

by Bob Raczka (ages: 4 - 10)


Thoughtfully crafted selection of works meant to encourage children to see the poetry in everything and to embrace the beauty of their everyday lives.

by Marilyn Singer (ages: 5 - 9)



by Bob Raczka (ages: 8 - 12)


Who says words need to be concrete? This collection shapes poems in surprising and delightful ways to show kids how to look at words and poetry in a whole new way.

by Chris Harris (ages: 8 - 12)



by Tony Medina & 13 artists (ages: 8 - 12)


This collection of poems depict thirteen views of everyday life for young men of color.

by Mary Soon Lee (ages: 10+)



by: Mariko Nagai (ages: 10 - 14)






### **Apple: Skin to Core**

(ages: 12+)



by Chris Riddell (ages: 12+)


