## PHS Announces 2021 National Merit Finalists

#### **Dear Parents:**

Each year Parkland High School is proud to recognize the superior academic performance of a select group of students. Our school counselors are diligently meeting with students to complete the course registration process. I want to assure parents that every student will be seen – virtually this year - by a school counselor to review next year's course requests.

We appreciate everyone's flexibility and patience throughout this process as we try to make plans for next year's opening of school. A course registration verification process will occur at the start of the marking period 4 for any parent who wishes to make any changes to their student's course requests. Please remember that any changes to a student's schedule for next year must be requested no later than June 1. Further requests for schedule modifications will only be considered during the drop/add period once the students return to school in August.

The school board recently adopted our 2021-2022 school calendar and so you can plan accordingly. Please note the first week of school is a fourday week slated to begin Monday, August 30 and conclude on Thursday, September 2. In observance of Labor Day, school will be closed Friday, September 3 and Monday, September 6.

One important note for seniors - on Tuesday, May 25, Parkland High School will virtually hold its annual Academic Scholarship Recognition Ceremony to honor students who have received merit-based scholarships, totaling a minimum of 25% of the cost of tuition at the college/university that they will be attending. Many of your children have established incredible resumes through academic and extracurricular excellence; if your child has received scholarships which qualify to the 25% standard, please submit your child's form (found on page 20 of this newsletter) so we can celebrate their outstanding awards.

For all of us, spring is always an incredibly fun and celebratory time for seniors. We have a date slotted for our graduation commencement ceremony - Tuesday, June 8. Exactly what the ceremony will look like and where it will be held is still on the table as the senior class officers have been meeting with high school administrators to prepare possible options based upon the seating capacity guidelines available. We are exploring several options and we truly hope and desire to have an event for the entire class of 2021 and their parents. Prom is another challenge, and we are preparing several options as well. We will communicate our plans as best we can, but are trying to remain as flexible as possible in the event any lifted restrictions could significantly change our plans for the betterment of our students.

# Counseling corner

### Junior athletes: NCAA Eligibility Center

Students who plan on playing a Division 1 or Division 2 sport in college should register with the NCAA Eligibility Center following completion of their junior year in high school. At the end of the student's junior year, a transcript that includes grades for six semesters should be requested through the Parchment Exchange eTranscript Service. Additionally, students should have their SAT or ACT scores forwarded directly to the Eligibility Center (by using code "9999") whenever they take the exam. Students can access the Eligibility Center website at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> for additional information.

### Juniors: Don't forget to sign up for the SAT or ACT

Juniors are reminded that sign-ups for the SAT Reasoning Test, SAT Subject Tests and the ACT are currently in progress. May and June testing dates are still available for all tests. Registration for the SAT can be completed on the College Board website at <u>www.sat.org/register</u>. Registration for the ACT can be completed online at <u>www.actstudent.org/start</u>.

# Help mitigate the spread of Coronavirus

Wear a mask, wash your hands, and keep social distance.

Complete the <u>Wellness Form</u> for each of your students every morning prior to coming to school.

Contact the Health Room if your child is going to be absent due to reasons involving the Coronavirus, including close contact, quarantine, travel, and being tested.

# Guidelines for sending your child to school

To help stay healthy and decrease the spread of illness in the school, we are encouraging all families to adhere to the following guidelines for sending your child to school. Please keep your child home from school (even if they have a test or sporting event) if he/she is experiencing any of the following symptoms:

Fever of 100 degrees or more

Vomiting/Diarrhea

Severe head cold

Persistent cough

Severe sore throat

Students should not return to school until they are fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medications.

> These are the same criteria the Health Room uses as a guideline when sending students home ill from school.



### Juniors

All eleventh-grade students (hybrid and online) should return their completed physical forms to the Health Room as soon as possible. If you plan to have your student's physical done by the school physician, you need to notify the Health Room by March 8, 2021.

#### Immunization Requirement:

The meningitis vaccine is required on or after your student's 16th birthday. Students in grade 11 will be required to have this immunization on the first day of their senior year at Parkland High School. The 11th grade physical is a good time to make certain this immunization is completed.

### **Sophomores**

All tenth-grade students will soon receive paperwork for completing their mandated physical for the eleventh grade. This can be done at the time your student gets their physical for their driver's permit, but may not have been completed before July 1, 2020. The form for the school physical you receive is the preferable paperwork to be completed. However, copies of the physical forms used for the driver's permit are accepted for the student's school physical. Please return the choice form to the Health Room as soon as possible to indicate how the physical will be completed. Forms are available on the PHS website.



### Welcome second semester sophomore Driver Ed students and parents

Here is some general information about the 'Theory' Class if you are a student this semester:

All course materials are posted in the Schoology Driver Ed folder. You will find an introductory video, PowerPoint, and assessment packet for each unit.

A weekly agenda page should be your guide for daily Google Meets and assignments for the day.

Students are to participate in Google Meets each time they are scheduled.

## Certificates of completion ready for pick up

Students who have completed their theory course last year or during the fall semester can pick up their completion certificates in D133. These certificates are needed if you wish to take the Behind-the-Wheel driving lessons and should also be given to your insurance agent when you get your license.

### Freshmen can take the theory course over the summer

# Safe winter driving tips to review with your new driver

#### Get your car serviced

Visit your mechanic for a tune-up and ask a professional to check for leaks, badly worn hoses, or other needed parts, repairs, and replacements.

#### Check for recalls


The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) has a Recalls Look-up Tool that lets you enter a Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) to quickly learn if your vehicle has a critical safety issue that has not been repaired, and how to get that repair done for free. Check www.nhtsa.gov/recalls.

#### Read your owner's manual

Read your vehicle's manual to familiarize yourself with the safety features on your vehicle (such as antilock brakes and electronic stability control) and how the features perform in wintry conditions.

#### Plan your travel and route

Before heading out, make sure to check the weather, road conditions, and traffic. Do not rush. Allow plenty of time to get to your destination safely. Always familiarize yourself with directions and routes before you go, even if you use a GPS system, and let others know your route and anticipated arrival time.

# Student Assistance Program (SAP)

## Motivating your teen during COVID-19

As we continue to march through a challenging year for our teens, we may find ourselves a little burned out and impatient. Please remember that you are not alone. We are all experiencing challenges with our children.

The following tips may help to keep your teen motivated:

#### Don't assume

Don't assume that their lack of motivation or hesitation to start on a project is laziness. Ask how they're doing and genuinely listen to their answer. If they're depressed, anxious, or dealing with other personal issues, it can be hard for them to focus on their work.

#### Know what matters to them

Knowing what's important to your teen is crucial. Igniting their internal motivation will be far more effective than trying to apply external motivation by giving them a reason of your own.

#### Help them understand the why

It's important to connect the things they need to do to that shortterm or long-term goal that matters to them. It might be obvious to us as parents why their math or English homework needs to be completed, but we need to highlight its connect to something they want. A short-term benefit could be that they will earn a privilege from you, such as watching movies or playing video games, by completing the task. A long-term benefit could be graduation, and therefore being done with high school, or being able to get into the college they want. An even more long-term benefit could be connected to the career they have in mind. But we need to make the connection apparent, because teens tend to be very presentfocused.

#### Avoid the phrase "because I said so"

That explanation isn't sufficient for us as adults, and our teens are young adults or are at least becoming young adults. If we're expecting more maturity from them, we should treat them as we would treat more mature people. We wouldn't tell our spouse or



will be more

motivated to help if you have a dialogue with them and allow them to choose chores from a list you provide. It still allows you to ask them to do some of the thing you need done, but it empowers them with a choice. You can also allow them to choose when and how the task is done, provided that you make it clear what the final deadline for completion is.

#### Help them organize and remember

Teens can sometimes forget assignments and responsibilities, especially when they're feeling distracted or overwhelmed by difficult situations. Figure out what type of organizer, calendar, and/or notepad app they can install on their phone to set reminders. This will provide reminders for them without you having to do it, and it empowers them to be at least partially responsible for organizing their lives. Putting it on their phone is ideal because of how much of their lives is connected to their devices.

#### Don't fear failure

Mistakes can be an incredible teaching tool. Let them know that mistakes are part of the learning process and encourage them to not expect perfection from themselves. Progress should be the focus rather than perfection. If they do make a mistake, sit down with them and ask them what they feel like they want to do differently next time.

#### Celebrate achievements

Recognize their achievements and acknowledge their efforts. Highlight their strengths and the improvements you see them making. Sometimes teens become heavily focused on their flaws, and it's important for us to make them aware of their strengths and accomplishments.

#### Let them have fun

Make sure they're setting aside time to do the things that refuel and recharge them. They will be far more motivated to get things done if they're enjoying life and know that after the work they'll have the chance to do something they love.

#### Be patient

Being a teen and being a parent are both learning processes. It's important that we're patient with our teens and with ourselves as well. We're truly in this together.

After school session (3PM-5PM) or Evening session (6:30PM-8:30PM)

Parkland High School will offer an SAT Prep Course this spring to help students prepare for the SAT Exam that will be administered on **Saturday, May 8**, 2021. Students who participate in this course will receive preparation for both the verbal and math portions of the SAT exam. The verbal classes will help students prepare for the verbal section of the SAT by providing practice, test taking strategies, and test simulation in the areas of critical reading, evidence-based writing, and contextual vocabulary. The math classes will help students prepare for the math section of the SAT by providing practice, test taking strategies, and simulated test taking in the areas of algebra, geometry and trigonometry including problem solving, data analysis, and practice in ratios, rates and proportional relationships.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all Spring 2021 SAT Prep classes at PHS will be offered virtually only. There will be no face-to-face instruction. The course will consist of 10 two-hour sessions, five for each of the verbal and math components of the SAT exam. Students may register for one SAT prep session. Either an after-school session (3PM - 5PM) or an evening session (6:30PM - 8:30PM).

The 10-class session virtual course will begin on Monday, March 29, 2021, and continue through Wednesday, May 5, 2021. Classes will be held Mondays and Wednesdays.

The course registration deadline is Thursday, March 25, 2021 by 3PM. Registration is on a first-to-sign-up, first-to-pay basis only, so register early as space is limited.

Students will need to pick up an SAT Prep Book for this class, which is theirs to keep. The book will be available for students who have completed the online registration AND whose payment has been received.

The SAT Prep Book will be available for students to pick up from March 15 through March 26.


