Months of virtual learning finally came to end on February 1 when students returned for consistent in-person instruction for the first time since March 2020. Half of the students are on campus each day following a new hybrid schedule to maintain smaller classes for social distancing. If pandemic conditions continue to improve, the goal is to have all students back on campus starting March 1.

DPCR was the winner in the Career Counseling category and remains the only local high school with a Corporate Work Study Program. Innovative Program Aims to Upend Traditional Math Teaching



People, particularly students, seem to either love or hate math, and that's not lost on DePaul Cristo Rey's math teachers who see many students struggle in their classrooms. "Many of our students have the mindset that if you're not good at math, you're not smart," says Math Teacher **Dominic Masotti**, pictured above. "It's not true, but that ingrained outlook is challenging to overcome."

Changing Minds and Math

The opportunity to challenge that mindset is among the reasons Dominic is exuberant when he talks about DPCR's participation in the Silicon Valley Math Initiative (SVMI), a professional development program for teachers funded through and promoted by the Cristo Rey Network.

Dominic and Principal **Paul Ebert** led the charge for DPCR to join the SVMI's two-year program to improve the quality of math instruction, totally transforming the traditional math classroom setting and in turn, increasing student achievement. All of DPCR's math teachers began the rigorous program this school year in a cohort with other Cristo Rey math educators around the country. "This program is providing us a professional framework to learn and be coached in research-based, proven teaching methods," says Dominic.


Even while teaching math virtually from August to February, Dominic noticed a difference when he incorporated what he was learning through the SVMI. "When I use a SVMI technique in my class, the lesson just goes better. There is more student input, activity and learning. It's the kind of math that should be taught, period," he says.

A Great Sense of Optimism

SVMI aims to improve math instruction by helping teachers not only incorporate thoughtful activities in the classroom, but to learn effective techniques on how to help support and respond to students' learning. Teachers are even given the opportunity to observe one another practicing these techniques in the classroom. Dominic says, "It takes the approach that struggle is good and mistakes are good because they are a path to learning."

As the pandemic continues to enormously impact education and while its long-term effects on student learning are yet to be known, Dominic has hope for students' improved math achievement. "This program really empowers me with a great sense of optimism. I was spinning my wheels trying to make traditional math teaching work for my students," he says. "Now my great hope is that this will increase students' positive relationship with math."




The family of **Brandon Ford '15** enrolled him in DePaul Cristo Rey before the school was even open; he can't believe that's been almost 10 years ago. "I'm so glad that my grandmother did what she did and signed me up. She responded in faith and took a risk on a new school," he says. "As the first class we were the testers going through changes with the school. Through it all we had a great experience and got a great education."

Following his graduation, DPCR's first, Brandon enrolled at Wilmington College and graduated this past May with an accounting degree and Wilmington's highest honor for student leadership, the Robert E. Lucas Leadership Award. His list of campus activities and leadership roles is impressive: resident assistant, student ambassador, mentor for two university offices, and leader of the percussion section of the Quaker Thunder Pep Band. He co-founded Men of Excellence and served as president of the Chi Alpha Christian fellowship chapter.

His accounting, communication and leadership skills are all at play as he pursues a career in banking. He's a credit underwriter at National Cooperative Bank in Hillsboro, Ohio. "When I started college I planned to pursue a music career; I chose an accounting major so I would know how to manage my finances," Brandon explains. "Gradually my focus changed and now a career in banking is a way for me to step out and help others. I want to fill in a need in lower income communities including Black, Hispanic and rural, so that each individual can have the knowledge and tools to pursue their dream."

While he didn't know it 10 years ago, Brandon realizes now that the opportunity to pursue his dreams started at DPCR. "I'm very thankful for DePaul Cristo Rey and the advantages it gave me as an African-American male, compared to others my age. Lessons I learned at DPCR and experiences I had in the Corporate Work Study Program are still helping me to this day in my career," he says. "DPCR was and is ahead of its time. I'm so grateful to all there who saw something in me that I didn't see in myself, and I thank God for the opportunities DPCR has given me."
