

NAME: YEAR 4 CLASS: BRING TERM - BAROQUE MUSIC CHALLENGE

Learning objective:
To demonstrate your musical knowledge by completing this Baroque themed Musical Challenge!

Antonio Vivaldi (1678-1741) was a priest and a musician who lived and worked in Venice, the great Italian city of canals, islands and churches. He was known as the 'red priest' because of the colour of his hair, but most of his working life was spent writing operas, concertos (over 500) and other vocal and instrumental pieces. Many of his works were written for the musicians at a girls' orphanage in Venice, where he worked. Vivaldi is perhaps best known for his four descriptive violin concertos known as 'The Four Seasons'. For each concerto, Vivaldi provided a 'programme' to explain what he is describing in the music. He includes such details as raindrops, a dog barking and hunting calls.





Year 1 in a Jam (Sandwich)






DoodleMaths Update

Year 6 Junior Bake Off



Year 6 have been busy this week taking part in the Great Russell Bake Off. We have calculated recipe quantities using ratio and proportion, written descriptive recipes, including imperative verbs, adjectives and adverbs, baked our cakes and iced them using symmetrical designs.

Cupcakes

You will need

- 110g soft butter
- 110g Golden castor sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 110g self raising flour

For the buttercream

- 150g softened butter
- 300g icing sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 3 tsp milk

STEP 1
Heat oven to 180c /160c fan / gas 4 and fill a 12 cupcake tray with cases

STEP 2
Using an electric whisk beat 110g Softened butter 110g Golden castor sugar together in till paste and fluffy and whisk in 2 large eggs One at a time, scraping down the sides of the balls after each addition

STEP 3
Add 1/2 Teila extract, 110g Self rising flour and pinch a of salt, whisk until just combined then spoon the mixture into the cupcake cases

STEP 4
Bake 15 minutes until golden brown and insert a skewer into the middle of each cake if it comes out clean leave them to cool

STEP 5
To make buttercream whisk 150g softened butter until super soft! then add 300g icing sugar, 1 tablespoon of vanilla extract and a pinch of salt. Whisk together until smooth (start off slowly to avoid icing sugar cloud) then beat in 3 tablespoons of milk


