

## What does it mean to be college and career ready?

We want all students to have college and career goals that will prepare them to experience fulfilling lives, actively participate as educated citizens, and thrive in a competitive and global marketplace.

Plan now to succeed in the labor market that is Utah's future! At the end of 2020, 66 percent of the jobs in Utah require 1, 2, 4 or more years of education beyond high school. Don't get left behind!

## What is my 4-year plan?

What you study now and learn in junior high and in high school will prepare you to be college and career ready. It is never too soon to start thinking about your future and what you need to do in school to be ready. If you plan now, you won't miss out on opportunities to take the classes you want. You may also take classes at other high schools if your school doesn't offer the class you want to take.

## What should I be worrying about next year?

1. Take challenging classes in core academics.
2. Get good grades.
3. Be thinking ahead about what colleges you may want to attend. They may have a higher admission requirement than the Davis School District graduation requirement.
4. Talk to your counselor about your plan.
5. Talk to your parents about how you will finance your college costs.
6. Start a file for all awards, honors, paid and volunteer work, and extra curricular activities.
7. Read books.



## What should I consider as I make my future plans?

Think about your short-range and your long-term goals. What classes, programs, and options do you want to take in high school? What lifestyle do you want down the road? There is so much to consider as you plan. **Don't give up what you want most for what you want now.**



If you are earning A's and B's in your core classes, consider challenging yourself by taking an Honors level class. These are also great stepping stones to AP courses as well as college preparation.

Start building your college transcript by taking CE classes! CE classes are college classes taught in high school. In order to earn the college credit, students must apply to the university offering the credit, pay the application fee (usually around \$30-\$40), and pay \$5 per credit hour. REMEMBER: it is important to pass these classes because it is permanently on your college transcript!

Build great study habits this year. Great study habits are the foundation of future success.

Start thinking now about what skills and knowledge you will need to have the job you want. Does it fit your personality? Will it give you the lifestyle you want? Does it fit your values? Will you like doing it everyday? Will it make you happy?

Make SMART goals every year. Plan ahead. Don't miss out on opportunities.


These are the classes that help you explore possible career pathways and build skills for life. Skills certifications are available in all eight CTE Areas of Study. The certificates you earn can be used as evidence of your accomplishments when you seek a job or apply for further education and training.

These classes are college level courses that require students to fully commit to that level of learning. Expect to put a lot in, but the skills and experience you receive will benefit you in many areas of your life.

## Graduation Requirements

These are the four requirements that you must meet to graduate from high school:

- You must have 27 credits.
- You must complete the following classes:
  - English
    - 9th Grade English (1.0)
    - 10th Grade English (1.0)
    - 11th Grade English (1.0)
    - 12th Grade English (1.0)
  - Social Studies
    - World Geography (0.5)
    - World Civilization (1.0)
    - US History (1.0)
    - US Government & Citizenship (0.5)
  - Science
    - Physical Science (1.0)
    - Life Science (1.0)
    - Other Science (1.0)
  - Math (3 full years)
  - Physical Education (0.5 Fit for Life—required)
  - Health
  - 1.5 Fine Arts
  - 1.0 Career & Technical Education (CTE)
  - 0.5 Digital Studies
  - 0.5 Financial Literacy
  - 8.5 Elective credits
- You must make up all "U's."
- You must pass the US citizenship test.



Taking a foreign language is not a requirement to graduate from the Davis School District.

Foreign language is required to be admitted to some universities out-of-state. Many of these schools require more than two years of a consecutive foreign language.

No colleges or universities require foreign language for admission in Utah, but they all recommend it.

Plan ahead and don't miss out on an out-of-state college opportunity because you did not meet admissions requirements.

### Letter of Completion (LOC)

What is the Letter of Completion?

- It is a letter from Weber State University stating all General Education (GE) requirements are fulfilled.

- The LOC can be presented to any State University or College and their GE requirements are waived, even if they are different.

Why do I need to know about the LOC?

- There are a total of 39 college credits to complete the GE requirements for a college degree. You can earn these credits in high school by taking a combination of AP and CE classes. Save time and money!

- You save money earning a LOC versus aiming for an Associates degree to transfer between schools. A year of college is 30 credit hours. (i.e. a Bachelors degree is 120 credit hours).

- It locks in classes as completed, such as the Math 1050 requirement. If a student were to take a couple of years off from school, they would not have to retake any classes.

### What is the difference between CE and AP credit?

#### CE: Concurrent Enrollment

- Costs about \$40.00 registration fee and \$15.00 per class
- Enrolled in high school and college class at the same time.
- Work hard in class all year and learn the material.
- Earn a grade for the class that goes on high school and college transcript.



#### AP: Advanced Placement

- Costs about \$100.00 per class
- Work hard in class all year and learn the material.
- Take the GIANT AP TEST in May.
- Pass the test and earn credit for the class. The test is scored 1-5. A passing score is 3 or higher.
