

Mr. McNeely's support of the school district never ended, just shifted after his retirement. He successfully ran for the school board and has been a trustee ever since.

"What legacy do you want to leave your kids?" Mrs. Veracruz asked. "The one thing that runs deep in my heart is to have a legacy of serving others before yourself. It's monumental so generations that follow can mirror it."

Mrs. Veracruz said she was inspired by other women who pushed her to try new career choices she may not have considered, and she's grateful to have been surrounded by encouraging women.

Mrs. Veracruz started her career in education as a paraprofessional at Hyman Elementary School. After watching her teach a class as a substitute, the principal at the time, Vicki Harper, encouraged Mrs. Veracruz to return to college and to earn her teaching certification.

During this time, her husband, Joe Veracruz, was deployed in Afghanistan as a member of the Air National Guard and she was raising their children. With her husband serving in the military, Mrs. Veracruz questioned whether she could handle school, work and motherhood all at once.

"So I signed up for the University of North Texas and did it semester by semester," Ms. Veracruz said. "I enjoyed taking courses, such as psychology and humanity, and wrapped with a 4.0 [grade point average]."



### Operation Connection: District Volunteers Reconnect with Virtual Learners



A group of volunteers from Duncanville ISD fanned out across the district on Saturday in an effort called 'Operation Connection' to reach virtual learners who have not been engaging in school.

Teams made up of administrators, board members and staff volunteers knocked on doors of more than 100 students. They delivered care packages including instructions on how to log in to classes online, a Duncanville t-shirt, and for those who were home, encouragement to participate in classes and homework.

Claudia Jacobs has two daughters who are doing their schoolwork online. She said the biggest struggle she faces is motivating her children to do their classes while she's also working from home. Jacobs had heard about Operation Connection through an email from the district, but she was surprised to see one of her daughter's principals and the president of the Board of Trustees on her doorstep Saturday morning.

"I think that's awesome of them," Jacobs said. "They showed genuine support and care and I like that. I appreciate that."

As a result of the outreach, so far, six families have requested a change to their child's learning pathway, and 10 families have requested a follow-up with their child's home campus.



Each year more than 70,000 high school students from across the state of Texas begin the All-State audition process.

Ultimately just 1,800 students, fewer than three percent, are chosen to rehearse and perform at the annual TMEA convention in various bands, orchestras and choirs.

### Schedule Adjustments Coming This Week for Virtual Learning Students

#### Live Instruction Temporarily Suspended (Friday, Jan. 29 and Monday, Feb. 1)

On Friday, Jan. 29 and Monday, Feb. 1, all virtual students districtwide will be provided classwork assignments to complete independently, but virtual students will have no live instruction on these dates. There will be no change for students who are attending school in-person and they should plan on attending school in-person as usual on Friday, Jan. 29 and Monday, Feb. 1.

The purpose of this change for virtual students is to provide campuses with time to make classroom adjustments as we transition into the third nine week grading period. Over the past few weeks, parents were able to make learning preference change between in-person and virtual learning and now those changes are being put into place.

#### Duncanville High School Schedule Adjustment (Tuesday, Jan. 26)




