



 - Finalize April 30, 2020.








Overall enrollment and percent of free and reduced lunch












Overall enrollment and percent of free and reduced lunch












Overall enrollment and percent of free and reduced lunch







Programming groups defined

- **Pre-kindergarten (Pre-K) academic:** from birth to age five, with 244 students served.
- Youth: Pre-K through grade 12.
- Adult: Age 19 to 54; age 55 plus.
- Facilities: Serving approximately 186 active groups (outside of regular school activities) with 9,486 participants.



Youth programming 2019 data

- Academic K-5: serving 34 students.
- **Childcare through Village Kids**: serving 745 students in grades K-5; and 36 students in grades six through eight.
- Enrichment: serving 283 students in Pre-K, 602 students in K-5; 76 students in grades six through eight; and 94 students in grades nine through 12.
- **Recreation:** serving 364 students in Pre-K; 860 students in K-5; 266 students in grades six through eight; and 172 students in grades nine through 12.
- Service: serving 30 students in grades nine through 12.



Adult programming 2019 data

- Enrichment: serving 294 participants in age group 19-54; and 80 participants in age group 55 plus.
- Health and safety: serving 215 participants in age group 19-54; and 53 participants in age group 55 plus.
- **Recreation:** serving 369 participants in age group 19-54; and 78 participants in age group 55 plus.
- **Sports:** serving 8 participants in age group 19-54; and 4 participants in age group 55 plus.
