

From the PAULpit



'My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?"

These words of Jesus, spoken while hanging on the cross are among the most disturbing words in the Gospels. Did Jesus give up trust in His most dear

Father during the crucifixion? Did Jesus actually yield to despair on the cross? How can we understand this desperate cry? Vatican II's document, "Church in the Modern World," recalls our Christian belief that Jesus' divinity did not eclipse the full experience of His humanity. The document states, "For by his Incarnation the Son of God united himself in some fashion with every man. He worked with human hands, He thought with a human mind, He acted by human choice, and loved with a human heart. Born of the Virgin Mary, He has truly been made one of us, like us in all things except sin." As fully human, Jesus tasted the full depth of human suffering on the cross – physical, psychological, and spiritual.

Recall that Jesus was also alone, having been rejected by everyone: religious authorities and fellow citizens, disciples and friends. It is powerful to remember that of His chosen twelve apostles – His inner circle – one betrayed Him, another denied Him, and all but one abandoned Him. Only His mother, the two Mary's, and John were at the cross. There on the cross Jesus felt completely abandoned – He even felt abandoned by his Father: "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?"

In Holy Week we seek the special grace of being united to Jesus as we ourselves cope with the suffering in our troubled world and in our personal lives. Like Jesus we may *feel abandoned* by God. But like Jesus we are not alone. Just as the Father was with Jesus transforming Jesus through suffering, so Jesus is now with us as He is transforming us! And don't we move toward maturity in our faith as we embrace our crosses and unite them with our Lord's cross? I have learned this truth slowly. As I have brought my sufferings to Jesus and talked with Him in prayer about them, I have been transformed, experiencing weakness to strength through faith.



FASTING & ABSTINENCE: According to Canon law and the U.S. Bishops, rules are as follows:

- Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and every Friday during Lent.
- Every person between the **age of 18 and 59** (beginning of 60th year) must **fast** on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. When **fasting**, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are <u>not equal</u> to a full meal, according to Canon law & the U.S. Bishops.



The Mystery of Love

"It is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." (Galatians 2:20)

The mystery which we adore in this Holy Week is a great history of love which knows no obstacles. Good Friday is the culminating moment of love. It is the commemoration of a drama of love which gives us the certainty that we will never be abandoned in life's trials. The death of Jesus, who on the cross surrenders Himself to the Father in order to offer salvation to the entire world, expresses love given to the end, a love without end, a love that seeks to embrace everyone, that excludes no one. A love that extends over time and space - an inexhaustible source of salvation to which each of us, sinners, can draw. If God has shown us His supreme love in the death of Jesus, then we too, regenerated by the Holy Spirit, can and must love one another. John the evangelist offers us the key to understanding its profound meaning: "having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end." (Jn 13:1) The love of God has no bounds. As St. Augustine often repeated, it is a love that goes "to the end without end." God truly offers all of Himself for each of us and holds nothing back.



The SEVEN LAST WORDS of CHRIST



"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do." Luke 23: 34

The Father already knows what the Son is thinking, but through these words, the Father and Son invite us into their thinking. They make us aware that forgiveness is offered to us through this sacrifice, and that through forgiveness, we are freed from the sin and lies that trap us.

"Amen I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise." Luke 23: 43

The penitent thief acknowledged his guilt and wickedness and was welcomed by Christ. We, too, can find salvation if we acknowledge our sinfulness.

"Woman, behold your son. Son behold your mother." John 19:26-27

This Word turns our gaze from the drama of the cross to those standing at the foot of the cross. It establishes Mary not only as John's mother, but also our mother in the faith.

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" Matthew 27:46 & Mark 15:34

Jesus is quoting Psalm 22– He embraces His suffering by speaking to the Father with the Word. That Psalm resolves in triumph and hope, as will Christ's suffering. The Father doesn't abandon Christ; rather, Christ abandons Himself to the Father.

"I thirst." John 19:28

At the beginning of Mother Teresa's ministry, Jesus appeared to her and told her to form a community that would satisfy His thirst for souls. Similarly, at the cross we see Jesus' thirst, not just on a physical level, but on the divine level, expressing His longing for us to come to know and love Him.

"It is finished." Matthew 27:46 & Mark 15:34

With these words, we see the healing of creation. The Father's wrath is satisfied. His compassion is delivered to His people, and we are gifted with freedom, cleanliness and grace.

"Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Luke 23:46

Jesus bows His head and hands over His spirit to His Father for all of us. This momentous and glorious moment proclaims that the past is finished, and a bright future is open to all. The crucifixion points to a path of hope, taking the redeemed to a never-ending future with Jesus, His Father, and the Holy Spirit.

"Father, into your hands, I commend my spirit"

Jesus bore all of our sins in order to expiate them. He wanted to experience that which was most difficult for His Heart...in order to gain fortitude for us. And what did Jesus say in the midst of the infinite sea of His bitter abandonment? He exclaimed, full of resignation, *Father, into Your hands I commend My spirit (Lk 23:46).* This is a heroic attitude. It is confidence and sublime abandonment. The ultimate that love can offer.

Abandonment is the supreme expression of love, this giving of oneself without reserve to the divine will, which is the total gift of our very selves. This heroic attitude formed from inexpressible trust in God's Love, from perfect selfrenunciation and from loving generosity, is the pinnacle of love. That divine will shall also be our joy and our martyrdom. United to Jesus, what do sacrifices matter when love is consoled when it suffers? Each immolation, each cross, each sacrifice is the perfect fulfillment of the Father's will. That will is a joy and martyrdom–a Calvary and a heaven–because it encompasses all suffering and produces all joys. Oh, my abandoned Jesus, grant me Your love in abandonment, in loneliness and even in death itself! Lord, today grant that I no longer seek my personal satisfaction.

Neither in that which is great, nor in that which is small...But help me to cast myself generously into personal sacrifice...if that should be Your will.

SVdP - Divine Child & Sacred Heart

St. Vincent de Paul Lenten Project: Pocket Shrine Lesson 2

This "Pocket Shrine" project will give tips on the creation and assemblage of the Altoid tin. If you missed lesson one, it basically discussed the collection of materials for the shrine. Search for: religious trinkets such as medals, pendants, rosaries, holy cards. If you don't have such trinkets, good sources include Etsy and Ebay. You can obtain E-6000 glue, Fabri-Tac glue, ribbon, bulb pins (holds charms), Mod Podge, and canvas at JoAnn's. Miniatures and tiny flowers are sourced at Michaels. Adhesive Diamond Wrap (ribbon) and beads are sourced at Dollar Tree.

Step 1: With the adhesive diamond wrap, peel away liner and apply it around the tin.

Step 2: Back of tin contains vintage hymnal music and a prayer. Turn the music sheet upside down and trace around the back side of the tin. Cut it. Apply Mod Podge smoothly on back side with foam brush, leaving no globs or bubbles. Apply the hymn and smooth. Apply top coat of Mod Podge on hymn.

Smooth down and let dry. Then, repeat tracing on the back side of the prayer called "Hail Mary Flame of Love," and cut it out. Apply glue on back side and press down, smoothing out, remembering to allow part of the hymn to show. No need to top coat the prayer, since it is already laminated.

Step 3: Open the tin. The right side (with more depth) is the focus on your choice. I chose Blessed Mother. Turn the Holy Card of Blessed Mother over and place the back of tin and do the tracing around with a pencil. Then cut it



out. Apply Mod Podge to the tin and apply the Holy card and smooth out. Next, apply the adhesive diamond wrap around the inner perimeter. Next, place glue (E-6000) sparingly around the perimeter. Wait a minute for "setting up" and carefully place the red beads all around. Let dry.



Step 4: Apply glue to four stars and carefully position on halo. Next, apply a trinket (heart) onto Mary's right shoulder, after gluing. Flowers glorify the saints and angels, so I took miniature calla lilies and small, white flowers and made a bouquet, selecting pink lace and twine to secure it.

Step 5: On the left side of tin, prepare the prayer by sizing it and tracing the front of tin to it. Cut and apply

Mod Podge to the tin and apply prayer. Smooth and let dry. I cut lace out to be the foundation of the vintage religious pin. Latch the pin on it, apply glue and secure in middle of the tin. Because the hinges can get caught on items, you have to keep things in the middle of the left side. I added a tiny bouquet of flowers and



glued to underside of pin. I added a green leaf to each corner (glued down).

Step 6: On front of tin there are three layers of fabric. First tackle the canvas, trace from front side and cut out. Glue down with Mod-Podge. In similar manner you will keep 2 layers of the lace ribbon together, with a small degree of overlap so it will be slightly wider than the width of the tin. Apply glue to the two lace pieces and let dry.

With these 2 together, plot your items and figure what goes where. I had a pin that had to be first latched to the lace pair. Then glue down on top of canvas. Next position your rosebuds on a small contrasting pink mesh, and glue mesh down, followed by the rosebuds. I centered a foundation ribbon accented with lace for the Mary picture. Glue down and glue the Mary picture down. Done! This project can be modified to be simpler with the use of Holy cards, or more challenging with religious jewelry and flowers, music, etc. The pocket shrine can be taken in your luggage, backpack, purse, etc. or seated on a side table with a rosary. Prayer boxes can be made the same way. In this one, though, you can still write your intentions and lay them inside by Mary. She will hold your intentions close to her heart!

Good luck on your project. These little shrines

make delightful gifts to special people in your life. If you need help with your project, I would be happy to help you out. Just leave a message in the church office at Sacred Heart.

Praying with the Mass Readings

Spiritual reading of Sacred Scripture is a form of prayer called lectio divina.

- 1. Begin... Come, Holy Spirit
- Read (lectio): Read the Mass Bible passage. 2. Read it carefully, two or three times. Let it really soak in. Underline a word or sentence that stands out to you.
- Meditation (meditatio). Ponder the words of 3. the passage that stood out to you. Allow yourself to be moved by the Word of God to discover its meaning for your life.
- Prayer (oratio). Speak to God about the passage. Be yourself. Allow time for silence to let God speak back to you. In this prayerful engagement with the Bible passage, you open yourself up to the possibility of contemplation.
- Contemplation (contemplatio): Resting in silence ask, "God, show me the way."

GOSPEL

Mk 14:1—15:47

The Lord be with you. And with your spirit. A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John Glory to you, O Lord.

N. – Narrator	V. – Voice
+ – Christ	C. – Crowd

N. The Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread were to take place in two days' time. So the chief priests and the scribes were seeking a way to arrest him by treachery and put him to death. They said,

C. "Not during the festival, for fear that there may be a riot among the people."

N. When he was in Bethany reclining at table in the house of Simon the leper, a woman came with an alabaster jar of perfumed oil, costly genuine spikenard. She broke the alabaster jar and poured it on his head. There were some who were indignant.

C. "Why has there been this waste of perfumed oil? It could have been sold for more than three hundred days' wages and the money given to the poor."

N. They were infuriated with her. Jesus said,

+ "Let her alone. Why do you make trouble for her? She has done a good thing for me.

The poor you will always have with you, and whenever you wish you can do good to them, but you will not always have me. She has done what she could. She has anticipated anointing my body for burial. Amen, I say to you, wherever the gospel is proclaimed to the whole world, what she has done will be told in memory of her."

N. Then Judas Iscariot, one of the Twelve, went off to the chief priests to hand him over to them. When they heard him they were pleased and promised to pay him money. Then he looked for an opportunity to hand him over. On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, his disciples said to him,

V. "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?"

N. He sent two of his disciples and said to them,

+ "Go into the city and a man will meet you, carrying a jar of water. Follow him. Wherever he enters, say to the master of the house, 'The Teacher says, "Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" Then he will show you a large upper room furnished and ready. Make the preparations for us there."

The disciples then went off, entered the city, and found it just as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover. When it was evening, he came with the Twelve. And as they reclined at table and were eating, Jesus said, + "Amen, I say to you, one of you will betray me, one who is eating with me."

N. They began to be distressed and to say to him, one by one, V. "Surely it is not I?"

N. He said to them.

+ "One of the Twelve, the one who dips with me into the dish. For the Son of Man indeed goes, as it is written of him, but woe to that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed. It would be better for that man if he had never been born."

N. While they were eating, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them, and said,

+ "Take it; this is my body."

N. Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them,

+ "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many. Amen, I say to you, I shall not drink again the fruit of the vine until the day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God."

N. Then, after singing a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus said to them,

+ "All of you will have your faith shaken, for it is written: *I* will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be dispersed. But after I have been raised up, I shall go before you to Galilee." N. Peter said to him,

V. "Even though all should have their faith shaken, mine will not be."

N. Then Jesus said to him,

+ "Amen, I say to you, this very night before the cock crows twice you will deny me three times."

N. But he vehemently replied,

V. "Even though I should have to die with you, I will not deny you."

N. And they all spoke similarly.

Then they came to a place named Gethsemane, and he said to his disciples,

+ "Sit here while I pray."

N. He took with him Peter, James, and John, and began to be troubled and distressed. Then he said to them,

+ "My soul is sorrowful even to death. Remain here and keep watch."

N. He advanced a little and fell to the ground and prayed that if it were possible the hour might pass by him; he said,

+ "Abba, Father, all things are possible to you. Take this cup away from me, but not what I will but what you will."

N. When he returned he found them asleep. He said to Peter, +"Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep watch for one hour? Watch and pray that you may not undergo the test. The spirit is willing but the flesh is weak."

N. Withdrawing again, he prayed, saying the same thing. Then he returned once more and found them asleep, for they could not keep their eyes open and did not know what to answer him. He returned a third time and said to them,

+ "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? It is

enough. The hour has come. Behold, the Son of Man is to be handed over to sinners. Get up, let us go. See, my betrayer is at hand."

N. Then, while he was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, arrived, accompanied by a crowd with swords and clubs who had come from the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders. His betrayer had arranged a signal with them, saying,

V. "The man I shall kiss is the one; arrest him and lead him away securely."

N. He came and immediately went over to him and said, V. "Rabbi."

N. And he kissed him. At this they laid hands on him and arrested him. One of the bystanders drew his sword, struck the high priest's servant, and cut off his ear. Jesus said to them in reply,

+ "Have you come out as against a robber, with swords and clubs, to seize me? Day after day I was with you teaching in the temple area, yet you did not arrest me; but that the Scriptures may be fulfilled."

N. And they all left him and fled.

Now a young man followed him wearing nothing but a linen cloth about his body. They seized him, but he left the cloth behind and ran off naked. They led Jesus away to the high priest, and all the chief priests and the elders and the scribes came together. Peter followed him at a distance into the high priest's courtyard and was seated with the guards, warming himself at the fire. The chief priests and the entire Sanhedrin kept trying to obtain testimony against Jesus in order to put him to death, but they found none. Many gave false witness against him, but their testimony did not agree. Some took the stand and testified falsely against him, alleging,

C. "We heard him say, 'I will destroy this temple made with hands and within three days I will build another not made with hands.""

N. Even so their testimony did not agree.

The high priest rose before the assembly and questioned Jesus, saying,

V. "Have you no answer? What are these men testifying against you?"

N. But he was silent and answered nothing. Again the high priest asked him and said to him,

V. "Are you the Christ, the son of the Blessed One?"

N. Then Jesus answered,

+ "I am; and 'you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power and coming with the clouds of heaven.""

N. At that the high priest tore his garments and said,

V. "What further need have we of witnesses? You have heard the blasphemy. What do you think?"

N. They all condemned him as deserving to die.

Some began to spit on him. They blindfolded him and struck him and said to him,

C. "Prophesy!"

N. And the guards greeted him with blows.

While Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the high priest's maids came along. Seeing Peter warming himself,

she looked intently at him and said,

C. "You too were with the Nazarene, Jesus."

But he denied it saying,

V. "I neither know nor understand what you are talking about." N. So he went out into the outer court. Then the cock crowed.

The maid saw him and began again to say to the bystanders,

C. "This man is one of them."

N. Once again he denied it.

A little later the bystanders said to Peter once more,

C. "Surely you are one of them; for you too are a Galilean."

N. He began to curse and to swear,

V. "I do not know this man about whom you are talking."

N. And immediately a cock crowed a second time.

Then Peter remembered the word that Jesus had said to him, "Before the cock crows twice you will deny me three times." He broke down and wept.

As soon as morning came,

the chief priests with the elders and the scribes, that is, the whole Sanhedrin held a council.

N. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. Pilate questioned him, V. "Are you the king of the Jews?" N. He said to him in reply, + "You say so." N. The chief priests accused him of many things. Again Pilate questioned him, V. "Have you no answer? See how many things they accuse you of." N. Jesus gave him no further answer, so that Pilate was amazed. Now on the occasion of the feast he used to release to them one prisoner whom they requested. A man called Barabbas was then in prison along with the rebels who had committed murder in a rebellion. The crowd came forward and began to ask him to do for them as he was accustomed. Pilate answered. V. "Do you want me to release to you the king of the Jews?" N. For he knew that it was out of envy that the chief priests had handed him over. But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. Pilate again said to them in reply, V. "Then what do you want me to do with the man you call the king of the Jews?" N. They shouted again, C. "Crucify him." N. Pilate said to them, V. "Why? What evil has he done?" N. They only shouted the louder, C. "Crucify him." N. So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas to them and, after he had Jesus scourged, handed him over to be crucified. The soldiers led him away inside the palace, that is, the praetorium, and assembled the whole cohort. They clothed him in purple and, weaving a crown of thorns, placed it on him. They began to salute him with, C. "Hail, King of the Jews!" N. and kept striking his head with a reed and spitting upon him. They knelt before him in homage. And when they had mocked him, they stripped him of the purple cloak, dressed him in his own clothes, and led him out to crucify him. They pressed into service a passer-by, Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross. They brought him to the place of Golgotha— which is translated Place of the Skull -, They gave him wine drugged with myrrh, but he did not take it. Then they crucified him and divided his garments by casting lots for them to see what each should take. It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." With him they crucified two revolutionaries, one on his right and one on his left. Those passing by reviled him,

shaking their heads and saying, C. "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and rebuild it in three days, save yourself by coming down from the cross." N. Likewise the chief priests, with the scribes, mocked him among themselves and said, C. "He saved others; he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the King of Israel, come down now from the cross that we may see and believe." N. Those who were crucified with him also kept abusing him.

At noon darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon.

And at three o'clock Jesus cried out in a loud voice,

+ "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?"

N. which is translated,

+ "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

N. Some of the bystanders who heard it said,

C. "Look, he is calling Elijah."

N. One of them ran, soaked a sponge with wine, put it on a

reed and gave it to him to drink saying,

V. "Wait, let us see if Elijah comes to take him down."

N. Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. Here all kneel and pause for a short time.

N. The veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom. When the centurion who stood facing him

saw how he breathed his last he said,

V. "Truly this man was the Son of God!"

N. There were also women looking on from a distance. Among them were Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of the younger James and of Joses, and Salome. These women had followed him when he was in Galilee and ministered to him. There were also many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem.


When it was already evening, since it was the day of preparation, the day before the sabbath, Joseph of Arimathea, a distinguished member of the council, who was himself awaiting the kingdom of God, came and courageously went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus.

Pilate was amazed that he was already dead. He summoned the centurion and asked him if Jesus had already died.

And when he learned of it from the centurion, he gave the body to Joseph.

Having bought a linen cloth, he took him down, wrapped him in the linen cloth, and laid him in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. Then he rolled a stone against the entrance to the tomb. Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses watched where he was laid.



RECIPE OF THE WEEK:

Stuffed Red Peppers

As you prepare this meal, reflect on how the veil of the sanctuary was torn from top to bottom.

- * 4 large red peppers
- * 2 tbsp. vegetable oil
- * 1 lb. ground sirloin
- * 1 chopped Vidalia onion
- * 2 cups cooked rice
- * 2 tsp. garlic salt
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- * 1 tbsp. finely chopped garlic
- * 1 large can crushed tomatoes
- * 1 8 oz. can tomato paste
- * 1 tbsp. chopped fresh Italian parsley
- · 1-2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese

Heat oven to 350 F. Cut peppers in half from top the bottom, removing the stem and seeds. Rinse. Put them in a pot of boiling water for 3 minutes. Remove and dry. Meanwhile, in a skillet, cook the onion and garlic in vegetable oil for 3 minutes. Then add beef, parsley, garlic salt and pepper and brown. Drain any fat. Stir in the cooked rice, tomatoes and paste. Cook for 2 minutes. Lay the peppers down in a 9 x 13 baking pan. Stuff the mixture into each half. Put the remaining mixture around the peppers. Cover with foil. Bake for 15 minutes. Uncover and cover the top with mozzarella cheese and bake for 15 minutes without foil on. Enjoy!

Meet Our Extended Family:

Bl. Diego Luis de San Vitores and St. Pedro Calungsod Feast Day - April 2 1627-1672, 1654-1672

Fr. Diego Luis de San Vitores was a Jesuit missionary who was granted permission to serve in the Philippines. As he was making his way there, the ship carrying him stopped in Guam and Fr. Diego Luis vowed to return there. He arrived in Guam in 1668 along with Pedro Calungsod and a group of Jesuit missionaries and lay assistants from the Philippines. Fr. Diego Luis believed that young men, strong in their faith like Calungsod, would be helpful in influencing the youth. The Jesuit missionaries only chose those catechists and assistants who were outstanding models of Christian life to accompany them on their missions. Calungsod, a native of the Philippines, was in his late teens when he came to Guam. In 1669, Fr. Diego Luis established the first Catholic Church in Guam.

After the death of a friendly local chief who had supported the missionaries, members of the Chamorro (an indigenous tribe) rose against the missionaries. Fr. Diego Luis and Pedro Calungsod were both martyred on April 2, 1672. After the murders, the Christian Faith spread quickly throughout Guam. Blessed Diego Luis was beatified in 1985 by Pope John Paul II, and St. Pedro Calungsod was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI in 2012.
