FROM STEM TO STAGE TO SPACEX

Profile of a Mount Student: Julia Rodano '21

alking up "the hill" -

schoolbooks, Seussical script and robot in hand – Julia Rodano '21, is on her way to start the school day. It's one of just a handful of days that remain for her at the Mount, as graduation for Julia and her classmates is less than 100 days away. With "curricular" comprising the core of any educational environment and "extra" pertaining to all that is offered and pursued beyond a course of study, Julia has created and followed a passion-driven path at the Mount by successfully blending academics, arts, athletics, and more.

With a selection of electives and honors courses that complement the Mount's core curriculum, Julia's coursework includes AP Computer Science A, Robotics, and Honors Physics. A student in the Mount's first cohort of The L.E.O. Program, (see pages 6 and 7), Julia and her L.E.O. team members and senior classmates **Ava Lukowiak '21**, **Isabel Taffet-Isaza '21** and **Lia Tortoriello '21** – recently pitched their budgeting app start-up Bigger Buck\$, to a panel of MSDA-style "sharks."

Bringing the arts into the mix, Julia's roster of Mount-related activities includes Chamber and Concert Choir, Lords Chords, and every Mount production to hit the stage in the Doris M. Byrne Performing Arts Center since her freshman year. For her final Mount role, Julia took to the stage as the "Cat in the Hat," (in tandem with fellow "Cat" Caty Backfisch '21 – see page 14 for more), in Seussical the Musical.

"Julia has served in many roles in both musicals and plays, but she has also put her blood, sweat and tears

into helping to build and paint the sets, creating dramaturgical presentations and participating in choir," shared **Michelle Posner**, Director of Performing Arts. "She is active in the International Thespian Society and has been an integral part of the performing arts department."

From team player in the arts, to goalie on the Lacrosse team, Julia explores her passions through classes and clubs, gaining valuable experience that she feels will be helpful to her future. With her penchant for technology, it is no surprise that the MSDA Innovation Lab has become a place of inspiration for her. It also served as home base during her summer 2020 internship on the MSDA technology team, led by faculty member **Elizabeth Rogacki** and focused on preparing the classrooms for successful hybrid learning.

"I love to code," Julia remarked. "I am very involved in the Robotics Club, and we just submitted our game design challenge which was exciting since I have never really done any design before."

If taken at face value, one might be confused by a high school senior's joy, enthusiasm and capacity – in equal measure - for all things stage and STEM. But to bring those passions into better focus and perspective, you just need to ask.

and working towards building a better and more beautiful world," Julia stated. "The expanded acronym – STEAM – includes "art," which shows how much art and STEM are intertwined; they both require creativity and they both bring joy to people."

When contemplating her path beyond the Mount, art and technology are core building blocks.

"I'm interested in both areas because I want to help make the world a better place and provide future generations with the resources they need to create a more sustainable and peaceful world," Julia continued. "I plan on majoring in computer science, hope to continue my journey with robotics, and as for the arts, I hope to find opportunities to be part of theatrical productions and choral groups." And if for some reason the college she selects doesn't have a robotics team – that's OK, Julia says she'll mentor students in creating one.





Throughout the past year, Julia noted that the ability to stay engaged with MSDA club activities has made the year seem almost "normal." Also keeping her busy college applications – with her sights set on multi-degree programs with acceptances from schools like DeSales, Montclair State, NIIT and Worcester Polytechnic Institute to name a few. As for life beyond the books? Julia's sights are set high. Really high.


"I want to get a job at NASA or SpaceX. I have been interested in space for a long time, and the idea of the unknown is fascinating to me," Julia concluded. "I want to thank the school administration and Mrs. Rogacki for their hard work and dedication to adding more STEM courses to Mount's curriculum. I hope what has occurred in my four years creates a wave of STEM courses and encouragement for young women at the Mount."

Julia's path is unique, and exemplifies the Mount's focus on helping young women "find their fire." No two students share the same journey, strengths or passions, but with a dedication to empowering young women, the Mount provides them with opportunities for education and exploration that transcend traditional expectations, providing students with the chance to soar.

THINKING **OUTSIDE THE CURRICULUM** BOX

MSDA Journalism **Class Explores** Storytelling and **StoryCorps**

Expert research skills, strong writing ability and an unwavering commitment to the truth: core elements at the foundation of any worthy journalism course, including the special elective offered at the Mount and taught by faculty member, Mrs. Erin **Croarkin**. But like that news story that resonates in your psyche and delivers a fresh perspective, new insight or enlightening moment, the key to "landing the story" with a reader, viewer, or in



this case - a student - is that special moment, unique viewpoint, and out-ofthe-ordinary experience.

Through the exploration of a personal relationship of great importance, each journalism student undertook a midterm project that incorporated the framework created by the non-profit StoryCorps, whose mission is to "preserve and share humanity's stories in order to build connections between people and create a more just and compassionate world." As regularly heard on NPR, students focused their work on interview skills and story-telling, moving the mid-year test beyond paper and pen, to incorporate relationships, conversations and memory making.

"During this time where so many of us are physically separated from those close to us, the StoryCorps project was a way for our Journalism students to use their interview skills, practice their listening skills, and, most importantly, connect with a loved one," remarked Mrs. Croarkin. "Even though we are not all physically together, we can still share stories, listen and connect."

In a reflection on the project, **Kaitlyn Hladik '21** noted of her interview with her grandmother, "I know that my Nanny will not be with me forever, so I knew I wanted to have something of hers I could always hold onto. Her comforting voice is something super unique to always have access to in addition to her wisdom."

COMPUTER SCIENCE FEMALE DIVERSITY AWARD

The Mount was awarded the **College Board AP Computer** Science Female Diversity Award for expanding young women's access to AP computer science and helping to close the gender gap in computer science. A total of 1119 institutions earned College Board recognition in 2020, with the Mount being one of only 859 institutions honored for achieving this important result in AP Computer Science Principles.



Mount Students Enter the "Shark Tank"

INAUGURAL "LIONWORKS" ENTREPRENEURIAL COMPETITION IS CULMINATION OF FIRST L.E.O. PROGRAM COHORT

n February 16, 2021, five "Sharks" arrived at Rosary Hall and took their places as judges for the first ever L.E.O. LionWorks Entrepreneurial Competition at Mount St. Dominic

Academy. The exciting culmination of the Mount's first cohort of the L.E.O. (leadership, entrepreneurship, and opportunities) Program – the two-year intensive elective that blends academics from the classroom with life lessons from the boardroom – the shark-tank style event featured head-to-head competition among four teams made up of the 17 students.

THE PRODUCTS, TEAMS AND MENTORS

Presenting their business pitches to the panel of "sharks" were the four teams of Mount seniors who had signed onto this innovative elective in their sophomore year, and worked over the course of their junior and senior years to learn the start-up business lifecycle. The L.E.O. LionWorks teams were:

Bigger Buck\$ - a budgeting app designed to help high school and college students; created by Ava Lukowiak '21, Julia Rodano '21, Isabel Taffet-Isaza '21 and Lia Tortoriello '21; mentored by Kelly Gillease, Chief Marketing Officer of NerdWallet

College: Unlocked - an app to help students with the college admissions process and beyond, created by Catherine Browne '21, Sophia Garske '21, Kaitlyn Hladik '21 and Isabella Vescera '21; mentored by Megan McGee '08, Product Manager, ONYX Design

Charcuterie Chix - a female-owned and operated charcuterie board company, created by **Theodora Exilus '21**, **Patty Ann Forsythe '21**, **Katerina Holevas '21** and **Renee Schuldiner '21**; mentored by Silvia Lucci, Founder LUHV Food

D1 Heat - a company that strives to meet all your hand warming needs, created by Brynn Caufield '21, Elizabeth Conti '21, Candice Davila '21, Hema Devalla '21 and Elisabeth Prioletti '21; mentored by Jessie Garcia '08, Founder and CEO, Tozuda

The "sharks" awarded the first prize of \$5,000 in collegiate scholarships, sponsored by Toyota North America, to College: Unlocked, and the second prize of a \$2,500 scholarship to D1 Heat. The second place scholarship was partially funded by an anonymous alumna's \$5,000 donation in support of the L.E.O. Program.

Ms. Briana Nelson, General Manager of Toyota North America served as a "shark" and remarked, "As a champion of women in the workforce, partnering with the Mount and the Leonidas Foundation on behalf of Toyota North America to provide tomorrow's female business leaders with this unique opportunity has been so exciting."

"Watching the young women of the Mount compete in their first ever L.E.O. "LionWorks" Entrepreneurial Competition was thrilling for everyone involved in the creation of The L.E.O. Program," said Matthew Perricone, president of the Leonidas Foundation. "We are so proud of the work they've done."

The inclusion of the L.E.O. Program as part of the curriculum at the Mount has enabled the school to morph the classroom into an entrepreneurial incubator, where discussions of customer segmentation, distribution channels and revenue modeling are the norm, and guest speakers and professional mentors serve as role models and co-educators.

"Today's Mount students are the change-makers of tomorrow, and empowering them with the skills and self-confidence they'll need to challenge the status quo and strive for the C-suite is something we take very seriously," noted **Christine Victori**, moderator of the L.E.O. Program at the Mount. "These 17 young women have embraced the opportunities provided by the L.E.O. Program, and the time, effort and passion they've devoted to their work, and to each other, has been incredibly rewarding."

A new group of students are currently enrolled in the second L.E.O. Cohort at the Mount, with a pinning ceremony planned for April 2021.

STUDENTS DRIVE CHANGE:

DEI STUDENT TASK FORCE TAKES SHAPE

EPTEMBER 2020 USHERED IN THE CAUTIOUS AND MEASURED, YET HOPEFUL RETURN TO IN-PERSON INSTRUCTION AT MOUNT ST. DOMINIC ACADEMY, with adjustments to schedules and hybrid learning models in place to protect students, staff, faculty and their families. Along with the cohorts and quarantine rules that had become part of the "new normal," the fresh school year also marked a major milestone for the Mount – a deliberate, intentional and multi-pronged approach to educating and elevating the importance of diversity, equity and inclusion across the MSDA community.

REPRESENTATIVE TEAM ANSWERS THE CALL TO ACTION

With the MSDA DEI Alumnae Network and the DEI subcommittee of the Board of Trustees created over the summer of 2020, the outset of the fall semester brought the inception of the DEI Student Task Force. The student-led group, which included an application process, was created to give students a voice, the ability to represent their peers to promote collaboration, and help effect positive change as part of the DEI initiatives underway.

Meeting regularly during CAP period in school and in the evening hours after extracurricular activities, the task force is working alongside two founding members of the MSDA DEI Alumnae Network. Chelsea Greene '16 and Ghilianie Soto '08. The task force and their efforts have been met with great regard during meetings with the MSDA Board of Trustees, the administrative leadership team, and the counseling department. The students' work is focused on the identification and implementation of programs to foster, embrace and celebrate a diverse and representative student body. create a framework for fairness and justice. and nurture an atmosphere of belonging within the school community.

Under the guidance of faculty members Ms. Nicole Perez '10 and Señora Ana Serra-Prescott, the DEI Student Task Force, itself a diverse and representative group of young women, is comprised of Ashlyn Brooks '23, Morgan Brown '23, Isabella Castillo '22, Reyna Gowie '23, Elise McGirt '24, Christina Piparo '22, and Elizabeth Victori '21.

"Being part of the DEI Student Task Force has been an incredible opportunity for me to make a difference in my school and community," noted Ashlyn. "To me, it means being part of a team where everyone has the same goal: to create and nurture a school environment that promotes inclusivity and equality for every person that is part of it."

With "veritas" and "caritas" - truth and love - as core mores at the foundation of the Mount's mission, advancing an environment where every student feels the same, safe sense of belonging is critical.

"The DEI Student Task Force is a chance to do better, to make a difference; to make the Mount the best place it can be, a place full of compassion and understanding," said Isabella. "It's a chance to learn to be better and build a better environment for future Mount students. It's a step in the right direction, a step towards change."

Reimagining the Stage in the Age of COVID

MSDA PERFORMING ARTS DIRECTOR MICHELLE POSNER GETS CREATIVE

In times of uncertainty - when the world's got you down - the arts can serve as the perfect elixir, a remedy of escape from the ordinary, to aid whatever's ailing you. But when Broadway and nearly all live-stage entertainment hits pause and the escape hatch is closed, where is one to turn?

Enter stage left, **Michelle Posner**, MSDA's Director of Performing Arts. With a vision for the COVID-conscious reimagination of the theatre program, Mrs. Posner started with a plan to get the students on the stage.

"When we decided to move forward with stage productions during the pandemic, we needed to ensure the safety of everyone involved," noted Mrs. Posner. "This meant smaller audiences, smaller cast sizes and limited crew. Everyone would need to do their jobs masked, and there would need to be extra cleaning protocols in place like daily sanitizing of the space and every piece of equipment."

In the fall, the Mount revisited the 1900s for the genre of its production - radio. A format absent much of the traditionally complex and close-contact stage direction and crowded backstage inner-workings, the format lent itself to creating a safer environment for the students and staff as they rehearsed for and put on "The 39 Steps" and "The Radio Play Disaster" to the delight of a limited number of inperson audience members and several streaming online.

Converting a typically grand and amusingly over-the-top musical production into a COVID-friendly format – particularly with so much interest from students – was not as simple. Yet through the ingenuity and determination of Mrs. Posner, Director Jensyn Modero, Producer Kelly Sullivan King '84, and Musical Director David Modero, two casts were cast, providing the opportunity to produce more performances which meant more audience members would get the chance to see it. And so, "Seussical the Musical" with cast Thing 1 and cast Thing 2 was born.

To help ease the two casts' grasp on the material and to carry out full safety protocols, the script was adjusted and the choreography was imagined in a way that was interesting to watch, yet realistic to perform while masked, singing, and consistently staying six-feet apart. With a team approach to rehearsal, for example, the Hortons from each cast, aka "Team Horton," or the two "Cats in the Hats" (played imaginatively and energetically by seniors Julia Rodano '21 and Caty Backfisch '21) learned their number and developed their characters together. According to Mrs. Posner, this team approach turned out to be an efficient way to manage rehearsals and allowed the casts to create together. An additional benefit of the double casting meant actors were able to fill in for each other if someone was quarantined during rehearsal or performances.

"It took a great deal of planning and consideration to pull off a live theatrical experience during the pandemic," concluded Mrs. Posner, "but we were able to do it safely and creatively and we had a fantastic time doing it!"
