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And Much More!



After careful and extensive planning considerations with our Administrative Team, School Board, and medical partners, along with the fact that all Parkland Elementary Staff were given the opportunity to be vaccinated for COVID-19 in early March, we will increase in-person instruction for all Parkland Elementary Schools to FOUR DAYS PER WEEK of IN-PERSON INSTRUCTION (from TWO DAYS) starting April 12, 2021, while continuing the option for students to remain in the Parkland Online Program.

We are happy to report that the remainder of Parkland's staff, including all secondary teachers, bus drivers, food service and administrative staff, were given the opportunity to be vaccinated March 27 and 28. However, transmission levels remain at the SUBSTANTIAL designation in Lehigh County. At that level, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) recommends that we keep secondary students 6 feet apart to the greatest extent possible. (The CDC recommends 3 feet of social distancing to the maximum extent feasible for elementary students). We are able to greatly comply with this measure in the current TWO DAYS PER WEEK of IN-PERSON INSTRUCTION model, but this becomes far less feasible if we were to bring all students back for more days of in-person learning. We continue to monitor the situation and are providing regular updates to families via email.

MARK J. MADSON APPOINTED NEXT PARKLAND SUPERINTENDENT

The Parkland Board of School Directors appointed Dr. Mark J. Madson as Superintendent of Parkland Schools effective July 1, 2021. Dr. Madson currently serves as Assistant Superintendent for Secondary Education and Support Services at Nazareth Area School District and will replace Richard T. Sniscak who will retire at the end of June.

Mark Madson started his career in education in 1998 where he served as a High School Business Education and Technology Teacher and Assistant Football Coach in Newton, Massachusetts. He joined Nazareth Area School District in 2001 in the same teaching and coaching capacity and steadily rose through the ranks by serving as Head Football Coach and then transitioning to Assistant Principal at Nazareth Area High School in 2008. In 2012, he joined the Central Office Administration Team to become the Director of Secondary Education and Educational Technology until he was promoted to his current position as Assistant Superintendent for Secondary Education and Support Services in 2017.

Dr. Madson received his Bachelor of Science in Education from Shippensburg University, a Master of Science in Educational Leadership from Wilkes University and his Doctor of Education in Administration and Leadership Studies from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. He has taught as an Adjunct Professor in Delaware Valley University's Doctor of Educational Leadership, Master of Education and STEM Endorsement Programs since 2014.

Dr. Madson and his wife, Lauren, have three children: Katie (18) Luke (16), and Cooper (10).

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SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Parkland Community,

As we begin to embrace the spring season and reflect upon the past seven months, it would be fair to state that this has been a school year like no other. Despite the challenges associated with the pandemic and twists and turns in our school schedule because of the winter weather, I could not be prouder of our school community. Our students, staff and parents have been most resilient throughout the myriad of obstacles we've needed to navigate.

Diagnostic testing in reading and mathematics indicates consistent performance by our students despite the challenges encountered with fully remote learning and hybrid learning. We recognize the role of teachers and parents in engaging and motivating our students throughout this school term and believe this has been a critical factor in student success rates.

Addressing Learning Loss During the Pandemic

As stated earlier, data indicates Parkland students are performing consistently in comparison to last year (prior to COVID) in both reading and mathematics. At the elementary level, teachers utilize diagnostic screeners to assess student growth regarding reading levels. For our struggling learners, each of our elementary schools maintain an intervention and enrichment period to offer additional support and resources for students identified with specific deficits in learning. Additionally, the district will provide a summer program that will focus on engaging learners who need intervention in literacy skills. At the secondary level, an analysis of student performance by subject, based upon current student performance data in comparison to student performance data last year prior to COVID, also demonstrated consistent performance levels, but with a slightly higher number of struggling students. Upon examination of performance of our students in the hybrid model compared to students learning 100% fully remote, we see both cohorts of students are learning and demonstrating growth. Administrators, counselors, and teachers are continuously examining student performance and offering tutoring sessions and interventions to help students who are requiring additional support.

Summer Credit Recovery

Our initial focus is working with our senior students and assisting them with plans to graduate and utilizing our summer school option for credit recovery if necessary. Students who need summer credit recovery will graduate in August. Our normal summer school program will also be available for 9-11th grade students in need of credit make-up. At the elementary level, we have identified students eligible for summer camp which will focus on reading remediation strategies designed to diminish learning loss identified during the pandemic. These programs will be funded via the American Rescue Plan (ARP) federal funds which have allowable uses that closely mirror details provided in the CARES I and CARES II federal funding plans.

Professional Development

The Parkland School Board and Administration have historically provided robust professional development opportunities for our staff. We have extremely talented educators who willingly share their expertise and coach their colleagues throughout the year. Our Curriculum, Student Services and Technology Departments are closely aligned, and they work collaboratively to provide professional development opportunities for our staff. Workshops and programs are offered regularly throughout the year to help our K-12 staff learn and grow their craft.

Vaccinations

During the last two weeks in March, the entire educational workforce in Pennsylvania was offered the opportunity to be vaccinated against COVID-19. This added layer of COVID-19 protection in schools for our staff has permitted the District to increase in-person instruction at the elementary level beginning on April 12, 2021 as noted on the front page of this newsletter. We continue to monitor the environment regarding community transmission of the virus as we evaluate our ability to increase in-person instruction at the secondary level.

A CALL FOR CHARTER SCHOOL FUNDING REFORM

THE ISSUE: CHARTER SCHOOL FUNDING REFORM



The current funding mechanism for charter schools forces school districts to **overpay for charter schools**, especially for cyber charter schools and special education students attending charter schools. Overpaying charter schools, in addition to rising costs, not only impacts school district budgets, but also **impacts every taxpayer**.

PRIORITY:
Provide access to high-quality education for 80,000+ students in Lehigh County.

IDEAS FOR MOVING FORWARD:

- Develop a **more equitable funding** formula which is critical for both school districts and the taxpayers they serve. Under the charter school law, tuition payments are calculated based on the budgeted expenditures of the student's district of residence. By bringing funding of cyber charter schools in line with the actual cost of educating a child in a virtual environment, school districts will not have to pass the unnecessary charges on to their constituents in the form of property tax increases.
- Ensure charter school expense **transparency**, equivalent to the requirements for school districts. Charter Schools are exempt from many educational mandates that public school districts must follow. **Transparency** regarding how much a charter school is spending on educational needs, compared to administration and other costs, will help parents and caregivers make more informed decisions, and will help school districts educate taxpayers on the costs associated with tuition payments to charter schools.
- Increase the oversight of charter school budgets. This is necessary in order to create a **level playing field** among school districts and their charter school counterparts. Because charter schools are funded by the same taxpayer dollars as school districts, the **accountability for funds** should be the same across the board.
- Continue to promote the availability of **high-quality cyber education** options offered through the student's home district. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, many school districts offered a local option for cyber education. Since the pandemic, these have become an increasingly viable option for students and families. With **increased support from the state level**, school districts can continue to provide a high-quality education in an evolving environment.

WHAT DO WE SPEND ON CHARTER SCHOOLS?



Tuition payments to charter schools are based on the home district where the student resides, **not the charter school the student attends**.

School district costs are not reduced when students attend charter schools. **Lehigh County School Districts pay \$12,832 per student and \$28,959 per special education student** who attends a charter school



School districts in PA **overpaid charter schools in excess of \$100 million** for special education services. (2016, PSBA)



Lehigh County School Districts will spend **\$89 Million, funded by taxpayers**, on charter school tuition for the 2020-2021 school year

THIS IS MONEY LEAVING YOUR SCHOOL



Lehigh County School Districts offer in-house cyber education at a cost that is, on average, **between 20-30% less than** what districts pay in cyber charter tuition.

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TRACY SMITH ANNOUNCES RETIREMENT



Parkland School District Assistant to the Superintendent for Operations, Mrs. Tracy Smith, announced her plans to retire this spring. The announcement marks a 30-year career in public education. Mrs. Smith serves as one of four core leadership team administrators for the District who oversees 1,500 employees and 9,500 students. She has been employed by Parkland for the last 13 years. She oversees the Technology Department and is also integral in serving as a liaison between the Curriculum and School Operations Departments at Parkland School District.

Tracy is focused on maintaining a reliable infrastructure and successfully integrating technology throughout the school district. During her tenure, Tracy is credited for:

- Rolling out a robust Wi-Fi network on all Parkland campuses
- Creating an annual FREE Teacher Technology Conference for the region's educators
- Launching a 1:1 program to give all school students a personal learning device
- Designing a Digital Citizenship course to help students understand their role in Internet responsibility
- Offering a certification pathway for Parkland High School students to become accredited in Microsoft IT Academy courses
- Developing a computer science pathway of courses that expose Parkland High School students to various careers in Information Technology (IT)
- Overseeing the launch of a National Girls Who Code Chapter at the middle and high school levels

MICHELLE MINOTTI APPOINTED ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT



Dr. Michelle Minotti was appointed Assistant Superintendent and will replace Tracy Smith upon her retirement. Dr. Minotti has served as the Principal at Springhouse Middle School since 2006. Prior to her leadership role at Springhouse, she served for three years each as Assistant Principal at Springhouse Middle School and Parkland High School. She also taught English at Saucon Valley High School before coming to Parkland in 2000.

Dr. Minotti will assist the Superintendent, School Board and Administrative Staff to establish and carry out district goals and initiatives, ensure the oversight of district policies and procedures, supervise and support District staff, evaluate resources and formulate long-range plans. Dr. Minotti will oversee and coordinate with the Director of Curriculum, Instruction, and Professional Development to support technology integration and participate in curriculum development activities.

Dr. Minotti serves as a dedicated member of the Parkland CARES Food Pantry Board. She and her husband Bob have three daughters; Talia (15), Liana (12), and Zara (9). She is an Institute for Educational Leadership Fellow, an adjunct professor, and a Challenge 5 United Way Committee Member. She has a passion for community and is proud of initiating the Parkland Parent

University series of parent workshops and for establishing R.E.A.C.H., which provides food, clothing, and school supply assistance pantries on-site at Parkland Schools with the goal of enhancing all students' health, happiness, and success.
