Red Bank Catholic Safely Adapts to COVID-19

The Red Bank Catholic Casey family returned for full in person learning on September 14, 2020 after six months of being remote. Several precautions have been taken by the faculty and students to ensure everyone is safe and can have a successful in-person school year.

To start the day a daily COVID-19 screening form is due by 7am to ensure safety before students even enter the school. Random temperature checks are done by every entrance as students come into the building.

Every classroom is stocked with hand sanitizer and disinfectant spray which is sprayed on each desk before class, and is to be wiped off by the students upon arrival.

Staircases have been set to one way directions to reduce

exposure. Each teacher is required to record a seating chart daily in the event contact tracing is necessary. The cafeteria has limited lunch tables to six people per table, and protective shields have been installed between students.

Several new technologies and advancements have been added to the classrooms to elevate the learning of students who have chosen to remain in a remote learning experience. The Owl and Yeti microphones have been added to classrooms to give students the full in school experience from home.

Students at home are projected on the white boards and the Owl allows them to see the students in class to make it feel as though they are with their classmates in person. The Yeti microphones ensure that students not only hear the teacher

speaking, but also hear their classmates, so that they can be a part of the class discussions from home.

These efforts by the administration and faculty, with student cooperation, have proven to be successful and effective.

Thanks to everyone for abiding by the new protocol and COVID-19 guidelines, we will continue to see each other more frequently for in person learning.

Everyone, please continue to wear your masks and stay safe.

2020 Presidential Election

Democratic candidate Joe Biden and his running mate, Senator Kamala Harris, defeated Republican Donald Trump and Vice President Mike Pence in the 2020 presidential election.

History was made as Senator Kamala Harris, the first African-American and third female vice presidential nominee, became the United States' first African-American, South-Asian, female vice president.

This election saw the highest voter turnout since 1900, with each candidate receiving more than 74 million votes each. Biden received more than 81 million votes which is the most votes a U.S. presidential candidate has ever received.

Because of the ongoing pandemic, several voters cast their votes early by mail to avoid crowded polling places. As a result of the mail-in ballots, several states had delays in reporting their votes.

It was not until four days after the election that news networks projected the winners of the election. The results of the election were not certified for each state and Washington D.C. until December 9, and the presidential electors formally cast their votes on December 14. Biden and Harris were inaugurated January 20, 2021.

Electoral College

The Electoral College is a process of the meeting of chosen electors to vote for the president and vice president. It consists of 538 electors, and each state is allotted electors based on the number of members a state holds in the House of Representatives, plus two for the number of senators a state

has. The District of Columbia is allotted 3 electors and is seen as a state for election purposes.

Electors are chosen by the candidate's political party in each state. Each candidate running for president has their own group of electors known as a slate which is chosen by their political party in each state.


When we vote for a presidential candidate, we are actually voting for our candidate's electors. All states except for Maine and Nebraska give all the state's electoral votes to whichever candidate wins the state's popular vote. Maine and Nebraska, however, have a version of proportional representation.

Every ten years, a population census is taken to ensure representation for each state is fair based on the state's population. When the number of representatives a state holds in the house changes, so does the number of electoral college votes that state holds.

Each state's electoral votes are counted in a joint session of Congress on January 6, and the vice president announces the results. The president-elect takes the oath and is sworn in on January 20, 2021.

This year, despite the shocking incident of insurrection by extremist groups on our nation's Capitol Building on January 6, our joint Congressional representatives still formally counted the votes, with then Vice President Mike Pence announcing the results.

Our Congress showed us that day that our United States democracy must remain a constant in American lives in order for us to maintain the free society that our forefathers envisioned.

This concert lifted the spirits of all who viewed it, breathing much-needed, magical Christmas cheer for the season.




The Christmas Spectacular ended with a beautiful finale portraying a solemn rendition of the Nativity scene, set by Mary's Garden.
