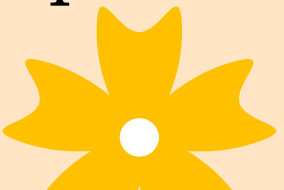

Meet Ruby Bridges

Ruby Bridges was the first African-American child desegregate an all-white Elementary school during the New Orleans school desegregation in late 1960.



How it all started

Ruby was one of the six students to pass the test and her parents chose to send her to an all-white school near their home. Ruby was going to an all-white school during the civil rights movement. How it all started

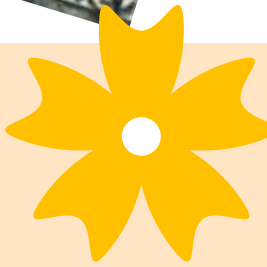

Meet Harriet Tubman

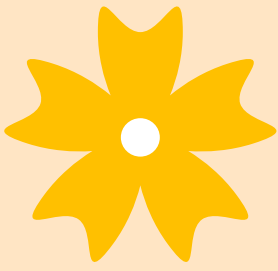
Harriet Tubman was an American abolitionist and an activist. She's well known for escaping slavery in an underground railroad. Not only did she escape but she helped many others and they never left the railroad.



How it all started



In 1849, Harriet Tubman Escaped Slavery thru an underground railroad located in 26 acres of land in Auburn, Newyork. She also freed more than 300 other slaves. In 2016, Lew announced that Alexander Hamilton will be on the \$10 dollar bill while Harriet Tubman will be on the \$20 dollar bill
