

### **School Facility Information**



Elmhurst Elementary School is a community school. It originally consisted of two buildings constructed in 1964 and later was expanded with two additional buildings constructed in 1965. In 1992, a 4-classroom addition and renovation was completed. This addition was part of the bond which passed in 1989. Also, as a part of the bond, the playfield was renovated in 1992. A modernization project was completed in 2002 as part of a 1998 bond. Currently, our school is a group of four main buildings connected by covered breezeways. Recently a perimeter

fence was added to Elmhurst to increase our campus security, as well as our access control system. We currently have approximately 395 students with three classrooms at each grade level, except for first grade which has four classes. Our school is used extensively by community groups on our fields, in our gym, and in our community room. If you would like to use our facilities, please contact our office at 253-298-3500.




