Esteemed Board members, Words can be powerful. Words have longevity and can be immortalized. Language is a living entity; it changes and morphs over time, until some words have completely changed their meaning. Words can become weaker or stronger in meaning, too. With this in mind, I implore you to rename the mascot for Olentangy High School. While "brave" (lower case b) is not offensive, "Brave" and "Braves" (capital B) still evokes a stereotyped American Indian caricature. For those with young children it might evoke images of a red-haired Scottish princess from a Disney movie. Regardless, stereotyping does not align with Olentangy's Board's stated commitment to "[challenge] and [reject] all forms of discrimination in schools and [meet] the demands of present and future society." Changing the image of the Olentangy Brave only takes us half way to rejecting stereotypes of the past. After decades of controversy, the Atlanta Braves opted to change only the offensive logo, but not the name, as our BoE has done. Ryan Helsley (Cherokee nation) recently said of this, "It's about the misconception of...Native Americans, and it devalues us and how we're perceived...That stuff like this still goes on [is] just disrespectful." Philip Yenyo of the American Indian Movement (AIM) said of the Atlanta Braves image-only change, "[W]hat they fail to realize is...they're still using a living culture as a theme for their...team. There is nothing brave about [that]." While Olentangy could be seen as redefining the term "Braves," the truth is, it is not for a district predominantly composed of non-American Indians to redefine. We must honor not what the White majority of this district wants, but what American Indians have been saying for decades. Kevin Gover (Pawnee Tribe), director of the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of the American Indian, obliges us to consider: "It doesn't feel like an honor when you do not confront the truth of the people you claim to be honoring...[You] are honoring [your White notion of 'heritage' - history with all the bad parts taken out." Keeping the name Braves is the path of least resistance and expense. Many have convinced themselves that "brave" is a positive term worthy of aspiration, and that referring to an entire school or team as "braves" somehow escapes appropriation. If Braves is no longer a reference to American Indians then choose from an array of other laudable qualities so there is no confusion. If it is still a nod to our regional heritage (e.g., "Olentangy") then find a more appropriate word that leaves no room for interpretation. This is not about giving in to the current trend of "cancel culture" or being "politically correct." It is about maintaining the integrity of the district--making our actions match our stated values. We have a unique opportunity at this pivotal moment to courageously own the past name choice and be culturally responsive IF we make this name change. The Board has asked the public to stop writing about this subject and allow the school committee to do their work, but the committee was limited to keeping the name Braves. No doubt they have done their work well given that parameter. There is no harm in providing the committee the necessary tools to make a culturally informed decision. I ask Board members to

give the committee three things: The capacity to consider other names Anti-bias training and relevant history for all committee members to enable them to look at name options more objectively At least 1-2 American Indian tribe members to consult the committee. The OLSD BoE agreed to "promote acceptance, understanding, cooperation, and appreciation of diverse groups of people." The name Braves violates this premise. The bravery of this Board is needed to follow through on those agreements to make a positive impact for our students and families, and for the community we envision in the future. I appreciate all that you do for our OLSD community.

Dear Board Members,

Thank you for your time and energy that you give tirelessly as you serve the students and families of this district. My family and I are appreciative of the role you play. From my understanding of the last board meeting, parents and community members were asked to let the project committee process take place. I completely respect that as we were a part of the project committee process for our own school's rebranding, however I honestly feel, under the current limiting parameters the board put in place of changing only the imagery and not the name, it puts the committee in a very difficult place. Changing the mascot name for Olentangy High School from "Braves" to an acronym spelling BRAVE is a noble but unsuccessful attempt to have your cake and eat it too. The fact is a mascot name with any variation of the word "Brave" or "Brave" will be associated with Native American people. Chief Glenna Wallace of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe says in a statement written the Olentangy school board:

"The word Braves will always be associated with Native Americans. Firemen are brave, police are brave, essential workers are brave, medical personnel are brave, but the word Braves, like it or not, will always be associated with Native Americans."

The attempt to change the mascot name to an acronym suggests an awareness that the term "Braves" is problematic, but after decades of being known as the "Braves", are we to believe dropping the "s" and making it an acronym is true change or progress?

At football games, will fans cheer "let's go Balanced, Resilient, Attitude, Value, Empathy" or will they cheer "let's go Braves"? Will a community who has cheered on the "Braves" for decades see a collection of character traits or will they see the same Braves they've known for years?

But what about the members of the Native American community who have respectfully asked you to change the name from the Braves or any variation of the word? Will they see our Olentangy respecting their wishes to remove a degrading, demeaning, and disrespectful mascot

name, or will they see this school board regifting them the same slap in the face in a shiny new box?

Besides, making an offensive mascot name an acronym of positive character traits does not change the offensiveness of the word it spells. Would the district consider a mascot name with this acronym?

Nice, Intelligent, Gracious, Generous, Energetic, Resilient

According to the logic of the school board and plans for Olentangy High School, that would be an acceptable mascot name describing desirable characteristics of an ideal student. But the acronym it spells out is offensive to many people in the African American community and hopefully would never be considered as a team name.

Members of the Native American community told you in no uncertain terms they want mascots with any variation of the word Braves to be removed from the district because it challenges their human dignity. Making an offensive mascot name an acronym does not satisfy their request. It shows the district is aware of the offensiveness of the name, but unwilling to change it.

I understand the bind you're in. There are many in the community who would like to see the name stay the same because Olentangy High School has a long and proud tradition with the name Braves. However, the term Braves for the use of a mascot name has been offensive, demeaning, and derogatory to many Native people for far longer. Does our tradition as a school district supersede the current stated will and desire of the Native American community whose long and proud tradition predates our school district by hundreds of years?

It's time for us to honor the wishes of Native people by changing the name from any variation of the word Brave. The school board members have the power to do it, but instead are choosing to place their priorities over the requests of the Native American community offended by the continued use of a demeaning and derogatory mascot name. Hello Board Members,

The Native American community has spoken and the school board is choosing not to listen. The board received a statement from Chief Glenna Wallace of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe who were forcibly removed from Ohio in 1830. She wrote the following:

"The word Braves will always be associated with Native Americans. Firemen are brave, police are brave, essential workers are brave, medical personnel are brave, but the word Braves, like it or not, will always be associated with Native Americans. Eliminating the imagery is the most expensive thing. If your school, your community has already made that commitment, then my advice is to eliminate the word Braves. I thank you for your sensitivity, your desire to do the right thing. And I realize that what I say might not be to your liking, but I must be honest with you and again ask for you to think long term."

The board received a statement from the Delaware Tribe which says the following:

"To get rid of the Olentangy Braves logo without getting rid of the names "Braves" falls short of doing the right thing. You can nuance the name Braves and try to justify it with a dictionary or thesaurus logic, but Braves is still clearly associated with a Native American male, oftentimes a warrior. The issue is not just "politically correct" but it is a human dignity issue."

Here we have the Chief of one tribe explaining that a mascot name using any variation of "Brave" should be eliminated. The Delaware tribe, our county's namesake, says changing the name is an issue of human dignity.

This issue is about respecting and honoring the voice of Native people, but it's also about all of us who have spoken up only to be shut down. This is about every business woman who stood up to their male counterparts only to be shut down and put back in their supposed place. This is about every parent who advocates for their child with learning differences only to be shut down and told they just need to try harder.

This is about a district who spent the summer reading posts on DearOLSD where students expressed the pain, disrespect, and indignities they experienced in Olentangy regarding race, identity, disability, and more. These students courageously spoke up pleading for the district to truly become One Community only for them to be shut down by a very prominent district administrator telling the students behind DearOLSD to stop posting because it was not necessary anymore.

After a summer of supposed awakening over issues of race, after several town halls, and staff professional development sessions about racial sensitivity, the Chief and the cultural director of Native American communities from this area spoke up to say maintaining any variation of the word Brave in a mascot name is an affront to their human dignity. They spoke up and at the moment, the board's position is to shut them down by replacing the name braves with an acronym that spells BRAVE.

If this board does not protect the dignity of the people in the tribe our very county is named after, how can we trust it to protect the dignity of Asian Olentangy students who are currently being bullied and called "coronavirus" by classmates? How can we trust these board members to protect the dignity of Black students who walk through middle and high school hallways hearing the n-word daily?

How can we trust this board to protect the dignity of religious students who are hesitant to be seen saying grace over their food before lunch. How can we trust our district to protect the dignity of gay students being taunted with the f-word? How can we trust these board members to protect the dignity of students with disabilities? How can we trust this board to protect the dignity of students with dyslexia, autism, and other learning differences?

Those questions are sincere and will only linger and amplify if the district is willing to sacrifice the dignity of an entire race of people just to appease local nostalgia and tradition? The Native American community and their allies have spoken up. Will you respect their request for dignity or shut them down? Thank you.

Hello Board Members, The Native American community has reached out to the school board expressing their desire for the district to refrain using any variation of the word Braves as a mascot name. This is a letter submitted to the Olentangy school board members from Chief Glenna Wallace of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe. Chief Wallace spoke up on behalf of her tribe, but the board shut them down by choosing to maintain a variation of the "Braves" name. Here is the statement from Chief Wallace. Thank you for being interested in this topic, for taking the time to reach out to individuals, for seeking different opinions. As you know, this is a sensitive subject and one that is particularly of national interest now, but also one that is not going to go away. For that reason I hope you are thinking about long term solutions. I realize this is a complex issue with numerous viewpoints. So let me just focus on mine. As you probably know, I have been the Chief of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma for the last 15 years. We lived in 26 different states before being the first tribe forced to remove from Ohio after the 1830 Removal Act was passed. Our ancestors walked the almost 800 miles from Lewistown Reservation to Indian Territory in 1832, the land that later became the state of Oklahoma in 1907. I have been active with Ohio Historical Connection for almost 15 years advocating for federally recognized tribes. I advocate primarily for the burial of our human remains there in Ohio, I advocate for the establishment of a cemetery there in Ohio where those unburied ancestors could be buried, I am an advocate for Ohio updating its burial laws. If you do your research, you will find Ohio is one of the top locations in the U.S. for having Native Remains in their museums, basements, etc. Shameful! That includes Ohio Historical Connection which is in the top 5 locations in the U.S. Ohio burial laws give little protection to buried remains 150 years and older. That means looters can dig up even Civil War bodies, take medals, buttons

from coats, etc. and sell them at hefty prices with little more than a slight slap on the wrist. And that is occurring wholesale there in Ohio. I also advocate for preserving mounds, mounds that were built by Native Americans and have historical cultural significance. I am on the Steering Committee and my tribe was the original tribe to be supportive of the World Heritage nomination for inclusion of mound sites there in Ohio. I love Ohio. It is my homeland. But so many changes need to occur there I say this to say that the word Braves will always be associated with Native Americans. Firemen are brave, police are brave, essential workers are brave, medical personnel are brave, but the word Braves, like it or not, will always be associated with Native Americans. I love the Kansas City Chiefs. They are my favorite football team. I also know that they have been so active in removing native imagery, trying to do the right thing, trying to prevent/eliminate the negatives such as fans wearing headdresses, fans painting their faces, elimination of the tomahawk chop. They have spent millions in their efforts. Yet what did I see on my local TV station the week of the Superbowl—a video of a second grade class with all of the children doing the tomahawk chop. Some classroom teacher, a well meaning classroom teacher I have no doubt, had to have taught them that. That teacher did not realize how disrespectful, how racial that is. And those children are innocent, yet perpetuating an act that is hurtful to us, insensitive. And I believe that incident has parallelism to your situation. Eliminating the imagery is the most expensive thing. If your school, your community has already made that commitment, then my advice is to eliminate the word Braves. Choose another logo, one that will not continue to suggest Native Americans even though that is what you intend. Don't just go half way. I thank you f

Respectfully submitted to the Olentangy School Board: (Laurie Reynolds currently resides in San Diego, California, and is a student at San Diego State University. She holds a degree in American Indian Studies and is currently pursuing a degree in Anthropology. She is a member of the

Puyallup tribal nation, located in the vicinity of Tacoma, Washington. While the US government does not allow natives to be enrolled in more than one tribe, and only recognizes native heritage from the tribe in which they are enrolled, Ms Reynolds also has ancestors from other Pacific Northwest tribes, namely the Yakama tribe and Nez Perce). Regarding the issue of using Indigenous mascots to represent sports teams and names/terms related to Native American culture, Laurie Reynolds shares these thoughts: I look at it like this, the name "Brave(s)" has connotations to Native American males who are fighting or "savage"...even if you take the mascot away because the name "Braves" is not associated with any other group. The name "Braves" is still connected to and will have Native American connotations and mental imagery. It is not fair to perpetuate this racist imagery without consent and agreement with the Natives of this land. I would also submit for your consideration, the historical Supreme Court case of Brown v. Board of Education and Dr. Kenneth Clark's "Doll Test," which as you know, led to school integration. The significance of the doll test, at least in part, presented us with the disturbing reality of how racially influenced our children have become via the promotion of stereotypical imagery and racially biased education, and how this takes place at a very early age. As educators, I believe that you have both the opportunity and responsibility to help ensure the healthy development of young minds which will influence the communities of tomorrow, as we move forward as a nation of diversity. To earn a degree in my current discipline at my University, there is a set criteria to complete a rigorous course of study inclusive of the following courses, Anthropology, Biological/physical, Socio-Cultural Anthropology, Archaeology, and Anthropological Linguistics. It is also interesting to note that, in my Linguistic ANTH class, we were just discussing how words are important. Words actually shape the way we think and perceive things. Even if truth is lacking in their association, words can frame the way in which we view and perceive other people. There are many examples of various people, some I may add are or have been in leadership roles intentionally degrading others placing them in a category of being less than. Relating those scenarios back to the word "Braves," this word also has connotations which we cannot easily detach from a psychological influence. Howbeit, it may be at a very subliminal level. Do we really want to perpetuate this notion of Natives? A "Brave" is a male Native. This then negates the inclusion of females, whom I would imagine also participate in your school's sports teams. If the school maintains its stance on retaining the name "Braves," that connotation, along with the name will remain in existence along with any behavior displayed at school events using the name "Braves." Therein, the shaping of the perception of those from whom it originates. This also promotes stereotypical images for your audience and community to digest. Natives are more than fighters, we are weavers, craftsmen, doctors, and are partakers in all sorts of other roles in society, not just fighting and warring. Would it be offensive to you to have sports teams named "the colonizers" or "the land stealers"? The name "Braves," in its proper context and place of honor, within a tribal group, is not a bad thing. The problem arises when it is appropriated and used by non-Natives, which then shapes the perceptions of others and defines who we are as native people. I am submitting this letter from the National Congress of American Indians to be read publicly. We want to ensure Native voices are heard in our conversation regarding the braves name. Regards, Trent Turner Dear Principal Griffiths, Superintendent Raiff, and the Olentangy Board of Education: On behalf of the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI), I am writing in response to a request for assistance that we received from a member of the Olentangy High School community. This individual informed us that the Olentangy High School community is currently engaged in a conversation about whether to retire its "Braves" name and mascot, and asked if NCAI would provide the school and school board with some general information about the facts concerning the harms caused by the continued use of Native "themed" mascots in sports and popular culture. That is the purpose of this email. NCAI is the oldest, largest, and most representative national organization representing tribal nations and peoples. It has been leading Indian Country's consensus-driven movement to eradicate offensive Native "themed" mascots from sports and popular culture for the past fifty years. As a resolution passed by NCAI's membership in 2005 explains, "the use of 'Native American' sports mascots, logos, or symbols perpetuates stereotypes of American Indians that are very harmful. The 'warrior savage' myth has plagued this country's relationships with the Indian people, as it reinforces the racist view that Indians are uncivilized and uneducated and it has been used to justify policies of forced assimilation and destruction of Indian culture." Below are linked resources that provide additional details about NCAI and tribal nations' broad and longstanding opposition to the use of these mascots, as well as the harms that they cause: (We will leave out the links shared in the letter for public participation purposes. Hello! We are submitting this letter from Curtis Zunigha from the Delaware Tribe to be read aloud for the Olentangy community to hear. It has been sent previously to the school board, superintendent Raiff, Olentangy High School principal, Mr. Griffiths, the diversity and inclusion team, and the communications team. We want the community to understand that the Native Americans who have responded to our inquiry about keeping the Braves name have all said, "make a complete change". We intend to support their voice. Sincerely, Olentangy students, Afton Turner, Jane Spelman, Lainey Wright and Olentangy parent, Dr. Jessica Spelman M.D. "Thank you for inquiring to the Delaware Tribe on this issue. Please note the Delaware Tribe nor our cousins the Delaware Nation in Anadarko, Oklahoma have no contemporary presence in

Ohio. We have both been in Oklahoma since it was Indian Territory in 1870. However given the name of your town I can understand why you contacted us. In my opinion I recommend a full and complete change. Getting rid of Native American mascot imagery is an action of removing race- based mascot images. The time is ripe for such change throughout America. I think the move to something like The Knights is good. But to get rid of the Olentangy Braves logo (I looked it up) without getting rid of the names "Braves" falls short of doing the right thing. You can nuance the name Braves and try to justify it with a dictionary or thesaurus logic, but Braves is still clearly associated with a Native American male, oftentimes a warrior. Not a knight, not an army soldier, not an athlete. So being real about this is the best way to confront resistance to change. I realize there will be a cost to the school district to rebrand the name, but that's the price to pay for doing the right thing. But it shouldn't stop there. There needs to be an information campaign as to why the change is appropriate. A lot of that will come from taking an honest look at the history of Ohio and its historic racism against the Delawares and other tribes like Shawnee, Wyandotte, Ottawa, and Pottowatomi. Such history should be incorporated into school curricula. A good resource is the Ohio History Connection (www.ohiohistory.org). I would ask specifically for input from the Connection's Native American resources. I appreciate you taking the lead on this issue. It will be the dominant white population desiring sincere change that will make it happen. Not a small group of Native Americans seemingly acting in protest. The issue is not just "politically correct" but it is a human dignity issue. You can inspire your community to make a paradigm shift in social consciousness and overcome the racism of the past. Would a plan like this be available to Olentangy? Marysville and Worthington, to our understanding, are using their HS football stadiums. If Liberty and Orange stadiums are restrictive due to student population size, could additional seating be brought in to accommodate a commencement? Or is there a different issue that we are not aware of for these solutions? Our primary concerns are 1) That all students in the class can be together to celebrate their accomplishments at commencement; and 2) That families can participate in seeing their student recognized in front of their peers, teachers and principal's as well as seeing/congratulating their student's friends and classmates. The 3 part weekend separates families from the community aspect of the celebration and diminishes the accomplishment and recognition that our students deserve and have looked forward to. We liken graduation commencement ceremonies in importance to that of a wedding. A significant event is transpiring, that is worthy of community recognition. It takes a community to get a couple to the altar and to support them after they have tied the knot. Likewise, it has taken a community to get our students to graduation. Everyone involved in that process should have the opportunity to celebrate together (even if distanced). While last year, brides and grooms held virtual weddings via Zoom and graduation was held "virtually" as well. Drive-thru graduation was a welcomed solution last year when the alternative was no

graduation at all. We have made significant progress in vaccinations and have seen pandemic infection rates coming down. Now, weddings are happening in-person because couples and venues have worked together to implement the distancing guidelines in a responsible manner. Isn't there a way for us to do the same for our community of families with graduating seniors? We inquired back in February for a contingency plan to hold an outdoor graduation commencement for our seniors. As a spokesperson for the 2021 OHS Senior Parents', I am asking again that our students be recognized at an in-person, family-friendly commencement ceremony, not a drive-through graduation. Please let us know how we can work together to explore alternative solutions to the unacceptable one proposed on March 23rd, 2021.
