


## **GRATITUDE PROJECT**

### **TEA AND MUSIC CONCERT**




We are hugely looking forward to hearing the submitted performances and, of course, to also welcoming back all pupils involved in music rehearsals and individual music lessons on 8 March.

### **EAL PERSUASIVE WRITING**

Before half term in EAL lessons, some of our EAL pupils were studying a topic looking at the reintroduction of beavers back into the UK and the benefits such projects can have on the environment. These pupils were also working on their Persuasive Writing skills. Here is a brilliant piece of writing by **Karina 5** 78F

Beavers were extinct in the UK for nearly 400 years, but now scientists have decided that the environment needs them. Why?


Firstly, beavers make dams and the dams that beavers build create habitats for a lot of plants and animals, such as small insects, frogs and fish, which is good for biodiversity.

Secondly, beaver dams also help alleviate flooding. When beavers build dams in rivers and streams it reduces the flow of water downstream.

From the other point of view, a lot of farmers don't like beavers because they think they aren't good for the land and they also damage trees.

Although beavers can damage land and trees, which is bad for farmers, there is a solution: move the fields further from the rivers. If there are 5 metres between the river and the fields, then beavers don't damage the farmer's fields and crops. Another solution is to put metal or sand around the bottom of the trees so beavers won't gnaw them.

In my personal opinion, beavers have more advantages than disadvantages for the environment.

# Chaplain's Thought of the Week

Stephen Covey said "Whilst we cannot always choose what happens to us, we can choose our responses". Your responses as parents, pupils and teachers have been amazing. As we have navigated another lockdown, I could not be more proud of the way in which everyone has rallied around and worked so hard.

So, as we move through Lent and lockdown, some other wise words from Covey remind us about three circles of influence – recognising those things which we can control, where we have influence or where we have concerns yet no influence or control. Let us use this time of Lent to give up wasting energy on things where we have no influence or impact, instead let us invest our energies where we can make a positive difference.

The 'serenity prayer' is similar in message and uses the words: 'God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference.'

Lent is a time for us to reflect and respond, as we prepare for Easter and the incredible gift of love through Jesus. A gift that, for the ultimate price paid on our behalf, offers us hope, peace and joy. As we respond to those around us, to the context in which we live, to the time of Lent and the Easter story, let us focus our energies on bringing hope, peace, love and joy.

"Be a light, not a judge, a model not a critic. Little by little, your circle of influence will explode and you will avoid the emotional cancers of complaining, criticizing, competing, comparing and cynicism...all of which are the opposite to being proactive." - Covey

So, this period of Lent, regardless whether lockdown unlocking pans out and no matter what your faith perspective is, let us try to give up – or 'fast' – on complaining, criticizing and cynicism. Instead, let's be proactive and 'feast on' those things where we can make a difference. Let us shine brightly, sharing the Easter message of love, of forgiveness, of hope, of peace and of joy.

Fast from unrelenting pressures; Feast on unceasing prayer.

Fast from hostility; Feast on nonviolence.

Fast from bitterness; Feast on forgiveness.

Fast from self-concern; Feast on compassion for others.

Fast from personal anxiety; Feast on eternal truth.

Fast from discouragement; Feast on hope.

Fast from facts that depress; Feast on truths that uplift.

Fast from lethargy; Feast on enthusiasm.

Fast from suspicion; Feast on truth.

Fast from thoughts that weaken; Feast on promises that inspire.

Fast from idle gossip; Feast on purposeful silence.

Gentle God, during this season of fasting and feasting, gift us with your presence so we can be a gift to others in carrying out your work. Amen.








### **HOLLIES**

### **LEGEND OF NINA**






### **CHINESE NEW YEAR DRAGONS**
