Researchers say 'average daily attendance' is a deeply inequitable measure.

Texas schools are largely funded based on who shows up to class, a measure with the potential to undercount students in low-income communities.

Education finance experts say using an attendance-based funding model exacerbates inequities — and that continuing to do so as districts work to recover from the coronavirus pandemic could be especially harmful.

So when state Rep. Gina Hinojosa asked a group of education advocates what she could do to help this session, they came to her with a wonky request: Introduce a bill that would funnel money to Texas public schools based on student enrollment, rather than attendance.

# Hold Harmless Extension

- Commissioner has said that it is up to the legislature to extend the hold harmless (even though he has the authority to do so).
- House speaker Dade Phelan has said he supports a move that would keep districts' finances steady. "I would support holding ISDs harmless provided that I also felt comfortable that all efforts were made and all due diligence was done in reaching out to the missing students."
- Senator Taylor, Chair of the Senate Education committee said he wants to hear what districts have done to search for missing students. "If you just say OK, we're going to hold everybody harmless, does that take away the incentive to go find these kids?"
- No word from Governor Abbott or Lt. Governor Dan Patrick

# Proposed Appropriations

• Senate Appropriations	\$120 Billion

# Both Appropriation Bills Contain:

- Full finding of HB3
- \$3.1 billion increase in the Foundation School Program
  - A portion of this could come from federal Covid-19 stimulus funds
- \$1 billion for property tax compression
- \$70 million for transition to online STAAR testing
- No expenditures from the \$11.6 billion Rainy Day Fund

# Federal Funding

- Latest Stimulus package includes \$5.5 billion for Texas (compared to \$1.3 billion in initial package)
- These funds can, and probably will, be used to **supplant state funds again as they did with the first package** in order to balance the state budget.
