He talked about the lack of accountability by the board and administration.

David McCray feels that the staff and board are working diligently on changes as well as Lincoln Crossing. He is disappointed about the Board of Trustees not answering the Communities questions. Twelve Bridges Middle School classes are impacted. He also brought up issues happening at Lincoln High School, the overcrowding; not having enough desks; students are using clipboards, the lines for the restrooms are to long, not enough books. He also talked about the cost of portables.

David Gordon – Thanked the board. He talked about the problems, and concerned citizens. He expressed board members and staff leaders are intelligent so what is the problem? Talked

7.1 (D/A) APPROVE THE FY 2006-07 SECOND INTERIM REPORT -

Carlson (06-07 G & O Component V)

• The FY 2006-07 Second Interim Report will be presented to the Board of Trustees for discussion and review.

Carrie presented a slide show on the seconded interim report. Wildlands mitigation funds are not restricted and they are one time monies. Cost for books and supplies are up. For Multi-Year projection 07-08 we are anticipating 200 new students which is an increase in ADA. She also reviewed mid year projections for 08-09, we are anticipating 250 new students. What this means is we will not meet the 3% reserved, we will be in a qualified budget. This means we may not be able to meet our obligations. On May 10th we will find out what the Governor budget will do for district. Next month we'll know what how much we will receive in ADA and another interim report will be brought back to the board in June. The district has been running \$4,000.00 in the red with transportation. We are still bringing back special education programs, so we won't have to pay so much to the county office. Our plan is to bring back one program per year. After much discussion there was a motion by Mr. Carras, seconded by Mr. Haley, and passed by unanimous vote.

Scott talked about meeting and working with groups on staffing ratios. He shared the qualified budget is deeply concerning and the district may also be looking at cuts, he is working to make it a positive budget.

7.2 (I/A) SCHOOL SAFETY - Boyle (06-07 G & O Component IV-V)

•Student safety is always a priority. Annually, districts and schools are required to update their Safe School Plans in order to plan and prepare for emergencies. All WPUSD sites and District Office have updated their plans, which cover situations from fire drills to lockdown and evacuation situations.

Mary talked about district safety site plans. She is currently working on making site plans uniform throughout the district. The board felt they needed more time to review the site plans. It was the consensus of the board is to bring back site plans and district plan to the May board meeting.

7.3 (I/D) DISTRICT BOUNDARIES – Leaman (06-07 G & O Component IV-V)

• During the 05-06 school year, the Ophir, Loomis, and Western Placer Unified School district's boards reached agreement on the

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annexation of 475.80 acres of land to Loomis and 221.48 acres of land to Ophir (the dotted line on the attached map). During the same period, a group of parents formed the Newcastle Boundary Change Committee. The committee has filed an appeal with the state to stop the action from moving forward. Newcastle and Ophir Elementary are charter and "school of choice" sites, so no inter-district is necessary to attend.

Scott presented an overhead on boundaries. He shared a couple of different options with the board. He asked if we should let the decision be made in November by the State or establish a feeder model which is approving interdistricts allowing students to attend Del Oro (we would need a MOU). Geographical choice would be to allow the student to attend another school based on residence area. An appeal has been sent to the state, the state will look at this appeal sometime in July and a decision will be made sometime in November. It was the consensus of the board to allow the state to make the decision.

BACKGROUND:

Historically, Administrative Regulation 5116.1 (Intradistrict Transfers) has been implemented in a variety of ways. Additionally, the opening of Lincoln Crossing Elementary and the reorganization of staff will have an effect on district openings next year. Research of surrounding area policies resulted in districts using different methodologies to implement intradistrict transfers.

The methodologies and my comments include:

- 1) Each intradistrict is decided at the site level between principals on a space available basis. This method could lead to overcrowding at certain schools with students being shuffled around the district after the school year begins. We have attempted this method and it did not lead to a smooth implementation.
- 2) Almost all Intradistricts are approved with the understanding that students will need to leave the school if a student in the attendance area moves in and needs the space when school begins. Once again, this could lead to displacement of students as the student's slot may be taken and will need to go yet another school.

3) <u>District office approves intradistricts.</u> With the opening of Lincoln Crossing, the Program Improvement status of First Street, and the priority for students residing in community facilities districts, this seems to be the best solution at this time.

Intradistrict Open Enrollment

Enrollment Under the No Child Left Behind Act

Within a reasonable amount of time, not to exceed 10 school days, after a student becomes the victim of a violent criminal offense while on school grounds, the student's parents/guardians shall be offered an option to transfer their child to an eligible school identified by the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee shall consider the student's needs and parent/guardian preferences in making the school assignment. If the parents/guardians choose to transfer their child, the transfer shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Within 10 school days after learning that a school has been designated as "persistently dangerous," the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of the school's designation. Within 20 school days after learning of the school's designation, the Superintendent of designee shall notify parents/guardians of their option to transfer.

Parents/guardians who desire to transfer their child out of a "persistently dangerous" school shall provide written notification to the Superintendent or designee and shall rank-order their preferences from among all schools identified by the Superintendent or designee as eligible to receive transfer students. The Superintendent or designee may establish a reasonable timeline, not to exceed 10 school days, for the submission of parent/guardian requests.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of their school assignment within 10 school days of the date that submissions are due. The Superintendent or designee shall consider the needs and preferences of students and parents/guardians before making an assignment, but is not obligated to accept the parent/guardian's preference if the assignment is not feasible due to space constraints or other considerations. Upon assignment, the transfer shall be completed as soon as practicable. If parents/guardians decline the assigned school, the student may remain in his/her current school.

STUDENTS AR 5116.1 (b)

Intradistrict Enrollment

The transfer shall remain in effect as long as the student's school of origin is identified as "persistently dangerous." The Superintendent or designee may choose to make the transfer permanent based on the educational needs of the student, parent/guardian preferences, and other factors affecting the student's ability to succeed if returned to the school of origin.

The Superintendent or designee shall cooperate with neighboring districts to develop an interdistrict transfer program in the event that space is not available in a district school.

No student currently residing within a school's attendance area shall be displaced by another student transferring from outside the attendance area. (Ed. Code 35160.5)

To implement intradistrict open enrollment pursuant to Education Code 35160.5:

- 1. By the end of the prior school year, The Superintendent or designee shall identify those schools which may have space available for additional students. A list of these schools and enrollment applications shall be available at all school offices. at the district office. A final list shall be available no later than two weeks after the school year begins. Applications will be available no later than May 1st for the next school year.
- 2. Students who submit applications to the district by March 15 shall be considered for admission to their school of choice the following school year under the district's enrollment policy.
- 3. Enrollment in a school of choice shall be determined by lot if there is more than one applicant for a school placement. from the eligible applicant pool, and a waiting list shall be established to indicate the order in which applicants may be accepted if openings occur during the year. Late applicants shall not be added to the waiting list for the current year.
- 4. The Superintendent or designee shall inform applicants by mail **or telephone** prior to July 15 as to whether their applications have been approved or denied or placed on a waiting list. If the application is denied, the reasons for denial shall be stated.

- 5. Applicants who receive approval must confirm their enrollment within two weeks.
- 6. Admission to a particular school shall not be influenced by a student's academic or athletic performance except insofar as academic standards are required for admission to specialized schools or programs such as programs for gifted and talented students. Such standards shall be uniformly applied to all students. (Education Code 35160.5)

- 7. It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to supply adequate information to the district to make a decision on the Intradistrict request. - 8. Students residing in a community facilities district shall have priority, to the extent provided by law, for attendance at school financed in whole or in part by the community facilities district.

BACKGROUND:

The District's First Interim Report, which is a snapshot of the District's financial status as of October 31, 2003, received a qualified certification by the Placer County Office of Education (PCOE). The qualified certification is assigned to a school district when it is determined that, based on current projections, the school district may not meet its financial obligations for fiscal year 2003-04, 2004-05, or 2005-06. A combination of events, such as the State's financial crises which has translated into reduced funding for school districts, lower ADA counts than projected, and rising operational expenditures all contributed to the District's qualified status.

In response to the qualified certification, the FY 2003-04 budget was evaluated, and based on the most current information available, adjustments were made to the revenue assumptions and strict spending controls were introduced. However, as previously explained, the qualified certification not only addresses the current year, but the next two years as well. The goal is to have the resources to meet both planned and unplanned financial obligations under a multi-year setting. To achieve this goal, a list of suspensions and reductions were developed for the FY 2004-05 budget. The attached multi-year projection incorporates the proposed suspensions and reductions outlined on the following page. This multi-year projection was submitted to PCOE along with the District's Second Interim Report, and as a result of the revised projection, PCOE removed the qualified designation. Please note that the projections barely meet the State's requirement for the minimum reserve of 1.5% for FY 2004-05, and still falls a little short of the minimum reserve requirement of 3% for FY 2005-06. For comparison, the total average net ending balance for all

unified school districts was 10.59%. Clearly there is still a lot of work yet to be accomplished in order to bring the District's budget into a long-term stable condition.

Proposed Reductions:

In an effort to conserve on personnel costs, the District is proposing to suspend the K-5 certificated staffing ratio and instead staff in accordance with the K-3 class-size reduction limitations for grades K-3 and the negotiated contract for grades 4-5. The District is also proposing to increase the 6-8 certificated staffing ratio from 24:1 to 25:1 and the 9-12 certificated staffing ratio from 26:1 to 27:1. These adjustments will allow the District to fill some of its vacant positions with existing staff instead of hiring new personnel. Total projected savings is \$233,721.

Suspension of the 1.00 FTE Elementary Spanish Teacher position. The total projected savings is \$51,938.

Suspension of the 1.00 FTE Middle School Arts Core position. The total projected savings is \$51,938.

Suspension of the 0.50 FTE Middle School Opportunity position. The total projected savings is \$25,969.

Elimination of the 0.20 FTE High School Ag Teacher position. The total projected savings is \$18,586.

Reduction of the High School Conditioning position from 0.20 FTE to 0.07 FTE. The total projected savings is \$8,493.

Classified staffing ratios were suspended resulting in a 1.50 FTE reduction of clerical services. The opening of the new elementary school will further reduce existing clerical position by 0.50 FTE. Total savings are projected at \$64,799.

1.00 FTE Bus Mechanic position is retiring under the provisions of the Classified Golden Handshake. The net savings is projected at \$65,280. This savings may be reduced if it is determined that this position needs to be backfilled with a less expensive position classification.

Suspend certificated stipends for kindergarten orientation, sixth grade Woodleaf, 6-8 Athletic Director, 6-8 Activities Director, 9-12 Athletic Director, and the 9-12 Activities Director. Total savings are projected at \$34,384.

Administratively, the District anticipates the retirement of the Director of Accounting position as of July 31, 2004. At this time there are no plans to fill this position. Total savings are projected at \$100,560.

Site discretionary budgets were calculated by multiplying the site's 2003 CBEDS count by the per student allocation. No COLA was provided to the per student allocation rate, and a ten percent deduction was taken from the computed allocation for a projected savings of \$29,792.

Supplemental funding for the District's art program was suspended for a savings of \$16,770.

The District Staff Development budget was reduced by 16.67% for a savings of \$5,000.

Supplemental funding for kindergarten class-size reduction was eliminated for a savings of \$6,500.

The high school athletic uniform budget was eliminated for a savings of \$10,000.

The Deferred Maintenance transfer was eliminated from the budget for a savings of \$130,000.

The total projected savings equals \$847,830.

SUPERINTENDENT'S RECOMMENDATION:

Administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve the Proposed FY 2004-05 Budget Reductions.
