A few of the many victims/incidents (there are *many* more than those listed here):

We want to warn you that the videos/images are disturbing, so *please proceed with caution*.

<u>Vicha Ratanapakdee</u>, an 84-year-old Thai man, was harshly shoved on the street in the Anza Vista neighborhood of SF (near the Target/City Center on Masonic Ave.). He was rushed to the hospital but soon died of his injuries. (<u>Full Video</u>)

<u>Christian Hall</u>, a 19-year-old Chinese American boy, was fatally shot by Pennsylvania State Police after they were called to assist him with a mental health crisis.

<u>Angelo Quinto</u>, a 30-year-old Filipino man and former US Navy vet, died after an officer kneeled on his neck. The officer was supposed to help Quinto as he suffered from an episode of paranoia, but Quinto ended up dying of the injuries. This all took place inside Quinto's Antioch home, and both his mother and younger sister were present. (<u>IG</u>: @ajthenurse)

Noel Quintana, a 61-year-old Filipino man, had his face slashed at an NYC subway station.

<u>Subhakar Khadka</u>, a Nepalese Uber driver, was coughed on and harassed by some passengers in San Francisco.

A 64-year-old Vietnamese woman was assaulted and robbed at a bank in San Jose.

A 91-year-old man was shoved on the street while walking in Oakland's Chinatown.

Also, many Asian businesses have experienced a significant spike in robberies over the past few weeks (for example, during the week leading up to LNY, there were <u>20+ reports of theft in Oakland Chinatown alone</u>).

legislation to protect all communities against hate crimes, including the Asian American community."

We want to recognize that anti-Asian hate is *not* a new phenomenon--it has been an issue throughout our nation's history that has been exacerbated by Donald Trump's inflammatory rhetoric since the beginning of the pandemic. The recent reports of hate crimes against Asian American communities serve as a powerful reminder of the importance of listening to our community members and acknowledging their experiences not just now but always.

 - Phillips: Our Asian neighbors are suffering. We need to listen to them When tackling hate against one community, it is important to ensure that we do not vilify another. As many news outlets and articles have

reported, many of the recent viral videos of the hate-crimes against Asian-Americans feature Black perpetrators. This does not in any way justify anti-Blackness. The actions of these few individuals are not indicative of the sentiment of the Black community at large and it is imperative that as readers of these news articles, we do not internalize and perpetuate anti-Blackness. This article written by San Francisco Chronicle Columnist <u>Justin Phillips</u> discusses the "slippery slope" of anti-Blackness and emphasizes the importance of listening and legitimizing one another's experiences.

Amanda Law verbally assaulted on Great Highway while walking her dogs, was told to "Go back to where [she] came from" and to "stay in f***ing Asia" (April 20)

Yuanyuan Zhu verbally attacked and spat on while walking to her gym in SF (March 9)

Elderly Asian man attacked while collecting cans near Hunter's Point (March 24)

In addition, we asked UHS students to share their own stories with us. Two who were comfortable with sharing anonymously are quoted below, although we have heard from many students who have experienced similar hostility:

"My brother was in a store when a group of middle school girls ran into him. One of them looked at him and screamed, 'Oh no! I'm gonna get corona now!""

"My mom's close friend, who's Chinese, was kicked out of a coffee shop because she wasn't wearing a mask. This was way before the Coronavirus was in the US."
