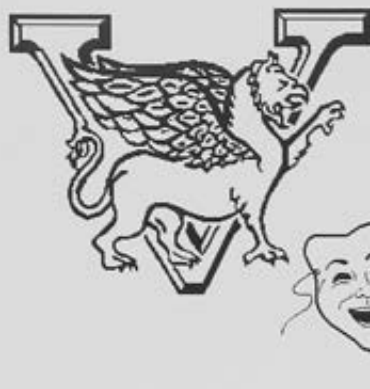

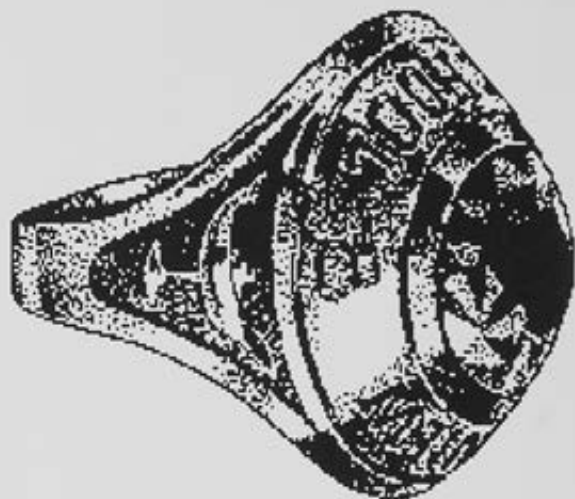
# Junior Ring

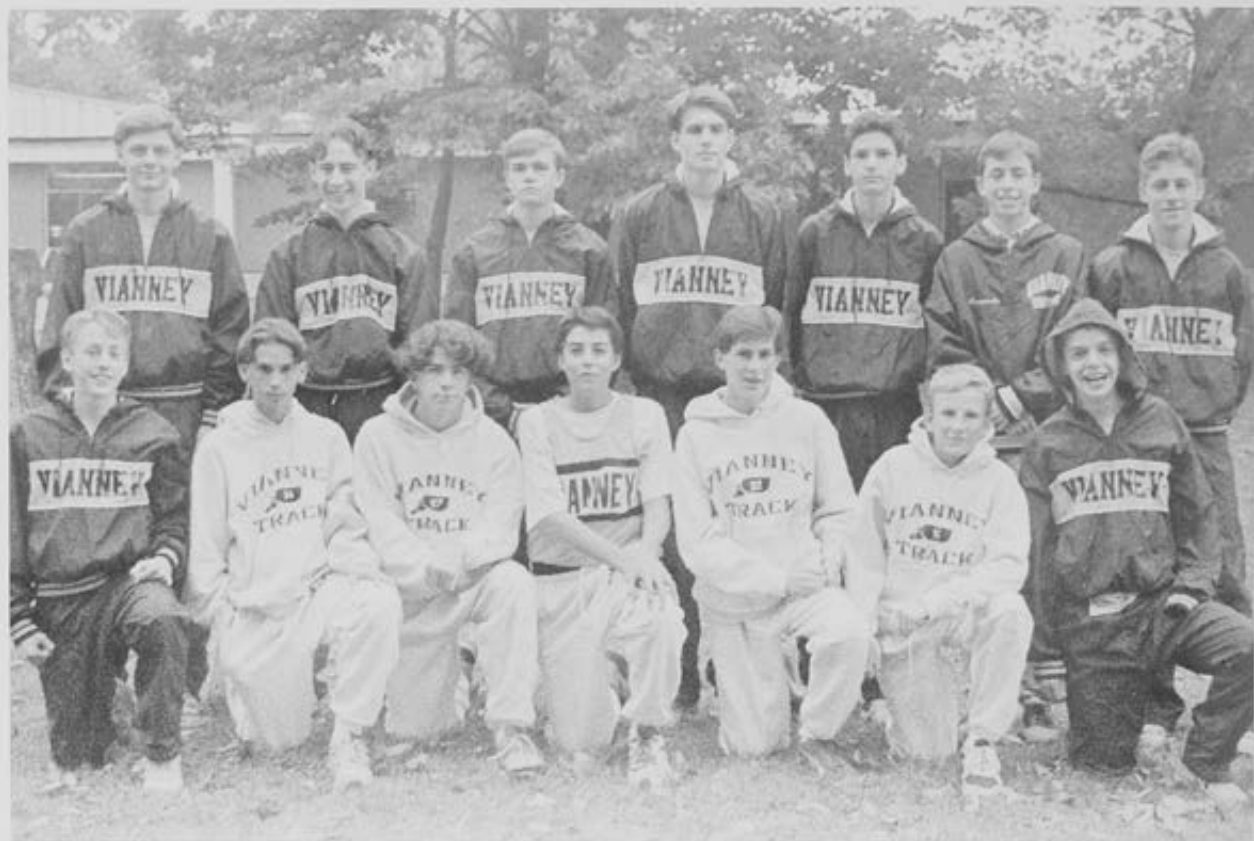

# Wrestling Makes a Hit

From the sweat shirt 'WRESTLING' fiasco to the first ever District Championship, the 93-94 wrestling season has been an exciting one. Even though the Varsity wrestling squad didn't quite have the dual meet season which they hoped for, they seemed to fly through Districts and Sectionals with ease. "The meets we lost were close - maybe one or two matches away," is the way Varsity Wrestling coach Tim Clepper described the dual meet season. Finishing the season with a three and seven record was not what the Griffins were hoping for, but they have some strong prospects for next year. With five state qualifiers, one of which placed fifth, and four other varsity starters returning, next season looks pretty appealing. Besides the facts about the dual meet season the Griffins really took off on the 'Road To Columbia' with a roar. "The dual meets are just a lead up to Districts, Sectionals, and State," said coach Clepper.

The highlight of the season came at Districts, where for the first time in Vianney's history the wrestling team placed first, winning by 100 points over very hard competitors. "Sending 13 wrestlers out of 13 Sectionals was a great accomplishment," is how coach Clepper described it. A total of seven Vianney Griffins won the Districts in their respective weight class: Scott Vogel at 103, Jim Judge at 119, Adam Bader at 130, Luke Bader at 135, Jerry Hurley at 145, Jeremiah Sullivan at 152, and Josh Brooks at 189. Jeff Kreutz took second place at 125. Third place finishers were Zach Welker at 112, Tony Schmitt at 140, Josh Armbruster at 160, Kevin Post at 171, and Greg 'Big Daddy' Wohlschlaeger at heavyweight.

The next big step for the Griffins came at Sectionals. After a tough battle Vianney soared away with eight State qualifiers. Senior Greg Wohlschlaeger commented, "We sent more than two wrestlers to State this year. Eight wrestlers is the most Vianney has ever sent. Now that is something to be proud of." The qualifiers were junior Scott Vogel, freshman Adam Bader, senior Luke Bader, sophomore Jerry Hurley, senior Jeremiah Sullivan, junior Kevin Post, junior Josh Brooks, and senior Greg Wohlschlaeger. "All the wrestlers stepped up to their potential to meet the challenges," said Clepper.

The day finally came for the State Tournament. Even though Vianney wrestled hard, only one Griffin placed. Freshman Adam Bader placed fifth keeping the yearly tradition of the state placers alive. "Adam really stood out among the rest of the wrestlers," said coach Clepper.

"The season can be described as an old car. It takes a while to get it going, but when it does it can really fly," said one Vianney spectator. Although the season didn't work out the way everyone wanted it to, it was truly a great season for Vianney wrestling. All Griffin wrestlers should look toward the future and see what it will be, but remember the season as it was, a great one.

So as far as next year, the team should prove to be the same force, if not better, and a team full of experience to boot.

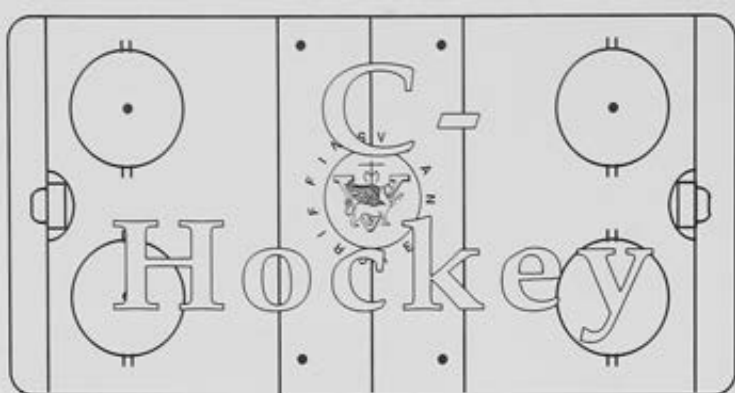

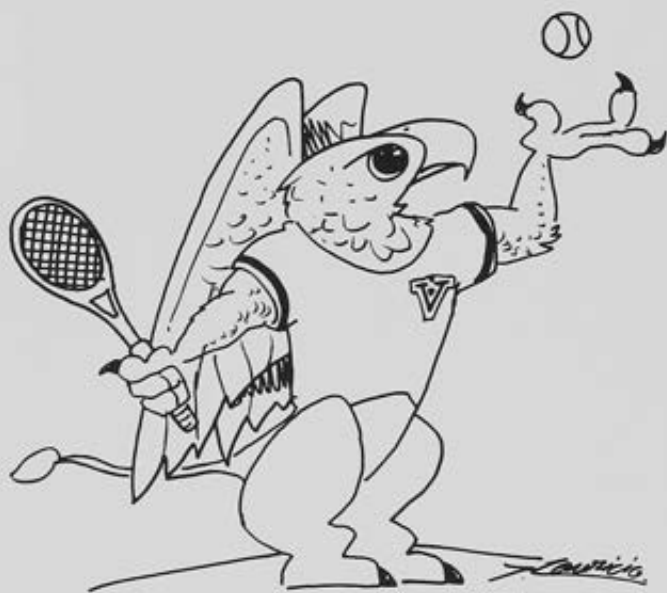

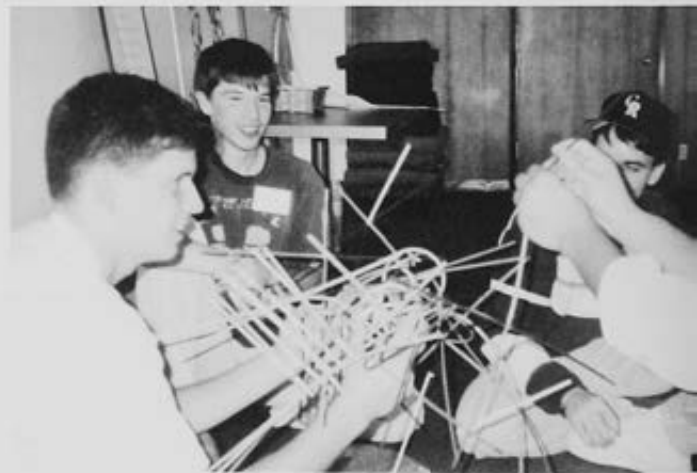

The Chris Fiala award was presented to Steve Ortwein for his pride in Vianney and his use of his talents to the fullest.

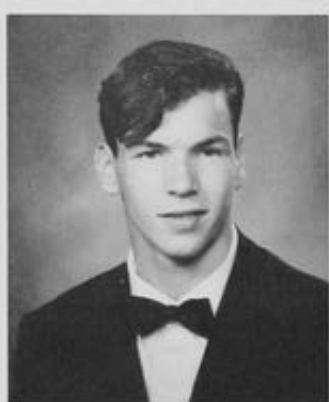

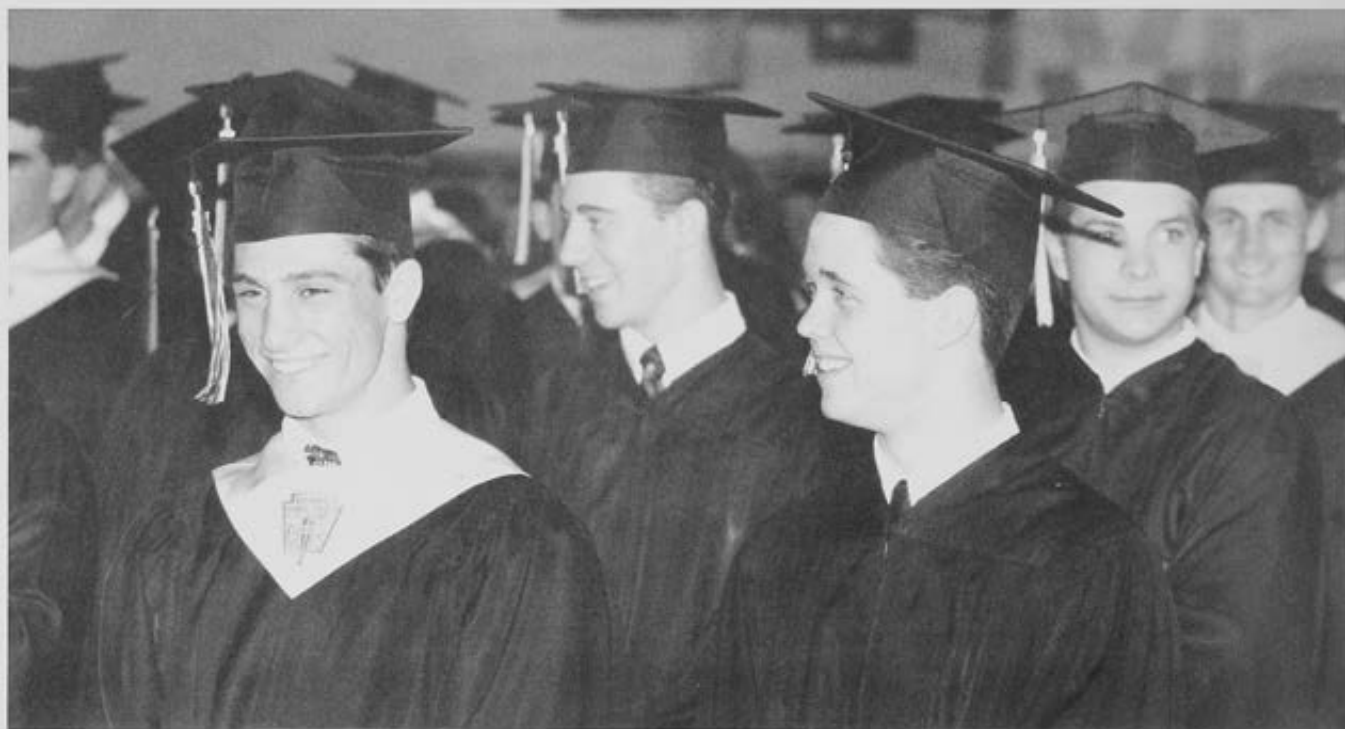

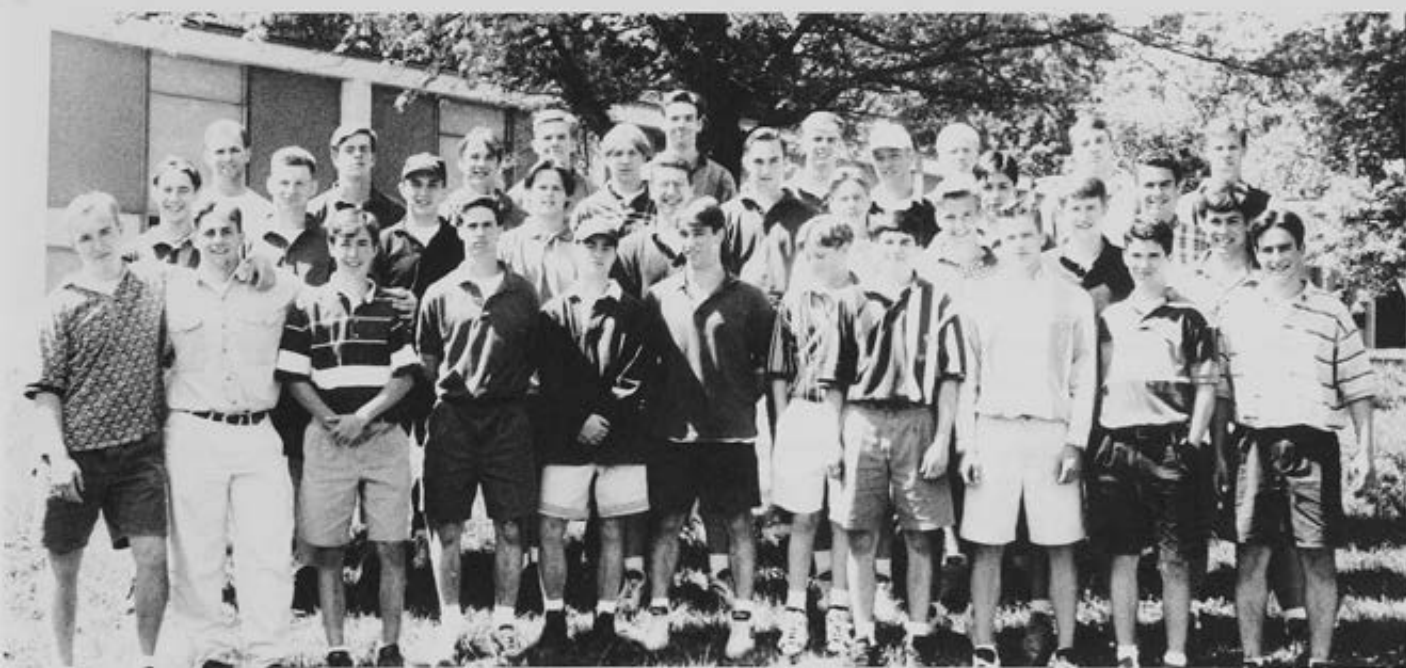

## Vianney Choir Soars To The Beat Of The Tune

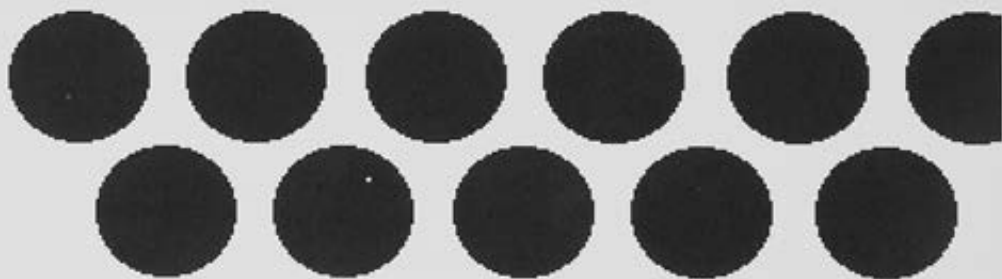

## Celebrating 80 Years of Service to Vianney

**Mr. Larry Furrer:** For twenty-two years Mr. Furrer has been a member of the Vianney faculty. For the past eight years he has served as Vianney's principal. Starting in the 1994-1995 school year, Mr. Furrer will return to the classroom full time. He has passed the reins of command over to Fr. Richard Wosman who is transferring from San Antonio.

Since signing his first contract in 1972, Mr. Furrer has been involved in a variety of activities. For example, he has coached cross-country and track and has seen several runners advance to the state meet. He has also witnessed several firsts in Vianney history. More often than not he has initiated these changes. Mr. Furrer started computer programming classes in 1976, with three classes, seventy-five students and one computer.
