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The Effects of COVID-19 on Tiny Hearts

Although COVID-19 does not impact children as much as adults, there are some risks. Researchers have learned that children who have been infected with COVID-19 can later experience cardiac effects due to Multisystem Inflammatory Syndrome (MIS-C), which can occur weeks after exposure to COVID-19, and in some cases without symptoms during the initial infection. MIS-C is a condition where multiple organ systems become inflamed, including the heart, which can cause damage to heart's cells. This predominantly occurs in children younger than 14 but has been seen in up to 20 years of age.

Symptoms of MIS-C may include:

- Fever
- Bloodshot eyes Fatigue

• Rash

Abdominal pain, vomiting or diarrhea

MIS-C is rare, and most children eventually get better with proper diagnosis and treatment. If you suspect your child has MIS-C, seek medical attention so your child's doctor can order the appropriate studies to identify inflammation in his or her body. It is especially important to rule out cardiac inflammation by performing appropriate lab work, an electrocardiograph and/or an echocardiogram. Should MIS-C be diagnosed or suspected, your child's care team will treat it appropriately to help avoid or reduce any long-term effects. It is important that this includes specialized, pediatric cardiac care.

The Children's Heart Institute at MemorialCare Miller Children's & Women's Hospital Long Beach includes a comprehensive care team that can diagnose and treat virtually any heart condition for children of all ages, including the effects of MIS-C.

Parent To Parent



Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, often our kids were on their devices upwards of eight hours per day. What can parents do to keep them safe online and on their cell phones?

Give your kids a set of online safety rules that they will understand with explanations that they will believe and take to heart. It's important for you to know which online

games that your kids are playing. Many are multiplayer games where several online players can be together playing at once or just watching from around the world. This is highly dangerous because people can pretend to be someone else and of a certain age and can expose kids to unsuitable and unacceptable predatory language and content.

Remember not only to talk with your kids frequently about staying safe online, but also explain that anyone at any age can be cyberbullied. Explain why it's so important to think about what they are going to post at any given time or in any area before doing so, to keep their passwords safe, to always log off and not to click on links from people that they don't know. The right thing to do is to report the cyberbullying to an authoritative figure as well. They may just save a life.

You could also take their electronic devices away for a few hours each day, but for those hours that they're on them, rules and guidelines still need to be in place.

Snapchat is a program where people can send images, videos, etc. to friends which will disappear within 10 to 30 seconds.. The hidden danger is that those "private" moments are not really deleted. They're hidden in files on most phones and if someone takes a screen shot, the message, image or whatever can be posted anywhere.

Finsta is a fake Instagram account and if a screen shot is taken, it can show up anywhere online.

Be sure to read about popular apps and arm yourself with knowledge for options that you as the parent can do to help your kids be safe. A few are: Instagram, YouTube, Kik, Telegram, TikTok

There's phone apps offered to parents to help them monitor their kids' phone and online activities.

Look up how to set up filters and teach your kids how to recognize, delete and block it.

This whole cyber safety situation is extremely exhausting. But, there's no way of getting around it if you're going to be proactive in protecting your children.

Enthusiastic about STEAM



for the Coca-Cola Scholars Program.


