

Dear Parents, Pupils and Friends,

We have been busy on site in preparation for the return of pupils next week and it is very exciting to reflect that this time next week, we will have welcomed all year groups in the Junior School and Senior School back to learning together.

Congratulations to our Year 11 pupils who received the results of their early entry IGCSE maths examinations on Thursday. These exams were taken at the start of the term and it is great to see the hard work of the pupils recognised in the grades awarded.

We have continued to receive news of successful university offers for a wide range of courses for our Year 13 pupils and, this week, I was delighted to learn of two candidates receiving offers from Nottingham University to study Medicine. Congratulations to Ata and Charlotte!

The closing date for the admission of pupils into Year 7 and Year 9 in September 2021 is today, so I am delighted to report that very healthy numbers have accepted the places we have offered. This means that, at this point, we do not expect to be able to offer any wait list places for either year group, which is a great reflection on the health of the School.

In <u>our assembly</u> this afternoon, I thanked pupils who were involved on the pupil panel for the new Head of Science, Head of Politics and Director of Music interviews which we have completed in the last few weeks. Candidates have loved meeting Royal Russell pupils and have universally praised their enthusiasm and engagement. A special thank you to Maria Maciejak, Rebecca Clery. Pettiann Bhoorasingh, Alex Jennings, Luke Mccabe, Thea Savva, Chris Mahajan and Ella Bexley for their help this week.

On Thursday morning I met with Year 12 pupils alongside Mrs Snelgrove and Ms Worsfold to share thoughts with them on the next stages of their Higher Education journey and how we will be supporting them through the UCAS process. We will be holding our Higher Education live event on Thursday 25 March from 9am to 10am. This will include presentations from former pupils and university representative sharing their expertise and experience.

I also took time to discuss the opportunities for Student Leadership in the School next year and set out a timeline for

the School Prefect application process. In my presentation I included some images of leadership and share one of these with you here.

Cricket fans will recognise this extraordinary moment from the 2005 Ashes series. For me, the connection between Freddy Flintoff and Brett Lee (on the opposing side) at the moment of a series victory, says a great deal for how I expect our student leaders to reach out and support pupils at all stages of their Royal Russell journey. This will be especially important for those who are feeling anxious about the return to School next week.



You will already have received detailed plans for the phased return of pupils to the School site next week. These have been set out to help make this process as safe as possible for all involved and will include Lateral Flow Testing for the returning pupils.

It is important to emphasise that we are not yet able to return to School 'as normal' and, our model of operating will be based on the effective routines we had in place at of the end of last term.

Face Coverings

In addition, we will be asking all pupils and adults in the Senior School to wear face coverings when they are inside buildings and when they are unable to socially distance outside.

It follows that, for parents, as it is not possible to maintain a distance of 2m at all times during drop-off and pick-up, we are asking all parents, guardians and carers to also wear a face covering when they are on site and outside of their vehicle.

The guidance regarding the wearing of face coverings is being reviewed by the Government at Easter.

Symptoms & Attendance at school

Please do not send your child to school if they or any member of your household is showing symptoms of coronavirus.

The three common symptoms of coronavirus are:

- a high temperature
- a new, continuous cough
- a loss or change to sense of smell or taste

I remain committed to running the school safely and successfully through to the end of this term and would ask for the cooperation of all member of the School Community in achieving this. Thought and care for others remains hugely important at this time.


Together we have raised an amazing £1,465 for Meningitis Now which will help support those affected by meningitis and stop the disease devastating lives.

On Monday, to celebrate St David's Day the catering team created a special themed lunch for the children of key workers and essential staff working on site.



- Did you know that in a lot of versions 5 pages of her Diary were taken out because they talked about her attraction to boys and girls?

- Its interesting to know that Anne Frank, a Jew in the second world war who became famous from her diary about her life hiding from the Germans, was also bisexual (meaning they feel attraction to female and male)



OSCAR WILDE

- Oscar Wilde was an Irish poet and playwright and became one of the most popular playwrights in London in the 1890s.
- · He was sent to prison for homosexuality and later died in prison of meningitis in 1900
- Male homosexuality was only decriminalized in 1967 meaning many gay mer would keep relationships secret to avoid being arrested





ALAN TURING

- Alan Turing was an English mathematician, computer scientist, logician, cryptanalyst, philosopher, and theoretical biologist
- In 1952 he was arrested after reporting a burglary at his home. In the investigation the police found out that Turing was in a relationship with another man
- At the time homosexual relationships were illegal and her was charged with "gross indecency"
- · He pled guilty on the advice of his lawyer, and opted to undergo chemical castration instead of serving time in jail.

THE STONEWALL RIOTS

- · Before the riots there was a protest in another New York City bar where a bartender refused to serve 4 men who were protesting New York liquor laws that prevented serving gay customers
- On the night of the Stonewall Riots, police began making arrests outside the bar A crowd of protesters then started to form and grew so large that the original NVPD raiding party retreated into the bar and barricaded themselves inside Some rioters used a parking meter as a battering ram to break through the door; others threw beer bottles, trash and other objects, or made impromptu firebombs.

Anxo's Mean and Median Discovery!

Anxo's Mean and Median Discovey!

Whilst working on averages in Maths, Anxo Garcia-Missan in Year 7 went to discover that the Mean and Median of any linear sequence will always end up being equal.

Take this example:

A sequence of 12, 14, 16.

Median = 14 (you can see that 14 is in the middle).

Mean = 14 (the 3 numbers add up to 42, which divided by 3 equals 14).

Here's another example:

A sequence of 4, 7, 10, 13, 16, 19.

Median = 11.5 (you can see that 11.5 is in the middle between 10 and 13).

Mean = 11.5 (the 6 numbers add up to 69, which divided by 6 equals 11.5).

Try it yourself with a different sequence!


