All in the Family

Diagnosed with Wegener's disease, a rare form of vasculitis at the age of 12, Quinn Miller '18 was no stranger to doctor offices and hospital visits. Unfortunately, after several years of remission, her disease presented itself again and she went into kidney failure. While undergoing dialysis, she was moved to the kidney transplant list at Vanderbilt Hospital. Normally the wait for a kidney is between four to eight years, but it was determined that her older brother, Gage '15 was a perfect match!

While at Notre Dame, Gage and Quinn had a variety of student interests. Gage (Mr. Notre Dame 2015) played baseball, ran cross county, and played football his senior year. Quinn was a Green & Gold Ambassador, office aide, and manager of the wrestling team. Neither of them could have imagined that life would take them on this journey.

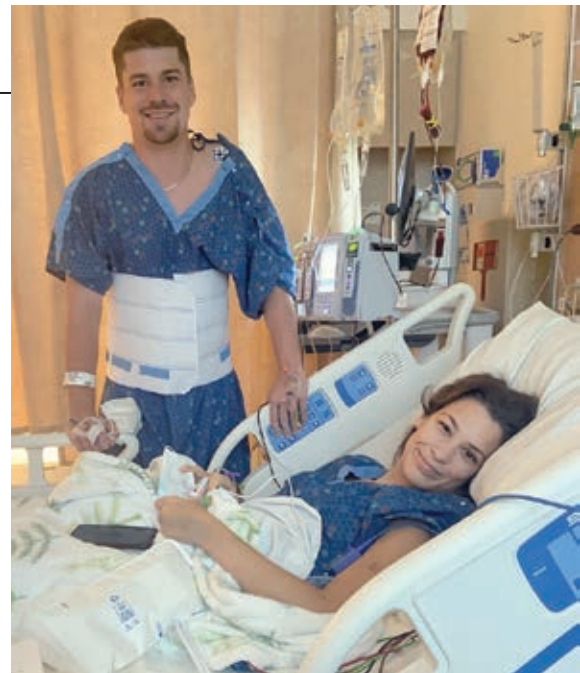
ND – *What was the process in getting a kidney transplant?*

Quinn – Once I was placed on the list at Vanderbilt, my brother Gage made a post on Facebook regarding my need for a kidney. The goal was to find a living donor if possible as the wait for a deceased donor could be lengthy. We were overwhelmed at the response. The team at Vanderbilt had to put a hold on applications because they received so many. It was breathtaking and a blessing. I was speechless! Gage kept telling me, "I know I'm a match. It's me."

Gage – I became an organ donor when I got my driver's license at sixteen. I really didn't know what it meant at the time other than I got a "heart" sticker on my license! I didn't really give it much thought until Quinn became sick and the doctors said family members would have the best chance to become a match. I did not want my parents or younger sister to go through the process so I made the decision to get tested.

ND – *How was your time at Vanderbilt during the process?*

Quinn – The process for a transplant is long, overwhelming, stressful and exhausting. I was worried about so many things but mainly how my brother was going to handle all the tests and appointments while working a full-time job. The staff at Vanderbilt was wonderful and after a four-hour surgery, I



woke up to see my brother in post-op with me. It was so calming to see him! Gage was discharged two days post-surgery; I developed a hematoma around my kidney which required some additional surgery. The best news, though, was that my new kidney was functioning!

After Gage left the hospital he continued supporting me with encouraging texts like "it's time to make more progress today," "move forward," and "get after it today." The medical team has been very pleased with my progress and how well my new kidney is functioning.

Gage – I began the process in April 2021 and had many tests, including fitness, bloodwork and other various lab work. The staff at Vanderbilt are the best of the best! With that being said, the process for my entire family was stressful and exhausting. Once the match was determined, the surgery was scheduled for June 2021 but, due to COVID, got pushed all the way to December 2021.

On December 7th, the transplant was performed. My recovery was pretty straight forward. Two days of post-op and a liquid diet! No more jello for me!

ND – How did the community help you during this process?


Q & G – The support we received from Notre Dame was wonderful. Not only do we have life-long friends from our time as a students at Notre Dame, we had the support and prayers from teachers, coaches, alumni and others. From sharing our story on social media for a possible kidney match to providing our family with meals and encouraging messages, we felt the outpouring of love from everyone. It was such a blessing! We can share our story because the power of prayer was so strong from the community.

ND – What message would you like to send regarding organ donation?

Quinn – The need and importance of organ donation is crucial. Prior to my needing a kidney, I wasn't really aware of the importance of donation or the number of people waiting for a match. My life is so much better because of the support from family and friends. I'm alive and well today because my brother was willing to be an organ donor.

Gage – The reason I donated my kidney was simple: my sister needed one and I felt it was my responsibility to help her. It was a hard process and can be different for everyone.

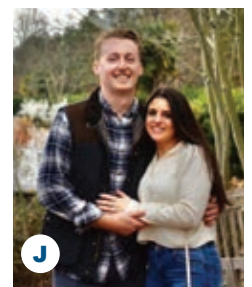
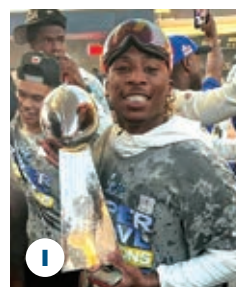
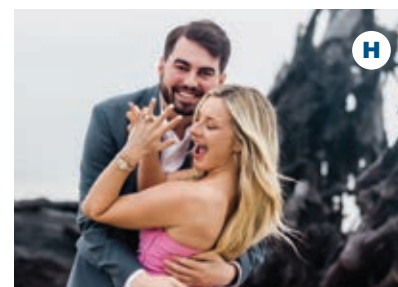
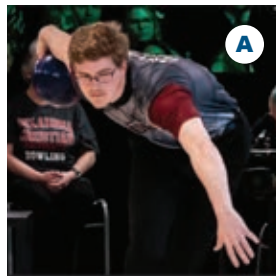
Quinn – I am so grateful to my brother and the sacrifice he made for me. It was a struggle for me to watch my brother give up his time and his kidney, but it saved my life. It is a priceless gift that I will cherish forever. He truly is the best big brother!

You've got a FRIEND

Whether those words bring out your 1970s Carole King groove, or your mid-90s inner child, friendships hold our heartstrings. At Notre Dame, countless students and alum form life-long friendships with their classmates, while others rekindle lost bonds years after graduation.



Class of 1966

When Susan Kimbrough meets her friends at a restaurant or a friend's home, the conversation at their table never ends. "We usually sit there at least two hours talking and catching up, we never quit talking" says Susan. "If we're lucky, we're positioned in a way we can all hear everybody, but there will be small groups between us talking."

Kimbrough has met regularly with ten or so of her friends over the last 20 years. "It's a group that means a lot to us... They come because it's that important to them."

Although new members attend meetings from time to time, most of the group has known one another since the first grade at OLPH. Throughout their time at Notre Dame, these friends attended the school's sports games, clubs outside of class, and sleepovers. "Basically, we stay connected, we bond, we watch out for each other, we support each other during hard times," says Kimbrough. "It's just a great connection that's gone on."

Class of 1971

Fifty years after graduating from Notre Dame, Theresa Hughes posted a signup sheet at her class reunion. The ask? Gathering for lunch and catching up with both old and new friends. Covid had other plans: "... we didn't get together for the first time until January," says Hughes. "I just had a list of people that signed up."

Hughes and her friends periodically reunited at their class reunions, but in between these times, a lot of them didn't see one another. "Those who live in Chattanooga, you're bound to run into from time to time," says Hughes. "But in the meantime, we haven't really communicated that much except probably through Facebook or different social media."

While some members of the Class of '71 have remained friends since high school, others come from entirely different friend groups. "I always found Notre Dame to be a very welcoming environment," says Hughes. "I wasn't the most popular girl but I just always felt welcomed and comfortable there."





As for Hughes' favorite memory at Notre Dame, a specific P.E. class came to mind. Her teacher, Miss Keough, ran a strict class and sometimes asked her students to run the section of Missionary Ridge behind the school. "Me, Debbie Massari Red and Melanie Mayo Autry decided that we didn't want to run that day," recalls Hughes. "So, we hid in the woods." Once class ended, the trio pretended they ran with everyone else, but Miss Keough knew the truth. "Well, we didn't get away with it," Hughes says with a laugh.



Class of 1982

In Beth Wrinkle's circle of friends, everyone is interconnected in one way or another.

"Probably more than half of the group all went to Catholic elementary school," says Wrinkle, who attended Saints Peter and Paul School and later All Saints Academy. "I knew some of them through either summer swimming or my parents knew their parents."

After meeting at a joint band concert in the eighth grade, Wrinkle and Nancy Eberle Howard became friends. Once at Notre Dame, she became acquainted with Howard's friends and the group grew. By the time of their 30th reunion, they rekindled their old friendships and decided to take a weekend trip together. "Our kids were older and we just kind of started reconnecting," says Wrinkle. "We started talking and saying 'hey, we need to start seeing each other more [and] let's get together.'"

For their first meeting, one of the girls found a house at Lake Nantahala in North Carolina. Says Wrinkle: "We all pick up like we left off, even if someone hasn't been there for several years."

While at the lake house, the group hikes, play games, and relax and enjoy a break from the hustle and bustle of life. Once the dust settled from their weekend, they began planning on meeting for at least one long weekend every year. "Ever since then, we've tried to have a big long weekend every year," says Wrinkle.

Out of her favorite memories with her group, Wrinkle recalls renting a pontoon boat, sitting around the fire, talking about memories in their yearbooks, and hiking on the Appalachian Trail. "It's so sweet to have friends that share a lifetime of history and it is great to know you have a tribe of fierce friends that have your back," says Brendie Keane, whose favorite experience is visiting a lake and ending up in a mud fight.

Class of 1994

Since her first year at Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Amber Hagen has always stuck with her friends. “Out of the six, four of us have been together since the first grade at OLPH,” says Hagen. The other two members enrolled in Notre Dame from Ooltewah and St. Jude and became friends after meeting through soccer and cheerleading.

“Several of us were soccer players and that’s how we met Krista Kaspar Gerhlein; Jennifer Rodgers was a cheerleader and that’s how they met Angela Jezewski Lowe,” says Hagen.



After graduation, several members of the group attended the same college, but the rest dispersed around the country. Despite this distance, they always made a

conscious effort to meet and attend each other’s weddings, baby showers, and other life events. “The six of us who get together regularly, we just become closer because we have made that effort to stay in touch with each other,” says Hagen.

Whether they are going out to eat or simply hanging out at a house with drinks, several of these friends in Chattanooga aim to meet a few times a month. With the larger group, the girls try to meet for a weekend trip in June and November to either one of two places: a lake house in Winchester, Tennessee and Blue Ridge, Georgia.

“My in-laws have a lake house in Winchester, we’ve gone up there, we’ve gone to Blue Ridge and just gotten a cabin and hung out and shopped,” Hagen says.



Class of 1972

For ‘72 graduates, their appreciation for old friends grows greater as each year passes.

“As we are now Golden Grads we want and need to see our childhood friends again, to reconnect as if we never left,” says Joe Coleman. “Older, hopefully wiser, we’ve changed physically but look closely and you will still see that young friend you remember.”

While at OLPH, Coleman met many of his future friends from other Catholic schools through sports, concerts, boy scouts, and dancing. “[We] had a feeling of excitement to gain new friends and experience that magic part of life together,” says Coleman. “We all had highs and lows but I think we all felt safe and loved.”

As for other members, here are some of their thoughts:

“Our class is all the same kind of crazy and we have love and respect for each other!” says Sarah Haddock, who usually meets with twelve to fifteen of her classmates for lunch.

Nancy Nolan says the class has spirit, both in energy and faith. Her ‘lunch bunch’ meets once a month, and the group embraces their age.

Jeff Campbell believes the Class of 1972 is somewhat separated from other groups in that they missed the Vietnam draft yet knew many who were drafted or had family members drafted. We share many of the cultural and social phenomena of the day.

“We appreciate each other and the fact of how blessed we were to graduate from Notre Dame together,” says Ann Thomas.

Class of 1975

When Pam Hudson reflects on her friends, she fondly remembers the spontaneous slumber parties. “We did not slumber much,” says Hudson. “We always woke up to Carole King’s “Beautiful” blaring on the stereo.”



“Today, Hudson and her friends foster the same fun and caring attitudes from their high school days. “We are always happy to see each other, whether meeting for dinner and drinks or seeing each other at parties or going on a trip,” says Hudson.

After Hudson retired in 2009, the girls planned a trip in the Western United States: New Mexico, Colorado, and the Great Sand Dunes National Park. “We had such a great time, we decided we should plan more girls’ trips,” says Hudson.

In 2017, the trio decided to take a trip to Memphis to see Beautiful: The Carole King Musical. While in town, they stayed with Lisa’s daughter and fellow alum, Jenny Rosen.

During their class reunion weekend, Neuhoff and her husband, Pat, host a gathering at their lake home. Last year, the group began honoring their classmates who have passed away.

Class of 2011/2012/2013

Spanning across multiple classes, Mary Cabell Kelly McCutcheon ‘11 still meets with over twenty of her high school friends. “We still do cookouts where we all bring our

dogs and grill out and play games,” says McCutcheon, who’s also watched some of her friends get married and have kids. “It’s really amazing and I give Notre Dame a lot of credit for fostering such an amazing environment that allowed us to create this group of friends.”

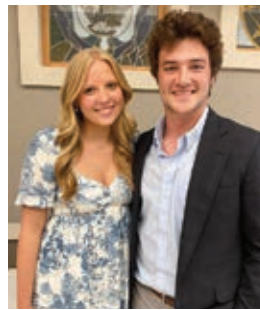

Graduation

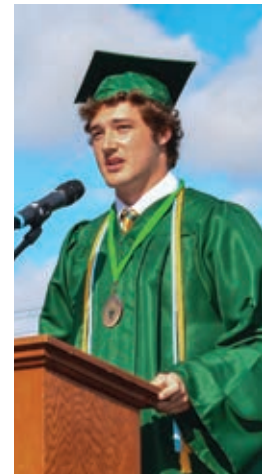

Bowling

The 2021-22 season was a rebuilding year for the boys' bowling team. Because of the leadership of seniors Tucker LeSar and Ryan Eiselstein and the emergence of freshman Cooper Jones, we were still able to finish second in the region. The team almost qualified for the state tournament, barely losing to McCallie in the region tournament.



Baseball

The Irish Baseball team were led by a strong senior class this year and finished the season 2nd in the district. The Irish advanced to the state tournament before falling in the 1st round. Alec Bouchard pitched a no-hitter vs Boyd Buchanan, throwing 7 innings and recording 10 strikeouts!

Swimming

Boys Soccer

The Boys Soccer team was a young team with only 3 seniors on the varsity team. The team worked hard and were able to finish 2nd in the district and qualify for the State Tournament. The Irish return a lot of experience for next year and are excited for the future!



Softball

The Irish Softball team started the year off with a bang, scoring 31 total runs in a double header vs Knoxville Catholic to start the season. The team improved their win total from the previous season and looks to continue to improve next year.

Tennis

The Irish tennis teams competed well this season. The girls team finished 2nd in the District and advanced to the State Tournament. Individually, Patrick Osborne finished as the District Runner up in the Individual Singles Tournament and advanced to the Region Semifinals. The Irish had only 1 senior between the two teams, so will return a lot of experience into the 2023 season!

Track

The 2022 track season was a successful one for the Irish. Throughout the year, the kids constantly improved their times with each meet. The Boys finished as the 3rd place team in the Region and the Girls were 4th. The Irish sent 8 athletes to the State Meet; Nitia Howard (shot, discus), Ty Wilkerson (TJ, LJ, 110m Hurdles, 4x100m Relay), Andrew Fillauer (4x100m and 4x200m Relay), Jaydon Kelley (4x100m and 4x200m Relay), Olivia Mroz (High Jump), Sophie Welch (3200m), Kenny Hammond (TJ, 4x200m Relay), and Rickey Maples (200m, 4x100m and 4x200m Relay). Nitia Howard finished in 3rd place in the discus, breaking her own school record with a throw of 95' 9"! Olivia Mroz claimed 1st place in the High Jump with a jump of 5' 2"!

Lacrosse

The Boys' Lacrosse team competed in their first varsity season since 2010. The team improved each game and capped off a 1-9 record with a 17-0 win against Pigeon Forge High School in the final game of the season. Junior Isha Davis finished 15th in the state across all divisions in save percentage (.607). The offense was paced by Junior Chance Mahon with 12 goals and 5 assists. Seniors Andy McGann (3 g + 1 a) and Alex Osbourne (2 g + 2 a) led the midfield on both sides of the ball. In addition to Davis at goalie, the defense was anchored by Junior Kelley Murphy and Freshman Ian Gregory who led the team in caused turnovers and ground balls.



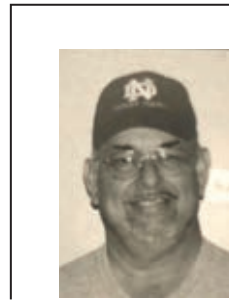
School's Out

FOREVER

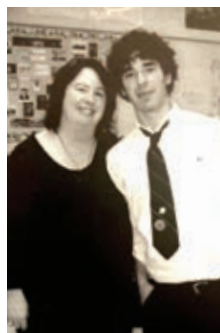
