From cupcakes to flowers to the word "love" and more, 7G is showing that **Valentine's Day** fun comes in many ways!




















Elementary IE

KYIV SCHOOLS SWIM LEAGUE - JANUARY 31, 2020

ATHLETICS AND ACTIVITIES



Last week, the middle school Math Counts teams traveled to Warsaw Poland for a mathematics competition. There were four different events altogether. One individual short answer test, a problem solving test, and then the team problem solving test. The last event is a countdown challenge where one student competes against another student.

The winner of each individual challenge moves on and the other contestant is eliminated from the competition. This continues until there is only one student left standing. Our school had one mathlete in this round. Lev started out in 10th spot but quickly eliminated several opponents until he finished in 6th place, way to go Lev.

The teams were prepared and ready for action but were bitten by the sickness bug and ended up playing with two of the members absent due to illness. It would not have been an issue but both mathletes were from the same team.

It was very kind of PSI, who also suffered the loss of two players, to lend us one of their students to help make our teams complete. Even with the addition of the extra player a sudden high temperature left us one member short on one of the teams. While this may not appear to be a problem it has a significant impact on the team score because the total score for the team is divided by 4 to determine the individual team scores. Dividing by four when there are only three members impacted the end result. This however did not deter our students in the slightest. They worked hard and achieved average to above average results on the individual and team assignments.

Aside from the mathematics events the host Warsaw school sent us on tours of the Copernicus Museum and prepared a photographic scavenger hunt in the Old Town. The coaches, Mr. Paul Bateman, and Ms. Natalie Taranec were very impressed by the behavior and the dedication our students had towards the competition. It was a fantastic CEESA trip one which left us all with fond memories.
