Being away from campus did not deter the pupils of Millfield Prep from taking part in World Book Day 2021. A full programme was provided for the whole school. We began, as is tradition, with the costume judging followed by a World Book Day assembly which included teacher interviews about reading and their favourite and recommended books. After that, groups were dispatched to workshops where they learnt about non-fiction techniques needed to create their own books. Everyone took part in themed World Book Day workouts courtesy of the PE Department, who delivered on creativity as well as physical activity. Year 8 had a *Treasure Island* theme, Year 7 tried some record-breaking Secret Agent stunts, Year 6 stuck to a *Stickman* regime and the Juniors' *Harry Potter* workout was magical. After lunch, the children rejoined workshops for a tutorial in illustration and then had some time to work on their own 'How To' books. SPANISH ARMADA HELICOPTER HISTORY

Last Saturday, our regulars at the Saturday Helicopter History Masterclass looked at the many reasons why the Spanish Armada failed.

In the hour long workshop, pupils from Years 6, 7 and 8, with no prior knowledge, studied a range of historical sources including maps, portraits, and extracts from Dan Snow's *Armada: 12 Days To Save England*. The group were given guided reading that charted the Spanish Armada's journey from Lisbon to Calais, the problems Sir Francis Drake faced and the role of Queen Elizabeth I at Tilbury.

This was the sixth Helicopter History which focused on giving pupils a broad overview, hovering like a helicopter over a period or event that they have never had a chance to study before. The History department will be looking to extend this project further next term and would like to thank all the pupils involved, many of whom have attended every workshop since January.

Armada ready to England	On 21 July 1588, 130 Spanish ships, carrying 17,000 men, sailed up the English Channel in a crescent formation, aiming for Calais to meet up with the Spanish army under the Duke of Parma, currently in the Netherlands. The English fleet left harbor in Plymouth and followed the Armada for eight days. The English navy had slightly more ships than the Spanish fleet, and had quicker ships with longer-range guns. The English fleet aimed to destroy the Spanish ships from a distance by firing cannon at them, but in those 8 days the English ships failed to inflict serious damage on the Armada.	Not attacking immediately Having a crescent formation
Sailing to Calais	Philip had instructed his commander to get close enough to the enemy's ships for the Spanish sailors to board them and then capture them, but this was impossible because the English kept their distance. Despite this, on 6 August, the Spanish ships reached Calais harbor and dropped anchor. The first stage of the Spanish plan seemed to have been successful.	Trying to board English ships stopping at Calais
Fire ships	During the night, the English commander, Lord Howard, decided to go on the offensive. He ordered that 8 unmanned English ships be filled with inflammable materials such as tar and gunpowder. At around midnight, these ships were set on fire and the winds carried them towards the Spanish ships in the harbor. The sight of these fireships coming towards them caused panic among the Spanish sailors, who pulled up or cut their anchors, losing their tight battle formation. The Armada was blown towards the coast of the Netherlands.	The English boats were shot
Attack	The result of the fireships being used was that the Armada was scattered and was no longer in a position to link up with Parma's army. The loss of their anchors also made it impossible to take shelter in harbours.	The Arm was just too big
Fleet	At daylight on 8 August, Lord Howard gave the orders to attack. The battle of Gravelines lasted for most of the day and was fought in the very poor weather conditions, with rough seas and bad visibility. Many of the Spanish ships were


