
RUMORS, SHAME, AND FEAR
















SWIMMING

On Wednesday, September 9 the swimming season 2020-2021 has started for KIS Elementary students ages 5-10 year old.

Swimming class is a place for students to learn new swimming skills, they're overcoming challenges and learning to grow and improve.

Throughout swimming lessons, kids will develop a routine of safety and swimming fun that reinforces what they've already learned and sets them up for continued confidence in the water. First-time students will learn how to get comfortable in the water before moving on to back floats, rollovers, submersions, and more.


In KIS swimming pool we do take all the precautions to make lessons safe for our students. We set up a labeling system to clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces and shared objects each time they are used. Also, we test water quality parameters in accordance with state rules and regulations.

During lap swimming we monitor that there is enough distance between each student swimming. Each group has not more than 8 students and they have swimming lesson every other week.

11-YEAR-OLD HUNTERS AND GATHERS DESIGNING TOOLS FOR A HUNT

This past week, Mr. Burke's 11-year-old Cultural Studies class teamed up with the school's Technology and Maker Space expert - Mr. Rech.

The class made various early people tools including traditional spears and an atlatl, which is a throwing spear. They were able to make these ancient hunting weapons during one lesson.

After the class designed and constructed their tools, they were able try them out. A bucket of apples in water represented fish and a pumpkin and watermelon represented buffalo. After the class finished their hunt, they had a class discussion on what was successful, what needed improvement and what they learned during this activity.

One student quoted "Hunter-and gathers had very difficult life" and another student stated" this was the first time I ever used a drill".

A special thanks to Mr. Rech for organizing this fun activity. The kids had a fantastic time and can't wait for their next project!















HEALTH AND SAFETY IN WELLNESS CLASS

For our Wellness class we have been learning about the 5 health-related fitness components: (1) Cardiovascular, (2) Strength, (3) Muscular Endurance, (4) Flexibility, and (5) Body Fatness.

In class, both from home via Zoom meeting and at school, we learn about the theory of these important components for overall physical health. We also learn about the importance of being responsible and safe by cleaning up and disinfecting equipment that we may have used. For example, after biking for cardio students take responsibility to disinfect the bike handles and seats.

Other activities we did for cardiovascular and muscular endurance are jogging around the track, jumping ropes, and power ropes workout.

While being healthy and safe students are also enjoying a good workout!



Secondary students in Mr. Butler's Literature class are using Zoom breakout rooms to collaborate on their poetry analysis, adding annotations to the text simultaneously and communicating about the poem's content, structure, and meaning.

WELCOME TO LOE!

This year is special for all of us. We have to face our realities, to find new possibilities within the blended learning, to be flexible and tolerant.

The LOE classes are in Zoom from the first days of school. It was not so easy at the beginning - problems with Internet and Zoom connection, with devices and material, confusion of classes and teachers... However, we could resolve them, and now, when the LOE teachers are isolated, it helps a lot.

We would like only to remind about the importance of using HEADPHONES and MUTING/UNMUTING. In the same classroom there are students with different LOE choices, and they may be distracted.



More than 500 students have been enrolled in LOE classes. They are learning French, German, Russian (native and non-native programs), Ukrainian (native) and Spanish (non-native).

But what a joy it was to have the class "together" (at least as best as is possible) to talk about how we can be a well-functioning "little family" this school year.

The program progresses students through increasingly challenging STEAM activities using a range of electronics including programmable boards, sensors, mechanical parts, and simple open-source software.














