What is a SEAC?

Special Education Advisory Council

*The **SEAC** is a group comprised of parents, educators and administration that provides input on special education issues to its local school district.*

It's purpose is to advise their school district on the development of programs and services to meet the special educational needs of children and families. Driving greater outcomes.

Parents can help districts be more effective by sharing families' unique perspectives.

It's purpose is to advise and to advocate, not to decide policy.

Minnesota law requires each school district or cooperative to have a SEAC, but does not specify how the groups should be organized or what duties they should perform.
