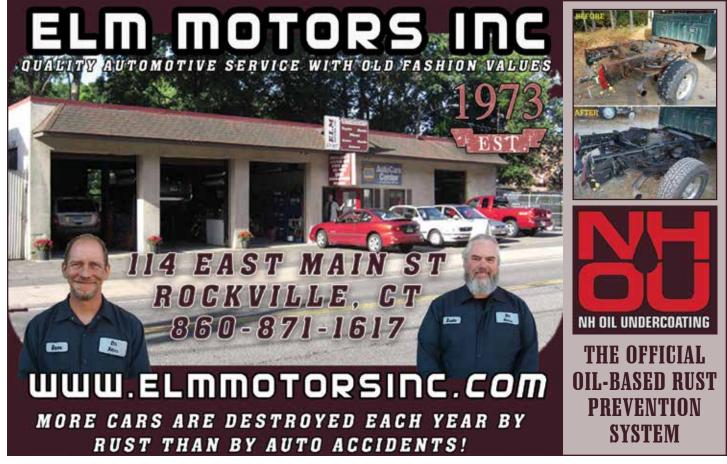

Rockville High's Newest School Resource Officer

With the graduation of the RHS class of 2016, so ended the tour of duty of Officer Steven Langlais as the School Resource Officer (SRO). Each police officer assigned to the school serves

for a period of four years, coming in with the new freshman class and exiting when they graduate.

A very competitive selection process was undertaken by the police department to select the new SRO for the high school. Unlike other police selection processes where the selection board is made up of senior police officers, the student resource officer is selected by members of



the Rockville High School community. The selection board is comprised of the Superintendent of Schools, the High School Principal, a teacher, and a student member. The Chief of Police decided that due to the unique qualities needed to succeed in the SRO position, educators and more importantly the

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(VRABE) Family Learning program

Vernon Regional Adult Based Education's (VRABE) Family Learning program provides a holistic approach to serving the community. The Family Learning program runs for 30-weeks from September to May, three-days per week, three-hours a day and is located at the Rockville United Methodist Church, 140 Grove Street. To date, VRABE has served 210+ multicul-



tural families. Students participate in the following four program components on a weekly basis: 1) six hours adult education (GED/ESL), 2) nine hours early childhood education 3) two hours parenting education, and 4) one hour interactive literacy activities between parents and children (PACT). Adult learners bring their children to participate in a multi-age early childhood program and Interactive Literacy Activities (PACT), including reading books, "Music Together," Lutz Children's Museum, circle time, and "family share." The multi-age and multi-lingual early childcare classroom has one lead teacher and two assistants who engage children in developmentally appropriate activities and learning tools to help the children thrive. During 2015-2016 VRABE served 30 families from 15 different countries. The GED student's progressed towards earning their GED and the ESL students gained 84 points in their reading assessment. Each week the students prepared projects to share about their families and culture.

Throughout the semester students participated in various topics on career counseling and support services. Some activities include exploring career profiles that align to personal interests, skills and aspirations. The Family Learning instructors conducted workshops based on postsecondary education or training, career advancement, and economic self-sufficiency. Staff and families discuss topics to learn about and assist in planning for guest speakers. This information helps students lead to economic self-sufficiency. During the past seven years, VRABE's Family Learning program has established and maintained strong partnerships within the community. These agencies provide services both inside and outside the classroom.

Vernon's First Church

Bolton was recognized as a town in 1720 and proceeded to divide its land between the 50 proprietors. Most chose farmland in the southern part of town and Bolton's meetinghouse was built nearby.

The northern part of town was rugged, mostly wood lots and planned for future expansion. Sons established their farms in North Bolton, with some of the best land along the old east-west Indian trail separating the Hockanum and Tankerhoosen River valleys.

Church attendance was a duty, so North Bolton families traveled six miles each Sunday, mostly by foot, to spend the day at worship in Bolton Center. In 1760, when there were enough families, the North Bolton parish was formed. Parishioners immediately began to plan their meetinghouse.

The site chosen was on the hill overlooking the Connecticut River Valley near the corner of Bamforth Road. The nearby Bamforth Road Cemetery was established ten years earlier.

The meetinghouse was raised in June 1762. Building the church was probably much like an old fashioned barn raising where the community came together for a weekend with whole families participating. When first used it was little more than a shelter for the congregation, remaining without pews until 1770.

The first minister was Rev. Ebenezer Kellogg, a 25 year-old Yale graduate. He read his lengthy sermons which carefully set forth the doctrines and duties of religion. After serving 55 years he died in 1817, his long career entirely at the old meetinghouse on the hill.

In 1826 the growing community built a new church at Vernon Center. The original meetinghouse was moved to Rockville and became the east wing of the old Frank Mill.

The meetinghouse was far more than a place of worship. Government meetings and other important gatherings took place there. Each Sunday farmers would travel from their homesteads to worship, meet their neighbors and 'tell the news.' To learn more visit MeetinghouseHill.org.

Meetinghouse Hill Field

Across Route 30 from the Vernon Center Middle School is a field. The field has a red barn at one corner, rows of corn stretching to Cemetery Road, and a small herd of beef cattle. Running up the left side of the field from the barn and over a

fieldstone bridge is a barely visible cow path.

What appears to be a typical farm field is actually one of the most historic properties in Vernon.

Early settlers in 1762 chose to build their first meetinghouse at the top of this hill. Families walked along dirt roads from their farms to church each Sunday. The road they took from the west for 63 years climbed what came to be known as Old Meetinghouse Hill.

The road to Hartford became an official turnpike in 1801 and, with improvements, was straightened bypassing the field. When the new church at Vernon Center was built in 1826 the road up the hill, still unpaved, was abandoned by the town.

The Strong family bought the field with its red barn about 1900 using it primarily for their herd of dairy cows for over a hundred years. A spring in the field

supplied water to the Tolland County Temporary Home For Children near Center Road.

To preserve this important piece of Vernon's heritage Meetinghouse Hill, LLC was formed by local residents and purchased the 33-acre property with the intention that the land continue as working farmland and that the public have access to the path and the view over the valley. Four

members of the Vernon Volunteers' Collaborative are involved.

The story of Meetinghouse Hill reminds us of where we come from, where we are today, and what we want for tomorrow. Here you can walk on the same unpaved path used by the Podunks and our Colonial ancestors. For more go to MeetinghouseHill.org.

Getting Students Involved

Vernon provides many opportunities for our students through the schools and the programs of the Park & Recreation Department. The organizations of the Vernon Volunteers' Collaborative also find ways to include young people. Here are a few examples:

Arts Center East offers art classes for children and hosts the Vernon Public Schools Annual Art Exhibit each spring to showcase student work in a professional setting.

New England Civil War Museum held a Civil War Camp For Kids at Strong Family Farm in June to teach them about living conditions, communication, cooking, and marching in formation.

Strong Family Farm encourages whole families to do farm tasks during their Spring and Fall Work Days, which include a student race as part of their annual Chicken Run, and runs the 8-week Adopt-a-Chicken program.

The Vernon Chorale featured RHS's Vocal Motion chorus as part of their April concert.

Tolland County Agricultural Center hosts the annual 4-H Fair each summer. With animals and competitions, this is a kid favorite.

Vernon Education Association is solely focused on students. Their projects include providing new books to first graders at the end of the school year, the summer Book Mobile, and mini-grants to teachers for classroom materials.

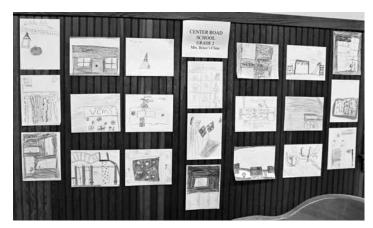
Vernon Garden Club, working with Lake Street School students, created a butterfly garden which is maintained yearly by students.

Town Clerk

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Beginning October 7, 2016 absentee ballots will be available from the Office of the Town Clerk for the November 8th State Election (commonly referred to as the Presidential Election).

AN ELECTOR MAY VOTE BY ABSENTEE BALLOT DUE TO THE FOLLOWING REASONS:

- Elector's absence from their town for all of the hours of voting
- 2. Illness or physical disability
- 3. Active service in the U.S. armed forces
- 4. Religious tenets forbid secular activity on Election Day
- 5. Service as a polling place official in another town or polling district other than their own

The ballot may not be issued until an application for the ballot has been received by the Office of the Town Clerk.

If you qualify for an absentee ballot, the application can be obtained from the Town Clerk's Office. Forms may also be downloaded from the Secretary of the State's website at www.sots.ct.gov (elections & voting, voter resources, absentee ballot and procedures, application for ballot). The absentee ballot applications with an ORIGINAL signature must be on file in order for a ballot to be counted.

DID YOU KNOW:

That on October 1, 1894 bicycle regulations were established for the first time in Vernon requiring that "Every owner or keeper of a bicycle shall annually on or before the first day of June cause said bicycle to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year in the town clerk's office." The fees were one dollar for bicycle carrying one person – two dollars for two persons or more.

Public Works Community Day

The Vernon DPW held their annual Community Day on Saturday, May 21st this year. A mobile shredding unit was available to give Vernon residents the opportunity to have confidential documents destroyed on site. Several hundred pounds of paper were shredded.

Touch-A-Truck was popular with residents

of all ages. A plow truck, ambulance, fire truck, and a 10-wheeler were just some of the vehicles on hand. Public Works and State DOT personnel were available to answer questions about their jobs and the public had the opportunity to explore and climb aboard the big rigs.

Senior Center Director Sela Saunders was available to answer questions about programs that are currently being offered. The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members kept busy educating residents on Vernon Alert, the Town's

community-wide notification system, and provided assistance with the shred event as well. Thor and Tengo, together with their handlers Officers Sembersky and Condon, gave demonstrations of police dog behaviors and the jobs that they do.

Ten bins of food and \$225 were collected to benefit the Hockanum Valley Community Council Food Pantry. It does indeed take a village! Volunteers from within Public Works and many other Town departments worked together to make the event a success!

Leaf Collection Program - 2016

The Town of Vernon leaf program will begin Monday, November 7, 2016. Leaves should be raked to the curb by this date to ensure collection. Do not be alarmed if you see DPW crews out the week before this date. They are testing the vacuum equipment and training our temporary leaf laborers.

All streets in the Town of Vernon have been divided into 3 groups. Group A Streets will be collected first and completed before leaf crews move on to Group B Streets and so on. This program is dependent on weather. Under good conditions, we expect to complete a group of streets in 1-2 weeks. Rain, snow or freezing temperatures will delay the program.

All streets are guaranteed at least one pass. If time permits, there will be a second pass. Residents are at their own risk whether to wait for a second pass or to bag their leaves for pickup on either of the first two Fridays in December.

Residents may either transport their leaves to a designated leaf bin or bag them for pickup by DPW crews. Leaves may be bagged using either the biodegradable paper bags OR plastic lawn & leaf bags. Bagged leaves will be collected the first two Fridays in December. Bag pickup is not automatic - please call the Public Works Office at 860-870-3500 to schedule.

Leaf bins will open mid-October for the convenience of residents. Contamination caused by disposal of brush, bags, grass clippings or any other debris will result in these leaf bins being shut down.

- NYE STREET At the firehouse off West Street. Bin will be marked.
- **CHURCH STREET** In the bike trail parking area. Bin will be marked.
- **LEGION FIELD** Off Regan Road at rear of parking lot. Bin will be marked.

Please be aware of some delays that are beyond our control - leaf fall timeframe, weather conditions, holidays. "Mother Nature" plays a big role in our leaf program!

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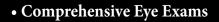


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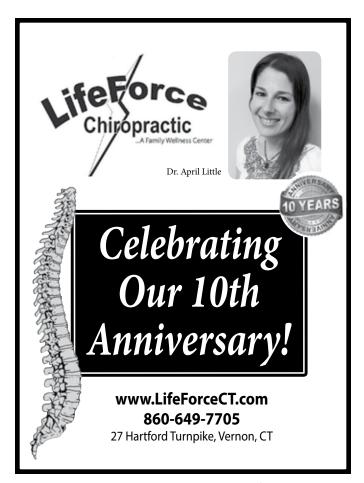

R.E.K. Recreation and Education for Kids

Our long-running R.E.K. program offers after school care for children in grades K-5 at Center Road School, Skinner Road School, Maple Street School, and Northeast School. We offer a variety of activities to meet the recreational and educational needs of your children, with a focus on building positive relationships with peers and staff members. R.E.K. will run from the end of the school day until 6:00 p.m. and is held every day that school is held, including scheduled half days and early dismissal days.

DAILY ACTIVITIES

Books are available at each site but your child is encouraged to bring a favorite book from home to read if they would like. Staff will be available for homework assistance as needed.
- **Recreation** Children will have plenty of time for active recreation each day. Outdoor time on the school's playscape and athletic fields will be offered whenever weather permits, and in the case of inclement weather the school gym will be used.

Recreation time will include a combination of structured games, team sports, and free play to allow your child to get moving and have fun!

- Arts & Crafts- A variety of arts & crafts activities will be offered to allow the children to explore their creativity, both through structured projects and free creative time.
- **Snack** A healthy snack will be provided each day, with special consideration given for allergies or food restrictions.

FEES & PAYMENTS

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Trail Mural dedication on National Trails Day



Saturday June 4th (National Trails Day) was the culmination of a one and a half year long mural project with the dedication of the Route 84 underpass mural.

The Vernon Greenways Volunteers spend hundreds of hours cleaning up the trails in Vernon. One area in particular, the Route 84 under pass near Sacred Heart Church, was the repeated victim of graffiti tagging. Don Bellingham of the Vernon Greenways Volunteers led the charge to permanently clean up this area of the Rails to Trails system.

The mural was done by lead artists Jeff Slobodien with assistance from several local artists and the EPOCH Art students at VCMS. A \$5,000 grant from Pratt & Whitney helped purchase supplies and equipment to make the mural a success.

Covering 2,500 square feet of space is no small task. Vernon Youth Services, Vernon Arts Commission, Greenway Volunteers and the Vernon Parks and Recreation Department all showed their support to dedicate this new piece of art. Once a section was completed it was covered with several coats of a clear paint. This will allow any future tagging to be removed with a power washer and preserved the mural for many years.

We can't wait to see everyone next year for the 72nd July in the Sky.



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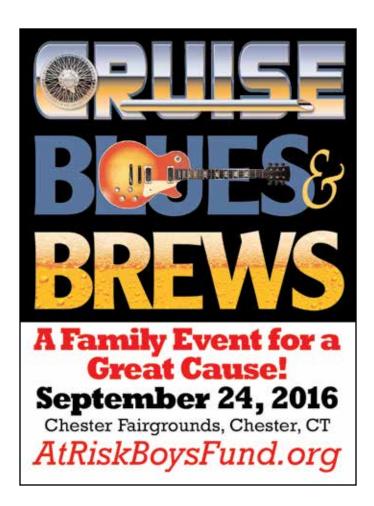


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If a Disaster Strikes, Will You Be Ready?

NCDHD HELPS RESIDENTS TO GET PREPARED!

Disasters can strike anywhere and at any time. It is important to plan and prepare for disasters before they occur. Preparing for an emergency now, provides you your best chance of survival, in the event of an actual emergency. Taking preparatory actions can reassure you, your family and co-workers that you can have control even in the face of such events.

Preparing for an emergency does not need to be an overwhelming task. The North Central District Health Department (NCDHD) recommends the following steps to help you get started:

- Create a family disaster plan. Entire families should be prepared and informed in the event of an emergency. Families may not always be together when these events take place and should have plans for making sure they are able to contact and find one another.
- Identify where you (and your pets) will go if you are told to evacuate.
- Ask an out-of-state friend to be your family contact. Other family members should call this person and tell them where they are.
- Locate important papers and documents. Have them ready to take with you in a plastic bag.
- Discuss the plan with your family members and test the plan at least annually.

PACK AN EMERGENCY "GO" BAG

Another important component of getting prepared is to pack an emergency "go" bag. A storm may force you to stay inside your home for a few days or may force you to evacuate your home. Preparing a bag in advance with the essentials you will need will help to reduce stress and get you to safety quickly. The emergency "go" bag should include the following items:

- Water (1 gallon per person per day) (if you have a pet pack additional water for pets)
- Non-perishable food (canned meats/vegetables, peanut butter/crackers)
- Can opener
- First aid kit
- Prescription medications & glasses
- Personal hygiene items
- Bucket with a lid and plastic garbage bags
- Chlorine bleach (no fragrances and dyes)
- Sleeping bag (or blankets & pillows)
- Extra change of clothes for each person and shoes
- Money

- Cell phone with car charger
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- AM/FM/weather radio (battery-powered)
- Fire extinguisher (ABC Type)
- Basic tool kit: flat-head & Phillips screwdriver, pliers, hammer, adjustable wrench
- Utensils
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape
- Knife
- Work gloves
- Rope
- Playing cards
- Sewing needles and thread

- Matches (packed in a waterproof container)
- Whistle

What type of disasters should Connecticut Residents plan for? Over the past 10 years, Connecticut has experienced natural disasters such as hurricanes, winter storms, floods, tornadoes, and power outages. We have been affected by man-made disasters such as 911 and the terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, and more recently the attacks in Florida, Germany and France.

NCDHD Reminds Residents to Stay Up To Date on Immunizations

Immunizations are the best way to prevent disease. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), immunizations saves the lives of 2 to 3 million people every year. Vaccine-preventable diseases can be very serious, may

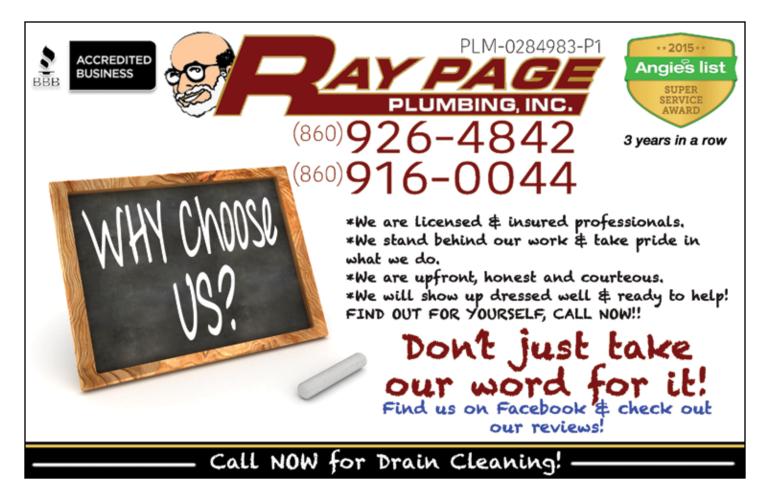
require hospitalization, or even be fatal – especially in infants and young children. That is why the North Central District Health Department (NCDHD) encourages all residents to stay up to date on their immunizations.

"Immunizations help prevent dangerous and sometimes deadly diseases such as

flu, measles, and pneumonia," said Patrice Sulik, NCDHD Director of Health. "Most vaccine-preventable diseases are spread from person to person. It's important to know which immunizations you need and when to get them."

NCDHD board member, Richard Regnier of Enfield, encourages residents to talk

to their primary care providers. Regnier states: "Make sure everyone in your family gets the immunizations they need. Be sure to follow up with providers if an immunization requires a series of vaccinations."

The United States has very low rates of vaccine-preventable diseases, but this isn't true everywhere in the world. Many countries do not have immunizations to prevent disease which is why we continue to see outbreaks of measles, polio, and whooping cough (to name a few). Immunizations not

only protect ourselves, they also protect the people around us (some who may be unable to get certain vaccines or might be susceptible for other reasons). Immunizations are important to our overall health, and can make the difference between life and death.

KEY FACTS.

- 1. Child safety seats and safety belts, when installed and used properly can prevent injuries and save lives. Each year, an estimated 975 children under 14 years of age die as a result of a motor vehicle incident.
- 2. Young children restrained in a child safety seat have an 80 percent lower risk of fatal injury than those who are unrestrained.
- 3. Child safety seats reduce fatal injury in passenger cars by 71 percent for infants less than 1 year old and by 54 percent for toddlers 1 to 4 years old. For children 4 to 7 years of age, booster seats have shown to reduce injury risk by 59 percent compared to safety belts

alone. By using a booster seat the placement of the shoulder belt sits better on the chest and not on the neck - so they don't place the shoulder belt in back of them.

CHILD SEAT SAFETY TIPS

WHEN USING A REAR-FACING CAR SEAT:

- 1. For the best possible protection, keep your infant in a rear–facing seat in a back seat for at least 2 yrs. of age or longer.
- 2. When they are infants, the car seat must be at a 45 degree angle. This is so the infant's head stays in contact with the seat and the baby's airway stays open. Always read the car seat instructions for each car seat.
- 3. The base of the car seat must be secured in the seat snuggly; with movement less than 1 inch side to side.
- 4. The shoulder straps on a rear-facing seat should be at the shoulder or a little below the shoulders.
- 5. Using a 5 point harness attach the leg straps first, then the chest clip. Place 1 finger under the strap and tighten. If you can pinch the webbing at the shoulder, it is too loose and your child could come out of the car seat. The chest clip should be at the arm pit level. This keeps the shoulder straps on the shoulder.



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
