

During the April 12 Board of Education Workshop, Board members heard informational updates and heard a report from Superintendent Dr. Mike Fulton.

Here is a recap:

Updates and Reports:

Food Service Update Dr. Christy Ziegler, chief of student services, introduced Nancy Coughenour, director of food services. Coughenour provided an update on the work of the food service department, focusing on the last year, and the department's adaptations to the COVID-19 pandemic. She shared breakfast, lunch and summer lunch participation rates, details about the free and reduced lunch meal and after-school snack and meal programs, and provided an update on financial performance.

The food service department is awaiting federal guidance, expected to come this month, detailing how food service will be distributed to students in the 2021-2022 school year. <u>Summer meals</u> will be distributed in the summer, starting on Thursday, June 3.

Coughenour introduced Grace Liss, who was appointed to become food service director by the Board in December. Liss assumes the new role on July 1. In recognition of Coughenour's upcoming retirement, Ziegler shared several notes from colleagues thanking Coughenour for her leadership in school nutrition at the district, state, and national level.

Response Plan Deputy superintendent Dr. Michelle Hubbard introduced several district leaders who presented details about the district's COVID-19 Response plan.

Dr. Hubbard emphasized that a wide range of individuals contributed to the development of the plan and that each recommendation was made with the district Strategic Plan and state requirements at the forefront.

Dr. Dan Gruman, director of assessment and research, shared district data related to attendance, including attendance rates, absenteeism, and grades. According to the data, students with chronic absenteeism are 11 times more likely to have at least one F,

compared to students who are not chronically absent. Dr. Gruman also shared NWEA MAP update, which provides indicators of academic growth. Later, Dr. Gruman also provided a discipline matrix update.

Dr. John McKinney, director of student and family services, provided an update on social emotional learning and data collected via the student Panorama survey. The survey responses related to student competency, student-teacher relationships, school climate, and diversity, equity, and inclusion.

Krista Carson, elementary coordinator for English Language Arts and social studies, shared details about academic recommendations made by the various learning teams.

Tyler Clubb, director of facilities and support services, and Judd Remmers, assistant director of facilities and support services, provided details about indoor air quality and sanitization. Clubb outlined the current status of HVAC equipment, evaluated with respect to professional and medical guidelines, and 2-year budgetary needs.

The data shared and feedback from teams across the district led to the presentation of the following recommendations to the board for the use of federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Funds.

Kansas Teacher of the Year Honorees –

Superintendent Dr. Mike Fulton expressed that the community is tremendously proud to honor the two Shawnee Mission School District (SMSD) Kansas Teacher of the Year honorees. Natalie Johnson-

Berry, English Language Arts teacher at Shawnee Mission North, is a Region 3 finalist for the 2022 Kansas Teacher of the Year award. This honor was announced in a virtual ceremony on March 28, 2021, hosted by the Kansas State Department of Education. She is eligible to be named Kansas Teacher of the Year, to be announced during a ceremony in September. Each year, every district in Kansas is able to nominate one secondary and one elementary teacher. Crystal Brower, a kindergarten teacher at Shawanoe Elementary and SMSD's Elementary Teacher of the Year, was also honored for her outstanding work as an educator during the March ceremony.

Spelling Bee Student Advances Ishya Bhavsar, an eighth-grader at Indian Hills Middle School, will compete in the Scripps National Spelling Bee. She was declared the state spelling bee champion in late March, in a competition with 74 students from across Kansas. This talented speller is also the

two-time reigning champion of the Johnson County Spelling Bee. Bhavsar is preparing for the national bee, to be held this summer.

Women in Technology Award This week, two Shawnee Mission students will be honored for their accomplishments in computing and technology. Lindsey Chiu, a senior at Shawnee Mission South High School and an Engineering Signature Program student, and Hannah Poe, a Shawnee Mission South junior, are recipients of the National Center for Women and Information Technology Award for Aspirations in Computing. They are being acknowledged in a virtual award ceremony later this week for their



outstanding aptitude and interest in technology and computing, leadership ability, academic history, and plans for post-secondary education.





Perfect ACT Score at SM East Andrew Ward, a junior at Shawnee Mission East High School, scored a perfect 36 composite score on the ACT exam. Fewer than one-tenth of one percent of test-takers achieve this distinction.



Coca-Cola Scholar Hananeel Morinville, a senior at Shawnee Mission North High School, was named a 2021 Coke Scholar. She is among 150 high school seniors across the country who will receive a \$20,000 college scholarship. Fewer than 1/6th of 1 percent of applicants to this scholarship

are chosen to receive this competitive award.



Food Service Recognition The Kansas State
Department of Education (KSDE) presented a
Certificate of Appreciation to the Shawnee Mission
School District in recognition of "heroic efforts since
March 2020 ensuring that Kansas students receive
healthy and safe meals during the COVID-19

pandemic."

The certificate, signed by commissioner Randy Watson, along with the deputy commissioner and the director of child nutrition and wellness, states that KSDE "applauds your leadership, tireless dedication, perseverance, and commitment to help keep Kansas kids healthy and ready to learn." Superintendent Fulton thanked everyone, especially those in the food service department, for all they have done to make sure students have received the nutrition they need throughout this year.

Week of the Young Child – This week nationally marks the Week of the Young Child across the country. Shawnee Mission celebrates all early childhood educators, students, families, and everyone who supports services that meet the needs of young children. Superintendent Fulton acknowledged the important role early learning plays in providing a foundation for success for students.

This is great timing as kindergarten kickoff events begin to be held in elementary schools. Of course, enrollment is open for kindergarten and pre-k in the district.
