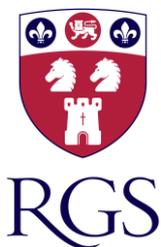

THE POSITION

We have an exciting opportunity for a qualified teacher of Biology to join our dynamic and successful Biology Department. You will be capable of teaching from Y7 through to A-Level, inspiring our students with a love of the subject and possessing a willingness to take them well beyond the scope of the syllabus. There will be opportunities to work with students applying for top universities as well.

Being 'willing to go the extra mile' is a major part of the role for all teachers at the RGS, not merely in specialist activities, but in a huge range of extra-curricular sporting, artistic and cultural work. We are keen to invite applications from those who would like to make their own distinctive contribution to this ethos. We very much value colleagues who are willing to contribute to our extra-curricular programme. An ability to teach in other sciences might also be desirable.

The RGS has its own salary scale (which is above national pay scales for teachers) and provides NQTs with an appropriate programme of induction leading to QTS.

THE SCHOOL

Thomas Horsley, the original settlor of the Royal Grammar School Newcastle (RGS) pledged his legacy to the School in 1525. Almost 500 years later, RGS continues to flourish as the premier independent school in the North East of England and as one of the country's leading schools. We regularly lead all northern schools in national league tables and pride ourselves on academic excellence, a high level of pastoral support, involvement in a wide range of sports and other the extra-curricular activities, and our commitment to bursaries and partnerships. In December 2020, we were named as the North East Independent School of the Decade by the Sunday Times.

RGS has grown substantially in recent years. There are now some 1,320 students, over 260 of whom are in the Junior School. The Sixth Form of 350 students is one of the largest in the independent sector. We became coeducational 20 years ago and girls now comprise 43% of the school.

The school is based in the heart of the City, immediately opposite Jesmond Metro station. The school occupies over 30 acres of land and has state-of-the-art facilities, including five brand new art studios, a new library, a new Sixth Form Centre, a 25m swimming pool, two Sports Halls, a Performing Arts Centre, outdoor football/rugby pitches at Mooracres, an artificial turf pitch for hockey and the former County Cricket Ground.

THE BIOLOGY DEPARTMENT

The department consists of seven teaching staff and two technicians. We are a strong team, but we value independence, and encourage teachers to use classroom practices which play to their strengths. In Years 7-9 we deliver our own KS3 course, and then move onto the Edexcel IGCSE for Years 10-11. Our classes are mixed ability (within the context of a highly selective school), and they contain around 24 students in Years 7-11. Our A-Level course is also with Edexcel (the Biology B syllabus,) and a typical sixth form cohort is between 50 and 60, so we generally have around 100 Sixth Form students studying biology at any one time. These are

usually split into 5 sets per year group. Staff are expected to teach across the whole age range.



The freedom to be an individual is an important part of teaching at the RGS. That said, we are a friendly and collaborative group, we teach from a common set of resources and we are committed to sharing good teaching practice. The successful candidate will have a love of biology and will want to function as a member of the departmental team, whilst bringing their own unique take to the way that the subject is delivered. Outside of the lab, we run an annual field trip, as well as numerous other trips and activities. The department also hosts a horticultural club.

TEACHING SPACES AND RESOURCES

We have five spacious and well-appointed labs within the Science and Technology Centre (STC). Standard facilities include digital touch screens in each teaching room and staff are provided with a Surface Pro laptop computer. The department also has an office, a prep room and a large seminar room.

A healthy level of funding allows access to a range of good quality equipment to support practical work. We have a PCR machine, high end microscopes and a dedicated microbiology prep area. The production and sharing of resources and practical ideas plays a central part in what we do. New colleagues are expected to contribute to this culture.



LIVING IN THE NORTH EAST

Whilst the North East is beloved and popular with so many, we know that not everyone will have had first-hand experience of it, so this is a short introduction to a city and region which we love, and believe you will too. Newcastle is a medium-sized city with an historic centre and a vibrant life of its own. There's culture and arts in the form of the award-winning BALTIC Art Gallery and The Sage, alongside several theatres that attract national touring productions. There's music from classical to club and we are home to the Royal Northern Sinfonia. There's also a growing food culture with some fantastic restaurants.

If you like sport then there's certainly no shortage of top class entertainment: from Premier League football being played at St James' Park and EFL at the Stadium of Light to first class cricket at Durham (a mere half hour away), and great rugby at the Falcons, not to mention basketball and even ice hockey, and then there is the annual Great North Run. The North East has also produced some of the country's finest athletes in track and field and there are clubs aplenty to get involved with, most famously in Gateshead.

The coast and the hills are minutes away from the city centre. By car you can be in the middle of nowhere in 45 minutes, the Scottish Borders is only an hour away and the Lake District an hour and a half. The coast is served by the Metro (our version of the Tube), but some of the country's best beaches are up the road in Northumberland, less than 40 minutes by car. There's mountain biking, road cycling, climbing, and endless hill walks in stunning countryside. There are green spaces all over the city too, with plenty of parks for children and dogs alike to run around.

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There are three local teaching hospitals, two universities in the city with another three close by. Some pioneering medical work goes on at the RVI, Great North Children's Hospital and the Freeman Hospital.

History abounds with more castles than you could count and sites of interest for almost every period of English (and border) history. Add that to a proud, independently minded and very friendly local population and we have most things

you could want.

There are some really excellent primary schools in the region and city as well as some good secondary schools too, but staff do get a discount at the RGS. There are also a number of good competitor independent schools as well.

The RGS is on the edge of the city centre, a ten-minute walk from the main shopping areas. The leafy, affluent suburbs of Jesmond and Gosforth are close by with housing ranging from purpose-built flats in terraced streets and conversions of bigger houses to terraced houses, post-war semis and large, family-sized detached houses with big gardens. All of this is within walking distance of the school so no commute is needed. Properties are very affordable both within the city and the surrounding area. If you want to travel to work then you could wake up with a sea view, hop on the Metro and be at school just half an hour later. The region wins tourism and lifestyle awards for very good reasons!

- a satisfactory Enhanced Disclosure Report from the DBS.

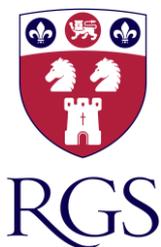

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Hours and Benefits

- Working Hours - Normal working hours will be those necessary to carry out the duties of the post as a part time (0.6) Biology Teacher (including commitment to attending parents' evenings, staff training and meeting deadlines).
- Salary - The salary will be determined by the RGS Teachers' Scale pro-rata to 0.6.
- Pension - The School is part of the Teachers' Pension Scheme and all teachers are automatically included in the Scheme.
- Lunch - School lunch is provided during term time.
- Education - At present the School's policy is to allow all eligible members of staff to educate their children at the school at concessionary rates, subjects to their children meeting the academic entry requirements and subject to a place being available.
- Car Parking - Car parking is provided during term time.
