From the principal's desk

The end of 3rd marking period is April 7 and report card grades will be accessible online roughly two weeks after that. As you know, students have completed the course registration process for the 2021-2022 school year. Student requests have been tabulated and Dr. Meehan and Mrs. Bennick will begin building next year's master schedule. I just want to reiterate that parents will have the opportunity to update their child's intended learning modality (face-to-face or online) once again in the middle of April. As things during the pandemic evolve, we know families' plans for next year may change as well. This verification period in mid-April will also give you the opportunity to review your child's course selections for next year. Please review these selections and report any problems to your child's guidance counselor. Please note that course requests may be changed any time prior to June 1, 2021.

One important note for Seniors, on Tuesday, May 25, Parkland High School will virtually hold its annual Academic Scholarship Recognition Ceremony to honor students who have received merit-based scholarships, totaling a minimum of 25% of the cost of tuition at the college/university that they will be attending. The scholarship awards have been rolling in, so thank you for sharing your child's success with us.

Keystone Exams will be given to students currently enrolled in Keystone subjects. Those exams will be given Tuesday, May 18 (Literature), Wednesday, May 19 (Algebra), and Thursday, May 20 (Biology). Only students who are participating in Keystone Exams will report to PHS on these days. All remaining non-Keystone taking students will work remotely Tuesday – Thursday.

I just want to reiterate how much your support and cooperation with pandemic guidelines means to our community. I know we all see a light at the end of the tunnel, but there are still a lot of hills to climb. This past week Lehigh County's positivity rate and number of cases per 100,000 increased significantly in the wrong direction. If we all commit to following protocols, the greater the likelihood of sending our Seniors off in style this spring. After all we have been through, that will mean a lot to everyone — especially the Class of 2021 and their families.

Counseling corner

ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery)

On Tuesday, April 27 and Thursday, April 29, the ASVAB (Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery) will be administered to all students who have preregistered for the three-hour exam. The ASVAB is an excellent opportunity for students to complete a career aptitude test that examines ten different areas, including mathematics knowledge, mechanical comprehension, coding speed and general science, to name a few. Students interested in a military career must take the ASVAB for career training placement; however, all students can benefit from the information provided by this exam.

The exam is free of charge and administered by military testing personnel at the high school; however, there is no obligation to meet with military recruiters if a student participates in the testing. In fact, most students taking the ASVAB are solely interested in identifying their strengths and weaknesses in the skill areas named above. In addition, an excellent workbook highlighting personal traits and several hundred-career occupations is distributed to students, along with their test results. Results of the test are usually available within two to three weeks.

If your son or daughter is interested in taking the ASVAB, registration will be held April 13 - April 22, in the Parkland High School Counseling Office. Students can pick up an ASVAB booklet if they are interested in learning more about this valuable career aptitude test.

College admissions testing SAT and ACT

Registration for the SAT I: Reasoning Test, SAT II: Subject Tests and the ACT are currently in progress. Remember, some universities require a junior set of SAT or ACT test scores. Only May and June test dates are still available for each exam this school year. Students interested in applying to selective private colleges and universities should check if the SAT II: Subject Tests are required for admission or placement purposes. The most up-to-date information can be found on the college or university website.

Students are encouraged to register for the SAT on the College Board's website located at www.sat.org/register or the ACT at www.act.org/student.

The winter weather has been a challenge to all of us, but the A-wing students are keeping themselves busy and preparing for a brighter spring season.






Joseph Cardboard Cutout Audience Members



Information from the Health Room



Help mitigate the spread of Coronavirus

Wear a mask, wash your hands, and keep social distance (even outside).

Complete the Wellness Form for each of your students every morning prior to coming to school.

Contact the Health Room if your child is going to be absent due to reasons involving the Coronavirus, including close contact, quarantine, travel, and being tested.

Return to school guidelines

Please keep your child home from school (even if they have a test or sporting event) if he/she is experiencing any of the following symptoms:*

Fever of 100 degrees or more

Vomiting/Diarrhea

Severe head cold

Persistent cough

Severe sore throat

Students should not return to school until they are fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medications.

* These are the same criteria the Health Room uses as a guideline when sending students home ill from school.



Juniors

All eleventh-grade students (hybrid and online) who have not turned in their grade 11 physical, must turn it into the Health Room no later than May 3, 2021.

Immunization Requirement:

The meningitis vaccine is required on or after the day your student turns 16 years old. Students in grade 11 will be required to have this immunization on the first day of their senior year at Parkland High School. The grade 11 physical is a good time to make certain this immunization is completed.

Allergy season is here


Spring has arrived and so has allergy season. This time of year is sometimes difficult and uncomfortable for students who have allergies.

Please be aware that the Health Room does not have allergy medicine.

If your student suffers from seasonal allergies and requires allergy medication during the school day, please be certain to administer their medication prior to the start of school.

Prepare for spring driving conditions







Keep your eyes open and your hands on the wheel to handle springtime driving hazards.

- Maintain a safe distance.
- Approach intersections cautiously.
- Drive slowly when roads appear wet.

Look for leftover sand and salt

- Many towns use sand and salt to combat icy roads, but once the snow is gone, sand and salt make traction difficult.
- Take care at intersections and give yourself a little extra braking time.

Master driving in rain

 Turn your headlights on, drive slowly and give other vehicles more space.
 Remember, even just a little rain combined with oil on the road can create slippery conditions and twice the braking distance.

Steer clear of hail

 To avoid hail damage, it's best not to drive. If you're already on the road, pull over and seek shelter to wait out the hail.

Avoid flooded roads

- Frozen ground, melting snow and heavy rains are just the right recipe for flooding. If you're approaching a flooded road, turn around and find a safe route.
- Standing water is particularly dangerous because there can be strong undercurrents and it's difficult to tell if you're looking at just a puddle or deeper water.

Library lines


April is National School Library Month





Spring musical program from 50 years ago: April 1971

Student Assistance Program (SAP)



As we continue to aid families in this difficult time, we are having many conversations about sleep problems with students. Many parents and guardians have shared that their children are getting minimal sleep, or, they are on an odd sleeping schedule. Sleep deprivation is a serious problem for teens.

Sleep is involved with many physiologic systems such as memory consolidation, control of inflammation, hormone regulation, cardiovascular regulation and many other important functions, therefore insufficient sleep duration and poor sleep quality will be associated with several significant adverse health outcomes. Reduced sleep duration has been shown to cause impairments in cognitive and executive function, while poor sleep has been associated with poor mental health.

The World Sleep Society recommends the following steps to achieve healthy sleep:



Fix a bedtime and an awakening time.


If you are in the habit of taking a nap, do not exceed 45 minutes of daytime sleep.

Avoid caffeine 6 hours before bedtime. This includes coffee, tea and many sodas, as well as chocolate.



Block out all distracting noise and eliminate as much light as possible.

Reserve the bed for sleep. Don't use the bed as an office, workroom or recreation room.



Exercise regularly, but not right before bed.

Use comfortable bedding.




