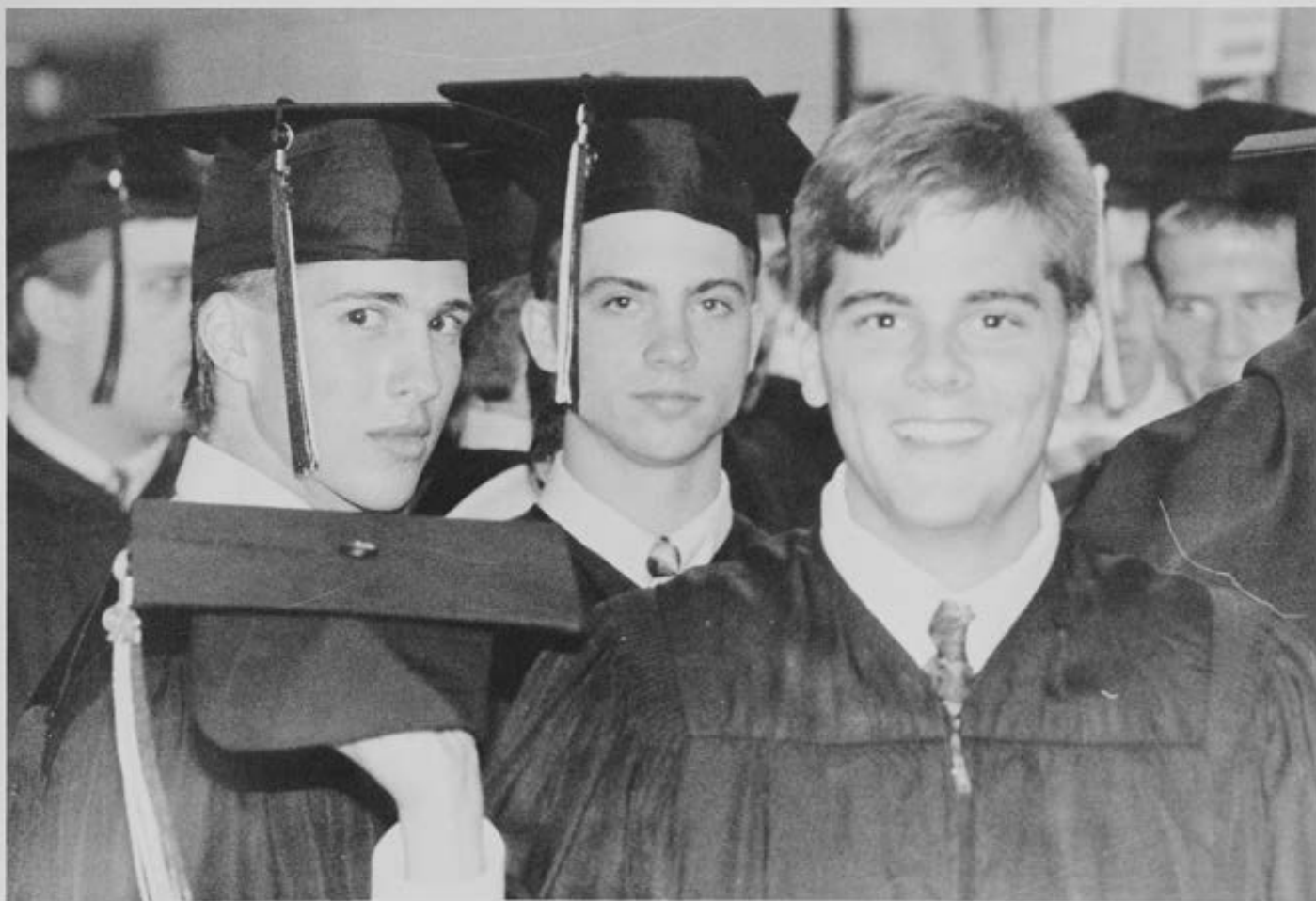

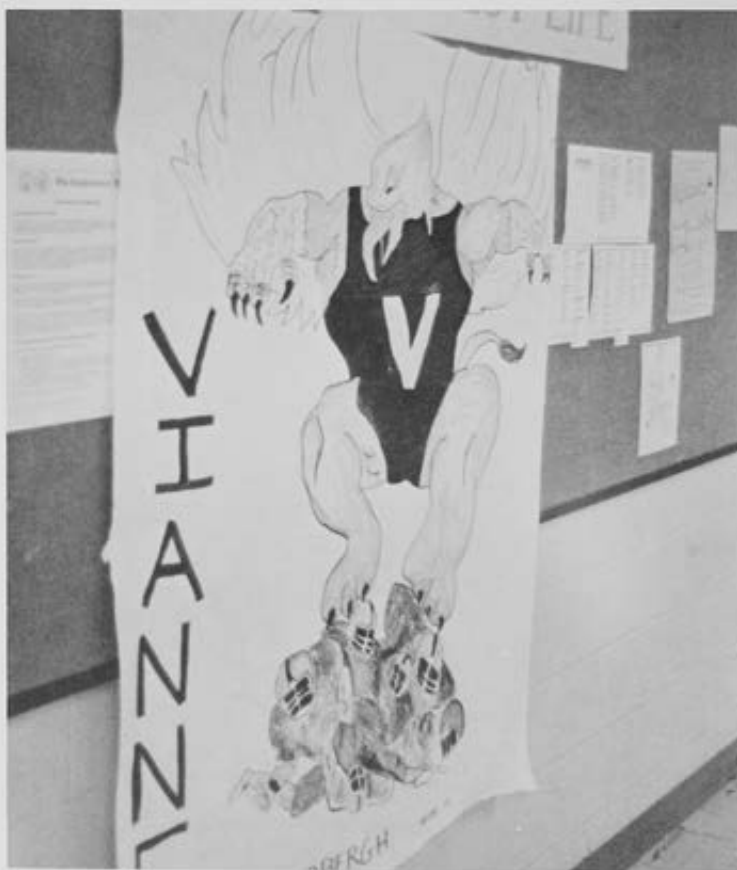

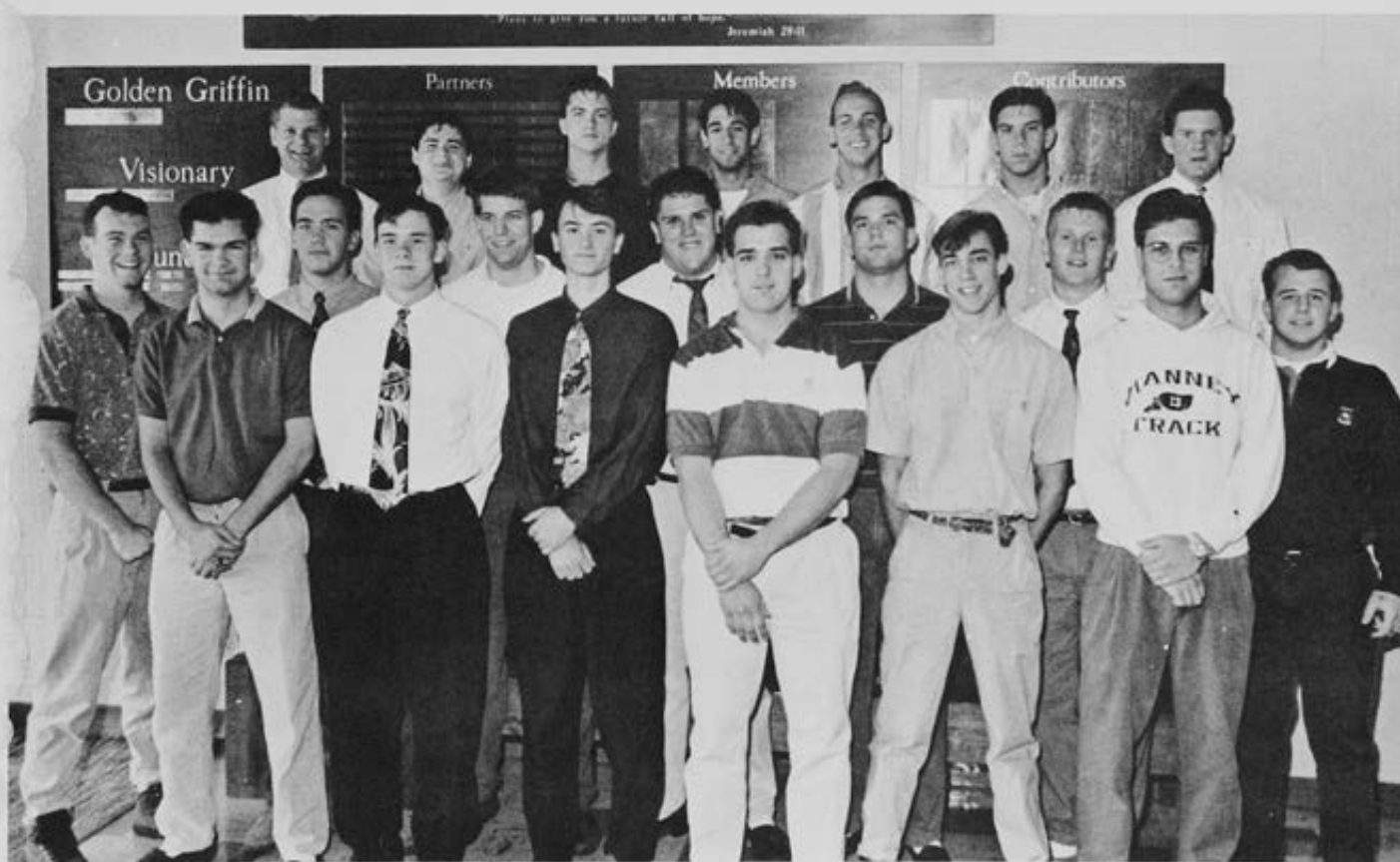
