









	Loan originated	Application denied	Total
Black or AA	7907	3997	11904
White	158287	34024	192311
Total	166,194	38021	408,430

If a person is Black, then the probability of their loan application being originated in Massachusetts is 66.42%. If a person is White, then the probability of their loan being originated in Massachusetts is 82.31%.

GOALS Stay focused on our original planning goals, which include:

- health and safety

EMERGING PRIORITIES As the year progresses and with improved weather, vaccinations, more testing, and possibly less mitigation efforts needed, additional viable goals have emerged:

- How can we accommodate students connecting with their classmates more often?
- Can we get students on campus more than twice each week?
- Can students connect with teachers more often, even if not on campus?
- Can we find ways for students to be together for co-curricular programming more often?

MITIGATION STRATEGIES IN PLACE

- Hybrid (in-person and async): De-densifies campus
- Cohorts across grade levels: De-densifies classes
- Pods: Maintains social distancing
- Mods: Minimizes contacts
- Masks
- Wayfinding
- Surveillance Testing

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES:

- Vaccine Timeline
- Space Logistics
- Equitable instruction time across courses
- Minimize contact tracing
- Demands on faculty

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2021-2022 AND BEYOND

- Curricular planning for 2021–2022 with typical timeline for course registration and a full catalog of courses
- Fostering student-centered experiences inside and outside of the classroom
- Project-based learning: holding onto exams *and* building in project periods
- Assessments and standards-based feedback
- Moving Beyond AP's, Advanced Seminars, and Integrated Studies Program
- Community building through curriculum development (e.g. performing arts, social justice/anti-racism graduation requirement)




