<b>What is the course description?</b>		
<p style="text-align: center;"><b>AP Seminar</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● AP Capstone is built on the foundation of 2 year-long AP courses- AP Seminar and AP Research- and is designed to complement and enhance the in-depth, discipline-specific study experienced in other AP courses.</li> <li>● AP Seminar develops students’ skills in writing, communication, research, analysis, evidence-based arguments, collaboration and presenting-- core academic skills that are needed for college, career and life readiness.</li> <li>● In AP Seminar, students investigate real-world issues from multiple perspectives, gathering and analyzing information from various sources in order to develop credible and valid evidence-based arguments.</li> </ul>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>AP Language and Composition</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● AP Language and Composition provides an opportunity for students to study and write various kinds of analytical or persuasive essays on non-literary topics.</li> <li>● The course prepares students for effective reading and writing in college and beyond.</li> <li>● The course is designed for students’ development of a repertoire of close reading, critical thinking, and writing skills. Students are expected to have complex and original thoughts that can be translated into sophisticated and focused writing that displays a maturity of style and vocabulary.</li> </ul>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Junior English 3</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● English 3 explores contemporary and classical works of fiction and nonfiction from a thematic perspective.</li> <li>● Students engage in analytical discussions/Socratic Seminars related to “big ideas” essential questions, themes, and characters in and across texts.</li> <li>● This course prepares students to compose analytical, narrative, argument, synthesis and research writing assignments.</li> <li>● The course content emphasizes the integrated study of reading, writing, speaking and listening.</li> <li>● There is an emphasis on critical reading, citing textual evidence, close reading skills.</li> </ul>

What are the expectations in this course?		
<p>Students are expected to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Complete a summer reading assignment</li> <li>● Develop key academic skills that will be used in college and beyond</li> <li>● Read and analyze texts on their own with minimal guidance from the teacher</li> <li>● Become critical thinkers in order to analyze/critique difficult texts</li> <li>● Work within a group and independently, to collect and analyze information with accuracy and present findings</li> <li>● Work independently to extend their abilities to synthesize information from multiple perspectives and apply skills in new situations</li> <li>● Practice disciplined and scholarly research skills while exploring relevant topics that appeal to their interests and curiosity</li> <li>● Self-regulate and follow a calendar of assignments (similar to a college syllabus)</li> </ul> <p><small>*Please refer to the 2021-2022 grouping procedures for placement criteria.</small></p>	<p>Students are expected to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Complete a summer reading assignment</li> <li>● Develop key academic skills that will be used in college and beyond</li> <li>● Read a variety of non-fiction and fictional texts each marking period</li> <li>● Write on-demand and process essays (synthesis, argument, and rhetorical analysis)</li> <li>● Respond to College Board multiple-choice questions (rhetorical analysis and writing)</li> <li>● Remain up-to-date with current events</li> <li>● Collaborate with peers on rhetorical analysis, literary analysis, and writing skills</li> <li>● Participate in group projects and presentations</li> <li>● Examine and analyze the choices writers make to achieve a purpose with a particular audience</li> <li>● Enhance their ability to understand and question the world around them through a rigorous study of rhetoric</li> </ul> <p><small>*Please refer to the 2021-2022 grouping procedures for placement criteria.</small></p>	<p>Students are expected to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Complete a summer reading assignment</li> <li>● Develop key academic skills that will be used in college and beyond</li> <li>● View documentaries and films associated with the text using various critical lenses</li> <li>● Be a part of a broad scope of collaborative activities, projects, presentations</li> <li>● Read approximately 4-6 full-length novels</li> <li>● Read a variety of nonfiction texts and poetry</li> <li>● Prepare for student-led in class discussions</li> <li>● Collaborate with peers on literature analysis</li> <li>● Enhance their understanding of the surrounding world through intense study of fiction and non-fiction</li> <li>● Write on-demand and process essays (e.g. argument, synthesis, narrative, expository, etc.)</li> </ul> <p><small>*Please refer to the 2021-2022 grouping procedures for placement criteria.</small></p>
Do I have the option to earn college credits?		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Students who earn a score of 3 or higher on the AP Seminar assessment and a final grade of a C+ in AP Seminar are eligible to take AP Research.</li> <li>● Students who earn scores of 3 or higher on the AP Seminar exam and AP Research will receive the AP Seminar and Research Certificate signifying their attainment of college-level academic and research skills.</li> <li>● AP Seminar is a prerequisite for AP Research. AP Research will be offered in September of 2021.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Students who earn a score of 3 or higher on the AP Language and Composition exam could receive college credit.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● TBD for 3-H and 3-1.
