

THE VISION OF OUR FOUNDERS

Expanding our footprint



For over 40 years, Colegio Interamericano has been growing our student population in Guatemala city. As such, there was the need to expand learning spaces. Six years ago, Fundación Educativa Guatemala, a not for profit foundation created with the objective to contribute to the development of the country through education, came together to lay out the plans known as Project Journey, aptly named to evidence the growth and future plans of Colegio Interamericano.



Today, as we welcome the completion of this Journey, we have to wonder if the Founders had a special gift to foresee the future. There is no better time, than this disruptive time in history, to receive the additional space: social distancing is at the forefront of our minds.



From 9 acres of property and buildings, Interamericano now covers 15.5 acres, and includes 63,308m² of beautiful terraced land divided into five distinct areas: Early Childhood Education, Elementary School, Middle School, High School and Administration. Our campus now encompasses 121 classrooms, eight state of the art science laboratories, two maker spaces, an art wing and purpose built music rooms, five computer labs, a two-story library, an amphitheater and two cafeterias. Among the sport and recreation areas, the school now has a large synthetic soccer field surrounded by built-in stadium seating, two covered basketball and volleyball courts, Early Childhood and Elementary playgrounds and multiple student's common areas. Key to the design of our new building is the numerous outdoor collaborative spaces. We are excited to enjoy the flexible, dynamic learning spaces to support our evolving programs and pedagogy.



The landscape for our students is continuously evolving and to be 'Future Ready' our new building encourages creative, intentional approaches to learning. Each of our divisions will benefit from this project as it allows all to expand their footprint. We know our students, faculty and staff will further strengthen our sense of community with these spaces. Collaboration, team building and fostering relationships are key components to our INTER experience, and our new buildings will ensure these goals are supported. Engaging our parent community is key and we now have the venue to host a variety of parent events. We are excited to have our parents, in all divisions, join us for catalytic conversations, student performances, social events and opportunities to further our relationships in our amazing new spaces.



While our students are not on campus yet, they can see the roof of our stellar INTER - HUB in the Guatemalan horizon. We are eager to return to campus and benefit from the spacious vision of our founders.

In many ways, we have returned to where we originally started as overwhelmed first-year teachers operating only one or two days ahead in our daily lesson planning... Trying to figure it out for the first time in real time with never enough time. Yet let's face the brutal reality that we've been under far greater real-world duress now than then with lives in our communities held in the balance. And it's no game; it's high stakes. So, as we enter our second pandemic school year after giving 110% for 24/7/365 in service to the greater good, I believe that we must begin to grasp these facts and transition away from the notion of the head of school and our respective institutions as preternatural and indefatigable forces of nature. 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
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
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
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
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2019-20 Changes to AP: A Path to Success for All Students



AP[®] students do college-level work in high school. And if they score a 3 or higher on the exam, they can earn college credit. To help them make the most of this opportunity, we're supporting their teachers with a suite of online tools and introducing new policies for the 2019-20 school year.

More Students Succeed When They Register in the Fall

More than half of schools that offer AP ask students to commit to taking the exam in the fall, boosting their chance of earning a score that translates to college credit. We've seen the benefits firsthand.

New Resources

Students will get personalized feedback through new digital tools that provide daily support for every AP classroom. Their teachers will be able to track their performance throughout the year using an online bank of real AP practice questions and monthly personal progress checks.

Your Student's To-Do List

Here is what students need to do to prepare for the 2019-20 AP school year.

THIS SPRING

Students sign up for AP classes at school.

BEFORE THE SCHOOL YEAR

- Students visit apstudent.collegeboard.org to learn more about AP courses and exams.
- Students without a College Board account should create one and set their password. They'll need their username
 and password when their AP classes start in the fall.
- Students who already have an account should make sure they know their username and password.

FALL 2019

- First week of class: Teachers will give students a join code for each of their AP classes. Students use their College Board username and password and join code to enroll in their class section.
- October/November: Schools submit exam orders.

SPRING 2020

- March: Schools submit any changes to their exam order and order exams for students in spring courses.
- May: Students take AP Exams.

SUMMER 2020

• July: AP Exam scores are released.

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
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
