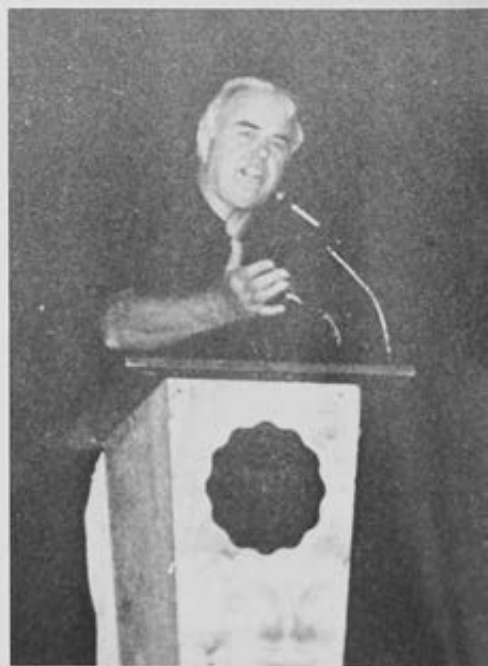

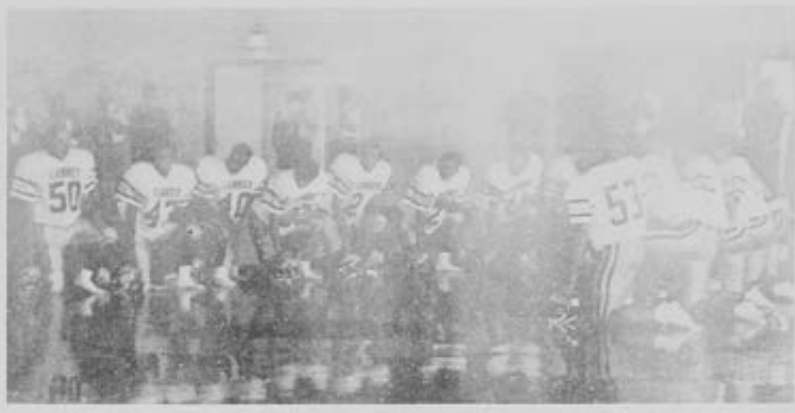

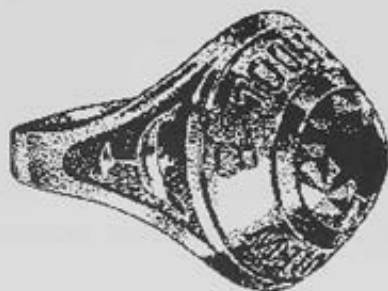

# Prom Night: A Great Time For All

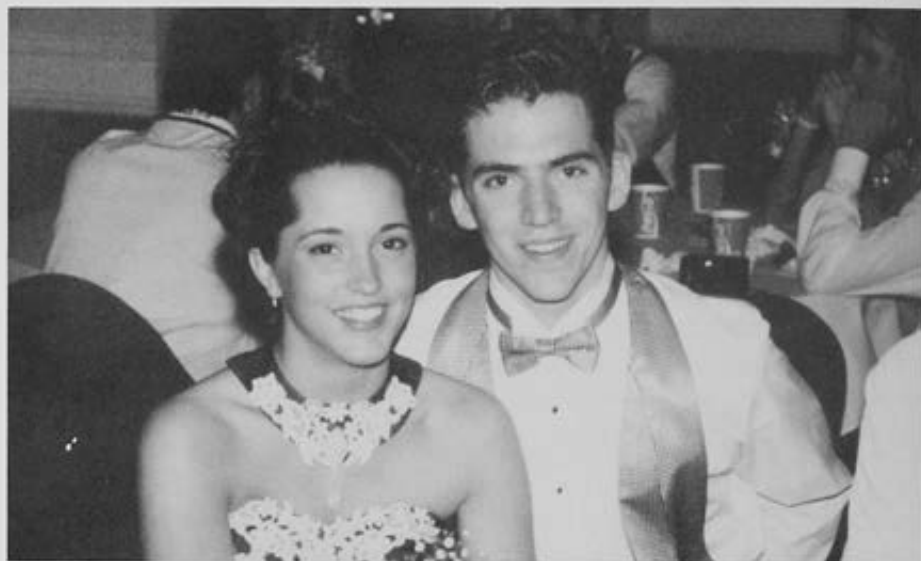
## An Evening Of Fun

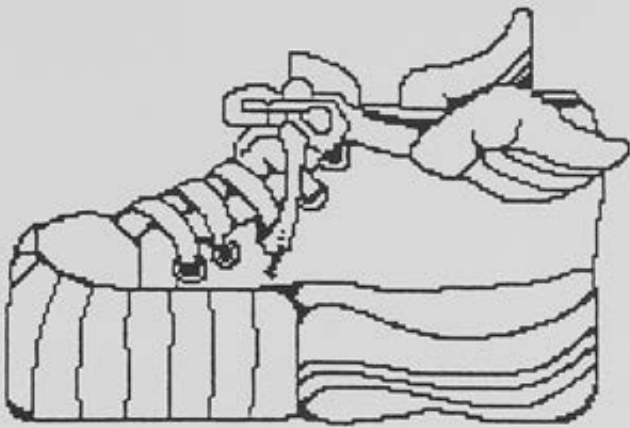

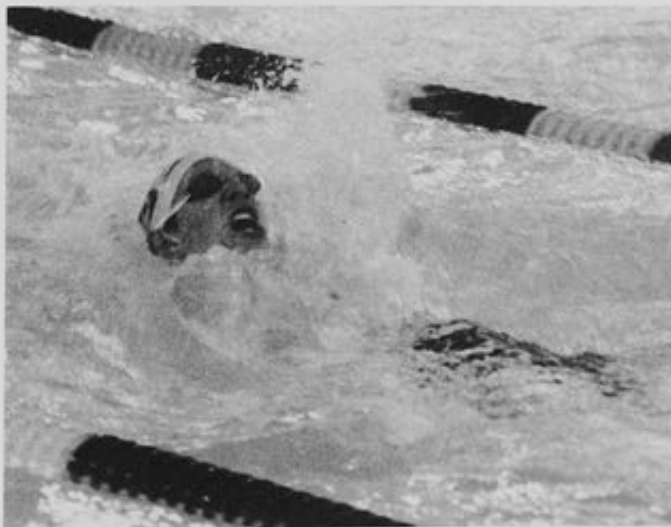

Mark, a freshman, took fifth place and Adam, a sophomore placed the highest a Vianney wrestler has ever placed in a State Tournament by taking second place.

"One of the main reasons the team had such a good season was because of the skill and leadership of the seniors. We hope to continue down that same road in the future," said Coach Clepper. Congratulations to all wrestlers on a season of hard work, and good luck to all the Vianney wrestlers in the future.

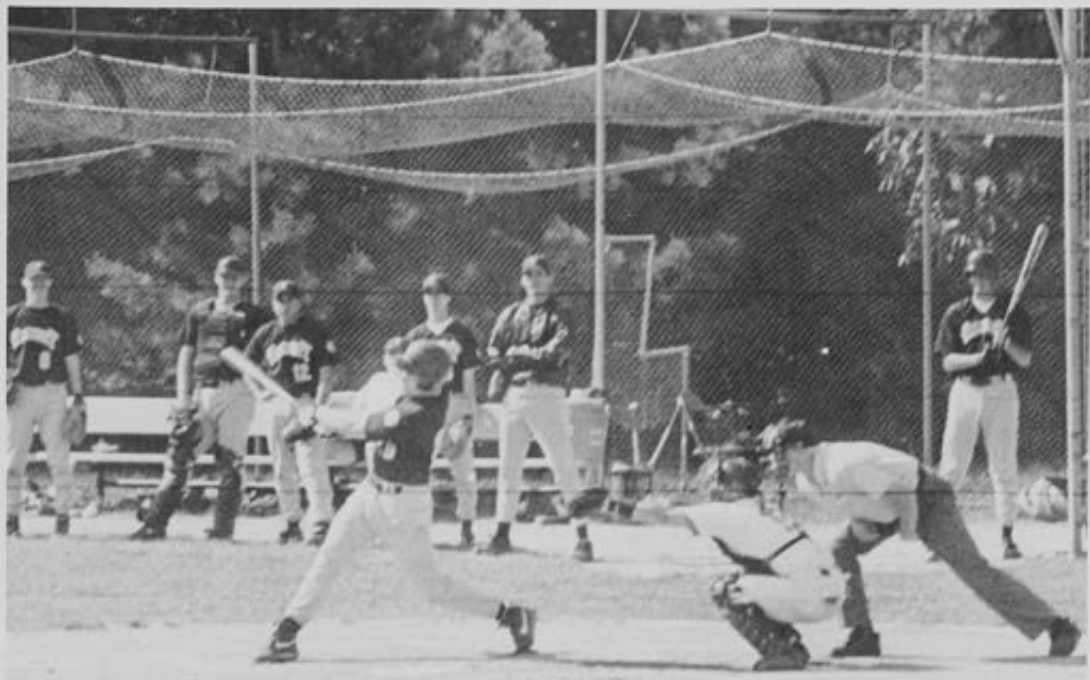

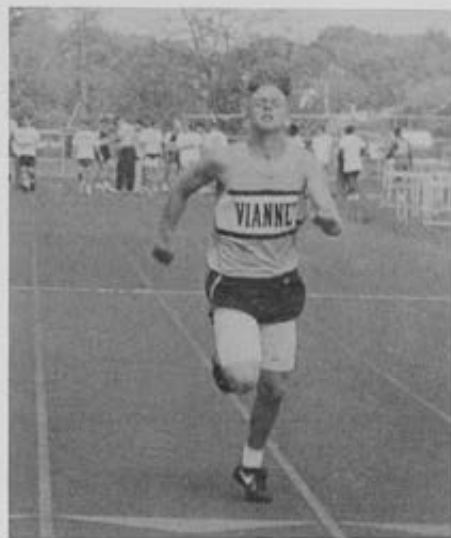

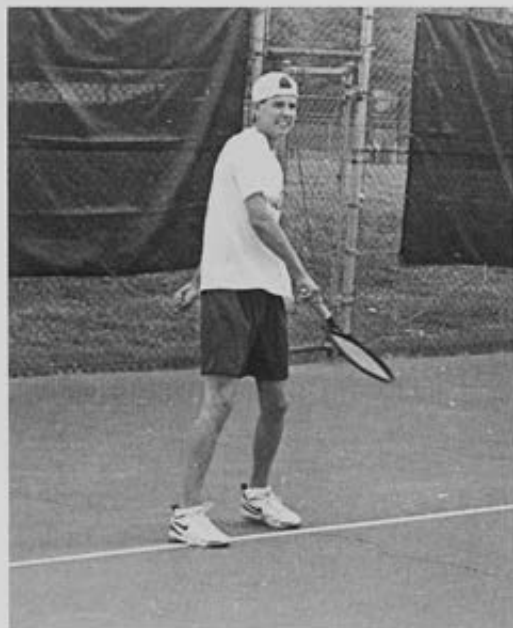

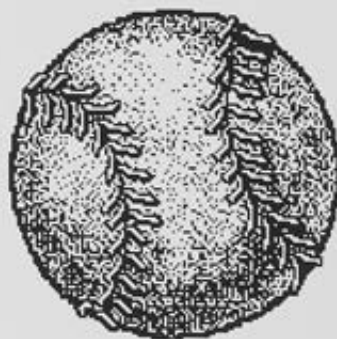



# Junior Social Service Project

## Junior Journey Of Service

My Social Service Project was a great experience for me. I worked at the Judevine Center for Autism and I was mainly involved with the preschool kids and the pre-teens. I felt that I really did some good and I helped them out. I gained a lot of knowledge about autism and I learned some new skills for dealing with people and some sign language. I also discovered a lot about myself.

In the first few days I learned that autism is a total communication disorder. This means that the person has trouble finding the meaning and value in what people communicate to him which prevents him from finding the hints in a conversation which dictate how he should act. This leads to the person reacting in a different way than people expect and this creates a communication barrier. Some of the skills which the Judevine Center taught me on how to deal with people with autism are to always speak positively and use negatives as little as possible. Positive statements tell the person what they should be doing, which is more beneficial than telling what they are doing wrong. It is important to find out what would motivate the person to act positively and use that to get them to perform the required action. This motivates the person to do an act that will benefit himself. It is most beneficial not to rush the autistic person after asking a question but to repeat the question or to offer assistance. It may take the individual time to respond because he is not only thinking of the answer but also thinking of how to communicate it.

I went in with the idea that people with autism are just not as intelligent - I was proven wrong. Most of the people

with autism are very smart; it is the communication barrier that prevents them from expressing their knowledge. On one occasion I was watching one of the preschool kid and he kept running toward the doors of the gym and waiting for me to follow. Then he would take off running down the halls. So I would go get him and playfully bring him back to the gym. One of the professionals said that this was a game that he tries to play with a lot of people; but we aren't supposed to let him do this because he would get into trouble at his regular school for running in the hall. I could plainly see that this child who, I thought, wasn't that smart had outsmarted me. He knew that I was new there and didn't know the rules very well. He took advantage of that and he played his little game with me. This taught me never to go into a situation with any preconceived ideas.

I do think that I helped the children as well. I know I, at least, helped the teachers by giving them a couple of extra

hands to work with. When I was helping the teachers with the lessons, sometimes some of the students would pay more attention to me. Therefore, if I participated in the lesson, the kids sometimes picked up the idea by watching me. Just by being there, I found that it made things different for the students which sometimes made them more interested in what was going on. One of the things that they try to teach the children is to look at someone's eyes when they are talking to them. On some occasions I would eat lunch with a couple of the children, and as I would eat, I would look over at them and at times they would be watching. They would make eye contact voluntarily for a short time. It's not much but it is a step forward.

I definitely enjoyed my Social Service Project and I hope that everybody had as good of an experience as I had. One note I would make for next year's Juniors is to go into this with an open mind and don't assume anything because, most likely, the people will surprise you. I would like to the teachers and other workers at Judevine and especially the children for all they did for me.

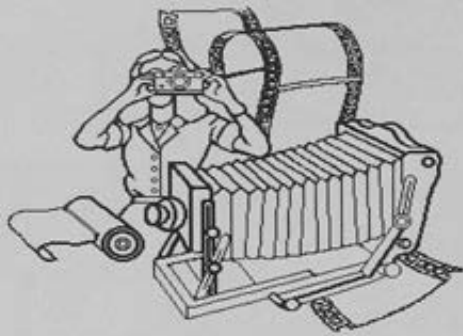

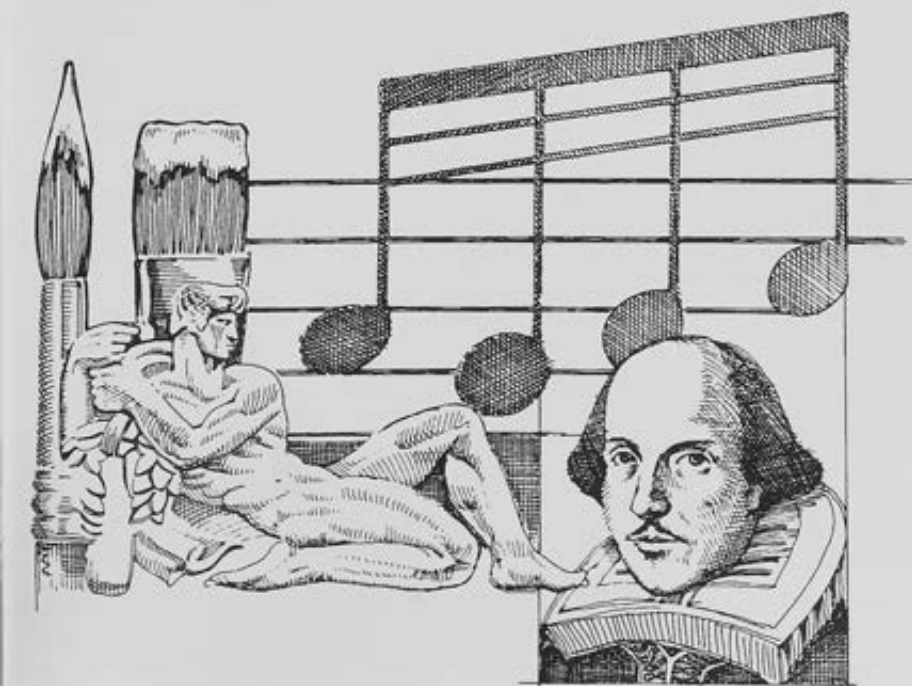
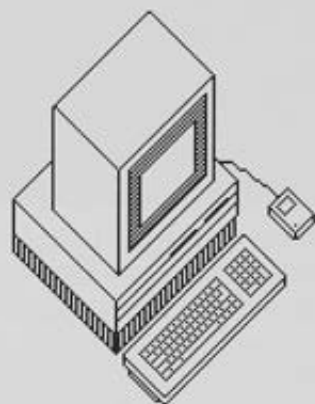

## A Fine Year of Art

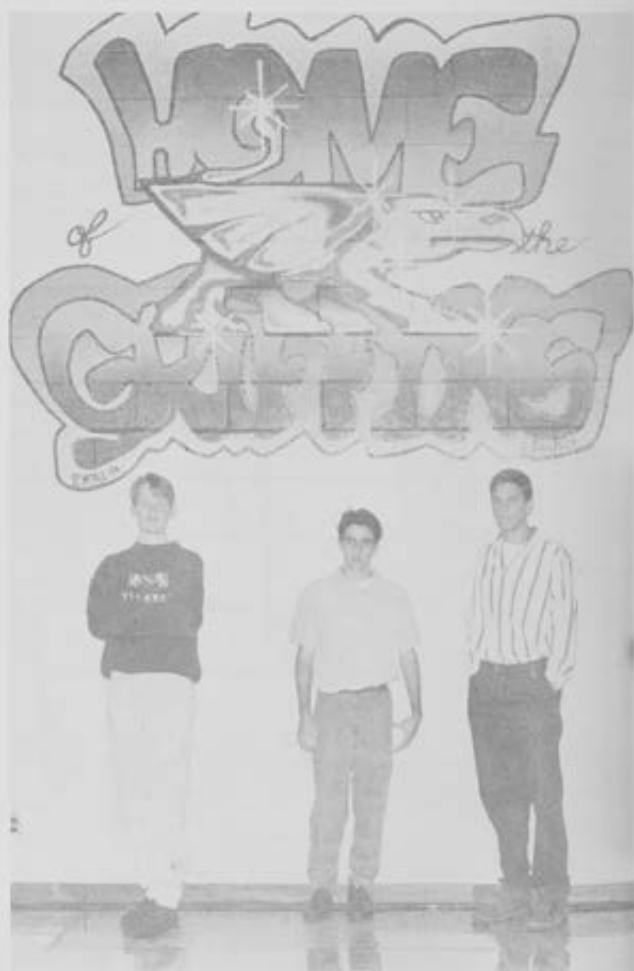

## Unexpected Success

Because there were no seniors on the squad, the 94-95 season was expected to be a rebuilding season. However, all three teams (Varsity, JV, and Freshman) were successful. The freshman team, led by Mike Mangiore and John Klix, won the Westminster Tournament and the DeSmet Tournament but had a 2-5-0 match record. The Junior Varsity team, led by sophomores Dave Speer, Mike Starkweather, Jeff Hahn, and Joe Danner, was undefeated in match play with a 3-0-1 record. 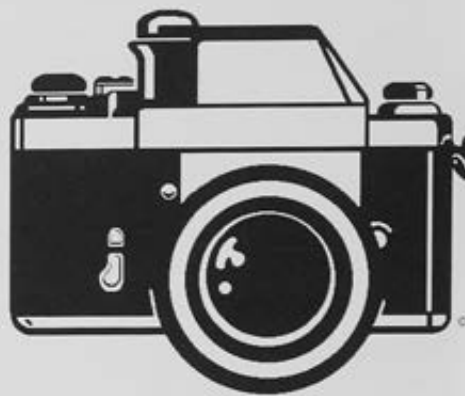

# VIANNEY SAYS "GOOD-BYE" TO FR. ADE

This is the final year that Fr. Adolf Windisch, S. M., will be the President of Vianney because his nine-year term has come to an end. After the 1994-95 school year is over, he will turn the presidency over to Fr. Richard Wosman, S.M., as was planned a year and a half ago. Fr. Ade is headed for a sabbatical period in Rome at the General Headquarters of the Marianist order. He expects to spend about seven months there doing research about the Marianist heritage and spirit, participating in several seminars, and leading a pilgrimage of Marianist Affiliates from the U. S. around Europe. He will also visit his family in Austria and Romania. After all of that, he will become a member of the North American Center for Marianist studies in Dayton, Ohio. This center does research on Marianist spirit and heritage throughout the world. It promotes the writings of Marianists and promotes Marianist lay people.

Fr. Ade is a native of St. Louis. After his father died at a young age, Fr. Ade was raised in the German St. Vincent's Home from preschool until he was in eighth grade. He then went to Chaminade High School (here in St. Louis) on an academic scholarship. This is where he was first introduced to the Marianist order. Before the age of seventeen, Ade Windisch volunteered for the Armed Services Training Program at the University of Wyoming and became a member of the Special Services that entertained wounded troops in hospitals. Later he joined the Marianist order and made his first vows in 1949. Father Ade was ordained a Marianist priest in 1960 in Fribourg, Switzerland. In 1963 Father earned his doctorate in Social Philosophy at the University of Fribourg.

Fr. Ade has taught at numerous schools since he began his teaching career in 1951. He has been at schools such as Villa St. Jean, Erbourg, Switzerland; McBride High School, St. Louis; Provencher Collegiate and St. Boniface, Manitoba, Canada; Central Catholic High and St. Mary's University, both located in San Antonio, Texas. Before he

came to Vianney, Fr. Ade had just completed his third year as the St. Louis Province Vocation Coordinator. He came to Vianney in the fall of 1986. His order asked him to be the first President and to find the first layman principal for Vianney.

Fr. Ade has done so many things since he came to Vianney. He has continuously formulated, articulated, and proclaimed the unique identity, heritage, mission, and future of Vianney. He has helped to bring about the major re-configuration and capital improvements of the campus through the success of the school's first \$1,000,000 campaign. That campaign helped to remodel the physics, biology, and technical drawing classrooms and labs, to put an all-weather track around the football field, to construct a refreshment stand in the stadium, to provide for more accessible roads into the school, and to add many more new parking places for the faculty, staff, and students, and to create the Griffin monument entrance.



Fr. Ade said that he will always remember the Vianney family. He has enjoyed sharing with the students and faculty and working with the parents and Board members. Father said that it has been a real privilege and honor to have been a part of Vianney's young history at an exciting and challenging time.

Thank you, Fr. Ade, for everything that you have done for Vianney as well as everywhere you have been. You have set an example for us of how to live our lives in helping one another. May you never forget the memories of Vianney that you cherish. May we never forget the lessons that you have taught us. Always remember what you told all of us, "VIANNEY-NUMBER-ONE!"

When I came to Vianney...

There were no Walkmans or Pac-Mans or mini-vans.

and the Macintosh was an Apple for eating—not computing.

When I came to Vianney...

I'm 48 years and 230 days old. I've been around for 17750 days. I have spent 9125 of those days here at Vianney.

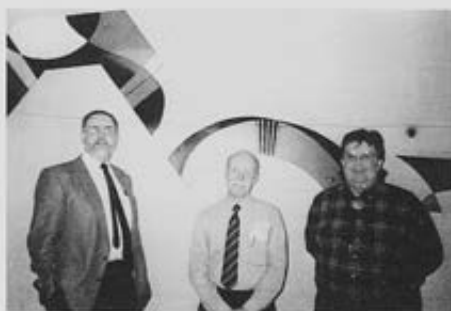
More...
