

Chaplain's Thought of the Week

This week is Comic Relief and the theme is about using the power of funny and laughter. The current lockdown is a most challenging time and across every community people have experienced the impact of the pandemic in very different ways. Though we are still in lockdown and you may have given up some things for Lent, I do hope that laughter isn't one of them.

Bill Bailey says that "Laughter is a pure form of happiness, because it's raw, unadulterated and you can't control it. It can just turn up unannounced and completely transform how you are feeling. We laugh despite ourselves, as if laughter is no respecter of how we ought to be, or think, or behave. It's pure happiness because there's no way to predict it."

Laughter is a great stress release, inhibiting cortisol, the stress hormone, as well as stimulating the hippocampus, the brain's memory centre. 
BUNNY BISCUIT BAKE OFF
